"Recycling Newspapers Is Successful"

The amount of newsprint collected in Oyster Bay's pilot newspaper recycling project during the month of September exceeded the July and August average by over 7,500 pounds, according to Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

The 348,500 pounds of newsprint collected in September brings the total for the year to approximately 1,635 tons. Hogan, a panel member on the Town Board's Standing Committee on Environmental Control, noted that this nine-month figure is

only 71 tons less than the total amount collected in all of 1972.

"Reviewing this year's monthly reports, it is evident that the pilot project will top the 1972 total tons figure in October.

The pilot project, conducted in communities throughout Oyster Bay, was a factor in the establishment of the Town-wide program which will be effective in the unincorporated areas of Oyster Bay Town on January 1, 1974 and in the incorporated villages on June 1, 1974.

Town 'Holds Line' On Tax Rate For 1974

On Tuesday of this week the Town of Oyster Bay held a public day and night hearing on the proposed town budget for 1974, which maintains the current tax rate of 61.6 cents per hundred of assessed valuation and shows an increase in the general fund budget from \$13,661,342 budgeted for 1973 to \$14,852,367 for the coming year.

The largest items of revenue expected to meet this budget are real property taxes, \$4,956,972; Department Income, \$2,999,900; State Aid, \$2,984,788; and a nearly \$2,000,000 surplus carried over from 1972. Other sources of revenue include penalties on taxes, use of money & property, licenses & permits, fines & forfeitures, interfund revenues, federal aid and miscellaneous income.

The largest expenditure items in the proposed budget are general government support, \$4,380,436; culture and recreation, \$2,412,015; employee benefits, \$1,840,213; community services, \$1,223,641; and debt service, \$3,577,015. Today also plans to spend about \$400,000 for public safety, over \$800,000 for transportation, and almost \$700,000 for economic assistance and opportunity.

The massive, multi-pound budget prepared under the direction of Joseph Macedonia,

Comptroller, also includes proposed budgets for 55 special districts (fire, park, garbage, etc.), the part town budget, statistical data and the capital program, the total budget amounting to over \$38 million.

Charges Overbudgeting

The \$1,972,832 surplus carried over from 1972 was the bone of contention in the budget for Councilman Lewis J. Yevoli and his Budget Advisor, Mario V. Colleluri, a resident of Old Bethpage, an accountant by profession and currently the employee of a Suffolk County school district as assistant budget administrator.

Mr. Colleluri in his statement issued to the press stated that the tax rate of 61.6 cents was about 30 per cent too high, creating surpluses each year. Councilman Lewis Yevoli, using epithets and raising his voice at Supervisor John Burke, said he was never consulted about the budget nor invited to a meeting on it.

In a later press conference, Supervisor Burke discussed the budget with reporters. He explained the surplus as a budgeted expense which never materialized, such as snow removal during a mild winter. He also called Mr. Yevoli's comments on the budget "unlearned, untutored and irresponsible," and showed reporters a copy of a memo sent to all councilmen

dated August 11th listing 25 or 30 budget meetings to which they were all invited. Councilman Yevoli received this memo, he said.

Having used snow removal as an example, he expressed concern that the Town might some year find itself underbudgeted for this item, the budget figure based on a five-year average which is now quite low, he said. "If we have another blizzard of '88 in '74, we'll be underbudgeted, and will have to cut back in other areas to meet the need."

Mr. Colleluri in his presentation said he had asked for a meeting with Mr. Macedonia, but had not been granted one. He met Tuesday with the Comptroller and returned to the evening session of the hearing maintaining his previous position.

Other than Mr. Colleluri, the budget received very little comment from the citizenry at large of the town, the only other speakers being Oscar Summers of Oyster Bay, who spoke about the East Norwich Community Park, Leo J. Benjamin of Syosset, who spoke in favor of preserving the history of the town, and Joseph Sciales, of the Birchwood Park Civic Association. The evening's session lasted a bare half hour. The budget is expected to be adopted by the Town on Tuesday, October 30th.

Vamps Battle House Fires

During the past two weeks, Hicksville firefighters battled two serious house fires. On October 14 at 5:19 p.m. a fire was reported at 40 Laura Dr which is on the corner of Cantigue Id. The fire, which is believed to have been caused by an electrical short in wiring in the basement, burned unnoticed for several

hours before being discovered. No one was at home during the day. The fire spread via the floor beams to the kitchen and up through the walls into the attic. The kitchen area was gutted. Heavy smoke damage occurred to the rest of the dwelling. Probationary fireman F. Larrin of Ladder Co. 5 suffered a cut wrist at the scene and was taken to Central General Hospital for treatment. No other injuries were reported.

On October 19 at 12:48 a.m. a family made good their escape from a house fire at 10 Glenbrook Rd., Hicksville. This fire also burnt a considerable time before the occupants were awakened by noises. The fire caused severe damage to the rear portion of the dwelling in addition to smoke and water damage. Vamps had a difficult time with this one as the fire spread through the walls. No injuries were reported. Chief Louis Mertz was in charge of the Department at both alarms.

An 18 yr. old youth suffered injuries Sunday October 21 when at 1:05 p.m. a car on which he was working on fell on him causing chest and shoulder injuries. He was treated by the Hicksville Rescue Squad and transported to the hospital by the Fire Dept. Ambulance.

Speaking of the Fire Department Ambulance, Birds were opened recently for the purchase of a new ambulance. The contract was won by Graman Corp. of Bethpage. The rescue unit will be one of modern design with space for future equipment. Birds are now out for a new 1500 gal. pumper to replace an aging 19 yr. old piece of equipment assigned to Hose Co. 4.

"Fire Report"
During the Period Oct. 9th thru Oct. 23rd, Hicksville firefighters responded to 48 alarms, 9 of those alarms were malicious false alarms, 3 of them occurring during the two hours of Oct. 22nd 12 rescue calls, and 27 fire calls.
