Hicksville Students Receive Occupational Ed. Certificates

Town Board Sets Hearing On Dangerous Bulding Ordinance

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the own Board has set a July 24th hearing date for a proposed ordinance to give the Town power to repair or remove buildings that are considered dangerous to the safety, health and welfare of the community.

Under the proposed ordinance a complaint concerning any building in the Town will be in-

vestigated by the Building Division.

Upon determination that the structure presents a dangerous condition, the owner will be notified and will be expected to respond within seven days.

If the owner indicates that he will correct the condition, he will be given 72 hours to begin the work. However, the owner can request and will be given a hearing if he disagrees with the Building Division's determination. The hearing will be held within 14 days after it is requested.

Should the owner refuse to act

on the notice from the Building Division, the Town Attorney will take court action to have the structure declared a public nuisance and the Town will then act to repair or demolish and remove the building.

The Town will be reimbursed for the cost of the work by placing an assessment against the land.

The ordinance would also empower the Town to order residents of a dangerous structure to vacate the building if it is believed necessary.

A hearing on the ordinance is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. at Town Hall, Audubon Avenue, Oyster Bay.

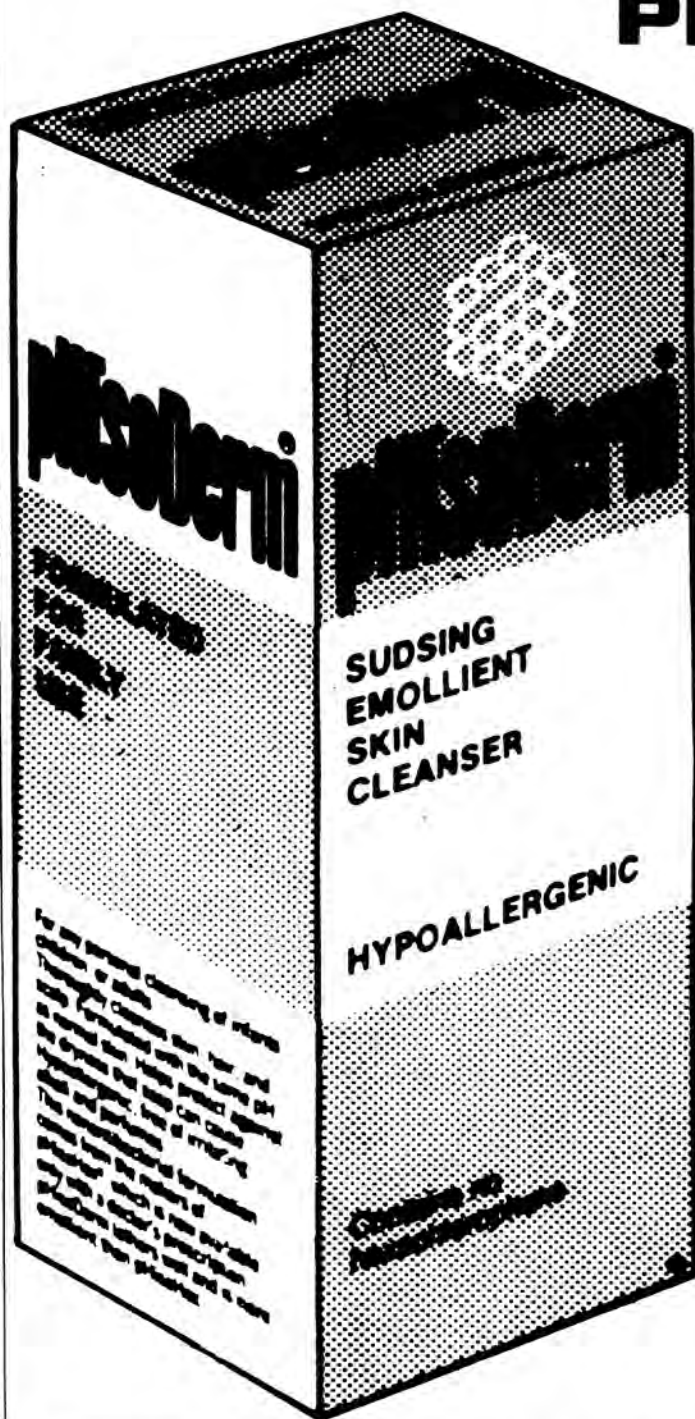

If you have individual line message rate service, your basic monthly charge includes 50 message units for calls from a home or business phone. Each additional message unit over 50 costs 71¢.

Multi-message-unit calls sometimes cause confusion. Probably because people tend not to realize their effect on the bill total.

A call from mid-Manhattan to Holles, Queens, for example, is a 2 message-unit call for the first 5 minutes. But if you talk for 15 minutes, it's a 6 message-unit call (1 message unit for each additional 3 minutes or fraction).

20. Keeping track of message units. We have prepared a folder to help you determine the number of message units for calls in the message unit calling area. If you would like a copy, just write "Message Units," 315 Hudson Street, New York City 10013.

21. Talk to us when you move. Work with the service representative to help you decide just how much telephone service you really need in your new home.

Know your prices. For example... residence customers pay \$1.17 a month for a Princess® phone, \$1.66 monthly for a Timeline® phone and \$2.33 monthly for a Touch-Tone® service. Basic service charge, premium charges where applicable, and installation are extra. If any of these items are extensions, add \$1.23 a month. (Incidentally, the service representative can send you a supply of new telephone number post cards. There's no extra charge.)

22. Toll-free numbers. Before making a toll call to a business in another town, check your phone book for an "Enterprise" or "800" number you can call toll-free. Or call 800-555-1212 to find out if the company you're calling has a toll-free number.

23. It's cheaper without the operator. Direct-dialed station-to-station calls from home or office phones are cheaper than calling through an operator. Rates are higher from pay phones because an operator must help. The same is true for person-to-person, collect and credit card calls from any phone.

24. Cheaper by the package. If you are planning to get Touch-Tone service (where available), we have a Touch-Tone package rate for 3 or more residence phones. The combinations available in the 3-phone package are:

- 3 Timelines
- 2 Timelines + 1 Princess
- 1 Timeline + 2 Princesses
- 3 Princesses
- 2 Timelines + 1 Color
- 1 Timeline + 1 Princess + 1 Color

The monthly rate for the 3-phone package is \$7.38, plus basic service and installation charges. Price breaks range from 24¢ to \$2.39 over prices of individual items, depending on the combination you choose.

Ask your service representative for details about packages of 4 or more phones.

25. Help from the operator. If, after repeated attempts, your direct-dialed call doesn't go through, tell the operator who will try to put your call through and see that you are charged the lower direct-dialed rate.

26. Limited-access long distance. Businessmen, if you want only selected personnel to make long distance calls, ask your service adviser—or your communications consultant—about "Toll-Diversion Service" for customers with switchboards. There is a monthly charge for this service, however, you may save on long distance.

27. Person-to-person is deluxe. Calling person-to-person can cost more than twice as much as direct-dialed calls. So when you have to make a long distance call, try to schedule it


in advance. If family members are away, set a specific time for them to call home—preferably when rates are lowest—so they can make the call at station-to-station rates.

28. "Time" and "Weather" aren't free. Remember that calls to either Time or Weather are charged as message units.
