Athletic Recreational Program

Help-Aid-Direction (H.A.D.), Hicksville's own youth and family counseling, drug abuse prevention center has just recently started its outdoor youth-centered athletic-recreational program for its fourth consecutive year.

H.A.D.'s co-ed softball team played the first game of its 1974 season on Saturday, May 4, 1974 against P.R.I.C.E., a Farmingdale youth counseling center. The game was won by H.A.D. The final score, 18-16, gave the appearance of an over active football game rather than softball game. Plans are being made the play against many Nassau County funded community groups every Saturday afternoon throughout the summer.

In addition to softball, the H.A.D. organization is presently organizing a competitive, traveling, co-ed volleyball team. At its 389 New South Road facility, H.A.D. is fortunate

enough to have an outdoor volleyball court with floodlights. On any decent night, many young people can be seen actively involved at H.A.D. in enjoyable volleyball games. Others participate throughout the day in ping-pong games held in the basement of H.A.D.

Throughout the summer months, the H.A.D. agency will provide frequent beach trips for its youthful participants. Hopefully, H.A.D. will repeat last year's very successful canoe trip down the Delaware River rapids and overnight bike hike out to Eastern Long Island.

Help-Aid-Direction is presently working with approximately 150 to 200 different youths, parents, adults each month. The H.A.D. program provides individual, group, and family counseling and extensive referral services along with recreational and socialization activities.

H.A.D. needs the assistance of the residents and businessmen of

the Hicksville area so that it may continue all of these crucial services. In addition to financial support, H.A.D. desperately needs all forms of athletic equipment such as bats, balls, bases, gloves, etc. Also, deeply appreciated by the H.A.D. agency at this time would be donations of a working lawn mower, yard equipment, redwood tables, and benches, outdoor grill, and tool shed to aid in the proper maintenance of its outside property.

Set Hearing On Carnivals

A June 11th public hearing was set by the Town Board last week on a revised proposal to regulate carnivals conducted within the unincorporated areas of the Town.

"This proposal, which is a complete revision of a proposed ordinance considered at hearing last September, would completely eliminate rides from any carnival or bazaar-type event regardless of the organization sponsoring it," according to Supervisor John W. Burke.

The previous proposal to regulate the conducting of such special events contained complex land requirements concerning any such event in which rides were involved. "In revising that proposal, the Town Board felt it should simply not allow rides out of concern for safety and because vacant property should not be allowed to be transformed overnight into an amusement park even if only on a temporary basis," Burke explained. Currently the Town requires special exemptions from the Town Board for operating of permanent rides on land within the Town.

In addition, the proposed ordinance requires all groups except charitable organizations to obtain a Town permit in order

to operate carnivals, bazaars or similar special events. Charitable organizations, which operate their own special event for fund-raising purposes on property which they own or lease, will only be required to inform the Town of the time and place of the event 30 days prior to it being held.

Other organizations will be required to obtain permits from the Town Clerk at least 30 days prior to conducting the event. To obtain the permit, the applicant must specify the location, time and place of the event and the identification of sponsors or operators; and must provide permission from the owner of the property, a certificate of insurance, permission from the County Health Department, building permits for use of tents, a \$1,000 bond to guarantee cleanup and a statement by the sponsor that the property to be used is not already designated as a private or public parking area.

All such events, regardless of sponsors, shall close at 11 PM and no equipment shall be installed or dismantled prior to 7 AM or after midnight.

The June 11th hearing will begin at 10 AM at Town Hall, Oyster Bay, N.Y.

Thousands Of H.S. Seniors To Meet Employers In Two-Day Event

More than 3000 Nassau County high school seniors will have a chance to explore career opportunities on Long Island during Youth Opportunity Days at Citiatigue Park on May 14 and 15.

The students, who will come from every high school district in Nassau County, will be bused to the park during school hours to meet with representatives of approximately 75 business and industrial firms, government agencies, the armed services, and the Nassau County Department of Commerce and Industry.

During face-to-face interviews, the youngsters and business representatives will discuss career opportunities and necessary qualifications for employment. The students will submit resumes to the companies represented, and some may be

called for future employment needs. The primary purpose of Youth Opportunity Days, however, is for exploration.

The event, now in its fifth year, is conducted for high school students who plan full-time careers after graduation. It is sponsored by the Nassau Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) and the Long Island Personnel and Guidance Association.

Youth Opportunity Days will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on May 14 and 15 at the skating rink in Citiatigue Park, Hicksville.

New Tennis Courts Approved by Board

At its regular meeting on Tuesday, the Oyster Bay Town Board approved unanimously by six ayes, Councilman Saladino being absent, the petition of R.A.K. Tennis Corp. for a special permit use to construct and maintain indoor tennis courts on Jericho Turnpike in Syosset, including office space and facilities incidental to a tennis club.

A public hearing was held on the petition on February 26th. The granting of the petition is based on the Board's personal assessments of its effect on the area and also a determination by the Nassau County Planning Commission that no adverse effects would result from the tennis club.

The resolution granting the petition contains 13 restrictions

on the planned tennis club. These are:

1. The building must conform to site plan and ground and floor layout submitted.
2. A fire hydrant shall be installed and maintained within the 50 foot right of way area near the south end, and the 23-foot driveway at the south end of the one-story metal building be reduced to 20 feet at applicant's option.
3. That all driveways and parking areas be paved and the building and surroundings be kept in good repair with adequate storm water drainage and a neat appearance.
4. That all variances required be obtained before issuance of building permit.
5. That the subject premises be used for tennis only.
6. That no public tournaments

AT SUPERVISORS' MEETING:

County Faces Suit In Abortion Case

A bizarre and unreal tale unfolded at the Nassau County Board of Supervisors meeting on Monday. It involved the case of a 21 year Old Nassau County woman who had an abortion at the Nassau County Medical Center on April 24th. On May 3rd or 4th, she was telephoned by the hospital and told that she must bury her "baby."

As if that weren't enough, the hospital referred her to a funeral home in Westbury, where the funeral director insisted on knowing by whom she became pregnant, and said he would bury her "little girl" on Tuesday.

The grisly chronology of events was presented to the Board of Supervisors by Bill Baird, of the Parents' Aid Society, who said the county would be facing a lawsuit instituted by the American Civil Liberties Union for its efforts in behalf of the fetus.

The woman, an epileptic who lives with her parents, was present, her face masked with black chiffon scarf to hide her identity.

According to Baird's calendar of events, Miss X telephoned the hospital on April 1st. She spoke to a Dr. Fox, who said he could not see her until April 10th. On April 21st, three weeks after her initial telephone call, she was admitted to the hospital, and on April 24th she aborted at 10:00 P.M., following an injecting of what Baird termed an experimental drug called prostaglandin at 9 A.M. that morning. She was 20 weeks pregnant at the time of abortion, Baird said. He later said her delay in arranging the abortion was due to a condition called "pseudomenses" which made her unaware of her pregnancy.

Later last week, according to Baird, Miss X was telephoned at home by a Ms. Sakaras, of the medical center, who said to her: "You must bury your baby." Ms. Sakaras referred Miss X to the William M. Donohue funeral home in Westbury, who she said, handles such cases. Before going to the funeral director, Miss X contacted Baird. Along with his assistant, Susan Vogel, Baird drove Miss X to Donohue's.

Miss Vogel, who was with Miss X during the funeral director's interview, said the undertaker insisted on filling out a death certificate requiring certain information, including the "name of the man who made you pregnant." He then said, according to Ms. Vogel, "Don't worry, we'll bury your little girl on Tuesday."

Miss X had an abortion at the medical center on April 24th and was called about two weeks later to dispose of the fetus. Speaking in her behalf, above, is Bill Baird, of the Parents' Aid Society, Hempstead.

Baird distributed to the press a copy of a receipt in the amount of \$20. (the actual sum paid was \$15, Baird said) signed by William M. Donohue. The receipt read: "Received from — the sum of \$20. for burial of baby in Plainlawn Cem. Hicksville." The fee was evidently all inclusive, including pick-up of the fetus, ground opening and burial container.

"Psychological Warfare"
Baird called the present case just another in the "psychological warfare" waged by the Nassau County Medical Center against women having abortions. He cited previous cases where the medical center refused to abort a 12-year-old girl who had been raped by her father and another where a woman was injected with abortive saline solution and then sent home, where she aborted. The medical center is presently suing that woman for non-payment of the bill for her abortion, Baird said.

Baird said abortion patients are being psychologically traumatized by being placed in maternity wards at the medical center. He said although he had been assured last December that abortion and maternity patients were being kept separate, next door to Miss X in the old building at Meadowbrook Hospital was a room full of new mothers, and across the hall was the glass-windowed nursery.

Having spent the weekend seeking what justification the medical center might have had in forcing the woman to bury her fetus, Baird was finally read part of the New York State Hospital Code which says: "A dead body, including a stillborn or a fetus discerned by the attending

physician to exceed 500 grams should be delivered only to a licensed funeral director or his agent."

500 grams translates to about one pound in American weight measure. "Supposing I had to have my arm amputated, would I be asked to bury it?" Baird asked. He went on to compare a fetus to an arm, leg or a tumor as an "extension of a woman's body," which should be disposed of by the hospital.

"And what were they doing with this fetus for over two weeks?" Baird asked.

Lawsuit to Follow
There was no comment from the Supervisors in relation to the case in view of a pending lawsuit in relation to it announced by Baird, who said it would be tried by Jerome Seidel of the American Civil Liberties Union. Hannah Komanoff, Long Beach Supervisor, did remark, however, that the Medical Board should have some policies in relation to abortion cases which should be adhered to.

\$6 Million Stable
A highlight of other business of the supervisors for the morning was the appointment of Arnold S. Rinaldi, of Hempstead, for the tendering of architectural and engineering services in connection with the construction of an equestrian center and other related facilities at Muttontown Park and Preserve. According to a bulletin from the department of Public Works, Rinaldi's fee amounts to 7 1/2 per cent of direct construction costs, presently estimated at \$5,800,000.

Rinaldi could not be reached for a description of the planned equestrian center.

Police Drive Against Bicycle Thievery

The Nassau County Police Department has started a concerted drive to combat bicycle thievery in its police district.

Commissioner Louis J. Frank announced today that 16 police officers under the supervision of the Youth Services Unit have been assigned the two-fold task of trying to minimize the number of thefts and apprehending the thieves.

The program has been labelled "Operation Prevent" and will feature education and enforcement in the attempt to reduce the number of bicycle thefts. During 1973, more than 8,500 bicycles valued at nearly half-a-million dollars were reported stolen in the district.

In announcing the drive,

Commissioner Frank said, "A bicycle may not seem like much to business and career-minded adults, but to a youngster it is probably his most valued possession."

To help publicize the program, 11"x17" posters noting the amount of bicycle thefts and the security measures to prevent them; will be distributed to schools; youth centers and other locations by the officers assigned to the detail.

The officers will also saturate trouble-prone theft-areas and will operate as a flying squad to enforce the program's aims.

Commissioner Frank pointed out that for the program to be effective community cooperation and assistance will be necessary.

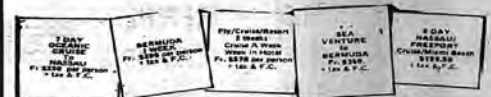

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, that Article IV of Chapter 6, "Unsafe Buildings", of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as amended, be and the same hereby is amended as follows:

REPEAL Article IV, "Unsafe Buildings" of Chapter 6 thereof, providing for reconstruction of damaged buildings, emergency repairs by the Town, vacation of buildings and action for recovery of costs incurred by the Town.

ADD the following new Article IV "Dangerous Buildings".

Sec. 6-70 Dangerous Buildings Defined "dangerous buildings" shall mean any building or structure which has any or all of the following conditions:

a. Those where any interior wall or walls, or other structural load bearing members, list, lean or buckle to such an extent that a plumb line, passing from any overhead supporting member through the center of gravity, falls outside the middle third of its base.

b. Those which, exclusive of the foundations, show thirty-three and one third per cent (33-1/3%) or more of deterioration of the supporting member or members, or fifty per cent (50%) or more damage to or deterioration of the non-supporting, enclosing or exterior walls or covering.

c. Those which have improperly distributed loads upon the floors or roofs, or in which the floors or roofs are overloaded or which have insufficient strength to be reasonably safe for the purpose used and which do not meet minimum standards prescribed by the New York State building construction code.

d. Those having inadequate or insufficient facilities for ingress and egress in the event of fire, panic or other emergency or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, aisles, passageways, corridors, or other means of access and which do not meet minimum standards prescribed by the New York State building construction code.

e. Those having inadequate or insufficient facilities for ingress and egress in the event of fire, panic or other emergency or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, aisles, passageways, corridors, or other means of access and which do not meet minimum standards prescribed by the New York State building construction code.

f. Those having inadequate or insufficient facilities for ingress and egress in the event of fire, panic or other emergency or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, aisles, passageways, corridors, or other means of access and which do not meet minimum standards prescribed by the New York State building construction code.

collapse or cause damage and injury to the occupants thereof or other persons or property.

f. Those which, in whole or in part, used for residential, mercantile, industrial, storage, assembly, institutional, or any other purpose, for want of repair, lack of sufficient fire escapes, or exits, or by reason of age, fire or dilapidated condition, or from any other cause may now be, or shall at any time hereafter become, unsafe or dangerous structurally, or a fire hazard or a nuisance to the general public.

g. A vacant building, unguarded or open at door or window.

h. Those which have been damaged by fire, wind, act of vandalism, or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals, or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the Town of Oyster Bay.

i. Those which have become or are so dilapidated, decayed, unsafe, unsanitary or which so utterly fail to provide the amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit for human habitation, as are likely to cause sickness or disease, so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of those living therein.

j. Those having light, air and sanitation facilities which are inadequate to protect the health, morals, safety or general welfare of human beings who live or may live therein.

k. Those buildings or structures in which there exist violations of any provision of any Code or Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals, or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the Town of Oyster Bay.

l. Those which, in whole or part, have an existing electrical wiring system which is defective or which fails to meet ventilation requirements as prescribed by applicable provisions of law, or which have plumbing, sewage, or drainage facilities that are not in conformity with applicable building and plumbing codes or which is overcrowded.

Sec. 6-71 Nuisances - All dangerous buildings within the terms of

Sec. 6-70 of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be public nuisances and shall be vacated and/or repaired, secured, demolished and removed as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 6-72 Other Definitions

a. Owner - shall include the owner of record of any premises, a mortgagee, a tax lien purchaser, a lienor, and any other person having a vested or contingent interest in said premises and anyone exercising rights of ownership therein as indicated by the records of the County Clerk of Nassau County or by the records of the Receiver of Taxes.

b. Posting - shall mean the fastening, nailing, tacking, or substantially securing by any other means, of any notice, survey, order, directive or official decision, on a building or structure.

c. Repair - shall be construed to include any alteration, structural change or the performance of any necessary or requisite for the elimination of any hazardous, dangerous, or unsafe condition of any dangerous building or structure, within the purview of this chapter.

d. Survey - shall mean a written determination in a report, after an on-site inspection, by a designated inspector of the Town of Oyster Bay, in conjunction with a registered architect appointed by the Town Board, and a practical builder, engineer or architect appointed by the owner of the subject premises, or any other person, receiving a notice under the provisions of this article, to be made after refusal or neglect of said person who has been served with a notice to make safe repair, or demolish and remove the dangerous building or structure.

e. Town - shall mean the Town of Oyster Bay.

f. Superintendent - shall mean the Supt. of Building Division.

g. The words "or" and "and" as used herein may be construed interchangeably where such meaning is necessary to effectuate the purpose of this chapter. Where necessary the singular shall include the plural and the plural include the singular. The word "person" shall include a partnership, corporation, association or trustee. The words "persons interested" as used herein shall be construed to include the owner as herein defined and all other persons interested in the property to which such words refer.

Sec. 6-73 Jurisdiction

Under this chapter, the Superintendent shall have jurisdiction for the purpose of demolishing, taking down or removing any hazardous, dangerous or unsafe building or structure or, for taking remedial action toward making any of said buildings or structures safe and secure or for compelling such buildings or structures to be vacated by its occupants.

Sec. 6-74 Investigation and Report

Upon receipt of information that a building or structure may be dangerous, the Superintendent shall cause an investigation of the premises to be made and an inspection report submitted and filed in his office.

b. After the report is filed in his office, and if the report shall confirm the existence of a dangerous building or structure, as defined in Section 6-70 of this Article, the Superintendent shall cause a notice to be served upon the owner or his executors, legal representatives, agents, lessee or any other person having a vested or contingent interest in same, either personally or by registered mail, addressed to the last known address, if any, of the owners or his executors, legal representatives, agents, lessees or other person having a vested or contingent interest in same, as shown by the records of the Receiver of Taxes and/or the Office of the County Clerk.

Sec. 6-75 Notice

The notice shall contain a description of the premises, a statement of the particulars in which the building or structure is unsafe or dangerous, the manner in which the building or structure is to be made safe, and an order requiring same to be vacated and/or made safe and secure or demolished and removed; and if service of this notice is effected by registered mail, a copy of said notice shall be posted on the premises.

Within seven (7) days of the

In the event that the whereabouts of the owner of the premises, or his executor, legal representatives, agents, lessees or any other persons having a vested or contingent interest in same, are unknown and cannot be ascertained after the exercise of reasonable diligence by the Superintendent or his authorized representative and an affidavit to that effect is on file in the Building Division then service of the notice as provided for in Secs 6-74 and 6-75 of this Article shall be made by publishing said notice once a week for two (2) successive weeks in the official newspaper of the Town with proof of publication to be filed in the office of the Building Division.

Sec. 6-78 Compliance with Notice and Order

If the person served with the notice shall immediately certify his assent to the securing or demolition and removal of the dangerous building or structure in question, he shall be permitted seventy-two hours (72) within which to commence the abatement of the dangerous conditions affecting the building or structure and shall employ sufficient labor and assistance to secure or demolish, repair and remove such building or structure within a reasonable period of time thereafter.

Sec. 6-79 Hearing

a. Any person affected by the notice described in sections 6-74 and 6-75 of this Article may request and shall be granted a hearing on the matter before the Superintendent or a building inspector designated by him, provided, that such person shall file a verified petition with the office of the Town Clerk, and the Superintendent, or his designee, within seven (7) days after a notice was served upon the petitioner who requests a hearing, and setting forth a brief statement on the grounds therefor. Upon receipt of said petition, the Superintendent or his designee, shall set a time for the hearing and shall give the petitioner seven (7) days written notice thereof. At the hearing, the petitioner shall be given an opportunity to be heard and to give reasons why the proceeding for the vacating and/or securing or removal of the dangerous building or structure shall be modified or withdrawn; the presence of the Superintendent shall be required at said hearing. The hearing shall be commenced not later than fourteen (14) days after the day on which the petition was filed; provided, that upon application of any interested party, the Town Board may postpone the date of the hearing for any reasonable time beyond the fourteen (14) day period if, in their judgement, the interested party has submitted a good and sufficient reason for the postponement, but in no event, shall the hearing be

postponed longer than thirty (30) days. In any case, if no such written petition shall be so filed within the seven (7) day period as aforesaid, or if the petition shall be rejected after the hearing, the Town Attorney is authorized to make application to the Supreme Court, at special term, as hereinafter provided.

b. If a hearing shall be requested and held pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 6-79 of this Article, the Superintendent shall make written findings of fact as to whether or not the building in question is a "dangerous building" within the definitions of Sec. 6-70 hereof, and serve a copy of said findings of fact upon the petitioner, any occupant of the dangerous building or structure or any person who shall have requested same at the hearing. If such findings of fact determine that the building or structure is "dangerous" the person served with the findings of fact may immediately certify his assent to the vacating and/or repairing, securing or demolition and removal of the dangerous building or structure in question, and he shall be permitted seventy-two hours (72) within which to vacate and/or to commence abatement of the dangerous conditions affecting the building or structure and shall employ sufficient labor and assistance to repair, secure or demolish and remove such building or structure within a reasonable period of time thereafter. Service of said findings of fact shall be either in person or by registered mail.

Sec. 6-80 Refusal, Neglect or Failure of Person Served to Comply with Notice and Order. Notice of Survey

a. Upon refusal, neglect or failure of the person or persons served with a notice and/or order, or findings of fact, pursuant to Sec. 6-79 to comply with the requirements therein, within the periods of time as contained in Secs. 6-78 or 6-79 herein, or upon his or their rejection of same, a notice of survey shall be served upon him by the Superintendent either in person or by registered mail, giving notice that a survey of the premises described in the notice will be made at a time and place therein specified.

b. The notice of survey shall state the date, time and place where the survey will be made, and that in the event the report of such survey indicates that such building or structure is dangerous, an application will be made at a Special Term of the Supreme Court, Nassau County, for an order determining the building or structure to be a public nuisance and directing that it shall be vacated and/or repaired, and secured, or demolished, taken down and removed.

Sec. 6-81 Survey, How Made; Posting of Survey

a. The survey shall be made by three (3) competent persons of whom one (1) shall be the Superintendent of Building Division or his Deputy, another shall be a registered architect appointed by the Town Board, and the third shall be a practical builder, registered architect, or licensed professional engineer appointed by the person served with the notice.

b. Within a reasonable time after the survey is completed, the determination thereof shall be made by such

persons in writing and filed in the office of the Building Division and a copy thereof shall be posted on the subject building or structure.

c. In the event the person or persons served with the notice of survey, as described in Sec. 6-80 hereof, shall fail, neglect or refuse to appoint a competent person to assist in the survey, the other two (2) persons designated pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 6-81 shall make the survey. In any event, agreement as to the results of the survey between any two (2) of the parties conducting the survey shall constitute the final survey required for further action under this ordinance.

Sec. 6-82 Compensation and Reimbursement for Survey Costs and Expenses

The architect appointed by the Town Board as hereinbefore provided who may act on any survey required by this chapter shall be entitled to a fee to be determined and fixed by the Town Board which is to be paid upon the voucher of the Superintendent. The Town may be reimbursed for the cost of the survey by assessment levied against the parcels of land upon which the survey was performed in the manner provided for the assessment of the cost of public improvements in Article 15 of the Town Law.

Sec. 6-83 Standards for Repair or Demolition or Vacating of Dangerous Buildings and Structures

The following standards shall be followed in substance by the Superintendent of Building Division in ordering repair or demolition, or vacating.

a. If the "dangerous building" can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance it shall be ordered repaired.

b. In any case where a "dangerous building" is fifty percent (50%) damaged or decayed, or deteriorated from its original value or structure, or where the owner refuses or fails to make ordered repairs, it shall be demolished, and in all cases where a building cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance it shall be demolished. In all cases where a "dangerous building" is a fire hazard existing or erected in violation of the terms of this ordinance or any ordinance of the Town or statute of the State of New York, it shall be demolished.

c. If the "dangerous building" is in such condition as to make it dangerous to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of its occupants, it shall be ordered to be vacated.

Sec. 6-84 Application to the Supreme Court

a. Whenever the survey shall determine that the building or structure surveyed is dangerous, the Town Attorney shall apply to the Supreme Court, Nassau County, at Special Term for an order determining the building or structure to be a public nuisance and directing either that it shall be repaired and secured or that it shall be taken down and removed, and that the occupants be ordered to forthwith vacate the premises.

b. Said application shall be in the form of a special proceeding with notice upon the owner as prescribed by the provisions of Article IV of the C.P.L.R.

c. Whenever an application

for said order is made to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, the Town Attorney shall file a notice of pendency of a proceeding against an unsafe building or structure in the office of the County Clerk of the County of Nassau which shall set forth the following information:

- 1) The title of the proceeding including the name of the Superintendent, the Town and the owner, as defined herein, or the person or persons described in (b) of Section 6-74.
- 2) The property affected.
- 3) A description of the dangerous building or structure with particulars which set forth the manner in which the building or structure is dangerous, and the manner in which the building or structure is to be made safe and secure, or demolished and removed.

Sec. 6-85 Execution of Precept or Order

Upon receipt of the order of the Supreme Court, the Superintendent shall immediately proceed to execute the provisions therein contained and may employ and furnish whatever labor, assistance and materials which may be necessary for that purpose.

Sec. 6-86 Interference

It shall be unlawful for any person, whether interested or not in the property affected by this chapter, to interfere, obstruct or hinder the Superintendent or his representatives, or any person acting in his behalf in performing the work directed by the determination of the Supreme Court as herein provided, or ordered by the Superintendent under the terms and provisions of such determination as hereinabove described.

Sec. 6-87 Reimbursement and Assessment

The Town shall be reimbursed for the cost of the work performed or services rendered as hereinabove provided, by assessment against the collection from the lots or parcels of land where such work was performed or services rendered for so much of the actual and complete cost as incurred upon and from each lot or lots in the manner provided for the assessment of the cost of public improvements in Article 15 of the Town Law.

Sec. 6-88 Emergency Cases

Any provision of this chapter to the contrary notwithstanding, where it reasonably appears that there is imminent danger to the life or safety of any person unless a dangerous building or structure, as defined herein, is immediately repaired, vacated, or demolished, the

Superintendent shall cause the immediate repair, vacation, or demolition of such dangerous building or structure. The cost of such emergency repair, vacation, or demolition of such dangerous building or structure shall be collected in the same manner as provided in Section 6-87 hereof.

Sec. 6-89 Penalties

a. Any person or persons other than those duly authorized by the Superintendent who shall remove from a building or structure any notice prescribed by this chapter prior to compliance with the orders contained in the notice, or committing an offense against the provisions of Sec. 6-88 of this Chapter is guilty of a violation punishable by a fine not exceeding two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) or imprisonment for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) days for each offense, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

b. Any occupant or lessee of any dangerous building or structure who shall fail to comply with any notice or administrative order to vacate, shall be guilty of a violation punishable by a fine not exceeding two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) or imprisonment for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) days for each such offense, or by both such fine or imprisonment.

c. The above penalties shall be exacted in addition to and without reference to any other charges made or expenditures made pursuant to other sections of this ordinance.

World Trade Problems

The nation's imported automobile dealers are seeking the Senate Finance Committee's support of legislation aimed at expanding U.S. world trade and have asked that organized labor's proposal that restrictions be placed on imported cars be opposed.

Members of the Finance Committee were told that restricting imports, as United Auto Workers President Leonard Woodcock has proposed, would result in fewer American jobs rather than the increase projected by the UAW chief.

Citing a recent research study by Harbridge House, a Boston-based consulting firm, Dan Cass, Sales Manager of Walters - Donaldson Inc. authorized VW sales, service and parts facility here, said that imported automobile dealers in America employ 143,275 workers, with an annual payroll of \$1.44 billion. Restrictive quotas on imported cars, he quoted the study as stating, would eliminate 22,870 jobs in this business over a two-year period.

"Restricting imports would not create any additional jobs in the domestic automobile industry," the local auto executive alleged, "since consumers desiring a small import will not accept a standard-sized domestic car as a substitute. U.S. factories cannot meet the demands for small domestic cars even today."

Even if one assumed that every imported car barred from the country resulted in the sale of an additional domestic car, he continued, there would still not be enough additional employment to offset the losses in jobs among imported car dealers.

Robert M. McElwaine, executive vice president of the American Imported Automobile Dealers Association, has repeatedly pointed out that the UAW quota proposal, if it succeeded in its aim of supplanting 300,000 imported cars with an equal number of domestically-produced automobiles, would add \$62 million annually to the nation's fuel bill and further deplete scarce fuel resources.

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Hicksville Youth Receives Life Savings Award

Michael Petrie, a 12 year old Hicksville Junior High School student, was honored Wednesday, May 1, 1974, by Liberty Mutual Insurance Companies for saving the life of 82 year old Mr. Grove Griffith of 13 Terrace Place, Hicksville, New York.

On February 15, 1974, Michael was responsible for saving Mr. Griffith when he fell into a 12-foot deep cesspool in his backyard. Mr. Griffith was crossing the yard when the ground suddenly opened up and he plunged into the cesspool. He couldn't get out because the sandy sides of the pool were collapsing.

Mr. Griffith called for help and Michael, who lives next door at 11

Terrace Place, ran to his rescue. Michael clung to the elderly gentleman and, at great peril to himself, kept Mr. Griffith afloat until Mrs. Griffith arrived and assisted in pulling him out of the hole.

"Actually," Mrs. Griffith told reporters later, "the side was caving in under me and I almost went in myself. Michael and I got him out, but Michael is the hero of the whole thing."

Michael was presented the 436th Liberty Mutual Life Savers Award, a gold medal encased in a clear block of lucite, by Mr. Irv Ballan, Long Island district manager for the company, at a ceremony in the office Mr. A.

Albert Glass, principal of Hicksville Junior High School. "We know that Michael has derived a deep inner feeling of satisfaction from his effort," Mr. Ballan said during the presentation, "and we are proud to honor him."

The Boston based insurance company established the award in 1922 in recognition of any life saving act by a Liberty Mutual employee or policyholder employee and of people who save the lives of company employees. Mr. Griffith, a retired executive of the company, is the oldest person to have been saved and Michael is the youngest recipient in the history of the award.

That auto body work and major repairs shall also be prohibited at all times, but this restriction shall not prohibit installation or servicing of accessories, the general servicing of automobiles or such minor repair work as is normally carried on as an accessory use to the operation of a gasoline service station.

The second problem in this so called simple milk run fire was the fact that despite pleas by the fire dispatcher a request to kill the 3rd rail power on the rail road tracks was stalled as MTA personell balked because it was rush hour. Firemen were forced to work on the track fire with the power on. A few years ago while Vamps were under a train putting out a fire the power, without warning, was turned back on. Luckily no one was hurt.

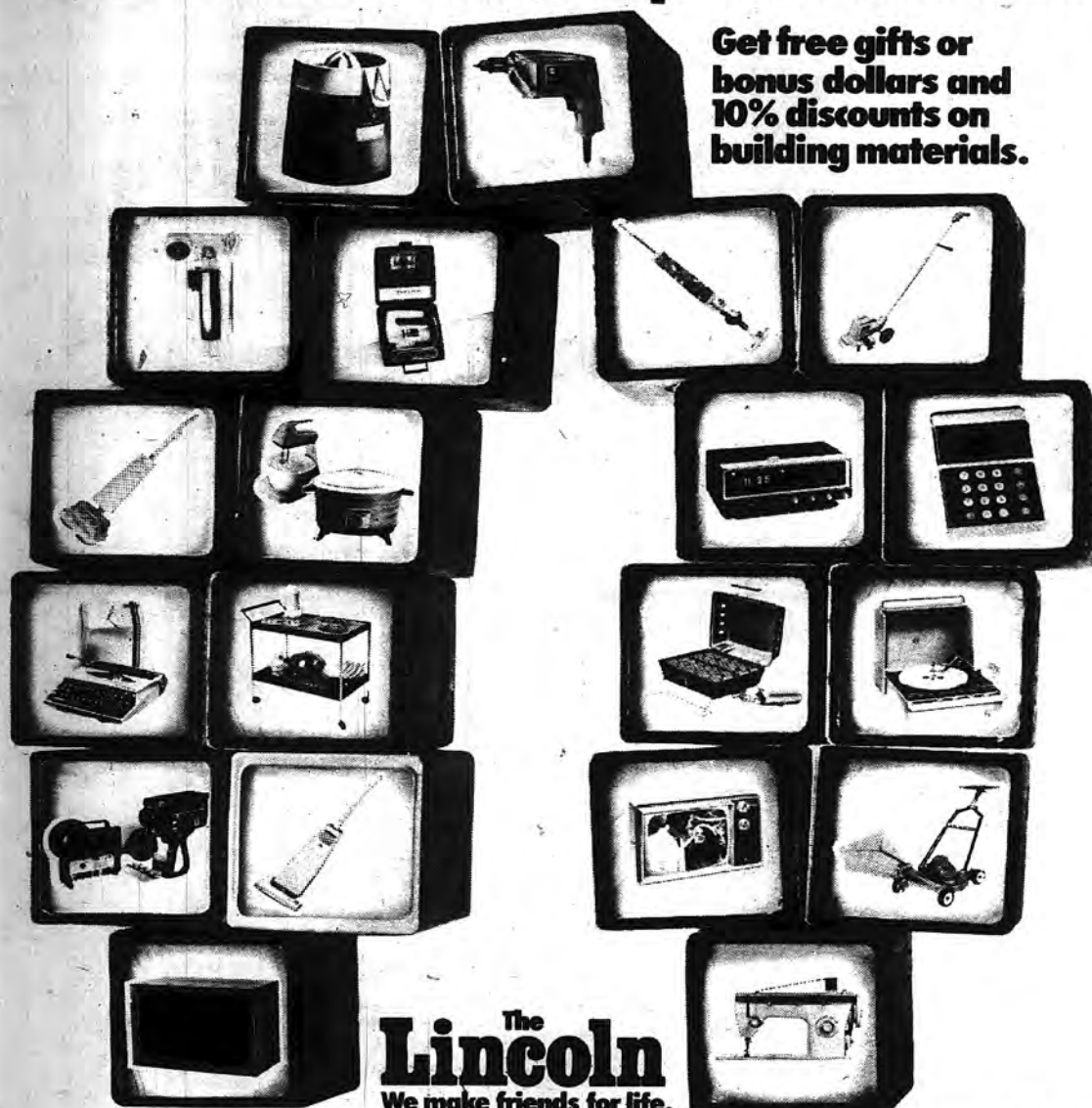
