Herald Report Hicksville School Board

Last Wednesday the Hicksville School Board took action to lower milk prices which had increased 10 cents per half pint when the federal government cut its milk subsidy last month. Hicksville cafeterias will now charge 10 cents for the milk container and the \$6100 deficit this will cause in the cafeteria budget will be taken from the 1973-74 school budget.

The board eliminated all clerical substitutes and any overtime for clerks until further notice. Several clerical vacancies have not been filled and the board wants to study these positions, plus others, before taking action.

A proposed policy statement on individualized instruction led to prolonged controversy when the board learned that a second-grade class at Lee Avenue had been switched from an individualized situation to a more conventional one. There was discussion of the program, which has been modeled after Project PLAN, having changed at other schools, too. The board agreed to get clarification on the present status of I.I. in the district before setting any policy on the program. They will meet with school principals this week to discuss this, and other subjects.

The board of education approved appointments for department representatives (similar to department chairmen) in the Jr. and Sr. High Schools. Mrs. Iris Wolfson suggested there should be representatives for reading and

health in the Jr. High, as well as separate department representatives for vocal and instrumental music. The board is seeking more information on this suggestion before taking any action.

The board voted to establish a position of Drug Abuse Education Coordinator for the district, contingent on receipt of funds from Nassau County for this position. Hicksville School District has been awarded a grant for a drug program, which provides for the coordinator. The position will no longer exist when the grant expires, and the salary with fringe benefits will not exceed \$14,438 for a period ending March 31, 1974.

The board directed administration to recommend a program, by September 25, for urinalysis tests for students (grades 7-12) to determine drug abuse. Mr. Bruno's motion was not passed unanimously—voting yes: McCormack, Bruno, Bello and Nagle; voting no: Wolfson, Madden, and Pirrung.

The board approved various bills for routine operating expenses of the district. They also voted to accept a student accident insurance plan which covers all students, grades K-12, in all activities. The cost to the district is \$9500 a year and the insurance company handles the clerical work. Our district only submits claims.

The next board meeting is Tuesday, September 25 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Road Improvement In Hicksville

A contract for improving a 4,800-foot long section of Old Country Road in Hicksville which has been the scene of 233 accidents in the past nine years has been awarded to Lizza Industries, Inc. Roslyn for \$335,880 by County Executive Ralph Caso. Lizza was the lowest of eight bidders.

The project involves removal of the existing six foot wide concrete median, paving of the shoulders on each side of the road and erection of left turn lanes by means of painted pavement. The changes will enable the section from the Long Island Railroad to

South Oyster Bay Road to conform to the width and pavement markings of adjoining sections of Old Country Road to the east and west.

"A substantial number of the 30,000 vehicles using this segment each day make left turns", Public Works Commissioner John H. Peters pointed out. "The turns block one of the two lanes in each direction for much of the day. By creating left turn lanes, we can improve traffic flow and reduce the accident potential."

Work is expected to begin in September with completion in four months.

Plan To Move? Notify Social Security

If you plan to move and you're one of the almost 29 million people who get social security checks every month, you should notify the Social Security Administration promptly, according to Marvin Kovel, Social Security District Manager in Freeport.

"Notifying social security before you move will assure delivery of your social security check to your new address without delay or interruption," Mr. Kovel said.

"Just call or write any social security office and give them the social security claim number that appears on our check as well as your complete old address and complete new address, with ZIP codes," Kovel said. "Also notify your post office of your address change."

A change-of-address form is printed on the back of envelopes in which social security checks are delivered.

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month to people getting checks under the retirement, disability, and survivors insurance programs.

What does social security mean to a young worker? For one thing... protection for you and your young family... regular monthly checks for you and your family if you become severely disabled and can't work for a year or more, or monthly payments to your family if you should die. Glenn Canessa may not be one of the better known artists in the New York area, but his work is guaranteed a large and appreciative audience at the Art Auction being held at Human Resources School on Saturday, September 22nd, at 8:00 P.M.

He is enrolled in the School's new open classroom and has been selected by his art teacher, Mrs. Sheila Mohrman, to represent the student body with a selection of art work which he has developed at the School in Albertson, Long Island.

Purpose of the art auction, which begins with a champagne reception and viewing at 8:00 P.M., is the financial support of the educational programs of Human Resources School. Over 200 disabled children are now in attendance, ranging from as young as one year, through senior high school. Glenn has been in the School's program for seven years.

This will be the third year in which the Parents and Friends organization has sponsored the art auction. This past spring it

donated to the School \$35,000 as a result of their volunteer efforts.

Among the other artists who will be represented in the show will be such prominent names as Braque, Chagall, Dali and Picasso, as well as a number of Long Island and New York area artists. A highlight of the evening will be a tour of the "Sculpture Garden," in which attendees to the show can browse, champagne in hand, through a series of sculpture works on display, each of which will be available for the auction which begins at 9:00 P.M.

Caso Praises Treasurer's Office For Saving About \$1,300,000

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced recently that the Treasurer's office had saved the county an estimated \$1,300,000 in interest costs on an all-purpose bond sale yesterday "by adroit watching of the market and by switching the offering date."

Caso said the savings came on the sale of \$42,800,000 in multipurpose bonds. County Treasurer John V. Scaduto had announced on July 22 that the county would receive bids on Aug. 22. Four days later, when the market did not look good to Scaduto, the treasurer announced a delay in the sale until Sept. 19. Then, last Thursday,

when Scaduto read the market as better for municipal bonds, he advanced the sale from the 19th to the 12th.

In reporting on the second switch in dates, the Daily Bond Buyer, the leading authority on municipal bonds, wrote on Sept. 7, "Mr. Scaduto and county officials have accelerated the offering to next Wednesday. Should the same levels continue through next week, the county will be the beneficiary of substantial savings in interest that will be incurred on the loan..."

As a result of the switches in the sales dates, the county sold the \$42,800,000 bond issue at a net interest cost of 5.14 per cent — a

net dollar cost of \$27,606,597. Scaduto said that "on Aug. 22, the bond buyer index was at 5.44 per cent. If we apply the .04 per cent difference realized on our sale to the bond buyer index of Aug. 22, we can assume that Nassau County would have sold its bond issue at about 5.40 per cent. We were able to save about \$1,351,950 by watching the market closely and changing the dates accordingly."

Caso congratulated Scaduto for the savings and said, "this is one more example of how, by our staying on top of a situation, the county taxpayers are getting the best break possible."

Channel 67 Appoints News Dept. Head

WSNL-TV, Channel 67 UHF has announced the appointment of Gary A. Gunter as head of its news department.

A former CBS-affiliate news director, 28-year-old Gunter plans a strong Nassau Suffolk approach for Channel 67, Long Island's first and only commercial television station.

Gunter began his career as writer, reporter, producer and anchorman for CBS affiliate KPFA in Amarillo, Texas. Since 1971, he has been weekend news director-anchorman for WFML-TV in Youngstown, Ohio.

With WSNL-TV, Gunter will head the Long Island oriented 67 Action News Department. Staffed with assignment editors, investigative reporter-writers and three full color news mobile units, the 67 Action News team will cover Long Island's government and human interest assignments throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties as well as world-wide news events via United Press International News film, slide and facsimile service.

Channel 67 will reach a primary audience of three

million Long Island viewers from its multi-million dollar facility at the intersection of the Long Island Expressway and the Veterans Memorial Highway. WSNL-TV, licensed to broadcast 24 hours a day, will initially program approximately 18 hours daily. The station is unique in that most of the broadcast day will be devoted to live, color programming.

Featured will be local Long Island news, weather, financial coverage, youth-oriented shows, and even soap operas to be broadcast live from WSNL studios daily. Special televised events will include golf tournaments, horse shows, boat races, concerts, and other occurrences of community interest best covered by a local station.

Point of View! Plainview Congress of Teachers

This is the first of a series of articles in what will be a continuing effort to present to the community the views of the teaching and clerical staff represented by the Plainview-Old Bethpage Congress of Teachers.

The articles will speak of problems that are important in Plainview, but some will, of necessity, also extend beyond Plainview's border to neighboring districts, and have even state or national implications. Local topics will include articles on planning the district's budget, early childhood education, 2-year community college, mutual accountability, individualized instruction, and specific educational policies in Plainview. Statewide and national problems include tax reform to take the financial burden off small property owners, and the Federal government's lack of support for public education.

We hope that these articles will stimulate response from the community in the form of replies and questions. Please feel free to write us.

Summer's over, and all across the country teachers and students are greeting their friends and colleagues and settling into another year of school. What kind of school year can we expect it to be in Plainview? How does it look from the teachers' point of view?

We have some unusual opportunities this year. We are pleased that the budget passed. Some new programs are being tried out; the buses and athletic programs are in operation; and the Board doesn't have to go through another round of budget hearings, cutting and juggling. Unfortunately, the margin of postage gives no one the feeling that there is unanimous agreement on the good health of our public school system. Many of our buildings still have leaking roofs, some classes could be smaller, and some equipment and supplies need to be replaced. Six votes is hardly a mandate telling the educational community to "keep up the good work."

This is the second year of a three year contract for the teachers and clerical workers of the district, a year in which the demands and counter-demands of negotiations can be left in the background and provide for more peaceful and amicable relations between the Board of Education and the employees.

Let us take the time given

us by an extended contract, the money provided by a passed budget, and the facilities now available to fully reexamine our priorities and our programs. This may well turn out to be the most important year in the recent history of the Plainview schools. Decisions made now will be with us for years to come and we will all have to live with them. It is the deep conviction of the Plainview Congress of Teachers that wise decisions are the result of meaningful involvement in the decision-making process by all those who will be affected; students, community, and staff. We are available to add our experience and training to the solution of the tasks before us.

We assume the School Board intends to involve all members of the school community in the development of future goals. That is the best way to ensure a successful outcome. We urge the community to take advantage of this new method of expressing their desire to the Board of Education.

SOCIAL SECURITY

QUES: The social security payments to my mother stopped when I reached 18 in June. They were paid on my late father's social security record. I plan to start junior college this fall and understand I'll keep getting student payments. Will my mother's payments also continue?

ANS: No, her payments will stop unless she's 60 or in her 50's and severely disabled. In either circumstance she can get reduced widow's benefits or, if she prefers, she can wait until she's 65 and receive full benefits. If your mother is near 60 or in her 50's and severely disabled and she decided she wants reduced widow's payments, she should contact any social security office to apply. The address of your local office is One Station Plaza

North, Mineola, NY 11501. The telephone number is P1-7-5470.

QUES: I became severely disabled and unable to work in December 1972. Social security started paying disability benefits to me, my wife, and child for the month of June 1973. Shouldn't my benefits have begun last December the month I became disabled?

ANS: No. The waiting period for disability benefits is 5 months. You became disabled in December of last year, and your waiting period ended in May, so your first monthly payment was for June. During the waiting period some people may recover from their disabilities. The social security law does not provide payments for short-term or partial disability; it only pays for severe and prolonged disability.

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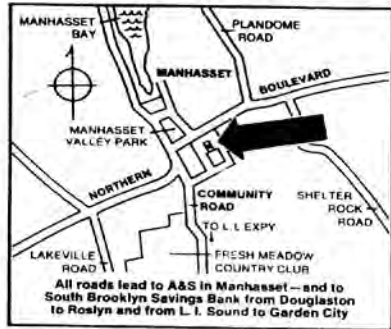

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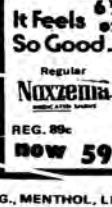
