## Community Council Holds Annual Awards Dinner

The Hicksville Community Council held its Annual Awards Dinner and Installation of Officers on Thursday, June 6 at the Trinity Lutheran Church in Hicksville.

Mr. Frank Chlumsky, who has for years been known as "Mr. Hicksville" for his many community activities and at 89 shows absolutely no sign of slowing up, was the installing officer. First Mr. Chlumsky graciously thanked last year's recording secretary, Ann Gregory, and the corresponding secretary for the post year, Iris Widder, for their dedicated service, for which all active Council members answered with a sincere "Amen". Then he went on to install the following officers: for president, Siegfried R. Widder; for first vice

president, Emil Immesberger; for second vice president, Warren Doolittle; for recording secretary, Herbert Johnsen, for corresponding secretary, Rita Sharkey and for treasurer, John F. Maniec. Mr. Chlumsky spoke of the important duties that each officer will be performing during the coming year. East officer pledged his support of the Council and to its slogan "For A Better Hicksville". President Widder's notes and explanation of how the community awards were determined, ran as follows:

The Hicksville Community Council Award is given at each of our Annual Dinners for outstanding service to the community in Hicksville. The recipient of the Award is decided upon by the Executive Committee of the Council.

After asking the members of the Executive Committee to think about nominees for the Award, we met and talked about the various organizations and names of individuals which were submitted.

Twelve names were presented for consideration.

We talked and listened and discussed, and then we talked and listened and discussed some more.

Finally, after due deliberation, a vote was taken and a winner was decided upon.

The winner of this year's Hicksville Community Council Award is an organization which has been functioning in Hicksville since November 1969. This Hicksville Organization involves an average of 150 young people and adults in some form of organized activity each month. Over and above their regular scheduled programs, we have them: not for what they did last, beautification activity in conjunction with Kiwanis, Lions, Rotary, and our Chamber of Commerce.

...at the corner of Broadway and Old Country Road. We have seen them provide family type movies on Wednesday and Saturday matinees in cooperation with Kiwanis. We have seen them bring a circus to Hicksville and arrange for handicapped children in the area, as well as hospitalized veterans from the Northport V.A. Hospital, to come to enjoy the show. We have seen them provide recreational activities for Hicksville young people, canoe trips, bike trips,

softball, volleyball, etc. They provide counselling just as much, or more. The list could go on and on...

They have a Board of Directors of 18 people, a professional Advisory Council, including ministers and doctors of 5 people, a Staff of 7 people, and, of course, the recipient is HAD.

To assist in the presentation, Mr. Barnes, Director of the Hicksville Public Library, last year's winner, came up and presented this Award to a representative HAD's first vice president Hy Sipinick.

### President's Award

Mr. Widder continued—"The decision on who should receive the award designated by our founder, Sheila Noeth, as "The President's Award" is strictly the problem of the president.

"The award really should go to someone who has served the Community of Hicksville in an unselfish way, over a period of time, cheerfully, and can fit into the categories I started jotting down on paper. These are some of them: not for what they did but for what they did that will last: unselfish service to the Community; giving of ones self to others; continual service to others; unceasing devotion to community; continual community efforts; consistent community awareness; and enthusiasm and steadfast devotion to the community spirit and I decided to use "Unceasing Devotion to Community", and to be sure I was on the right track, I got some definitions from the dictionary: unceasing - continual; proceeding without interruption; devotion - earnest attachment to a cause; community - life in association with others.

"Is there someone like this? I knew there was.

"This person is a member of our Council. When this person has something to say, this person says it. When this person feels something should be done, this person does it. This person, by profession, is a teacher, but is more than just a teacher. This person has worked with youth groups outside the school. This person has been very active in church work. This person has been active in politics. This person is a well-rounded citizen

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# AT SUPERVISORS' MEETING

## OTB Hearing, Paneling Hazards, Caso Candidacy for Lieut. Gov.

The first meeting of the Nassau County Board of Supervisors on Monday offered a lengthy calendar which was nonetheless non-controversial, and a half-dozen vehement speakers who took this opportunity to air their concerns. Following the meeting, the County Executive held a widely attended press conference to discuss his selection to run as Lieutenant Governor of New York State with Governor Malcolm Wilson, a selection which had become official that morning.

Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Francis T. Purcell offered a resolution to set a public hearing for a Nassau County off-track betting program. As noted, the New York State legislature a few weeks ago disallowed the proposal to create a bi-county Nassau-Suffolk OTB. The public hearing date had not been set as of Monday.

Hempstead Supervisor Alfonso D'Amato spoke out against highly inflammable luan and other light, porous wood paneling which comes primarily from far eastern countries. He said he would work with the county attorney and the County Office of Consumer Protection not to outlaw such paneling, but to require that it bear signs saying, "This paneling not fire rated," in warning would be purchasers of potential hazards.

### Sorley Speaks

Dr. Ralph Sorley, of Rockville Centre, a man who this reporter has not seen for a few years but, who, however, according to his own words "has been working hard in devious ways," appeared at the meeting to protest proposed separate fee-charging by Nassau County Medical Center doctors as well as what he considered exorbitant and unsubstantiated out of pocket expenses charged to the county by District Attorney William Kahn.

On the subject of the doctors, Sorley recommended that they be let go if they found they weren't making enough money under the present system, and new doctors hired. On the topic of Kahn, he had a confrontation with Nassau County Controller M. Halstead Christ with whom, according to Christ, he has had a "running conversation" all week. Certain out-of-pocket expenses, according to Christ, have been labelled by Kahn as relating to confidential investigations, and must not be disclosed. "I would recommend you see Mr. Kahn

directly," said Christ. "I'm not going to see Kahn," said Sorley. He later said he had been "studying Kahn" for 12 years.

### Abortion Issue

The abortion issue came up once again with the appearance of Right to Life's John Short, of Farmingdale, and another representative from Melville. Short was urging County Executive Ralph Caso to endorse a bill which is presently on the governor's desk in Albany requiring two attending doctors at any abortion concerning a fetus over 20 weeks, "one doctor determined to kill a life and one determined to save it." Caso had no statement for Short.

Baird also spoke regarding the case of a woman who was asked to bury her post-20 week baby by the Nassau County Medical Center.

### Candidate Speaks

At the press conference following the Board Meeting, Caso expressed his pleasure at having been selected as the Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, and showed agility at fielding questions. Regarding his campaign plans, "that would be up to the strategists to decide."

Regarding his feeling about the cross endorsement ban, "that's up to the leaders of the political parties to decide." As far as his preference of candidates among the Democrats to oppose him, he said he would not presume to speak on that topic, and besides, he doesn't know.

Caso did say, however, that he has never taken an election for granted, has always "run scared," and would conduct an "aggressive, fighting campaign." He felt that Watergate should not be an issue in the campaign, although there are those who will try to make it so, he said. "In the last election, we ran on a record of solid accomplishment, and won an overwhelming victory: Watergate was around then, too, you know," said Caso.

Regarding the possibility that he was selected because of his ethnic background, Caso had something like this to say: "In an election campaign, ethnicity is always an important consideration. It is highly probable that my Italo-American background had an influence in this choice, and that because of it, I might appeal to my 'compadres.' The laughter of reporters chalked up another ounce of good will for the County Executive.

## They're Off and Running GOP Designates...

District Attorney William Kahn, one of the biggest vote getters in the history of Nassau, topped the list of 43 candidates designated by Nassau Republicans at their Convention held tonight, June 6th, at the Holiday Inn, Hempstead, according to Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta, Party Chairman.

In addition to Kahn, the 1,970 Republican Committeemen and Committeewomen selected candidates for Congress, State Legislature, County and Family Court Judges, Councilmatic positions and District Court Judges.

The business-like Convention contained no surprises except for Party Chairman Margiotta. The Party Leader was surprised by the Convention's members singing him "Happy Birthday" on the occasion of his 47th birthday, which he was celebrating today.

The importance of Kahn's candidacy to the Republicans was emphasized by the names of top Republican leaders who supported his designation. Speaking on behalf of Kahn were: County Executive Ralph G. Caso and Republican leaders James Picken of Oyster Bay, Thomas (Bud) Pierce of North Hempstead, John Pasucci of Glen Cove, and John Scadato of Long Beach.

Designated for Congressional seats were: Incumbents Angelo D. Roncallo of Massapequa in the 3rd C.D., Norman P. Lent of East Rockaway in the 4th C.D., and John W. Wylder of Garden City in the 5th C.D. Mrs. Edythe Layne of Roslyn Heights was named in the 6th C.D. She is the first woman to seek a Congressional seat from Nassau County on the Republican line.

Named for State Senate seats were incumbent Senators: Owen H. Johnson of West Babylon in the 4th S.D., Ralph J. Marino of Syosset in the 5th, John R. Dunne of Garden City in the 6th, John D. Caemmerer of East Williston in the 7th, and Norman J. Levy of Merrick in the 8th. Newcomer Joel S. Kaplan of Woodmere was designated in the 9th S.D., which takes in both Nassau and Queens Counties.

Picked to seek another term in the State Assembly were incumbent Assemblymen: Stuart R. Levine of Plainview in the 10th A.D., Philip B. Healey of Massapequa in the 11th, George A. Murphy of Seaford in the 12th, Milton Jonas of North Merrick in the 13th, Joseph M. Reilly of Glen Cove in the 14th, John E. Kingston of Westbury in the 15th, Joseph M. Margiotta of Union-

date in the 17th, and Armand P. D'Amato of Baldwin in the 18th. Newcomers named were: Richard D. Hausman of Port Washington in the 16th, Louis J. Milone, Jr. of Rockville Centre, in the 19th, Curtis Andrews of Woodmere in the 20th, and Henry (Harry) Dwyer of Floral Park in the 21st. Mr. Dwyer replaces Assemblyman George J. Farrell, Jr., who decided against seeking another term in Albany.

County Court Judges designated were Republican incumbent Raymond Harrington of East Rockaway and incumbent Democrats Alfred Samenga and Douglas Young, all running with bi-partisan support.

Family Court Judges included incumbent Pat Collins of Freeport, Republican, and Marilyn Friedenberg, Democrat, both running with bi-partisan support.

Other Family Court Judges designated were: Incumbent Aaron Cohen of Glen Cove, and Edwin J. Loewy, Hempstead Village Justice, who will seek a newly created Family Court Judge position. A graduate of Cornell University and Law School, and a member of the New York State and Federal Bar, Judge Loewy is married and the father of three. He is currently President of the New York State Association of Magistrates, and still maintains a law office in Hempstead.

Administrative Judge of the District Court, Alfred Robbins of Hempstead, the first Black to serve in that position, was designated to seek a full term as Administrative Judge. He must run county-wide for that post, and he will run with bi-partisan endorsement.

Named to run for Councilmatic post, up for election in North Hempstead this November, were incumbent Councilmen John J. Infancia of New Hyde Park and John P. Dunne, of Plandome Heights, N.Y. Dunne, no relation to the State Senator, was designated to replace Councilman Clinton G. Martin, who plans to resign his North Hempstead Councilmatic seat this month. Mr. Dunne is married and has four children. He is practicing attorney in Manhasset and former confidential secretary to the Administrative Judge of the County Court, and former Acting Justice of the East Hills Village Court. He is a graduate of Hofstra University and Georgetown Law School.

Designated to run for District Court Judges were: Second District: Incumbents John Capilli, Abe Lerner, James P.

Griffin, Eli Mellan, a Democrat, all with bi-partisan endorsement. In addition, Donald Belfi of Rockville Centre, Assistant DA, will seek a District Court Judgeship. Belfi, 38, is a Georgetown University and Fordham Law School graduate. He served in the Nassau DA's Office for 13 years. After his graduation from Fordham Law School at the age of 23, he served in the office of the late Manhattan DA Frank Hogan for 2 years as the Assistant DA, and he was the youngest man at that time to ever serve in that position. In the Nassau DA's Office he has served as former Deputy Chief of the Rackets Bureau and Homicide Bureau, and is presently Chief of the County Court Trial Bureau. He is former President-Republican of the Nassau Young Republicans. Mr. Belfi ran unsuccessfully in 1964 for the Assembly seat in the 19th A.D., presently held by Democratic incumbent John Thorpe.

Re-designated in the Third District for District Court Judge were: District Court Judges Charles Marchese of Port Washington, and Arthur Block of New Hyde Park, both with bi-partisan endorsement.

In the Fourth District, District Court Judge Julius Schwartz was designated and will run with bi-partisan support. Others seeking a District Court Judgeship in the Fourth District were: Edward Margolin, 62, of Woodbury, Chief Assistant DA of Nassau County, and Oyster Bay Councilman, Sal Mosca of Bethpage, and Thomas Ryan of Massapequa, and Assistant DA.

Margolin, who is married and has two children, is a graduate of New York University and New York University Law School, where he obtained his degree by attending classes in the evening between 1929-1939.
