## 150 Teen Age Republican Due At Political School August 12-17

An estimated 150 young people representing nearly all of New York's 62 counties are expected at the ninth annual Teen Age Republican (TAR) School of Politics to be held the week of August 12-17 at Siena College in Loudonville, an Albany suburb.

In addition to seminars on political structure and techniques, special programs will be included to allow the students to put theories into practice. Among other things, TARs will learn State nominating procedures through a mock designating convention, primary election and campaign to choose TAR nominees for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Comptroller.

A number of prominent speakers, including Edward Cox, one of President Nixon's sons-in-law, will address the students. Cox will attend the session on Friday morning, August 17. Others who will appear include Associate Judge Charles D. Breitel of the Court of Appeals, Republican and Liberal nominee for Chief Judge of the Court; Lieutenant Governor Malcolm Wilson, Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz, Pamela Powell, Director of Youth Activities for the White House, and Republican State Chairman Richard M. Rosenbaum.

Miss Powell, the daughter of Julie Allyson and the late Dick Powell of motion picture fame, will be on the program for Tuesday afternoon, August 14. Republican State Chairman Rosenbaum is to be the main speaker on Wednesday evening, August 15.

For the second year, the school is under the direction of Cathy Bertini of Skaneateles, who is Director of Youth Activities for the Republican State Committee. She is being assisted by Co-Director Timothy Carey of Ossining.

Registration for the nearly week-long school opens at 10 a.m. Sunday, August 12, with the first program starting at 3 p.m. that day. Balancing the studies are a number of recreational activities, including a concert at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center Monday evening, August 13.

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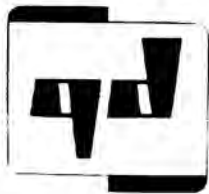


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## Road Closing - Cedar Swamp Road

The New York State Department of Transportation announced today that the portion of Cedar Swamp Road between North Hempstead Turnpike (Route 25A) and a point approximately one-half mile north of Jericho Turnpike (Route 25) will be closed a through traffic due to the planned resurfacing of this highway.

Work is scheduled to begin on Monday, August 6th, and continue for a period of approximately two weeks. The closing will be in effect only during the contractor's normal working hours, which are, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The Brookville Police Department will provide assistance in directing traffic

during this entire operation. Signs will be erected to advise motorists of alternate routes in the area. The main alternate route will be Route 106 which also serves the North Shore communities in this area. Access will be provided for local residents and emergency vehicles at all times.

This project is part of the Department of Transportation's Highway Reconditioning and Preservation (R&P) Program which fosters the preservation protection of the taxpayer's investment in the State Highway System. Work is being supervised under the direction of Austin H. Emery, Regional Director of Transportation for Region 10.



## FARE

## Burke Bags Illegal Garbage Dumpers

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced recently Friday, August 3, that the Town has suspended a dumping permit issued to Jamaica Ash and Rubbish Removal and warned a number of other firms that the Town will not tolerate any dumping in the Old Bethpage landfill of any wastes collected outside the confines of the Town.

Burke said that Town personnel, including members of his staff under the supervision of David Maffei, Director of the Town's Division of Environmental Control, have been conducting an examination of the debris being dumped at the landfill site in recent weeks.

The evidence gathered clearly indicates Jamaica Ash has been a violator of the regulations that go along with the permit. Burke said "We have also uncovered evidence

although to a lesser degree, that five other firms may also have dumped illegally." The other firms are V & J, New Hyde Park, A & M, Deer Park, Island Carting, Smithtown, Associated Waste Disposal, North Bellmore and Mets Roll-off. Old Bethpage Town Clerk Ann Ocker issued a letter of warning to these firms and the other firms licensed to utilize the Oyster Bay landfill facility advising them that the Town will deal harshly with violators.

Burke said the information gathered was obtained during part of a broad study of landfill practice and dumping procedures, and reflects the continuation of concern on the part of the Burke administration to economize on the use of the limited amount of space available to the Town for sanitary landfill purposes.

## The Storm Before The Calm

Both the House and Senate careened through last week's heavy legislative session with unusual abandon as both houses tried to tie up loose ends before the beginning of last Friday's month-long summer recess.

The Senate Armed Services Committee, however, has decided to slice money from the program, and a sure tug-of-war over whether the troubled F-14 will get fully funded is in the offing.

The Brawl Over Oil

Oilmen and environmental lobbyists were evident everywhere in Congressional hallways last week arguing their respective cases for or against the bill which would grant final

approval of the Trans-Alaska pipeline, and they presented meritorious arguments on both sides of the issue.

Oil lobbyists, among Washington's most potent, argued for immediate approval of the pipeline as a solution to the impending "energy crisis." They also sought to block further review of the project, which had stalled construction of the artery for the past several years.

Environmentalists contended that the pipeline would bring ecological havoc upon one of our last remaining virgin territories; that the tanker transportation needed to ship the oil from Alaska's southern coast to the 48 contiguous states was dangerous, and that a Canadian alternative route was much safer and would get the oil to areas where it was most needed: the Midwest and East Coast.

The climate in which the bill was to be considered was a distasteful one. No Member of Congress liked being painted into a corner in which a hasty decision had to be reached on an issue as critical as this one, but that was the case. The "energy crisis" argument, over the long term, was certainly valid, in that our failure to approve the pipeline

would undoubtedly increase the pressure for opening up the Eastern Coastline to off-shore drilling.

When debate concluded, I decided, reluctantly, to support final passage of the bill for reasons that were admittedly parochial, but nonetheless very weighty. I would much rather have oil coming from Alaska, at limited ecological risk, than from 30 miles off our Long Island coast where the potential for environmental damage is even greater.

I did vote for the all-important amendment which would help keep intact the aims of the National Environmental Policy Act, however, and permit further court review of the pipeline controversy. For if the pipeline is as environmentally sound as the Interior Department says it is, it should have no trouble being approved by the courts. If it is not, the NEPA should not be waived solely to permit the pipeline's construction.

This would only invite other agencies to seek exemption from environmental protection requirements, and the Nation's most important environmental law would become just another sheet of paper, at a time when we most need its safeguards.

## REPORTS

We were delighted with the news from Congressmen Roncalli and Lent last week that the federal government has approved a grant of \$1,125,000 to assist in the acquisition of the Bruce Estate in Woodbury for a park and recreational facility.

This grant will permit the Town to take a major step in its long range program to preserve and landbank our dwindling natural resources of open space. Major acquisitions, such as the 121 acres of the Bruce Estate, can only be accomplished with the support and cooperation of the federal, state and county governments.

The Bruce Estate, bordering on Jericho Turnpike in Woodbury, features woodlands, ponds and gently rolling hills, much of which will be preserved in its natural state in the ultimate development as a recreational facility. The property is adjacent to the 280-acre Stillwell Woods property which Nassau County plans to acquire for future park purposes.

It is imperative that such acquisitions be made now before our open land is gobbled up by developers.

The Town is also continuing with the development of other recreational facilities in several

communities. Construction on Phase II of the development of John Burns Park in Massapequa is expected to start some time late this fall, with completion scheduled for the fall of 1974.

Federal assistance in the amount of \$650,300, in matching funds will greatly assist in carrying out this program. Plans call for six lighted tennis courts, three lighted handball courts, two platform tennis courts on a raised deck with a warmup hut, two basketball courts, one lighted softball field, additional parking facilities and a playing area for pre-school age children.

Additionally, there will be a conservation area, an overlook area and float, landscaping and bulkheading.

On the north shore, construction has been approved for the first phase of the overall renovation of the park and beach facilities at the Theodore Roosevelt Memorial Park in Oyster Bay. This first phase includes improved access for cars through the construction of a grade crossing at Larrabee Avenue and an increase in parking facilities. Other improvements include the completion of wider, permanent boat launch ramps and special parking facilities for cars and

boat trailers.

Preliminary plans for a community park to serve the residents of the Jericho Park District are being developed by a task force comprised of local residents with the assistance of Town and County advisors. The proposal is in the final stages of preparation and is expected to be presented to the Jericho residents at a public meeting early this fall.

Initial steps also have been taken for the creation and development of a community park for residents of the Hicksville area. A 7-acre parcel of land has been proposed for acquisition for the new recreational facility by Planning Associates, consultants to the Town. A public hearing on the park proposal has been scheduled by the Town Board for August 28, 1973, at which local residents will be able to express their suggestions for the development of this facility.

Recreational areas and parklands are an important aspect of the suburban nature of our Town. The preservation and development of such areas will continue to be a major criterion in all our considerations for the future growth and development in the Town of Oyster Bay.

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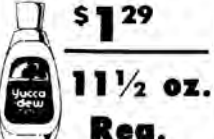
