No More Rotating Teachers

After one and a half months of rotating girls physical education teachers in several elementary schools, the Hicksville School Board voted to hire a replacement, thus filling the vacancy at Dutch Lane School. Gym teachers from Burns, East, Fork and Old Country Road had been shifting among the five schools to cover the girls' gym classes. PTA Council and several PTA units had written to the board and administration asking for this situation to be reevaluated and urging the hiring of a permanent replacement at Dutch Lane.

The board also approved other changes in teaching personnel and hired an additional kindergarten teacher for Lee Avenue School. The school's enrollment for that grade level has increased,

necessitating the forming of another class.

The board of education spent a great deal of time discussing and approving bills for routine expenses of the district. The telephone bill accounted for most of the controversy, due to the switch to the centrix system in September. The bill was held aside until such time as it could be determined whether the August bill had previously been paid and until the attorney could determine if it is legal for a school district to pay for services before rendered (the telephone company bills one month's service in advance.)

The board approved the contract with non-instructional supervisory and administrative personnel. Dr. Madden abstained on this vote. The board also approved the closing of openings in individualized instruction rooms in Dutch Lane, Old

Country Road and Lee Avenue Schools. Mr. McCormack voted against this action.

The name of Opportunity High School was changed to Hicksville Evening School. This may help to secure state aid in the future.

The board approved a retention agreement for the firm of Rains, Pogrebin and Scher as district negotiators at a fee of \$20,500 for two years. Board president, Robert Pirrung, explained that monies for this year's fee are in the current budget due to a savings when the district did not subscribe to the supplemental tax roll. There is already \$3000 budgeted for negotiations in the 1973-74 budget.

The board hired Mrs. Marie Egan as District Clerk.

The next board meeting is Wednesday, November 14 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Hicksville Library Institutes Community Information Service

"I'm 82 and I live on my own because I want to. I get around fine and I can take care of myself—but still, I worry about something happening to me and no-one knowing about it. Is there some way someone can check on me to see if I'm O.K.?"

The answer to this self-reliant senior citizen was found in the files of the new Community Information Service of the Hicksville Public Library. The Nassau County Department of Senior Citizens Affairs (535-4114) offers, among many other services, the Ring-a-Day Telephone Reassurance Service: a telephone call at a regular time daily, to those senior citizens who request it.

"I have three pre-school children who have to be taken to the Plainview Medical center for treatments once a month. I have no means of transportation, and I just can't afford to take a cab. Is there any place I can turn to for help?"

Once again the Community Information Service had the answer. The Hicksville area is fortunate in that it has an active chapter of FISH (Friends in Service and Help), made up of volunteers who are available around the clock for emergency calls and service, particularly for transportation. To reach FISH in this area, dial 938-6333.

These are only two calls for

help among the many that can be answered from the files of the Library's Community Information Service. Housed in a filing cabinet in the Library's Reference department are hundreds of cards outlining services made available to Hicksville residents by public and private agencies. The function of the Library's new department is to attempt to find, for any troubled Hicksville area resident, the proper agency to which he can take his problem.

These problems can range from where to arrange for home care services for the aged, ill, or homebound—to where to call to

Hofstra Law School Selects Father & Son For Award

Hofstra University's School of Law has selected the eminent philosopher Dr. Paul Weiss and his son, Jonathan Weiss, a prominent attorney specializing in legal services for the poor, to inaugurate the School's President's Inaugural presentation, "Law and Ethics," on Wednesday, November 14 at 2:30 PM in the Monroe Lecture Center.

The Weisses are co-authors of the book, Right and Wrong: A Philosophical Dialogue between Father and Son. During the formal inauguration of Robert L. Payton as fifth president of Hofstra on Thursday, November 15 at 8:00 PM in the Hofstra Playhouse, Paul and Jonathan Weiss will receive the silver medalion being given to the recipients of the Hofstra Faculty Distinguished Scholar Award.

In announcing their selection for the Award, Law School Dean Monroe H. Freedman stated: "Paul and Jonathan Weiss are singularly appropriate choices as

our honorees. As a philosopher and an activist attorney, they represent the relationship of thought and action, the dependency of law on its foundations in morality. As thinkers and participants in public affairs, they offer informed and original perspectives on the critical issues of our times. And as father and son, they span the generations, emphasizing the timelessness of the search for knowledge and justice."

Dr. Weiss is Sterling Professor of Philosophy (emeritus) at Yale University, Hefner Professor of Philosophy at Catholic University, and a past president of the American Philosophical Society. He earned his B.S.S. at CCNY, and his A.M. and Ph.D. at Harvard University. His published works include Reality, Nature and Man, Man's Freedom, Modes of Being, Our Public Life, The World of Art, Nine Basic Arts, The God We seek, and Philosophy in Process.

Jonathan Weiss is currently Director of New York's Legal Services for the Elderly Poor, having served previously as Managing Attorney of Mobilization for Youth Legal Services, and managing Attorney of the District of Columbia Neighborhood Legal Services. Mr. Weiss has also been associated with the Solicitor's Office of the U.S. Department of Labor, and the Columbia University Center in Social Welfare Policy and Law. He earned his A.B. at Yale, attended Chicago Law School, where he was elected to the Law Review, and completed his J.D. at Yale. In addition to their presentation, "Law and Ethics," the Weisses will discuss two other topics during their two days at Hofstra: "The Responsibilities of Judges, Lawyers and Juries," and "The Nature of a Constitution."

County Contracts Awarded

County Executive Ralph G. Caso has awarded two contracts for improvements at County facilities and one to alleviate a drainage problem in East Meadow.

Slope Stabilization at Sands Point Preserve: A \$74,863 contract was awarded to Vogel Bros. Paving Corp., West Babylon, for construction of a four-foot high timber retaining wall at the base

of the slope below the main house of Falaise, the former Guggenheim Estate. An eroded area will also be filled with topsoil and stabilized with plants and shrubs. The erosion had occurred due to a deteriorating seawall which was recently repaired.

B'nai B'rith Conference

Some 200 persons, representing the leadership in B'nai B'rith units across Long Island and over the Metropolitan area, turned out for the 5th Annual Conference of the organization, to hear an "insider's" report on the Middle East crisis by Israeli Ambassador to the United Nations, Jacob Doron.

Doron addressed a luncheon on Sunday, November 4, which concluded the day-long meeting at Hofstra University, sponsored by the Nassau-Suffolk Council of B'nai B'rith, the Long Island segment of the largest Jewish service organization in the world, with over 500,000 members in 42

countries.

Ambassador Doron told the audience that Israel is still faced with a "precarious situation" in resolving the Middle East crisis with "nobody really knowing what will happen tomorrow." He added that the "general cease-fire" is holding but that signs are clear that the Arabs are "breaking the cease-fire every couple of hours."

The Ambassador contended that as far as peace is concerned that the "crux of the problem is the refusal of the Arabs to accept the sovereign existence of Israel."

Improvement of West Side Parking Field, A. Holly Patterson Home: Lizza & Sons, Inc., Oyster Bay, was awarded a \$61,957 contract for installation of additional drainage facilities and regarding at the Patterson Home's west side parking field. Present drainage has been found to be inadequate and pavement subsidence has occurred.

Extension of Newbridge Avenue Drain, East Meadow: Lizza & Sons were also awarded a \$42,997 contract for construction of a 1,000-foot extension of the Newbridge Avenue drain to Storm Water Basin No. 272 to relieve flooding in the area between Hempstead Turnpike and Jerusalem Avenue.

Work is expected to begin this month and take two months to complete.

Supervisor John W. Burke Reports

The oil industry has introduced a new twist in its all-out campaign to conduct drilling operations for oil and gas off the East Coast. Newspaper and magazine writers are being taken on helicopter tours of offshore drilling platforms and oil refineries on the Gulf Coast in an effort to convince them of the safety of such operations. The industry hopes that by convincing the news media that offshore drilling is hazard-free and is good for local economy, subsequent stories written by these people will reflect that belief.

The oil industry has conducted over fifty such press junkets so far this year, at a reported cost of about \$2,000 each. It would seem that this \$100,000 could have better been spent in the development of spill-proof drilling and production methods which would be much more convincing to the public than stories of offshore operations over two thousand miles away. Drilling in the 30-foot depths of the relatively calm waters of the Gulf of Mexico is a far cry from the conditions under which such operations would be carried out along the Atlantic Coast.

This potential threat to our

environment is a very real one. Two of the primary target areas are the so-called Baltimore Canyon, which lies about forty miles south of Long Island, and the Georges Bank Trough, the southerly end of which is about one hundred miles east of Montauk Point.

Industry officials appear confident that drilling in these waters in only a little over one year away, with full-scale production within another ten years.

The industry speaks of the impact offshore drilling would have on the local economy, but says little about the environmental impact of ancillary onshore facilities such as pipelines, tank farms and refineries.

There is little doubt that we are facing a nationwide energy crisis and that new sources of energy must be developed. However, we have seen what uncontrolled industrial development and so-called technical progress have already done to our environment. The protection of our environment and maintenance of the ecological balance is at a crisis stage and must be given first priority in any future development.

Plainedge Downs Comets 14-8

Hicksville dropped its fourth game of the season to Plainedge by a score of 14-8. The game was decided by a series of mistakes made by Hicksville in key situations. One score by Plainedge seemed to be a gift from the Comet offense. The Comets fumbled inside their own ten yard line but their defense got the ball back on downs. The offensive unit proceeded to come onto the field and fumble again inside their own ten and thus set up a Plainedge score and two point conversion against the wearied Hicksville defense. Offsetting penalties nullified a third quarter pass that would have brought the Comets down to the two yard line with a first down. This play was reminiscent of the previous week's nullified touchdown pass due to a linebacker failure to buckle his cinchstrap. This week's 45 yard scoring drive was almost extinguished when a pass to Plaetle on the Plainedge 11 yard line was nullified because an illegal receiver was downfield. Mistakes similar to those mentioned have both instrumental in Hicksville's four defeats.

The Hicksville defense let up a surprisingly high 270 yards rushing yet allowed only one touchdown other than the one set up by two successive fumbles. The Comets defense has not been the reason for their losses this season. The Comet defense is fourth in the tough 9 member North Shore Division I and has only given up an average of 12 points a game. The trouble lies in the offenses low scoring average which amounts to only 8 points a game. The defense has distinguished itself this year in holding the Farmingdale powerhouse to 20 points, shutting out Port Washington and scoring two touchdowns for the beleaguered offense. Standouts on defense this week were Greoli Thorne, Wall Sweeney, Bob Soriano, Brendan Wallace and the always consistent trio of Tony DiGuseppe, Leo Orsino and Paul Curcio.

The strong defenses of both teams kept both punters busy all afternoon. Both Plainedge scores were tallied in the second quarter. The first came on a 45 yard run through the middle by Scott Pomierico. The next score

was set up as previously mentioned by two consecutive Hicksville fumbles. Plainedge picked up the ball on the Hicksville 10 and worked it to the three yard line. Pete Toscano exercised his option as quarterback by running the ball around the left end for the score. Plainedge's final two points were scored on a run by Toscano with 30 seconds left in the half.

The Comets lone touchdown was the result of a beautiful 85 yard drive in which Cannone switched to the air. Curcio started the ball rolling with two runs totaling 20 yards. Cannone then threw to Plaetle for 20 and on third and eight hit Orsino on the Plainedge 20. An illegal receiver penalty forced Cannone into a fourth and thirteen situation. He came through with a clutch pass to Glen Plaetle at the two. Curcio supplied the final touch by powering over for the score. The final score of the afternoon came on a conversion pass over the middle from Cannone to Orsino. The game turned out to be a good matchup between two defenses rated third and fourth in a tough division.

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Kellner Day In Hicksville

On Friday, November 2nd, all segments of the Hicksville community turned out to honor the beloved Sam Kellner. Mr. Kellner celebrated his "50th Business anniversary" -- a commemoration and tribute to having been a local businessman for 50 years in our town.

Sam J. Kellner was born in Austria on October 4, 1900. In his years spanning almost a decade, the story of Sam Kellner is not unlike Horatio Alger. He was brought to the United States by his parents at the age of five and attended public school in Hicksville, Long Island until his second year in high school. At that time, he left school to go to work to help his parents support the family of seven children.

After working at

When most men dream of retiring, in the early 1960's Mr. Kellner embarked on a new venture with the formation of the Rolling Oaks Corporation to engage in the home construction field in Florida. He planned and developed the city of Beverly Hills, 65 miles north of Tampa in Citrus County. The organization

has constructed over 2,500 individual homes and it has proved to be a very successful enterprise



providing retirement and mature leisure homes for over 6,000 people. The Kellner philosophy is to offer people a complete

and wonderful life style. He insists in a business setting based on honesty and integrity.

Mr. Kellner was honored for his humanitarian and philanthropic efforts by Congregation Beth Shalom in Beverly Hills, Florida.

In 1970, Mr. Kellner was cited by the New York Council for Civic Affairs for his outstanding public service in providing housing opportunities for retired people.

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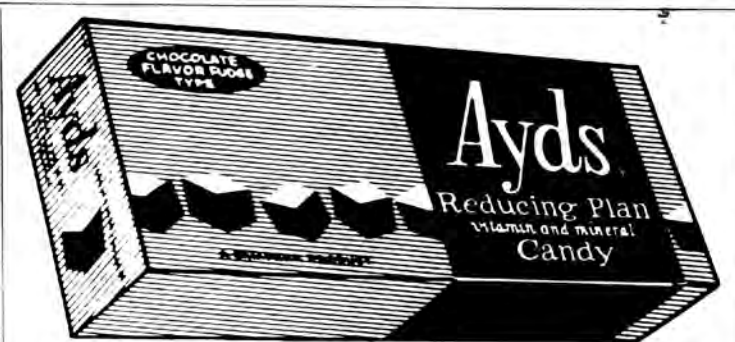

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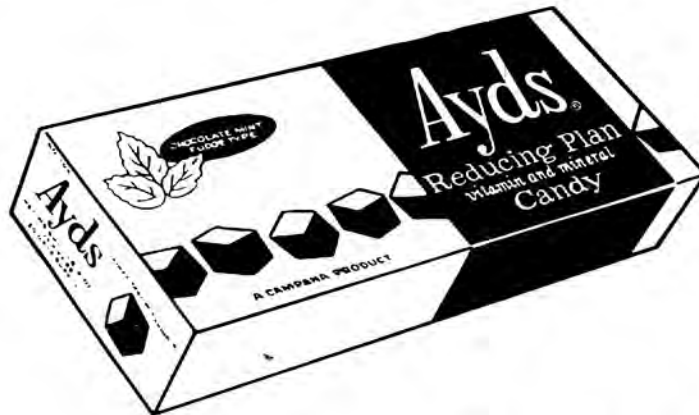
