Curbs Nassau Welfare

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced recently that the number of persons receiving welfare in the county was cut another 6.9 per cent during the first half of 1973.

The removal of 3,698 persons from the rolls since January of this year follows a 7.2 -per cent cut in the number of welfare clients during 1972.

Caso, who pledged when he took office that he would keep the lid on the rising welfare load pointed out that the 50,289 people now receiving public financial assistance represent a 13.6-per cent decrease since the high point in 1971 when welfare clients totaled 58,149.

'It is apparent that we have succeeded in halting and reversing the runaway costs of welfare, something that the previous administration was unable to achieve. We it without reducing assistance to those who need ' Caso said

The number of persons on welfare soared 55 per cent during the last two years of the previous administration. During Caso's first year in office, growth was slowed to 7.3 per cent. Since that time, it has been reduced steadily.

The Social Services department's report for the second quarter of the year showed that the number of individuals receiving financial assistance was reduced by 1,992 during April, May and June.

The welfare rolls were reduced by 1,706 during the . first quarter.

The county executive reported that spending on Home Relief, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Disabled and Old Age Assistance was \$1,634,865 less in the first half of 1973 than in the first half of 1972

Projecting the same expenditure rate through the end of the year, Caso said that he expects to save as much as \$3,000,000 in welfare costs in these categories this year.

Caso said that figures announced in Albany in June showed a statewide drop of 4.2 per cent in the number of individuals on welfare at the end of the state's fiscal year on March 30.

Nassau's reduction of 14.8 per cent for the same period more than tripled the state figure. Nassau County welfare recipents are about three per cent of the total number of people receiving public financial assistance throughout New York State but the Nassau County reduction accounted for 12.4 per cent of the statewide drop of 74,261, Caso said.

The most significant reductions during the Caso administration have been in the Home Relief and Aid to Dependent Children categories where the caseload


has been cut 17.2 per cent since December of 1970.

Caso attributed the reduction in welfare costs to the rising rate of employment in the county, improved economic conditions and continuing tight management and efficiency in the county's Social Services depart-

He referred to New York State Social Services Commissioner Abe Lavine's praise for the county department at Eisenhower Park on May 16.

The state commissioner said that our department could serve as a standard for social services departments all over the state." Caso said. "The department's efficient management has curbed the costs of welfare and made it possible to deliver prompt and effective services for the genuinely needy."

"Blackouts" Leave Fans Furning

of us charged with protecting the public interest, however, it brings to light a very unfair situation/acting millions of sports fans across the country-namely, the television "blackout" of home football, basketball and hockey games despite the fact that tickets to them are unavailable. Congress enacted an antifrust exemption in 1961 for the National Football League, with the express purpose of insuring its financial stability as the sport it promoted grew in popularity.

Television blackouts were considered a necessity, at the time, for the sport's survival. Now twelve seasons later, they are, in my opinion, no longer necessary or desirable. The situation here in New York points up the mequities engendered by TV blackouts Using the New York Jets as an example, one of the by-products of the exemption has been that they have increased the attendance at their home games by an outstanding 303.7 percent in just ten years. This year, some 34 percent

years. This year, some 94 percent of the fans present at their games will be season ticket holders while many thousand of ad-ditional Jets fans have been on

the waiting list or such tickets for years. Those fans lucky enough to find an individual game ticket for sale must pay over \$7 for it, and the result is that most local football fans are relegated to

The bill covers feetball, bester held. 48 nours prior to game time. The bill covers football, basketball and hockey, and is limited, for now, to a one-year trial period. Not the least of its fringe benefits could be the end to such current practices as ticket scalping. Professional sports teams depend for their support on a far greater number of fans than can squeeze into a periodar prace.
