Each year, the president of the Nassau County Board selects a member to represent Nassau County and its nine Divisions and Ladies Auxiliary units, as Aide to the Grand Marshal, to be named by the Parade Committee and its perennial Chairman, the Honorable James J. Comerford of New York City.

James P. Crimmins of Hicksville, a founding member of the Commodore John Barry Division Eleven, Ancient Order of Hibernians of Hicksville was chosen by Michael J. O'Rourke, County President, at an Executive Meeting of the County Board held early this year. Mr. Crimmins resides at 91 Myers Avenue with his wife, Kathryn, sons John and Jamie, for the past 18 years. A married daughter, Kathleen Crosby, resides in Oakdale with daughters Maureen (2½ years old) and Denise (4 weeks old), to the delight of the proud grandparents.

Board Approves Bruce Estate Acquisition

A potentially short, quiet meeting at the Town of Oyster Bay on Tuesday gained some pizzazz for the viewers present with some comments offered by Town Meeting perennial Oscar Summers, Oyster Bay attorney, and Judy Jacobs, President of the South Woodbury Taxpayers Association, also a familiar face at Town Hall.

On the agenda, a big moment for the Town went quickly and routinely when the Town Board voted unanimously to acquire the Bruce estate in Woodbury for a Town park. The next steps in the procedure will be the appointment of appraisers for the property and the institution of condemnation proceedings.

There were no speakers on the two routine hearings on the agenda which concerned the construction of additional drainage facilities in the Town and the renewal of the Plainview Fire Department Contract.

deposition covered many topics, including the energy crisis and the opinion Canadians hold of Americans, both he and Juday Jacobos of the Wouth Woodbury Taxpayers Association zeroed in on Supervisor John Burke concerning the rehiring of Gerard Trotta on the town's roster as Assistant Superintendent of Parks. Both asked to know why a person presently under indictment and awaiting trial would be rehired by the Town.

To both speakers, Supervisor Burke's answer was to the effect that Mr. Trotta is a civil service worker, whose hiring is not in the hands of the Town Supervisor.

Mrs. Jacobs quoted chapter and verse of the Civil Service Law. She said a civil service worker may be granted a one-year leave of absence. He may be granted a two-year leave of absence, she said, if he returns to the job for a three-month period.

She demanded to know whether Mr. Trotta had been granted such leave of absence, and if so, where were the minutes of the Civil Service Commission meeting at which such leave was granted?

Supervisor Burke recommended that she seek the information from the Civil Service Commission. "Can you get this information for me?" Mrs. Jacobs asked. "No, I can't," was the reply.

"I'm not standing before you accusing Mr. Trotta of guilt," said Mrs. Jacobs. "What I am doing is stating that the public has a right to know of his innocence or guilt before he is back in a Town job, paid for by the very taxpayers we do represent."

Community Council

During one of the worst ice storms of this season (Thursday, Jan. 3) the Hicksville Community Council held its regular meeting at the Hicksville Library on Jerusalem Avenue.

In spite of the inclement weather, over thirty Hicksvilians, representing about twenty local organizations, heard a two-part program. They also contributed their ideas as to how two small community parks might possibly be developed.

Ms. Paula Conrad, County Psychologist assigned to School District 17, and John Maniac and Allan Lewis of HAD, directed the first part of this program. They explained the methods used in their work, to help young people solve their problems. This was followed by a most illuminating question and answer period, which threw much light on the fine work being accomplished by HAD and the school district in these areas.

The following members of the Hicksville Community Park Task Force were present by invitation of the HCC, to hear proposals and suggestions for the development of the two proposed park sites: Mrs. Clara Bennett, Mr. Peter C. Collins, Mr. Emil Immesberger, Mr. Jack Landress, Mrs. Sheila Noeth, Mr. Amadeo Tomaini, Mr. Robert Willis, Mr. Warren Donlittle and Mr. Donald McLean.

Some of the suggestions offered were:

Lighted baseball complex (an estimated 1,500 to 2,000 boys in the Hicksville community are involved in baseball).

Community building at either or both sites for use by senior

citizens of which there are ten or twelve active groups in Hicksville. This facility also would be available for other groups of residents.

The parks should be developed for all season multi-use purposes for residents of all ages. Other proposed facilities included tennis courts, both indoor and outdoor, an indoor swimming pool, and handball courts. Better utilization of other existing park sites also was suggested.

The newly-formed Task Force explained that this was the first meeting of its kind. They said that a questionnaire was being prepared to be mailed to every home in the District and they urged that those present report back to their organizations and ask them to be sure to return the questionnaire. They said that other suggestions were also welcomed and should be sent to the TOB Supervisor's Office at Town Hall in Oyster Bay.

It was explained that the work of the Task Force, which is of course, advisory to the Town Board, should take about six months and would end in their recommendations to the Town Board as to how residents wish to develop these two small park areas. The Town Board will then hold a public hearing before they make any binding decisions.

"All of this may take time," explained a spokesman for the Task Force, "but it is important that the residents and taxpayers of this District have ample opportunity to express themselves before any decisions be made affecting the Hicksville Park District."

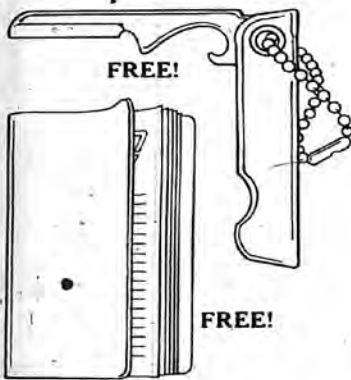

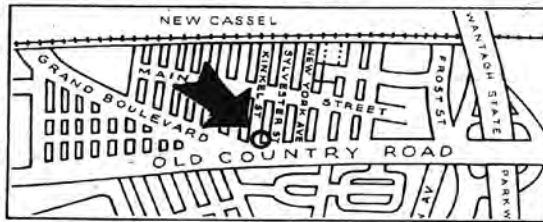
