Hicksville Budget Cut

An unexpected additional \$141,204 in Federal Aid Iunds which were released to Hicksville School District by Governor Wilson on Thursday of last week, brought good news for taxpayers who had previously defeated the district's first proposed budget on June 6th.

The new funds, resulting from The new tunds, resulting from special services provided to the handicapped under Titles IVA and XVI of the Social Security Laws, have been withheld from many schools for more than a year while disputes about school

district eligibility were ironed out at the state and federal levels. In order to receive the funds, school officials have been required to submit voluminous reports, and School Board President Robert Discount and the fundamental program waiver. Pirrung had to sign a waiver agreeing that the funds would be returned if subsequent federal audit may require it.

In commenting on the "windfall", Joeal officials say there is
no question that the services have
been provided, and what has been
argued was whether or not school
districts could participate in the

fund-sharing program.

As a result of these additional revenues, plus cuts of \$85,000 previously made in the budget at a special Board meeting on Monday, June 10th, a total reduction of 23 cents per hundred can now be used to cut the tax rate increase to \$1.70 in place of the previously proposed \$1.70.

Dear Parents and Taxpayers

Dear Parents & Taxpayers,
After the defeat of the school budget
on June 5, the Board of Education
reviewed areas of the budget where possible economies could be effected without impacting our educational programs. As a result, we have decided to defer certain building maintenance programs, consolidate functions in the cafeteria, reduce some supplies and equipment and reduce our District insurance cost estimates. These revisions amounted to a reduction in the tax rate of 9 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

In addition to our reductions, Gov. Wilson has just released an additional \$141,000 in state aid to the Hicksville schools enabling us to reduce the tax rate another 14 cents or a total reduction of 23 cents. I sincerely feel that the revised tax rate increase of \$1.47 represents a sound financial and educational plan. We have provided for the continuation of our outstanding music and foreign language programs. We are planning to expand our learning disabilities program in three additional elementary schools. We have moved toward smaller elementary class sizes, particularly in the lower grades, where our children need more personalized attention. Provisions have been made in this budget for an Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum. There is currently no one in the central staff

charged with that responsibility and if we are going to maintain the technical competence of our teaching staff and ensure a coordinated K-12 curriculum, the leadership, direction and expertise provided by that individual is essential.

Another facet of the budget which represents a more cost effective use of represents a more cost effective use of your tax dollars in the reassignment of four elementary Ass't Principals to central administration. These individuals have many years of elementary school experience and will be charged with the responsibility to review and evaluate all programs in our eight elementary schools with a view toward improving consistency in view toward improving consistency in instruction, insuring that the strengths of one schools are incorporated district wide and most importantly improving the articulation between the elemen-tary schools and the Jr. High School. Their main concentration will be in Language arts Reading and Math where no district - wide supervision now exists.

In summary, we feel that this is an educational budget and trust that you coansider it a wise investment in your children's future, and rate "Yes" on June 27.

studies Congress development of alternative sources of energy, studies completed since the Arab emcompletes since the bargo and ensuing "energy crisis" have concluded that we will continue to rely on petroleum

will continue to rely on petroleum for the bulk of our energy needs until well into the 1980's.

The oil industry itesli, despite its clamor for oil-shore drilling rights, has hitched its forward planning and pocketbook to the prospect oil escalating import requirements, knowing full well that domestically produced supplies of crude and refused oil will not be sufficient to meet even the most conservative estimates

With the U.S. required to pretroleum asome barrels daily With the U.S. required to import approximately 1 3 of its petroleum 180me 6,000,000 barrels daily), a new breed of supertankers has been providing the most popular solution to the problem of getting that product from there to here at the lowest possible cost. Popular with the industry owing to their efficiency, they also offer some benefit to the consumer in that transportation costs can be cut by as much as 60 percent through their use. Their advantages have been offset almost cqually, however, by their problems.

The "J.R.Grey" is a typical supertainker. Owned by Chevron, it is one of the largest ships in the world. Over 1.100 feet long and wider than a football field, it earries 264,000 tons (alm 2,000,000 barrels) of crude between Arabian ports and the eastern United States, joined by

14 more equally gigantic "sister ships" in Chevron's fleet alone. The "Grey", however, requires over 85 feet of clearance below the waterline when fully loaded approximately double the mean low water depth of New York Harbor, for example. While delivering its cargo efficiently in our coastline, it is too huge to safely enter our ports to discharge it.

Off-loading her cargo to

Oil-loading her cargo to smaller tankers capable of clearing the silty bottom of East Coast harbors is, even by industry admission, a risky business, and the heightened risk of accident such increased traffic assures has never been seen by environmentalists as acceptable. Deep-Water Ports", however, are a reasonable compromise solution, balancing need and are a reasonable compromise solution, balancing used and efficiency against minimal civironmental risk, and last week the House of Representatives okayed their construction. The owayed their construction. The word 'port' does not accurately describe these facilities. What the DWP's are, in fact, are huge moorings antchored approximately 3 miles from shore from which supertankers will pipe their cargo to the manifand elimination the need for harbor. eliminating the need for harbor-bound tanker traffic and even the harbor oil-pollution risks we are

harbor oil-pollution risks we are taking today.

I supported the legislation, in the belief that the need to reduce the cost of imported oil to East Loass consumers could be balanced with the relative environmental safety of the Deep Water Port idea. I should mention that no DWP's arepplanned for the waters off Long Island, although each of us will benefit from the increased supply and lesseened prices the Supertanker Deep Water Port partnership should provide.

Ouestion Box Social Security

QUES: Even though I've been disabled for 5 years. I can't get montly social security checks because I never worked at jobs covered by the program. I'm now 43. Can I buy Medicare coverage?

coverage?

ANS: No. You have to be 65 or over to purchase Medicare coverage. Disabled people under 65 can get Medicare protection only if they've been entitled to monthly social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more.

QUES: I'm 74, and I've already applied for supplemental security income payments. Every now and then I do odd jobs for people, but my earnings never go over \$50 a month. Will these earnings have any effect on my payments?

ANS: No. Regardless of age you can earn up to \$65 a month without it effecting your sup-plemental security income

Community Meeting At County Medical Center

The Nassau County Medical Center amounced today that it would hold a special, community meeting in the center on Thursday, June 27.

Acting Superintendent Edward J. Rosasco, Jr. said that the meeting, one of the first ol its kind in the nation, is being arranged "to acquaint the public of Nassau County with the various programs of their medical center and to answer any questions that persons attending the meeting might have." The county medical center was one of the first hospitals in the nation, private or public, to hold an accreditation evaluation hearing. Rosasco said that. "Now in becoming one of the first to hold a special community meeting, the medical center is once again in the foreiront of the growing trend in health care—to bring the hospital to the community. 

Most materials and supplies will now be furnished by the parent directly. NO use of the school buildings after 3:30 pm by "ANY GROUP", unless that group paid in advance for the operating expenses of the building or groups like Little League, a-H Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, CYO, etc. it would mean that these fine organizations, who de so much for our youth, would be locked out of the schools.

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




