The abortion issue came up once again with the appearance of Right to Lifers John Short, of Farmingdale, and another representative from Melville. Short was urging County Executive Ralph Caso to endorse a bill which is presently on the governor's deak in Albany requiring two attending doctors at any abortion concerning a fetus over 20 weeks, "one doctor determined to kill a life and one determined to save it." Caso had no statement for Short.

At the press conference following the Board Meeting, Caso expressed his pleasure at having been selected as the Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, and showed agility at fielding questions. Regarding his campaign plans, "that would be up to the strategists to decide." Regarding his feeling about the cross endorsement ban, "that's

tegarding his reeling about the cross endorsement ban, "that's up to the leaders of the political parties to decide." As far as his preference of candidates among the Democrats to oppose him, he said he would not presume to speak on that topic, and besides.

speak on that topic, and seakes, he doesn't know.

Caso did say, however, that he has never taken an election for granted, has always "run scared," and would conduct an "aggressive, fighting campaign." He felt that Watergate

"aggressive, fighting campaign." He felt that Watergate should not be an issue in the campaign, although there are those who will try to make it so, he said. "In the last election, we ran on a record of solid accomplishment, and won an overwhelming victory: Watergate was around then, too, you know," said Caso.

Regarding the possibility that he was selected because of his ethnic background, Caso had something like this to say: "In an election campaign, ethnicity is always an important consideration. It is highly probable that my Italo-American background had an influence in this choice, and that because of it, I might appeal to my "com-
