## "Don't Call 9-11 For Fire In Hicksville"

Hicksville Fire Commissioners wish to inform all Hicksville residents that the fastest way to request assistance from the Hicksville Fire Dept. is to call directly to the Hicksville Fire Dispatcher on WE1-0026.

The telephone emergency 911 system is about to go in effect in Nassau County. While it will be very helpful to the County Police Dept., it can cause a serious delay in reporting a fire.

Why should not use 911 to call Hicksville Firemen? When you dial 911 a police operator in

Mineola will answer your call, when he learns it is a fire. He will switch your call to the county fire dispatcher, who will take your request. He then must call the Hicksville Fire Dispatcher (who is on duty around the clock). In the meantime precious minutes have been lost.

By picking up the phone, dialing WE-1-0026 or operator you will at once be in contact with the Hicksville Dispatcher. Apparatus will be on its way in minutes.

By dialing direct you do away

with the middle men and save time.

Hicksville residents were informed via the mail to dial direct and by-pass 911 for fire. Repeating again 911 for police emergencies is recommended.

In conjunction with 911 and the new emergency ambulance setup in Nassau County, Hicksville Fire Departments ambulance will back up the police ambulances in addition to responding on doctors orders or fire officers requests at rescue calls.

### "H.F.D. Inter-Company Tournament"

On Sunday August 19th Hicksville Firemen competed against each other for the department championship. The annual event was won by Protection H & L Co. No. 1 and Chemical Co. No. 3. Both companies tied for first place, the first time that was ever done.

### Hicksville Girls Win Nursing Scholarships

Two Hicksville High School graduates who plan careers in nursing have launched themselves toward their goals by winning scholarships and receiving college acceptances. Both girls have other family members in the nursing field.

The girls are Roberta Boechi, 93 Ave. Lane, and Beverly Brower, 97 Cambridge Drive. Both were enrolled in the health careers course at the BOCES County Center in Westbury, one of five occupational education centers operated by the Nassau Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES). They attended the County Center half of every school day for one year and pursued their academic subjects at Hicksville High School the other half day.

Roberta, who won first prize last June in Long Island Jewish Medical Center's health careers contest, has received a Regents scholarship for nursing and will attend Nassau Community College in the fall. She is interested in working with the disadvantaged and the handicapped. Roberta's older sister is a nurse.

Beverly, who expects to work in pediatric nursing, has received a Regents scholarship and the Escher-Scharrer Memorial Scholarship for nursing. She will attend the State University of New York at Plattsburg in the fall and will eventually follow in the footsteps of her mother who is a nurse, and her older sister, a former BOCES health careers student and now a nurse. Beverly's younger sister will begin a BOCES health careers course this fall.

## Old Country Road To Be Improved

A mile-and-one half segment of Old Country Road from Salisbury Park Drive to the Wantagh State Parkway will be improved under a \$493,121 contract awarded to Hendrickson Bros., Valley Stream, by County Executive Ralph G. Caso. Hendrickson was the lowest of 10 bidders. The contract calls for reconstructing the existing seven-foot shoulders on

each side with a heavier base and then resurfacing the entire 62-foot width. Traffic conduits and boxes will also be placed so that installation of traffic control facilities in the future will not require pavement removal.

Public Works Department engineers pointed out that the shoulders were built with a lighter base since they were originally

intended for parking but the changeover to painted left-turn lanes and simulated median strips has caused the shoulders to be utilized by through traffic which requires a heavy concrete base.

No land was taken for the project.

Work is expected to begin in September and be completed by late January, 1974.

### LEGAL NOTICE

TO THE TAXPAYERS OF THE HICKSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT: NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Fire Commissioners of the Hicksville Fire District, Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, on the 14th day of August, 1973 subject to a permissive referendum as provided for by Sec. 6-G of the General Municipal Law.

An extract of the resolution is as follows:

The Hicksville Fire District maintains a Capital Reserve Fund under Sec. 6-G of the General Municipal Law in which account there is sufficient funds to accomplish the purposes hereinafter set forth, namely, the purchase of a specific type of equipment to wit an ambulance and appropriate modern equipment, and it is proposed to use the present ambulance as a trade-in, and it is proposed to purchase the said specific type of equipment in order to maintain the high standards of performance of the Hicksville Fire

Department in the discharge of their duties in preserving the lives and property of the residents of the community and the said purchase is deemed in the best interests of the residents of the Hicksville Fire District. The resolution further provides that there be transferred from the present Capital Reserve 6-G Fund of the Hicksville Fire District a sum not to exceed \$20,000 and the District Treasurer is authorized to effect such transfer from time to time to effect such purchase.

This resolution shall not take effect until September 14th, 1973 unless in the meanwhile a permissive referendum as provided for in Sec. 6-G of the General Municipal Law is required to be held.

## Waldemar Research

The Waldemar Medical Research Foundation of Woodbury, announces that the 1973 Scientific Congress of the Waldemar Summer Research Participation Program will be held on Friday evening, August 24th, in its Generoso Pope Memorial Library at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Leo Gross, Director of Educational Programs, will preside.

The Congress culminates a summer of feverish research and learning activity for forty-eight high school students representing high schools in Nassau, Suffolk, and New York City. The program is supported in part by a grant from the National Science Foundation. Research teams of talented high school students will report on experimental findings on such diverse subjects as: Thymus Gland and Immunity; The Pathology of Noise; Chromosome Aberrations and Cancer; Sickle-Cell Anemia; and Slime Mold Morphogenesis. ## Efficiency Curbs Nassau Welfare Costs

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced recently that the number of persons receiving welfare in the county was cut another 6.9 per cent during the first half of 1973.

The removal of 3,698 persons from the rolls since January of this year follows a 7.2 per cent cut in the number of welfare clients during 1972.

Caso, who pledged when he took office that he would keep the lid on the rising welfare load, pointed out that the 50,289 people now receiving public financial assistance represent a 13.6 per cent decrease since the high point in 1971 when welfare clients totaled 58,149.

"It is apparent that we have succeeded in halting and reversing the runaway costs of welfare, something that the previous administration was unable to achieve. We did it without reducing assistance to those who need it," Caso said.

The number of persons on welfare soared 55 per cent during the last two years of the previous administration. During Caso's first year in office, growth was slowed to 7.3 per cent. Since that time, it has been reduced steadily.

The Social Services department's report for the second quarter of the year showed that the number of individuals receiving financial assistance was reduced by 1,992 during April, May and June.

The welfare rolls were reduced by 1,706 during the first quarter.

The county executive reported that spending on Home Relief, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Disabled and Old Age Assistance was \$1,634,865 less in the first half of 1973 than in the first half of 1972.

Projecting the same expenditure rate through the end of the year, Caso said that he expects to save as much as \$3,000,000 in welfare costs in these categories this year.

Caso said that figures announced in Albany in June showed a statewide drop of 4.2 per cent in the number of individuals on welfare at the end of the state's fiscal year on March 30.

Nassau's reduction of 14.8 per cent for the same period more than tripled the state figure. Nassau County welfare recipients are about three per cent of the total number of people receiving public financial assistance throughout New York State but the Nassau County reduction accounted for 12.4 per cent of the statewide drop of 74,261, Caso said.

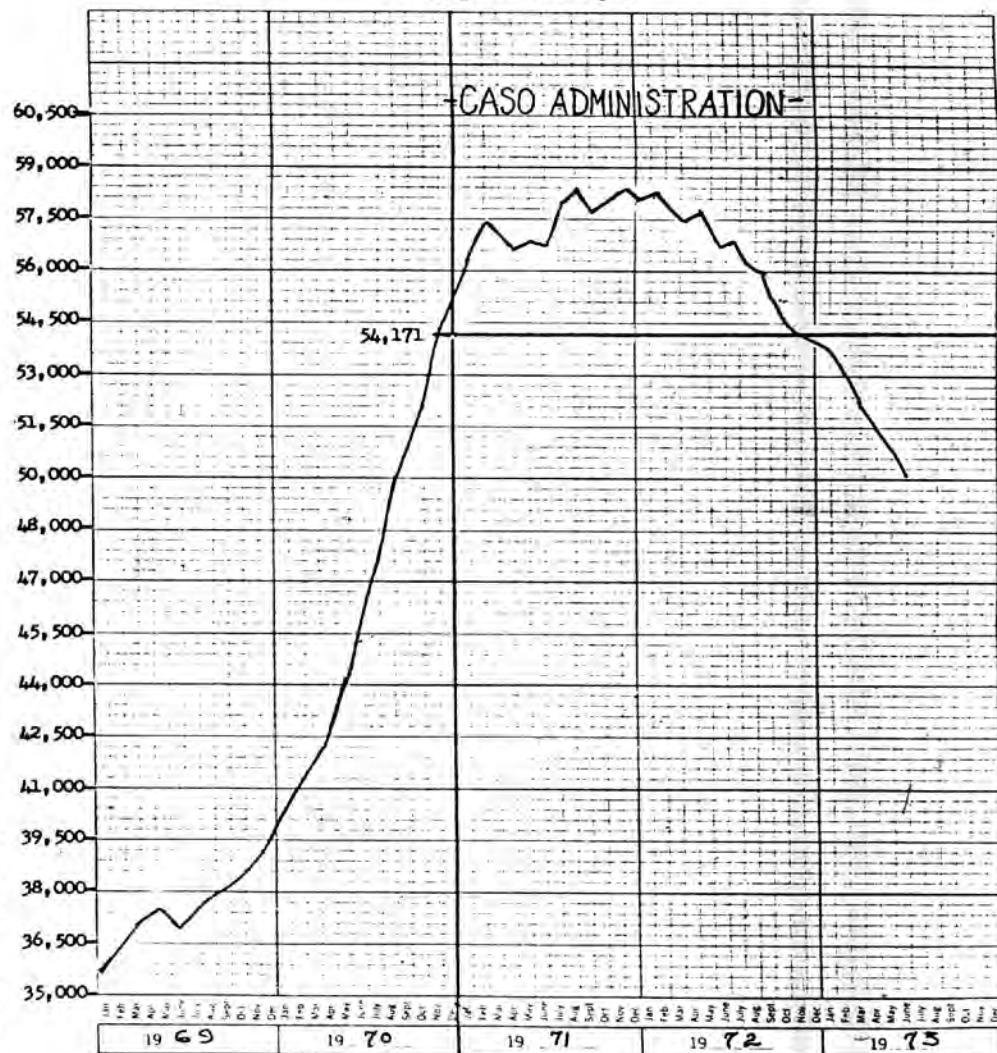
The most significant reductions during the Caso administration have been in the Home Relief and Aid to Dependent Children categories where the caseload has been cut 17.2 per cent since December of 1970.

Caso attributed the reduction in welfare costs to the rising rate of employment in the county, improved economic conditions and continuing tight management and efficiency in the county's Social Services department.

He referred to New York State Social Services Commissioner Abe Lavine's praise for the county department at Eisenhower Park on May 16.

"The state commissioner said that our department could serve as a standard for social services departments all over the state," Caso said. "The department's efficient management has curbed the costs of welfare and made it possible to deliver prompt and effective services for the genuinely needy."

It has gone so far that in many instances, malfunction has become the function of an article of institution.

"I am not alone in my frustration. What has happened is that the average consumer has grown more and more tolerant of this condition. So tolerant, in fact, that it is expected. Rather than being relieved when an article is repaired, the reaction is to wonder when the same article will need its next repair. These

experiences have caused me great frustration, and it is this frustration that has started me on a line of work concerned with objects that appear as if they should function, but in fact, do not."

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, That pursuant to law a public hearing will be held in the Hearing Room in the Town Hall, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York on September 11, 1973, at 10 o'clock a.m., prevailing time, or as soon thereafter as practicable, to consider the following amendment to the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, as amended:

AMEND Chapter 11 "Garbage, Litter & Waste" of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, by including the following thereunder:

(New) ARTICLE VI  
PRODUCTS - RECYCLING  
DIVISION - "RECYCLING  
OF NEWSPAPERS"

Section 11-130 - generally, defines "newspapers" and "refuse". "Newspapers" are publications which customarily contain newsworthy items and advertisements. Magazines are not included. "Refuse" means all garbage, rubbish and waste.

Section 11-131 - generally, states that no Town disposal facility or landfill shall accept refuse containing newspapers from any refuse collection agency, person or corporation. Effective June 1, 1974.

Section 11-132 - generally, states all residents who have their refuse collected by the Town shall separately bundle newspapers with cord or rope and place them at curbside for collection by the Town.

## LEGAL NOTICE

Effective January 1, 1974

Section 11-133 - generally, states that no private refuse collection agency operating in the Town and no public refuse collection agency operating in the incorporated areas of the Town may dump refuse which contains newspapers at Town disposal facilities. Discarded newspapers shall be accepted when bundled and tied with cord or rope, effective June 1, 1974.

Section 11-134 - generally, a violation of this ordinance is punishable by a fine of up to \$25. Intentional or negligent dumping or refuse containing newspapers at Town disposal facilities or landfills is punishable by a fine of up to \$250, or fifteen (15) days imprisonment or both.

All persons interested shall have an opportunity to be heard upon said proposed amendments at the time and place aforesaid. The existing ordinance is on file in the office of the Town Clerk and may be examined during regular business hours by any or all interested persons.

## "Blackouts" Leave Fans Fuming

The month of August, already having featured some half-dozen "pre-season" games, reminds us of the onset of the professional football season early in September. Whether that fact in-

spires enthusiasm or exasperation among those of you who read this column is a matter of personal choice. Among those of us charged with protecting the public interest, however, it brings to light a very unfair situation facing millions of sports fans across the country—namely, the television "blackout" of home football, basketball and hockey games despite the fact that tickets to them are unavailable. Congress enacted an antitrust exemption in 1961 for the National Football League, with the express purpose of insuring its financial stability as the sport it promoted grew in popularity. Television blackouts were considered a necessity, at the time, for the sport's survival. Now twelve seasons later, they are, in my opinion, no longer necessary or desirable.

The situation here in New York points up the inequities engendered by TV blackouts. Using the New York Jets as an example, one of the by-products of the exemption has been that they have increased the attendance at their home games by an outstanding 303.7 percent in just ten years. This year, some 94 percent of the fans present at their games will be season ticket holders while many thousand of additional Jets fans have been on the waiting list or such tickets for years. Those fans lucky enough to find an individual game ticket for sale must pay over \$7 for it, and the result is that most local football fans are relegated to

listening on radio or reading the scores and "play-by-play" accounts in the next day's papers. I am keenly aware of the frustration these fans feel, because of the stubborn and arrogant refusal of the N.F.L. and other leagues to lift their blackout policy.

Television has been a major factor in professional sports rise in popularity. Rather than hurting attendance at stadiums, broadcasts have increased gate receipts by adding to the total number of fans willing to brave traffic, high admission prices and inclement weather to participate in the very special excitement generated by a sell-out hometown crowd.

In an effort to remedy this situation, I have introduced legislation to prohibit the leagues from blacking out telecasts of home games when tickets have been sold out at least 48 hours prior to game time. The bill covers football, basketball and hockey, and is limited, for now, to a one-year trial period. Not the least of its fringe benefits could be the end to such current practices as ticket scalping. Professional sports teams depend for their support on a far greater number of fans than can squeeze into a particular arena for a given event. It's about time that the "lockout" of loyal sports fans unable to purchase tickets for home games no longer be compounded by the "blackout" of telecasts of these games into their homes.

## Congressman Angelo Roncallo Reports

On a completely different subject altogether, "Project Pass the Word," has asked me to help inform military personnel retired prior to September 21, 1972 that September 20, 1973 is the deadline for electing the new MILITARY SURVIVOR BENEFIT PLAN passed during the last Congress. This is a more equitable benefit plan for you and your family. However, the provisions of Public Law 92-405, this new plan, are complex and apparently as recently as the end of this past June only one-third of all those eligible had enrolled. It is your right—something you earned while you were on active duty and it would be a shame to miss out on it because you didn't know about this September 20th deadline.

You can contact your local military facility to obtain a DD-1881 Form or make application to the military finance center of your branch of the service in a personal letter witnessed by an adult who is not a beneficiary.

Since time is growing short, I suggest that if you have any questions you contact your local military office directly to save time. Then, if you have any problems, you can get in touch with me at the office and we will see if there is anything we can do to help. However, since time is of the essence, I would deal directly with the military first.

I hope you are enjoying the summer vacation. I certainly am! It's great to be back on Long Island for a few solid weeks.

## Hearing Date Set For Senior Citizen Housing In Plainview

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the Town Board has set September 11, 1973 as the date for a public hearing on a request for a change of zone from Residential "D" and Business "F" to Senior Citizen District (S-1) Zone in Plainview. The land involved, a vacant parcel, 444' X 277' rectangular shaped, is located on the east side of Barnum Road, just south of Old Country Road. It is bounded on the east, west and

south by homes and on the north by a nursery and a shopping center.

The Town Housing Authority is seeking the rezoning. If the application is approved 69 Senior Citizens apartments will be constructed on the site under the federal government's "turnkey program."

Under "turnkey" construction is done by a private contractor and turned over to the Town upon completion. The proposal would bring the total number of Senior Citizen housing complexes to

seven in the Town. The others, all fully occupied, are located in Syosset, Massapequa, Oyster Bay hamlet, Bethpage, Hicksville and Plainville and provide for a total of 364 units.

To qualify for Senior Citizen housing, a person must be at least 62 years of age, or, in the case of a couple, one must be 62 years or over. A single person may make no more than \$4,500; a couple may make up to \$5,400. Total assets can equal no more than \$10,000 for a single person and \$12,500 for a couple. A person must also be a resident of the Town in order to be eligible.
