Hicksville School District To Vote In May

The Hicksville Board of Education set May 8 as the date for voting on school budget and school board candidates. William Bruno was the only board member to vote against the motion, feeling a May date was too soon because the board would not have enough time to consider the proposed budget.

Mr. Bruno also objected to distribution in the schools of flyers advertising Saturday movies sponsored by H.A.D. and the Hicksville Kiwanis. He stated this was against state education law, but school board attorney, Joseph Campanella, said the board was within its rights and this distribution could take place at the school board's discretion. Robert Pirrung, board president, reminded Mr. Bruno that a policy had been passed last year allowing the superintendent to decide on distribution of flyers in the schools by outside organizations. Mr. Bruno remained firm in his objection, adding the board was endorsing H.A.D. by allowing their material in the movies. Since the money from the movies goes to H.A.D. activities, he added, the board should be aware of how the money is being spent. Mr. Bruno requested all long-range expenses for educational

innovative programs or capital investment expenses recommended by administration be accompanied by a projection of all costs for five years. This suggestion will be tried for the remainder of the school year.

The school board approved a request by St. Ignatius CYO for use of two buildings on Saturday afternoons for a basketball program. Due to the expansion of the district's own recreation program, this organization was put out of facilities previously approved for its use. The cost for each afternoon of use will be \$50. Dr. Joseph Madden abstained on the voting because he felt this approval should have been automatic and should not have been placed on the board's agenda. Mr. Bruno voted no; the other trustees, yes. (Mr. McCormack is still absent, due to illness.)

The board of education restored the use of the trampoline in the physical education program, on a voluntary basis. Mr. Bruno felt the board should save money and not approve the use. He said there were many law suits before which cost the district money. However, Dr. Niosi said the rate of accident had been low.

The school board approved an

emergency health sabbatical for Robert Whearty, principal of Dutch Lane School. Lou Penque, assistant principal at Lee Avenue, was named acting principal through June. Robert Townsend, assistant principal at Dutch Lane (who has been filling in the past few months in Mr. Whearty's absence) has been transferred to Lee Avenue as full-time assistant principal.

The board of education also approved an extended readiness program at Lee Avenue School. In this program first graders who need help to successfully bridge the transition from kindergarten to first grade will receive intensive work in reading and math. The program will be taught by the part-time kindergarten teacher at Lee Avenue, who will now be full-time.

The board discussed subsidy of the Hicksville High School newspaper. Steve Burgay, editor of the Comet, said the paper now prints 1000 copies per issue at an average cost of \$225. Even with ads and sales, the paper is losing between \$70 and \$80 an issue. Steve explained that the yearbook is partially subsidized and papers in many neighboring high schools are financed by the

Social Security

Question Box

QUES: I'm 65 and my ex-husband and I have been married 23 years before we were divorced. But I couldn't get any social security payments on his work record when he died 3 years ago because I hadn't been receiving any support payments from him. Has there been a change in this requirement?

ANS: Yes. The support requirement was eliminated. As long as your marriage lasted 20 years and your husband had worked long enough under social security, you are eligible for benefits. You should contact any social security office to apply for benefits. Your local office is at 1 Station Plaza North, Mineola, New York. The telephone number is PL-7-5470.

QUES: I'm a newlywed and plan to keep working until my husband completes law school. My employer tells me I should have my social security card changed since it still shows my maiden name. Since I only receive one number in my lifetime anyway, why is it necessary to change my name on my card?

ANS: Although it's true you keep the same social security number for life, your employer is right. For social security recordkeeping purposes, your name and number both must be correct to assure proper credit for your earnings. The people at any social security office can issue a duplicate card showing your new name.

Statement of Nassau County Executive Caso on the Mitchel Field Decision in US District Court, Brooklyn

I am delighted with the decision of Judge Constantino which should enable Nassau County to move with dispatch to complete the development of Mitchel Field. I am now publicly calling on the selfish interests and nay sayers who brought this suit to cease their legal meddling and allow us to proceed in this, the year of Mitchel Field.

While I question Judge Constantino's contention that "community opposition to (low income family housing) has been racially motivated," I also note court's finding that "... there is no proof of official conduct which has as its purpose the containment of blacks or which has the effect of denying blacks rights and opportunities

available to whites."

Judge Constantino's decision says the opposite is true and it cites our pioneering open housing law, as well as my own support, while presiding supervisor of the Town of Hempstead and now as county executive of Nassau County, "of several proposals to alleviate the housing needs of the poor." The judge also made note of my scattered site housing plan and my efforts in behalf of a state constitutional amendment to give counties the power to build housing.

I find significant Judge Constantino's conclusion that blacks are able to move freely in Nassau's housing market and that Mitchel Field lies in the midst of communities with

substantial black populations.

I firmly agree with Judge Constantino's statement that "there is no basis to support a finding that the construction of high rise apartments at Mitchel Field is essential to the existence of low-income family housing in Nassau County."

The federal court finds that the uses proposed for Mitchel Field land "have a rational and legitimate governmental purpose" and I intend to pursue the development of Mitchel Field with enthusiasm in the months ahead.

I want to single out County Attorney Joseph Jaspian and the members of his staff for the cogent case they presented in U.S. District Court.

The Shields Make Donation

The Nassau County Medical Center was given \$3,000 today by Shields, a 700-member county-wide police association, for use in the center's kidney research and dialysis program.

The money, in the form of a check to the Meadowbrook Medical Education and Research Foundation, was presented to Dr. James F. Collins, the superintendent of the center, and Dr. Joseph M. Letteri of the Department of Medicine, who is in charge of the day-and-night renal dialysis program. Presenting the check to Collins and Letteri were Shields' president William Lombard of

Elmont, vice president Gerard Molloy of Westbury, sergeant-at-arms Robert Lucent of Levittown, and welfare committee member Harold Deegan of Plainview.

Collins told the police officers that he was "both proud and pleased to be able to accept this generous contribution on behalf of the medical center for this highly regarded, ever-expanding renal dialysis program." Lombard said that, "This check is our way of saying 'thanks to the medical center' for the work it has done in the field of renal dialysis and to help the center to improve the quality of life for

those Long Islanders who need kidney care and treatment."

The medical center's highly sophisticated kidney disease facility was dedicated by Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso on December 8, 1971. Last December 31 the program was expanded to a day and night operation. It had been running from 8 AM to 4 PM. At the time of the expansion, Letteri said, "nighttime dialysis makes it possible for persons needing regular dialysis to work a normal, daytime job and then obtain their treatment at night."

Margiotta Introduces Bill To Regulate Petroleum Industry

Believing that the public has a right to know the true dimension of the energy problems, Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta (R-Uniondale), at the request of Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz, this past week introduced legislation to regulate the petroleum industry in New York State.

The bill, which is part of Attorney General Lefkowitz's 1974 legislative program, will require all petroleum companies to report production information to the State's Public Service Commission.

The report would include such things as the quantity of production of crude oil, the amount and type of petroleum products refined, sold, imported, exported and inventories of such products on hand and the report would become public record.

The PSC would have the power to audit books, records, and inspect facilities of such corporations and the power to require testimony under oath and subpoena power over producers' books, records and other

materials.

"Attorney General Lefkowitz and I believe that since the public is being asked to make the sacrifice to conserve energy, the public has the right to know the true dimensions of this energy crisis."

"The energy crisis involving oil supplies is at a 'public be damned' stage and full and voluntary disclosure by the oil companies must be made at once," Margiotta said.

"The major oil companies should realize that the energy crisis, whether real or contrived, is having a real catastrophic effect on the nation's economy. Employment, manufacturing, commutation and tourism are all suffering great economic hardship loss."

"The public is suspicious of the credibility of the energy crisis. Only full disclosure by the petroleum industry will help remove these doubts," the Uniondale lawmaker said.

"The Attorney General and I both believe that regulation of the petroleum industry has been and

is amply justified by the undeniable fact that almost all aspects of that industry are infused with the public interest."

"The petroleum industries should be subject to rules and regulations as are public utilities in the state. The oil companies are in reality 'private utilities.' If a public utility were involved information would be quickly available through enforcement of the state law regulating these utilities. The oil companies have the same responsibility to act in the public interest and furnish full information to allow the government to act."

"At the same time, the oil industry itself supplies all the information about the industry. Reliance on institutional reports or piecemeal disclosure is highly unsatisfactory, governmental fact finding is a slow process and legal action can be protracted."

"My bill would overcome these difficulties by making this information available and this will make it easier for government to properly deal with the energy crisis," he concluded.

district. Dr. Madden moved the board pay printing costs for the remainder of the year - 3000 issues to be distributed free - at a cost not to exceed \$1000. The motion failed with trustees Bello, Bruno and Pirrung voting no and Madden, Nagle and Wolfson voting yes. Mr. Nagle pointed out that sports programs are paid for by the district - why should the paper be different? Mr. Pirrung felt a complete subsidy was the wrong way to solve the Comet's problems and therefore, reluctantly, voted no. He said he will meet with the Comet editor, the superintendent and Mr. Rusch, Hicksville High School principal,

within the next two days to try and reach a reasonable financial solution to save the newspaper.
The school board passed a policy which will pay substitutes \$50 per day after the 21st day of consecutive "subbing" for the same teacher. No fringe benefits will be paid but those substitutes who are part of the New York State Retirement System will receive retirement pay. As part of the additional pay, these long-term substitutes will be expected to assume the responsibilities of the regular teacher. This new policy passed 4-2 - voting yes: Bello, Nagle, Wolfson and Pirrung; voting no: Madden; Mr. Bruno abstained.
The next regular school board meeting will be Wednesday, February 13 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building.
