## "Noise of Fire Whistles Reduced"

Hicksville Fire Commissioners have ordered the sounding of the Districts Five Sirens and one Air Horn reduced during the night-time hours. Firemen are alerted by Home Alert Radios but these are not enough at times and with the responsibility of providing Fire and Emergency protection for almost 58,000 residents in Industrial Buildings, stores etc. The Underwriters require a backup system. Also Hicksville's Firemen are not paid and therefore can't be expected to stay at home near the Alert Radios 24 hours a day. Firemen still do need an audible warning system.

### 12 NOON SIGNAL

It has been reported that many people think the Fire Dispatchers have nothing better to do than blow the Whistle at 12 Noon to

make the people jump. This couldn't be farther from the truth. The Fire Alarm system is required by the Fire Underwriters, to be tested at least once a day. This is not done to tell everyone that it is noon time. Unless the fire is serious the sounding of the horn and sirens will be kept to a minimum. For the past several years the sirens have been turned off at 10 PM and go back on at 7 AM. This is still the case, so don't get upset if it blows between 10 PM and 7 AM it may just be that the time clock lost power or some other minor problem.

The Horn blows 24 hours a day, but the number of times it blasts has been cut in half. It is a small price to pay for the service. The Tax Rate we enjoy now is due to the system we employ.

## "Hicksville: Another House Fire, Another Close Call"

A house fire at 2:08 AM on Saturday July 14 caused heavy damage to a bedroom and to a garage. Smoke and fire, which started in a garage, spread up the walls and through the wood floor above into the living area. Mr. and Mrs. LeCompte and their three children escaped just in time down the only exit stairs they had. The children's room was gutted.

Firemen took a beating getting into the blaze due to heavy smoke. 55 firemen, 8 pieces of apparatus under Chief Louis Mertz responded. While firemen fought the fire, which was at 90 Morgan St, a second call was received at 2:26 AM for a car fire at 78 Burns Ave. One engine, co. standing by at the scene of the Morgan St. fire responded. At 2:28 AM another call was received for a fire at the Astro Motel on South Oyster Bay Rd. Hicksville vamps being tied up fighting the other fires requested assistance from the Plainview Fire Dept. Upon arrival, Plainview vamps under Chief Klien and Hicksville Asst. Chief Ferber found that call to be a malicious false alarm, which helps us to point out an important fact. Had that false alarm come first before the house fire, some

lives could have been lost. Don't wait till someone gets injured or killed. You can help by educating your family on the dangers of a false alarm. If there is an alarm box by your house develop a habit of checking it from time to time. Report anyone tampering, defacing or sending in a false alarm. Any help you can give us will be appreciated.

A smokey fire on July 17 at 119 Bethpage Road kept Hicksville vamps busy for an hour. A clothes dryer caught fire and the fire spread to the cellar. Firemen were out at the time at a false alarm at the Mid Island Plaza. False alarms from careless workers or poor equipment

recently, have been occurring on a regular basis in the past few weeks.

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## Agreement On Contract Disputes

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Case and Patrolmen's Benevolent Association President Cliff W. Schmidt announced agreement on a fact-finder's report designed to end the contract dispute between the county and the association.

The agreement, which is subject to ratification by the County Board of Supervisors and the PBA, provides for an 8-per-cent pay hike in 1973, retroactive to Jan. 1, when the old contract expired and a 7 1/2-per-cent increase in 1974. The two-year package would cost the county \$5,087,000 in 1973 and \$4,599,000 in 1974.

Case said that he was "not fully satisfied with the fact-finder's agreement, but then, in contract bargaining no one is ever fully satisfied and there must be some give-and-take. For the most part, I believe it to be fair and equitable." Schmidt said that "while it is not everything we wanted, it is fair and reflects the needs of the policemen of the county."

The PBA placed 141 demands on the table when negotiations between the association and the

county opened. More than 100 were withdrawn and there were only 26 remaining when the county and the PBA went to impasse. The factfinders disapproved 20 of the 26 after the county refused to agree with them. Included in these were demands for changes in grievance procedures, increased compensation for members working holidays, an increase in the number of holidays, an increase in sick leave, an increase in personal days, an increase in longevity and tenure for detectives.

In addition to the pay hikes, the factfinders call for a \$50 increase in the clothing allowance for non-uniformed police personnel and a \$50 increase for equipment for all ranks. Both items reflect rising costs. The report also provides for a rescheduling of police tours and recommends that "the requirement for college credits to take promotional examinations be continued." However, to correct some inequities in that examination policy, the factfinders further recommended that "said requirement not apply to those persons who were on the force prior to Jan. 1, 1970."

## Tobay Resident Reminded About Beach Access

With the warm weather attracting more and more people to the Town's beaches, Supervisor John W. Burke has again reminded Tobay residents heading for Tobay Beach that they will have access via the Jones Beach Causeway even in the event the Jones Beach parking lots are filled to capacity.

The Supervisor said the Town had reached an agreement with the Long Island State Park Commission whereby parkway policy will allow Town residents displaying Oyster Bay Beach

Permits to enter the Causeway at the Merrick Road entrance. He pointed out that before the agreement, when Jones Beach parking lots have been filled, road blocks have been erected to close off southbound traffic to the Causeway preventing Oyster Bay residents from reaching Tobay Beach.

The Supervisor advised Town residents to exit from the parkways and go directly to the Merrick Road entrance with their Town Beach permits clearly visible.

Oyster Bay Supervisor John W. Burke has issued a reminder to park district residents with pool memberships that registration for the second session of the free swimming program conducted by the Town Division of Parks will take place July 18 through July 22. If the classes are not filled during registration week, registration will be accepted during the first week of classes. The program will be conducted July 23 through August 17.

Instruction is offered minimum age, 8 years in the pools at Plainview Old Bethpage

Community Park in Plainview, Bethpage Community Park on Stewart Avenue in Bethpage, Syosset-Woodbury Park in Syosset and the Marjorie R. Post Community Park in Massapequa.

Swimming instructors, certified by the American Red Cross, will conduct sessions for Beginner, Advanced Beginner, Intermediate and Swimmers classes. The 4-week Junior and Senior Lifesaving courses will be continued at each of the pools.

## Highway Projects Approved By Tobay

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the Town Board had awarded a Department of Public Works contract to De Gore Construction Incorporated of 128 Greenwich Street, Hempstead, lowest bidder at \$222,920.00, of three bids submitted for concrete repairs in Hicksville, Jericho, Syosset and East Norwich.

Burke said the highway improvements are scheduled for the following areas in the mid-island communities: HICKSVILLE: project bordered on east by Linden Blvd. extending ap-

proximately between Farm Lane (north) and Lee Avenue, extends west to (but not including) Jerusalem Avenue between Maglie Drive (north) and South Dean Street.

JERICHO: a triangular area bordered on north by (but not including) the Long Island Expressway Service Road between Clinton Lane (west) and Rockland Drive, extends south-west on Rockland Drive to Yeats Lane; bordered on west by Yeats and Clinton Lanes.

SYOSSET: all of Arizona Avenue and its side streets.

EAST NORWICH: northern most part of project is Summit Court; bordered on west by Hill Drive between Summit Court and West Oak Hill Drive; southern border is West Oak Hill Drive and Oak Hill Drive to approximately 250' south-east of The Circle. Project includes repairs on Wood Drive, Wood Court, Francesca Drive, The Circle, the western portion of Soundview Avenue and the southern end of Singworth Street.

The estimated construction time for the work plan is two hundred (200) calendar days.

## Discount Toll Books Make A Big Hit In Oyster Bay

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that more than 500 Long Island State Park Commission discount toll books have been sold by the Town of Oyster Bay since they first went on sale on June 13.

The toll books were distributed to Town Hall and its annexes in Massapequa and Hicksville for sale through an agreement with the Commission. Formerly, the books were only obtainable by writing to the Commission offices at Belmont Lake State Park.

The agreement to let the Town

sell the discount books came about as a result of cooperative effort by Assemblyman Philip B. Healey, Supervisor Burke and Mr. H.L. Bill, General manager of the Long Island State Park Commission. Assemblyman Healey discussed the project with the Commission for several months to enable the Town to extend the service to its residents.

The books, which are good through January 31, 1974 according to Town Clerk Ann R. Ocker, are available in the following denominations: 10 trip -

\$3.00, 25 trip - \$10.00 and 50 trip - \$15.00.

The normal toll for access to the beaches is \$7.00 during the summer and 50 cents during the off-months.

"We were pleased to be able to offer this service to our residents," Mrs. Ocker stated. "We couldn't be happier with the reception the books have gotten and feel confident that many more people will take advantage of the books when the 1974 edition goes on sale next February."

## 'Operation Skylight' 12"

The Nassau County Police Department has initiated night helicopter patrols by its Air Bureau aimed at cutting down criminal activities in waterfront areas of the north and south shores.

Termed "Operation Skylight," the patrols started on July 7 and current plans call for them to continue until September 15.

Police Commissioner Louis J. Frank said the patrols were instituted primarily as a deterrent to burglars and thieves who prey upon marine craft and equipment on the county's two shores.

effect, a three pronged effort by the Nassau County police to diminish the amount of boat and marine thefts at marinas, along canals and in the open waters. In addition to two helicopters equipped with 3.8 million candlepower searchlights, boats from the Marine Bureau and unmarked police cars from the Crime Prevention Unit are utilized in a coordinated land, sea and air patrol.

The three units maintain direct radio contact with each other with the helicopter being the focal point of the operation.

Inspector Harry Engel, commanding officer of the Air Bureau, said the helicopter cruises at about 500 feet in the air and its search-light which is 16 inches in diameter and 24 inches in depth can light up an area half the size of a football field.

Even if we were never able to spot anyone," Engel said, "It is a psychological deterrent to anyone wanting to steal a boat,

an engine or a piece of equipment."

"When that light goes on, it's just like daylight," Engel added.

The helicopter crew consists of three men: the pilot, an observer from the Marine Bureau and an Air Bureau crewman to operate the light. The Marine Bureau observer supervises and coordinates the movements of the chopper, the patrol boat and the patrol car on land.

While the patrols are all at night, they will be in effect in different areas at different times and at odd patterns.

Although the primary purpose of the patrol is to cut down on crime along the waterways, the helicopter will be available for any emergency activity if it is needed. As a case in point, the Skylight helicopter only recently assisted in the rescue of three people from a capsized boat off Port Washington after which it returned to its assigned patrol.

## 150,000 Residents Receive New Leisure Pass

Nassau Recreation and Parks Commissioner Richard A. Fitch today announced that 150,000 residents have applied for the new Leisure Pass identification card since the county began issuing the passes in March.

The Leisure Pass is now required for admission to all ice skating facilities at county parks. Beginning January 1, the identification card will also be required for admission to all county parks, where now only proof of residency is necessary.

Among the topics to be discussed are administrative structure, fiscal systems and program consolidation and improvement; computer consoles will be used in demonstration of case studies and problem analysis.

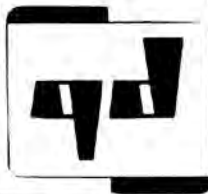

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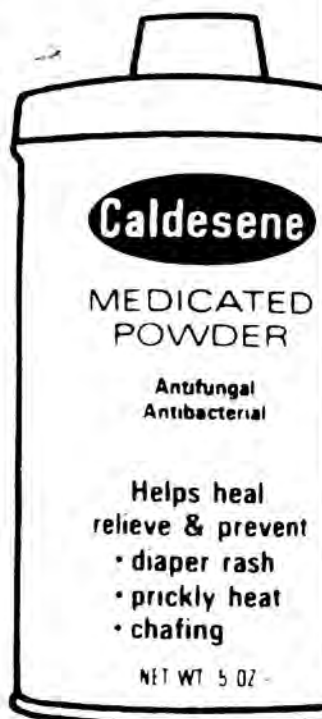

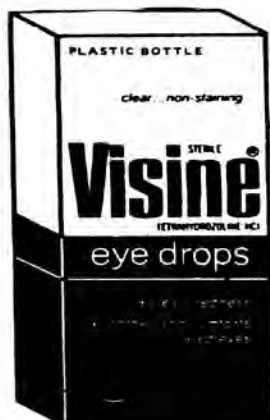

In the mid-1950's, when discrimination was mentioned, one didn't have much difficulty picturing back-of-the-bus segregation, separate restroom facilities, and lunch counter sit-ins.

These ugly scenes have fortunately been dropped from our National lifestyle, but only, I'm afraid, to shatter into a thousand smaller struggles. The most recent joust for "equal right" is being carried out by and for women, that 51 percent of our populace hardly anyone concedes

has enjoyed equal job opportunities in the past. Another current quest involves the original American-the Indian. Both of these struggles are illustrative of a trend that began with the black civil rights movement of the 50's. Activism spawned organization; organization fostered leaders; and leaders invariably were drawn from the charismatic visible personages who could best portray the cult when the cameras closed in.

The shift from the quiet and steady to the loud and turbulent was apparent both in personalities and methodologies. Just

as the Roy Wilkins gave way to the Stokely Carmichaels, so did steady pressure and engotiation give way to demands and confrontation. The rule of thumb for bettering one's lot evolved from who can make the best rational case to the "movers and shakers" to who can scream the loudest.

No two social scientists probably have the same theory on why this evolution came about. But a parallel development that accompanied the change is that people began to caste themselves. Second generation sons of immigrants
