Youth Agencies Want More Aid for Summer Program

Spokesmen for the disadvantaged youth of Nassau County were present at the Nassau County Board of Supervisors meeting last Monday to ask for increased funds and more jobs for the summer youth programs.

Rev. Gregory J. Foster, Jr., director of the Youth Development component of the Nassau County Economic Opportunity Commission, said: "We don't want an increase of \$50,000 this year, we want \$250,000," although the press release handed out by him stated that the YDP was looking for a 50 per cent increase on its current allocation of \$100,000.

A new program described by Rev. Foster was one to provide young people with direct assistance in enrollment in vocational trade schools and colleges.

Other projects mentioned for next summer's youth program by Rev. Foster include the encouraging of youngsters to go into their own business enterprises and to begin publishing a newspaper which would "communicate information about their activities among individual groups and communities."

Summer Job Program
Also speaking in favor of increased assistance for youth, particularly in the area of finding them summer jobs, was Billy McCall, director of the Freeport Community Action Program, who said that 5,800 young people in Nassau County are eligible for

the Neighborhood Youth Corps job program, yet there were only 1200 jobs for them last year. To meet the needs of 1200 applicants in Freeport last year, he said he had only 30 slots to fill. Mr. McCall appealed to the Board of Supervisors to ask the Department of Labor to double the number of jobs available to meet the need.

In response, County Executive Ralph Caso pointed out that the jobs must be forthcoming from the private sector of business to meet the needs of unemployed youth. "The government just can not provide that many jobs," he said.

Capital Improvements
In other business, the supervisors approved a capital note ordinance in the sum of \$544,300 in renewal of capital notes to finance various capital improvements planned on in the county budget. The major improvements concerned include \$112,500 to finance the acquisition of personal property comprising part of the county bus system and \$37,500 to finance the acquisition of real property comprising part of the county bus system. Also to be financed will be improvements to various parks in the county, including Inwood, Woodmere, Cow Meadow, Cedar Creek, William Cullen Bryant, and \$25,000 for general improvements to county parks. Coliseum expenditures included are \$11,250 for site development work and \$1,750 and \$6,875 for the

central utilities plant. \$16,875 will be expended for reconstruction of the county administration building and \$5,750 for construction of the Social Services evaluation center. \$7,125 will be expended to convert the Westbury Temple for use by the Probation Department; \$1,500 will repair county bridges; \$7375 will improve the old County Courthouse building on Franklin Avenue and \$3,875 will be applied to parking improvements.

Of the total capital note ordinance, \$100,000 will pay for construction of surface drainage sewers.

Also Accomplished
In other ordinances approved, the supervisors voted that the county assume operation of county busses in the event of the termination of agreement with the Metropolitan Suburban Bus Authority, ratified the agreement with the youth agencies in relation to the summer program in the amount of \$94,369; and voted to spend \$81,000 for experiments in denitrification of waste water at Bay Park at a cost of \$81,000.

The supervisors also authorized an agreement with Henderson & Casey, consulting engineers, to study the water systems at Eisenhower Park, much of which is said to be approaching the end of its useful life, and to make recommendations.

The Boy Scouts of America has pledged to deliver to the Nation on its 200th anniversary a great

gift a new generation of prepared, young citizens who are physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight.

Many Cub Packs will be conducting annual Blue and Gold Banquets in February, Scout Troops parents dinners and Courts of Honor and Explorer Posts have planned special activities for the anniversary celebration. Competitive rallies are planned for the winning patrol in each district to determine the Council winners. Cub Pack Dens will be participating in a Roller Derby on the same basis.

The annual Finance Campaign to raise the 1974 Budget of

\$577,375.00 will also be conducted during February under the leadership of Chairman John E. Burns of Sea Cliff.

Operation Igloo, the annual winter encampment for Explorers will be held at Onteora Scout Reservation at Livingston Manor in the Catskills February 16 to 18 with over 1,000 Explorers and older Scouts enjoying skiing, sledding, tobogganing and ice skating for the holiday week end.

Participating in these and other activities will be the 34,000 youth members and 11,000 adult volunteers of the Nassau County Council.

PLAINVIEW-OLD BETHPAGE HIGH SCHOOL News

GLOBAL CONFLICTS
The Mack Geneva Peace Conference on the Middle East was the outgrowth of eight weeks of study and research on the Arab-Israeli Crisis. Students were given the opportunity to apply what they had learned in a new context: a simulation Peace

Conference. The class was organized into the different interest groups actually represented at the Geneva Conference. Acting on the basis of the values and attitudes identified with each group, students interested and attempted to reach a satisfactory solution to the Middle East debacle. During the three weeks which were devoted to the conference, students focused attention on the various issues involved and found it difficult to escape the problems involving protocol, e.g. discussion on whether to permit U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim to preside over the opening sessions of the conference. 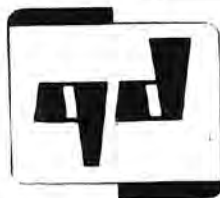

Law To Protect Senior Citizens

"Bill", as he was known to his many friends and associates, was a past president of the Hicksville Rotary Club, a past secretary and founding member of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, a senior member of the Columbia Society of Real Estate Appraisers, a member of the Nassau County Insurance Agents Association and held an associate membership in the National Board of Realtors. He was also a member of the Brookville Country Club.

Legislation to provide that any increase in Social Security benefits shall not be included in computing the income allowance of senior citizens' eligibility for real property tax reduction was introduced by Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta (R-Uniondale).

The Uniondale lawmaker said that his bill was aimed at protecting the senior citizens from a "possible injustice" that will be inflicted upon them when the Federal Government increases the Social Security benefits by 11 per cent this year.

He said: "The Federal government has recognized the fact that living expenses have greatly increased and that it is necessary to increase Social Security payments in 1974 to help the senior citizens keep pace with these cost of living increases."

"It is quite possible that this increase in Social Security payment would put recipients over the income level of \$6,000 and, thus, deprive them of being eligible for a real property tax exemption of 50 per cent which is now permissible under existing law," Margiotta said.

"It would be a great injustice to our senior citizens to give them an increase in Social Security benefits on one hand then to take away senior citizens' real property tax exemptions on the other hand," he said. "This bill would prevent such an injustice."
