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Supreme Court Rules, Schools Must "Help With Language Problems"

Chairman Henry M. Ramirez said the Supreme Court's ruling requiring public school systems to take positive action to help children who do not speak English may "pave the way for bilingual bicultural education."

Ramirez is Chairman of the Cabinet Committee on Opportunities for Spanish Speaking People.

A former educator and long-time advocate of bilingual, bicultural education, Ramirez said he believes that the court had "established a land-mark decision, perhaps the most far-reaching legal ruling affecting the nation's foreign speaking."

The Supreme Court held unanimously Jan. 21 that schools which provide the same education to all students do not satisfy the law when some pupils

are "effectively foreclosed from any meaningful education" by a language barrier.

"These schools must now help with the language problems of students who do not speak English."

Ramirez said "I believe that now the school systems will provide bilingual, bicultural programs so that foreign students can receive the same educational opportunities afforded other Americans."

The Supreme Court based its decision on Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. The case involved poor Chinese school children in San Francisco, but Ramirez said he believed it would have a more significant impact in all schools with foreign speaking students.

Grumman Waste Treatment System

Grumman Aerospace Corporation has completed negotiations with United States Steel Corporation to provide its revolutionary Ozotherm waste water treatment system for installation on board the vessel George A. Sloan, a Great Lakes bulk carrier.

The fully automated treatment system, developed under a U.S. Coast Guard contract by Grumman Aerospace Corporation, will process all the waste water generated by approximately a 35-member crew. Ozotherm's physical chemical process separates the waste water into liquids and sludge by screening and centrifugation. The liquids are completely disinfected by ozone, which is internally generated, while the sludge is consumed in an oil fired incinerator. Moreover, the generation of ozone eliminates the need for chemical additives and their associated costs, storage, handling and safety problems.

In a year of testing, the Ozotherm system has demonstrated its ability to consistently produce an effluent that far exceeds EPA's Standard of Performance for flow through sanitation devices.

Installation of the Ozotherm system will be made this spring, followed by a comprehensive shipboard test and evaluation program conducted by U.S. Steel and Grumman personnel.

Grumman Aerospace Corporation will install a similar system on a U.S. Coast Guard cutter this spring.

Grumman Ecosystems Corporation, a subsidiary of Grumman Corporation, designs and builds sewage plants and solid waste handling facilities, distributes a broad line of pollution control equipment as well as performing environmental studies and is also responsible for world-wide marketing of the Ozotherm system.

Hofstra Student Is "Miss Long Island"

Hofstra University student Andrea Lisa, recently selected as Miss Long Island, is representing Hofstra and is a semi-finalist in the nation-wide contest for Glamour Magazine's Ten Top College Women of 1974.

The 5' 7" beauty queen and professional model has combined an outstanding educational record, expected to lead to two degrees from Hofstra in June, with broad community involvement in such varied areas as Puebla, Mexico, Springfield, Mass., and Nassau County.

She is the daughter of Hofstra Vice President and Mrs. Luis E. Bejarano of Lynbrook.

Andrea has been selected because of her outstanding achievements in her anthropological studies at the Universidad de las Americas, Puebla, Mexico, her tutorial programs for community involvement at Springfield College, Springfield, Massachusetts, and her work in public relations, modeling, and acting while attending Hofstra University, in Hempstead.

Andrea Lisa, a graduate of Malverne High School, started her college studies at Universidad de las Americas, where she was on the Dean's List and president of the American student group attending the university. She established Mesoamerican culture oriented programs, including art and excavation exhibits, on campus and tutoring programs for non-Spanish speaking students. She also planned and coordinated travel groups and student excavation groups outside of the immediate Puebla area under the direction of anthropologist Alejandro Estrada.

She continued on the Dean's List after transferring to Springfield College, where she was President of the Spanish Club and organized, developed and implemented a community Tutorial Program designed to help Spanish-speaking Americans. She also served as student representative to the Education Department Policy

Committee, which determined departmental requirements, community oriented activities, and resolved departmental conflicts.

Since transferring to Hofstra in 1972, Andrea Lisa has been involved in a Personal Development program of public relations with a major bank, the Phone-a-

thon fund-raising project for Hofstra Alumni, public relations and fund-raising for the Boy Scouts, tutoring in the Upward Bound Program, promotion for the Long Island Auto Show, and high school lecturing in Spanish and English on Mesoamerican culture.

Washington Report

While news of the lifting of the Arab oil embargo dominated the Nation's headlines late last week, another piece of information circulated which lent bright hope to our eventual escape from the whims of Arab sheiks of their now-precious oil.

The Washington Post revealed last Friday that the Administration is seriously considering a crash, all-out effort to develop a synthetic fuels industry in this country, perhaps to the tune of about \$100 billion over the next ten years.

Just as rayon, dacron and nylon have nudged king cotton from its traditional pedestal over the past 15 years there have also been found ways to produce oil and gas more quickly than mother nature's million year aging process.

Several years ago, the U.S. Bureau of Mines discovered that it was entirely practical to "distill" low-sulphur oil from ordinary garbage and urban wastes. The technical report that was issued with the discovery predicted that over half the nation's demand for oil (based on

1970 figures) could be met by this conversion process, and in the bargain, we might also take care of our garbage disposal and landfill problem. I personally thought the conclusions were quite dramatic and tried to call them to Congressional attention. Nevertheless, as happens to many studies in Washington, they were relegated to obscurity.

The OIL DAILY, daily newspaper of the petroleum industry, snidely referred to me as "anti-petroleum" because I hailed the potential of the new process, and included another dig at my "patriotism" by saying in the story's headline - "Watch Out Mr. Oilman - You May Become a Garbage Man".

The sum and substance of last week's revelation is that the government, after two years of benign neglect of the garbage-to-oil project, is now thinking about devoting millions of dollars to it and several other well-developed methods of producing "synthetic" energy.

It's unfortunate that the process got "junk-heaped" two years ago when its refinement and perfection could have been

well on the way. Nevertheless, it sometimes takes a slap in the face to wake the U.S. up, and if it were nothing else, the Arab oil embargo was the slap we needed to force us to seek better ways of producing energy.

I hope that now we can begin moving toward a more farsighted energy policy which recognizes the potential of our vast, inexhaustible resources. The garbage-to-oil process is but a beginning that should eventually push the U.S. into heavy use of atomic, solar, tidal, geothermal and other sophisticated but

boundless forms of energy that have heretofore taken a back seat because of our preoccupation with oil.

Developers interested in submitting proposals for uses of some 90 acres of Mitchel Field land will have until June 30 to contact Nassau County officials.

Three parcels of land within the Mitchel Field package - designed for commercial use - are available on a rental basis, according to an announcement by County Executive Ralph G. Caso.

The parcels involved are seven acres on the southwest corner of Stewart and Merrick Avenues; some 35 acres on the south side of Hempstead Turnpike from a point opposite the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum to the Meadowbrook Parkway, and 45 acres - the so-called Santini

section - in the vicinity of Merrick Avenue and Front Street, stretching north to near Hempstead Turnpike.

"I've stated this is the 'year of Mitchel Field,'" Caso said. "We'd like to get these commercial projects going, so we've established a deadline for developers to submit proposals. These parcels are owned by the county and will be retained. We seek to rent the land to a developer, thereby gaining rental fees as well as tax revenue."

"We want to get this valuable property on the tax rolls as rentables. They are available, under restricted conditions, for commercial, retail or research

uses." Nassau Commerce and Industry Commissioner James R. Wells has been actively seeking proposals for development of these parcels. He has sent some 40 Mitchel Field kits to development firms on Long Island, in the Metropolitan Area and in other states.

The county last month signed a lease with a development company for use of some 50 acres on the western portion of the Mitchel Field site as an industrial park.

Herald Report

Hicksville School District

Last week the Hicksville School board again tabled items requesting approval for summer school as a contingent budget item. Since the board has not completed its work on the 1974-75 budget, the trustees are reluctant to make contingency commitments.

The board accepted the resignation of the Drug Abuse Education Coordinator. This program is only funded through the end of March. The board also approved other agenda items: bills for routine operating expenses of the district, personnel changes and a request by the St. Ignace Girls Cadet Corps for the use of the High School football field for its drill competition this summer.

Most of the meeting was devoted to a report of the Educational Goals Committee by Iris Wolfson. Mrs. Wolfson explained that the 30-member committee has spent a great deal of time and study in preparing a list of goals and a statement of commitment to those goals. The committee has several sub-committees which are delving into various reports (Booz-Allen-Hamilton, CRS, Hofstra Study, etc.) and another preparing student and community surveys. The school board approved the goals and statement of commitment submitted by the committee and the entire document is printed, in its entirety.

THE GOALS OF EDUCATION

The following statement of policy sets forth the goals of education for the Hicksville Public Schools. The purpose of these goals and objectives is to guide the school system in developing, implementing and improving educational programs for all its students.

The school system has the responsibility for some of these goals, and shares the responsibility for others with the home and community institutions.

The extent to which these goals can be realized must depend upon continuing commitment of the entire school system, including the Board of Education, administration, staff, students, parents, and the community. The endorsement and support of all the above will enable the Hicksville Schools to serve the students and community in the most effective way possible.

Education includes all the experiences of an individual throughout a lifetime of both formal and informal learning. The school should provide encouragement and opportunities for all students to acquire knowledge, ask questions, explore ideas and seek answers. In this manner the school is helping the student recognize his or her values and understand the values of others.

The ability to succeed motivates a student to learn. Each student is unique, and the school must maintain an atmosphere in which each student will have opportunities for self-fulfillment.

The school program must develop the skills of learning, and in so doing should be based on the study of broad human concerns, and should be flexible enough to deal with change related to the needs and interests of each student. The school program should offer opportunities for decision making, help the student develop the ability to learn throughout his or her lifetime, respond to and understand other human beings, and accept the full responsibility for the results of his or her actions.

ACADEMIC SKILLS

The fundamental responsibility of the school is to develop programs that enable each child to acquire those skills basic to all learning. Achievement of all other goals will depend on the success of the school system in ensuring that the student attain the following basic skills according to his or her own ability.

Reading: Ability to read and understand written matter, and the ability to relate it to other knowledge.

Composition: Ability to express in writing one's thoughts accurately.

Listening: Ability to listen carefully and to understand what is being said.

Speaking: Ability to speak effectively with confidence.

Mathematics: Ability to compute and solve problems of logic and Mathematics, and understand the structure of the subject so that it can be used academically as well as a tool in daily living.

Study: Development of the necessary basic study skills in order to

Supervisor JOHN W. BURKE... REPORTS

The Nassau County Board of Supervisors recently adopted a resolution calling on the House Judiciary Committee to speed up its deliberations concerning impeachment of the President. A number of people have questioned the propriety of this resolution.

"I feel that this was not a valid matter for consideration by the Board of Supervisors, but voted in support of this resolution for several reasons."

For one thing, the language of this resolution expressed concern that undue delay in reaching a decision on the question of impeachment is contributing to uncertainty in government at all levels. The cloud of suspicion hanging over Washington tends to restrict and handicap both the President and Congress, as well as having an impact at local levels of government.

This uncertainty and its negative impact on government will not be removed until the charges against the President and his administration are resolved.

It is imperative that a decision on impeachment be reached as quickly as possible, since unreasonable delay could cripple the nation at a time when firm decisions must be made regarding energy shortages, environmental problems, our economy and international matters.

My feelings on this matter are as strong or perhaps stronger than most, in light of the accusation made against me. I, too, am very anxious to have my day in court and the opportunity to clear my record as soon as possible.

However, I have been told this may not be possible for some

months due to a crowded court calendar. Although disappointed, I am not going to allow this delay in the judicial process to interfere with my responsibilities to my constituents who have indicated their confidence in me. I am going to continue to do my job as Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay to the best of my ability.

RONCALLEO REPORTS

Any of us who are lucky enough to have our parents or grandparents still living realize what a tremendous source of wisdom and advice they are. Senior citizens to my way of thinking are really one of America's greatly underemployed resources.

There are several measures currently being considered in Congress which would make life easier, happier and more productive for them.

I have listed below several of them and I would appreciate your taking a look at them and letting me know your feelings on them. I certainly benefit from your views and will take them into consideration when voting on the issues.

In the area of tax exemptions and deductions:

- a bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 to permit an exemption of the first \$5,000 of retirement income received by a taxpayer under a public

retirement system or any other system if the taxpayer is 65.

- a bill to permit the full deduction of medical expenses incurred for the care of individuals 65 or over without regard to the 3 per cent and 1 per cent floor.

- a bill to relieve a substantial number of elderly individuals of the necessity of filing a declaration of estimated tax with respect to income from pensions or retirement annuities, or from interest and dividends when it is not in excess of \$2,000.

- a bill to encourage state and local governments to provide relief for the elderly from real property taxes.

In the costly area of hospital care:

- One bill would authorize an experimental program to allow care of elderly individuals in their own homes.

Concerning various problems relating to mass transit:

- a bill providing special half-fares for elderly at nonpeak hours on all interstate common carriers.

- a bill amending the Urban Mass Transit Act to require mass transportation systems to meet the needs of the elderly.

- a bill providing tax incentives for the modification of certain facilities removing architectural and transportation barriers to the handicapped and elderly.

Finally in the area of social security:

- a bill to amend the Social Security Act to provide for the payment of special allowances to help elderly low-income persons and families meet their housing costs.

I am providing a complete list of senior citizens legislation to various groups in my District and I look forward to hearing from them in the near future.

Dear Editor:

In as much as I am running for the Trusteeship of the Hicksville Public Library, I would like to take this opportunity to acquaint your readers of my activities over the past year as they relate to the Library itself.

Because of the failure of the 1972 budget, it was deemed necessary that a part-time librarian be removed from the Children's Room and, as a result, there was a limited registration for the Children's Pre-School Story Hour. I went before the Board of Trustees as a committee of one protesting this move on behalf of all the children of Hicksville who were entitled to this service. I presented at that time several suggestions to the Board as to ways this could be resumed but, unfortunately, they did not choose to act upon it. Rather, they waited until the budget of 1973 appeared and at the passage of same, reinstated a part-time children's librarian. I am proud to say that over 150 children are registered in the program at this time!

After introducing myself into the workings of the Library in this manner, I became a reorganizing member of the Friends of the Hicksville Public Library and was elected to serve as Treasurer of this group. I worked actively for the passage of the 1973 budget in many ways, including letters to the Editor of our local publications giving the voting public reasons for returning a positive vote. I worked on and at the Book Sale held in August. The proceeds of this sale enabled the Friends to present the Library with an 8MM film projector. I served as Hostess at the tea at the Annual Holiday Program in December. I also presented the Friends with the suggestion that funds be raised for a special lift enabling the handicapped to attend functions on the lower level, as well as

the handicapped children to use their Library facilities. To this end, I assisted at the Flea Market held in March and will also continue to work towards this goal. If I am elected a Trustee, I hope to continue my activities as a Friend in a liaison capacity.

I will strive to see that the Library is run as economically and efficiently as possible, just as we taxpayers and homeowners must do to meet the spiraling costs in maintaining our homes and the needs of our families. I will also strive to see that the Library contains books and periodicals presenting all views so that people might "read and judge for themselves" on the many issues we are faced with today.

Please vote Yes for the Budget and for me, Clara T. Bennett, to serve as your Library Trustee on March 26.

Dear Editor:

I hereby announce my candidacy for Library Board Trustee.

My two opponents have taken similar positions, in that they both advocate a "Yes" vote on the Library Budget Tax Increase. Also, the incumbent running for re-election is directly responsible for the separation of the "Library" vote from the "School" vote, while the other candidate has remained silent on this issue.

I, therefore, present you with the only choice. I am advocating a "No" vote on the Library Budget, because of the proposed overall 17 percent tax increase (which includes an 11 percent salary increase). I am also apposed to isolating the "Library" vote from the "School" vote for the following reasons:

1. A separate vote is an added, and unnecessary, \$4000.00 burden on the taxpayer.
2. The first (1973) separate

"Library" vote produced a total turn-out of only 1392 voters. This is approximately 22 percent of the average total voter turn-out in the previous four years when we had joint "School & Library" voting. And, again, the Library Board has scheduled another (March 26, 1974) separate "Library" vote!

Briefly my background is: I have been a Hicksville resident / taxpayer for 21 years. Four of my children have graduated from the Hicksville schools, while one is currently attending.

I urge all voters, even though inconvenienced, to vote on March 26, at your local schools.

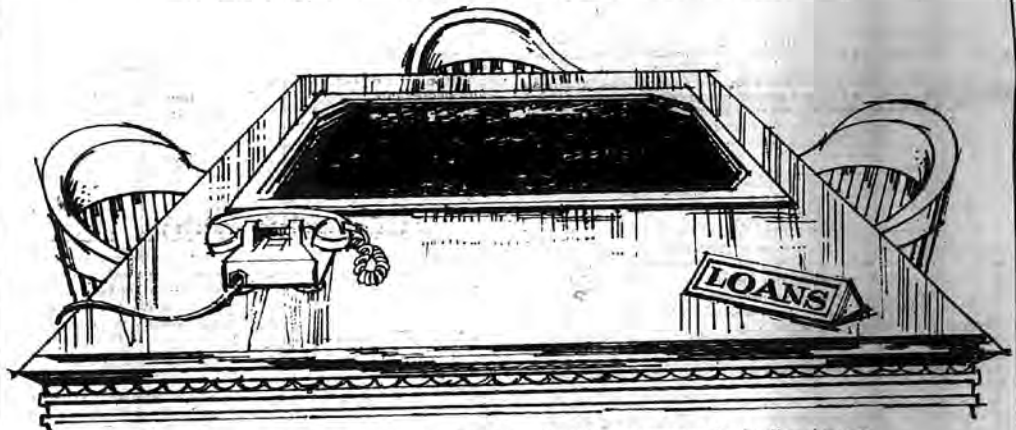

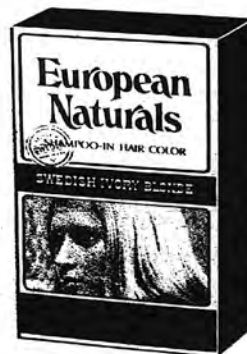

Congress of Teachers Meet March 21 - 24

President Murray Goldstein of the Hicksville Congress of Teachers is leading a contingent of 5 delegates to the second annual Representative Assembly of the New York State United Teachers in Montreal, Canada. The meeting begins March 21st and will run through March 24th. Other delegates include: Ignatius Rienzo, Michael Sena, Marjorie Giannelli, Elayne Kabakoff.

New York's Governor, Malcolm Wilson, will head a list of dignitaries and special guests attending this year's meeting. Wilson will address the delegates March 22nd.

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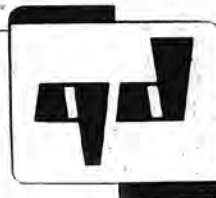

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Hicksville Woman A Highlight At Big Ceramic Show

Mrs. Ming Chen, who began dabbling in ceramics as a hobby several years ago will provide

one of the featured exhibits at the second annual National Ceramics Show at Long Island which opens this Thursday, March 21 for a four day run through Sunday, March 24 at the Nassau Coliseum, Uniondale.

Mrs. Chen, who lives at 139 West Cherry St., was born in China where the ancient art of ceramics began some 2,000 years ago. She came to the United States in 1946.

- o Replace air filter if necessary. Clean breather pipes.
- o Tune engine. Check ignition system, voltage regulator output, spark plugs, carburetor and fuel

pump, cell condition and fluid level of battery.

o Drain and flush car radiator, if necessary.

o Drain engine oil, replace filter if necessary and refill with recommended summer grade oil.

o Check tension and condition of all belts.

o Examine front end: steering mechanism, shock absorbers, springs and transmission.

o Rotate wheels and spare tire to prolong tire life.

o See that front wheels are properly balanced and aligned.

o Inspect windshield wiper blades; replace if necessary.

o Lubricate chassis completely, oiling or greasing door locks, latches and other points not usually covered.

o Adjust aiming of headlights and see that tail, brake and direction indicator lights are all in working order.

o Inspect exhaust system for leaks. Check crankcase ventilator and exhaust control systems for proper operation.

To attract and retain the most qualified, well trained, effective and motivated staff through meaningful supervision, good recruitment programs, opportunities for professional growth and the creation and maintenance of an academic atmosphere which will promote the highest professional standards.

To develop and implement a comprehensive program of instruction to achieve the goals of education, and to provide the materials to carry out the program.

To evaluate on a continuous basis the effectiveness of administrative, supervisory and instructional personnel.

To evaluate on a continuous basis the effectiveness of all phases of the educational program.

To adopt different approaches when it is determined that they will contribute effectively to the attainment of the educational goals.

To encourage dialogue with the entire community, making an effort to communicate needs and achievements, and being responsive to the aspirations and needs of the community.
