Two CD Auxiliary Policemen to be Honored

Two members of the Civil Defense Auxiliary Police who have been credited with saving the life of a three-year-old boy will receive Civil Defense Commendation Certificates at ceremonies at the CD Emergency Operating Center in Mineola, Friday, August 3rd, at 3 p.m. Gen. Otto C. VanExel, Nassau County CD Director, will make the presentation.

The volunteer CD Auxiliary Policemen who will be honored are Patrolman Nicholas Cilla and Cadet Lee Bartow, both of the Hicksville unit. According to Hicksville Auxiliary Police Chief

John Bennett, the two men were on patrol when they saw a car hit 3-year-old Michael Peters in the road near his home at Windsor St. They rushed to the boy, found he was unconscious, and had stopped breathing. They immediately applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and the boy began to breathe again. He was subsequently taken to Syosset Hospital where he remained on the critical list for several days.

According to Chief Bennett, this is the second time during the past year that members of his volunteer unit have saved a life in an emergency situation.

"Department of The Year" Award

The Nassau County Police Department received the top award in the State Traffic Safety Council's "Department of the Year" program.

Julian D. Biso, Director of Research and Program Development for the Council, announced the award and presented an engraved plaque to Police Commissioner Louis J. Frank at the 73rd annual conference of the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police in Syracuse.

A scholarship grant of \$250 was also presented to Commissioner Frank, enabling a member of the Nassau County Police Department

to attend a specialized traffic safety course at a university or college of his choice.

Nassau received the top award because of procedures and techniques developed in specialized traffic divisions. The awards are based upon a combined evaluation of police traffic functions with emphasis on manpower allocated to traffic related duties, accident investigation procedures, selective enforcement of serious moving traffic violations, personnel training programs and the quality of each agency's traffic record system.

"Five Escape Hicksville House Fire"

Hicksville Firemen responding to a call from the alarm box at Barry Dr. and Robbins La. off Caniague Rd. found upon their arrival a serious fire in progress at 39 Barry Dr. instead of the usual malicious false alarm that comes from that box on a regular basis.

The fire, which was reported at 5:06 a.m. on July 31st, caused serious damage to the structure. The five occupants evacuated the house by a ladder raised by neighbors, and by jumping from the 2nd story windows. The owner Mr. Irving Seigel was treated at the scene for smoke inhalation.

The fire, which is believed to have originated in a portable TV set in the kitchen, spread to the crawl space in the attic via a kitchen exhaust duct. Upon arrival firemen found flames 25 ft high coming out of the roof. The TV set was believed to be the "Instant On" type which really is

always energized. (More about this type TV set later.) The fire was brought under control in 20 minutes by 60 Hicksville firemen under Chief L. Mertz.

We wish to remind Hicksville residents once again about the importance of home escape drills. Had the five occupants in this fire panicked tragedy could have resulted. We also wish to point out the importance of cooperation on the false alarm problem. Many times a box is pulled and although many people are outside, nobody sees a thing. The old adage of crying wolf too many times could come into play.

We recommend that owners of the "Instant On" type TV sets get into the habit of pulling the plug out or using the "Vacation Switch" to completely kill power to the set. Sets like these frequently go afire without warning.

During the period July 17 through July 31, Hicksville

Firemen responded to 44 alarms, 11 rescue calls, 11 malicious false alarms, 22 fire calls. A railroad box car was set on fire on Sunday, July 22, at 1:33 p.m. in the rear of 250 Duffy Ave. Firemen had to stretch hose lines over the third rails to get at the fire. Power had to be shut down for one half hour, as was all rail traffic. Lt. Lombardi of Co. 3 was treated at Central General Hospital for smoke inhalation and released. Asst. Chief Ferber was in charge.

Another house fire on July 31st at 1:26 p.m. at 27 Terry St. caused considerable damage to one room. This fire was believed to have started in a faulty phonograph. The fire was brought under control in a short time and no injuries were reported.

CHICKEN LITTLE CASSEROLES

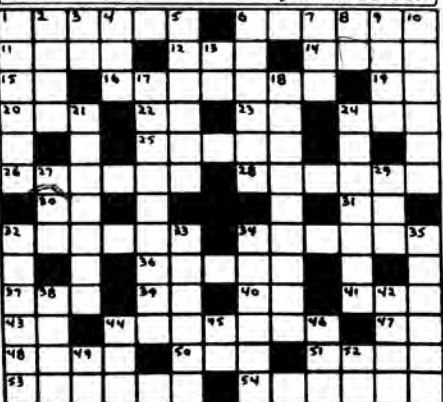
Makes 6 servings

| Filling | Topping |
| 2 tablespoons chopped onion | 1/2 cup enriched corn meal |
| 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted | 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour |
| 1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour | 1/2 teaspoon salt |
| 1 teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon baking powder |
| 2 cups milk | 1 egg, beaten |
| One 10-oz. pkg. frozen peas, cooked and drained | 2 tablespoons melted or liquid shortening |
| 2 1/2 cups diced cooked chicken | 1/4 cup milk |

Heat oven to hot (425°F.). For filling, sauté onion in butter in medium-sized saucepan. Stir in flour and salt. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Add peas and chicken, mix well. Continue cooking over low heat, stirring frequently, about 10 minutes. Spoon chicken base into six 8-oz. ovenproof casseroles.

For topping, sift together dry ingredients into bowl. Add egg, shortening and milk. Mix only until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened. Spoon topping over hot chicken filling in casseroles. Place on cookie sheet. Bake in preheated oven (425°F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Garnish with pimiento chicken cut-outs, if desired.

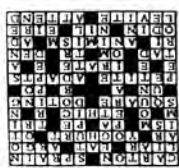

Consumers Need to Know

When food prices are high, home appliances can be doubly important. For example, now is certainly the time for food freezers to come to the aid of the budget. When you find a bargain, buy it in quantity, and freeze the extras, or cook things "from scratch" in larger quantities, and freeze part for later use.

Day-old baked goods are often reduced in price and can even be improved by freezing. The thawing adds moisture, which seems to freshen rolls and cakes.

It costs no more to operate a full freezer than one half-full, so keep it stocked for variety as well as economy. When you make a favorite casserole or stew double the recipe and freeze half.

Baked potatoes scooped out, mashed, put back in the shells, and wrapped in foil also freeze well. Just re-heat under the broiler with a grated cheese topping, and you've saved time as well as fuel.

Home economists of the Home Appliance Manufacturers Association also suggest ways that small appliances can be a big help, particularly in small-portion cooking. You'll find that portable grills, pressure cookers, and electric pots save power and keep the kitchen cooler.

Try cooking cheaper cuts of meat in a "plug-in pot" rather than on top of the kitchen range. Use a pressure cooker to shorten cooking time of many dishes.

If you have a garden, or can buy from a farm, you save quite a little when you prepare and freeze locally grown vegetable and fruits when they're plentiful.

A blender is another help in making use of food which might otherwise be thrown away. For example, puree fruits that are not quite perfect. Then freeze to have on hand for toppings or sauces.

Cook the tough ends of asparagus, broccoli or carrots in meat stock and blend into a soup base. Add bits of leftover meat for flavor.

Apple-Bacon French Toast



Delicious, hearty breakfasts have no effect on the weather, but they certainly can and do brighten spirits — from the little folks right on up to Dad. Apple-Bacon French Toast delights Mother too because it's an easy-do, calling for a package of frozen cinnamon swirl French toast that needs only heating through in the toaster or oven. Serve it with juicy apple rings sautéed in butter and brown sugar and then top it off with crisp bacon strips. What a delicious and hearty breakfast or brunch dish this is!

APPLE-BACON FRENCH TOAST

Makes 3 servings

| 2 tablespoons butter or margarine | One 10-oz. pkg. frozen cinnamon swirl French toast |
| 2 apples, pared, cored and sliced in rings | 6 bacon slices, cooked and drained |
| 3 tablespoons firmly packed brown sugar | |

Melt butter in large skillet. Add apple rings and sauté 3 minutes; turn. Sprinkle brown sugar over apple rings. Continue cooking over low heat until sugar is melted and apples are tender.

Meanwhile, prepare cinnamon swirl French toast in toaster or oven according to package directions. Allow 2 slices per serving and top with apple rings. Spoon butter-sugar mixture over apples and criss-cross 2 bacon slices on top.

Good Psychology

Master Your Fear 3 Ways

Lack of self-confidence, psychologists say, is usually based on insecurity or fear. The insecure person is afraid not only of others, but also of himself. Plagued by feelings of doubt and distrust, the insecure individual is often hesitant to make even minor decisions because of his fears.

Here are three simple rules for mastering fear which may work for you:

1. Illuminate your fears with facts. Determine what you're afraid of, then find out why you're afraid of it. Probably most insecure people fear they will not be able to live up to the community

accepted "norms" of society. What norm or standard are you afraid of? What do you do-or what don't you do-that makes you feel you can't live up to that standard? Get the facts.

2. Provide yourself with competent allies. Now that you know what the problem is, turn to somebody who is qualified to help you. Once you've taken someone into your confidence and asked for help, the problem is half solved.

3. Wage a winning war. Make up your mind to do something about the fear you're fighting. You've thought about it; you've found an ally; now you need action. Make a list of three things you can do today which will help you overcome that insecurity; then set out to do them.

A RECORD NUMBER OF BOY SCOUTS are presently attending the Nassau County Council summer training camps. Council President Francis Looney tells us. The Council is operating three camps this year. Many were shocked when they heard of this unfortunate situation and a drive got underway to save Wauwexep. I sure hope that they have succeeded... what an investment in the future!

Opera buffs can enjoy the Amale Opera Company's rendition of "Pagliacci" on Monday, August 6 at Coes Neck Park in Baldwin and jazz fans will find their favorite music on "Jazz Night" Monday, August 6 at Roosevelt Park in Roosevelt.

The nostalgic "Golden Oldies," sounds of the dynamic Exciters will be at Elmont Road Park in Elmont on Tuesday, August 7 and Uniondale Park in Uniondale on Thursday, August 9.

FOR LOVERS OF CLASSICAL MUSIC, Nassau County Dept. of Recreation and Parks is sponsoring the New Chamber Orchestra under the baton of Clayton Westermann in an open-air concert at Wantagh Park on Sunday, August 5 at 8 p.m. This is sponsored jointly by this Dept. and Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians, while this Dept. and Lico is co-sponsoring a display of Nassau's teen-agers arts and crafts at Eisenhower Park on Sat., August 4 beginning at 11 a.m. Contestants are finalists from events run in Nassau's three townships and examples of graphics, oil painting, watercolors, photography and ceramics will be shown. The performing arts will feature dance, drama, vocal and piano presentations. At 2 p.m., Country and Western music will be provided by Johnny Scott. REPORTS

In these times of spiraling costs, inflation and concern to make ends meet, both the Town of Oyster Bay and the residents it serves face common fiscal difficulties.

Through painstaking review and analysis of priorities, operations and expenditures, this administration has not increased the General Town Tax since 1970 despite significant increases in cost, number and extent of services provided. Similarly, many housewives through careful planning and shopping have been able to provide for the needs of their households despite the high cost of living we all face today.

With hardened disregard for these customers, the Merrick Division of Utilities and In-

dustries Corp., which supplies water to south shore areas in our Town, has requested of the Public Service Commission a 43 percent rate increase. While this utility serves only a small segment of the Town's residents, the enormity of the requested rate increase should cause us all alarm. The unconscionable increase sought by the utility is at the very least dangerously inflationary and is indicative of the utility's cavalier disregard of national policy on inflation as expressed in the President's Phase IV guidelines. We all must be concerned.

I have written to the Public Service Commission to urge a flat denial of the requested rate increase. Councilman Joseph Saladino reiterated this position in a personal appearance at the

Commission's public hearing held this week in Hempstead. The time has come for utilities to change their habit of constantly passing increased costs on to the consumer rather than analyzing their internal operations and expenditures in an effort to reduce their operating costs.

The Merrick Division of Utilities and Industries, Corp. by the outlandish rate increase sought, subjects itself to the severest criticism virtually conceding past and present inefficiency, and proclaiming its irresponsibility by flouting established national policy on inflation. An absolute denial of the rate increase will cause the utility to examine its own performance and motivate it to consider the public's welfare as well as its own.

By the time this column appears, Congress will have had its first full-scale confrontation with President Nixon over the highly controversial question of whether the Chief Executive has the right to refuse to spend monies appropriated by Congress. This practice, commonly known as "impoundment," is as old as Thomas Jefferson's administration, but it has become more controversial than ever in the last six months because of the President's decision to withhold funds from a number of environmental and social programs.

The bill before the Congress last week seemed to be reasonable on its surface. It gave Congress the power to disagree with any Presidential impoundment and, by simple resolution, force him to spend the money. It also set a ceiling of \$267 billion on the Federal Budget for Fiscal 1974, and gave the president the authority to impound funds appropriated above and beyond that limit.

However, it was apparent to

me and many of my colleagues, that the anti-impoundment bill did not get at the heart of our budgetary problems. The need for impoundment of funds has never been due to a vendetta of any President against any particular program, but has been due instead to the inability of Congress to provide itself with a responsive and responsible means of setting a federal budget.

We could quite simply obviate the need for impoundments if we were willing to overhaul our Congressional budgetary machinery and install an effective mechanism for controlling spending activities. It was for the purpose of more effective budget control that Congress established a Joint Study Committee on Budgetary Control, but instead of adopting the many fine proposals of that Committee, Congress decided to "run for cover" and ignore the basic problem.

I do not intend to appear as an apologist for or a proponent of Presidential impoundments.

Indeed, I find impoundments just as distasteful as the next person. The point I am trying to make is that the sponsors and supporters of the anti-impoundment bill had their priorities strangely out of line. In passing an impoundment control bill before considering budget reform legislation, we are not solving any long-range problems, but creating new ones. We are saying, in effect, let us end Presidential controls now and perhaps get our own house in order later.

The debate on the impoundment control bill as passed by the House last week is probably academic anyhow, as it will undoubtedly be vetoed. No serious budgetary reform legislation is expected to be considered in the near future, and I would hope a Presidential veto will force many of my colleagues into an awareness that any anti-impoundment legislation must go hand-in-hand with budgetary reform if it is to be effective. On the measure considered last week, I voted "No."

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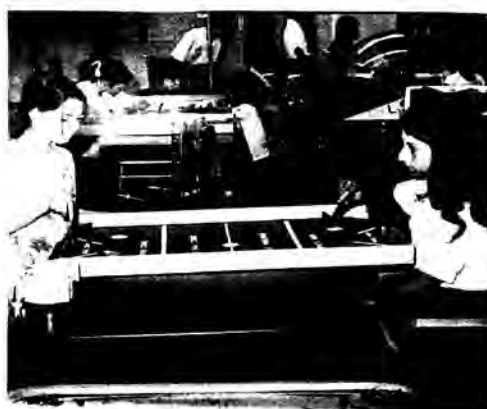

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Chapter 2 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

2-1 The Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, pursuant to the authority of the General Municipal Law Section 77b, and in its desire to provide a more efficient procedure for the review and approval of requested authorization for Employee travel and Employee attendance at trade conventions, seminars, lectures, schools and other special programs, or events, does hereby delegate to the Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay, the authority to review and approve, such employee requests, not exceeding \$500 in estimated cost and expense. Requests expected to exceed \$500 in cost and expense must have Town Board approval as provided by law.

2-2 Employees of the Town of Oyster Bay who are desirous of traveling to and attending trade conventions, seminars, lectures, schools or other special programs, or events, must submit a request, on a form approved by the Supervisor, sufficiently in advance of said event to allow for a proper review of each request. Prior to being submitted for the Supervisor's review and approval the employee's department head will review and approve the request and forward to the Supervisor

with the request, a statement indicating the expected benefit to the Town, if said request is approved.

2-3 After reviewing the employee request to travel and/or a request to attend a particular program or event, if satisfied that the request is justifiable, beneficial and a proper Town expense, and its approval will contribute to the Town's ability to service its citizens, the Supervisor will approve the request. Once approved, the Supervisor may so notify the Office of the Comptroller and authorize the reimbursement of said employee for the necessary expenses incurred by the employee during said travel, upon the presentation of a duly certified claim form to the Comptroller. Employees incurring expenses by traveling to and attending a program or event without the prior approval of the Supervisor, may not be reimbursed for such expenses.

2-4 The provisions of Secs. 2-1, 2-2, 2-3 apply, but are not limited to:

- (1) Employees whose travel on Town business would cause them to be away from home overnight;
- (2) Employees whose round trip mileage would exceed 500 miles;
- (3) Employees who wish to attend trade or professional conventions for which attendance is expected during the regular working hours, and reimbursement for fees and expenses is desired;
- (4) Employees who wish to attend a school lecture, seminar, course, program or

similar activity to receive some instruction which would better able those who participate to perform their work, where attendance is required during regular working hours, or a claim is to be made to the Town for reimbursement of expenses incurred from such participation; and

(5) Travel to, or attendance at, any other special program or event for which a claim is to be made to the Town for reimbursement of expenses incurred from such travel or attendance.

2-5 The provisions set forth in Section 2-1, through 2-4, shall in no way apply to that necessary employee travel and expense incurred in the proper execution of those Town duties and responsibilities provided by laws of the State of New York, County of Nassau and the Town of Oyster Bay, except as specifically provided herein.
