Social Security News

People in financial need who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled may be eligible for monthly federal payments starting next January according to Sydney Savrin, Social Security District Manager in Mineola. These payments - called Supplemental Security Income - will be made to people who have little or no cash income and not much savings or other assets.

The amount of the SSI checks that people get will depend on how much other income they have. In addition to the basic Federal payment, New York State will provide a supplemental assistance benefit. Eligibility for both types of payments will be determined on the basis of an individual's income. For example, a single person living alone with a monthly income of about \$230 or less and a couple with a monthly income of about \$325 or less may be eligible for some type of payments under this program. Persons with limited income from work may also be eligible for payments.

"People getting Social Service Assistance payments in December because they are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled

generally will continue to get their payments in January, under this new Federal - State program. They don't have to apply. Their combined State and Federal assistance payments in January will be at least as much as their Social Service assistance payments were in December," Savrin said.

Although the supplemental security income program will be administered by the Social Security Administration, payments will be financed by Federal general tax revenues - not by social security contributions from workers and employers.

Social Security District Offices are presently taking applications from persons 65 or over, or blind, or disabled. These applicants are persons who may be eligible for supplemental security income beginning January 1, 1974. If any person believes he may be eligible for this type of benefit, Mr. Savrin suggests that he immediately contact the Mineola Social Security Office, located at One Station Plaza North, Mineola, N.Y. 11501. The office may also be contacted by phone at 747-5470.

Local Groups Study Drug Abuse in Nassau

On Saturday, November 10, the Nassau County Council V.F.W., The Action Council of Central Nassau, Inc., and the Department of New York Drug Addiction Commission worked cooperatively to enlighten the V.F.W. members, local groups and organizations, and the general public as to the widespread abuse of all drugs in the County today. Approximately 75 people attended.

Mr. Frank Mastandrea, Chairman spoke to us on what is

happening, what is being done, and, of course, what MUST be done immediately to alleviate this ever-increasing problem among youth and adults in every segment of our society. He pointed out that drug abuse and addiction is not limited to the poor and/or minority groups any longer. It has always been

present in the more affluent, but certainly not as publicized.

Our main objective was to get to the Post members and their Auxiliaries as this problem relates to their potential members the Viet Nam Veteran. We are not, however, overlooking the rest of the population. It has come to light that many of our

young men and women coming back from the middle and far East are coming back addicted for a multitude of reasons. A majority of them do not know where to turn, but hopefully, they will seek help through their Veteran Service Workers at their local V.F.W. Posts.

Mr. Arthur Randall, Assistant

District Attorney for Nassau County spoke to us regarding the new N.Y. State Drug Laws; and four young people from Woodside Halfway House in Queens spoke on their use of and involvement with drugs and today's drug culture.

All in all, it was an extremely informative seminar.

Energy Crisis

Responding to a letter he received from President Nixon, Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today outlined a comprehensive program undertaken by county government to help cope with the energy crisis.

Caso told the President of the formation last August of an ad hoc energy crisis committee and its October report that led to the reduction of thermostats, water temperatures and lighting in all county government buildings. This group meets tomorrow (Nov. 15) to consider further proposals to deal with the worsening fuel supply situation. Caso reported the county executive gave a brief account of public education programs he began to develop greater interest in the conservation of energy, including proclamations, radio announcements and requests to school districts to participate in Energy Education Week activities. Caso said that a leaflet pointing out ways to conserve energy is in its second printing after more than 100,000 copies were distributed in less than a month.

Routine Meeting For Nassau Supervisors

In a routine, post-election day meeting, the Nassau County Board of Supervisors set public hearing dates on bus applications and sewer easements, voted in favor of the Nassau-Suffolk Comprehensive Health Planning Council to use some office space in the Davis Building at the Plainview Division of the Nassau County Medical Center and adopted a map showing easements to be acquired for sanitary sewer purposes in Merrick in the vicinity of Bridge Street and various other streets.

A public hearing date of December 3rd was set for bus applications by various companies to Roosevelt Raceway, Belmont Race Track and Jones Beach. A date of December 17th was set for the public hearing on property to be acquired in Merrick for drainage purposes on the north side of Smith Street, east of Bellwood Drive, in connection with Newbridge Creek East Branch.

Advertising for bids was authorized on the construction of exterior stair walls and guard rail at the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum. Also in regard to the Coliseum, the county executive was authorized to execute an agreement with Gulick-Henderson Laboratories extending the firm's inspection service to include the bracing truss system, with additional compensation.

The Supervisors also voted in favor of the construction of a \$138,890 Cooperative Center in Roosevelt and authorized an agreement with Sidney B. Bowne & Son to investigate and determine the amount of "borrow and fill" used in the construction of the Mitchell Field interchange and to render a written report of their findings.

A Happy Thanksgiving To All!

Dear Friends:

As a special Thanksgiving message to all our readers, we reprint excerpts of an editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian commentator. This was widely reprinted throughout our country and inserted in the Congressional Record. We also extend thanks to The U.S. News and World Report, in whose pages we read it.

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth.

Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When the franc was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris.

I was there. I saw it. When distant cities are hit by earthquakes, it is the United States that hurries in to help. . . This spring, 59 American communities (were) flattened by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions upon billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplanes.

Come on, let's hear it! Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tristar or the Douglas 10?

If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the international lines except Russia fly American planes? Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon?

You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, and you get automobiles.

You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon—not once but several times—and safely home again.

You talk about scandals, and the Americans put their right in the store window for everybody to look at.

Even their draft-dodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets, and most of them—unless they are breaking Canadian laws—are

The impending shortage of home heating oil could be the basis for home owners introducing potentially hazardous practices into their homes in seeking alternate sources of heating. Safety experts have expressed considerable concern over the possible dangers of the improper use of auxiliary heating devices.

A serious potential hazard exists in the use of top burners or ovens in gas stoves for this purpose. Used over long periods at night when doors are infrequently opened, the oxygen in the area can be depleted, resulting in improper combustion and the production of deadly carbon monoxide. Operation of ovens with the door open makes the thermostat ineffective and could cause the stove elements to burn out.

Oil, kerosene or gasoline heaters must be properly vented to the outside to prevent the build-up of hazardous combustion products. An adequate oxygen supply through proper room

ventilation is necessary to avoid asphyxiation from carbon monoxide.

Charcoal grills are fine for grilling steaks outside on the patio, but are the most dangerous potential home heating device indoors. They should only be used where there is a direct connection to a flue or chimney. Charcoal briquets produce about 20 percent carbon monoxide at all times, which quickly reaches lethal levels in a closed room.

Ventilation is also important in the use of fire places, whether the wood burning type or the so-called gas log. A blazing wood fire, by the way, although colorful, is a very inefficient source of heat; glowing coals are a much better source of radiant heat on a cold winter day.

Electric heaters are recommended as one of the best forms of auxiliary heating equipment. The unit should bear the Underwriter Laboratory seal, and be equipped with a thermostat to prevent overheating. It should also have a "tip-over switch" that automatically shuts the unit

off in case of an accident. Home wiring should be checked before using any electric heater. No other appliances should be used on the same line when an electric heater is operating.

All portable heaters should be kept well away from flammable materials such as curtains or bedding. These units should only be operated when a responsible adult is present to safeguard children and the elderly or disabled.

Used with caution, auxiliary heating units can safely provide additional comfort through the cold winter months ahead.

TOWN NOTE: Stores, schools and other public buildings are now being decorated for the holiday season. Managers and service personnel of such places should be certain that fire fighting and detection equipment are clearly visible, readily available and not obscured by any holiday decorations.

Roncallo Offices Elect Daylight Savings Time Now

Congressman Angelo D. Roncallo (R-3rd-NY) announced today that effective immediately both his Washington and Cold Spring Harbor offices will observe Daylight Saving Time hours in order to conserve energy.

Roncallo stated that the decision to open and close his offices an hour earlier was made while discussing the energy crisis in an informal staff meeting. "We were all upset that Congress had adjourned for the Thanksgiving recess before acting on legislation to implement Daylight

Savings and decided that we could make our own small effort to conserve energy by establishing Daylight Savings Time on our own." "However," Roncallo stated "to assure that our new voluntary working hours do not interfere with my service to my constituents of the Third District, one staff member in each of my offices will remain until the close of the conventional working day to answer the phones and be on hand should any emergency arise."

Commenting on the fact that the energy crisis seems to have

taken our country by surprise, Roncallo recalled on January 18, soon after arriving in Congress, "I cosponsored legislation to reestablish Daylight Savings Time on a year round basis as I recognized the scope of the pending crisis. Besides the obvious benefit of conserving energy," the Long Island Congressman added, "daylight saving allows for an extra hour of light and thus provides more safety for our school children, many of whom must be out in the early dusk hours of winter."

Urges Daylight Saving

Citing the additional extra hour of daylight gained from Daylight Saving Time as a significant factor in the reduction of traffic accidents, the Nassau County Traffic Safety Board unanimously passed a resolution urging all legislators from the Nassau area to advocate and support governmental efforts to legislate the establishment of year-round Daylight Saving

Time, Richard F. McGuinness, Chairman of the Board, announced.

In a letter to all federal and state legislators from Nassau County, Chairman McGuinness stressed that for the past three years, some 55,000 Americans have been killed and over five million injured annually on the nation's highways. The greatest incidence of traffic accidents,

lives lost and persons injured, McGuinness said, occurs in the peak rush hours from 4:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M.

Evidence now indicates that the changing visual environment from light to dusk to nighttime visibility accounts for a significant percentage of these accidents.

"It is logical to assume," stated McGuinness, "that an extra hour of daylight in these critical hours of maximum traffic would reduce the obvious hazards of inadequate visibility which would in turn reduce the incidence of traffic accidents with a corresponding saving of lives and a reduction of injuries."

They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles.

I hope Canada is not one of these."

SOCIAL SECURITY Questions & Answers

QUES: I've accumulated \$82 worth of doctor bills so far this year. When can I send these bills in to the Medicare carrier for payment?

ANS: You can send your bills in immediately. This year the annual deductible for medical insurance is \$60. Medicare will pay 80 per cent of the reasonable charges above the \$60 deductible.

QUES: I always thought the social security program was only for older people. Is that true?

ANS: No. Today social security could just as easily be called a young worker's insurance program. The program has changed a lot since 1935 when it was enacted. The survivors

program provides income for the families of young workers who die prematurely. The disability program provides monthly checks for severely disabled workers under 65 and their families. Over 4½ million children today are receiving social security benefits based on the work record of a parent who has retired, become disabled, or died. Many children are being helped through college by social security student benefits that were made possible by their parents' contributions to social security during their working years.

QUES: I've heard that the new Supplementary Security Income payments for people who have

little property and low income and who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled starts in January, 1974. My father who's almost 90, is confined in a State hospital. Medicaid pays his bills there. Will he be eligible for these new benefits when they begin?

ANS: He may be, but his payments would be limited to \$25 a month because he is in a medical institution and supported by Medicaid. The \$25 is intended to purchase small comfort items for those recipients who have no income. You should inquire further. Your local social security office is at 1 Station Plaza North, Mineola, New York. The telephone number is PL 7-5470.
