"Obvious Shortage" At NCMC Brings Prompt Action By Caso

On the basis of a personal two-and-a-half hour unannounced tour of the Nassau Medical Center Thursday night, County Executive Ralph G. Caso today ordered a crash program to hire additional nurses, nurse's aides, technicians and clerks.

Caso, angered by what he called the "obvious shortage" found during his tours of the East Meadow facility, issued the following statement today after a meeting with key hospital officials:

"Despite the monetary

problems facing the county, we cannot think in terms of putting a price tag on human life. If the county can borrow money to transport human life in its buses, then it certainly can commit money to sustain life in its hospital.

"I have today ordered the expediting of the placement of 21 registered nurses, eight practical nurses, 36 nurse's aides, 13 clerks and five technicians. These are the 77 positions approved by me two weeks ago following a series of meetings between county

Supervisor Burke praised the lifeguards noting that "this most successful effort acknowledges their abilities both as individuals and as a team, and reflects the quality of protection provided for those who utilize the Town's beaches."

"Those who are entrusted with the safety of people enjoying Oyster Bay's waters must have special knowledge and skills," noted Supervisor Burke. "Our lifeguards have certainly displayed these capabilities by once again excelling among their peers."

Fire Report

During the period of July 24 through August 6, Hicksville firemen answered 45 alarms. There were four malicious false alarms, 20 rescue calls and 21 fire calls.

The total alarms for July came to 139. Fifteen were malicious false alarms, 27 rescue calls, one mutual aid call, one working (serious) fire.

Disaster Drill Held

On Sunday, August 4, a disaster drill was held at the request of the Syosset Hospital, to test their personnel. The drill was set up in Jericho, on Jericho Tpke., by the Jericho Fire Department. The

disaster was a bus and car collision. To the bystander it looked like the real thing, blood and all. Fire department rescue squads from Syosset, Jericho, Hicksville, Westbury and Carle Place took part, along with the Nassau County 2nd Precinct police chopper and the Orlando Ambulance Service.

Included in the drill was a staged incident at the hospital of a heart attack. It was reported that the drill was a great success.

New F.D. Ambulance
Hicksville Fire Department's new 1974 Grumman built ambulance has arrived and will be

put into service soon. It will replace a well used 1963 ambulance.

County Team To Investigate Possible Medicaid Abuses

A new investigative team of county social service and health experts will begin today to investigate possible abuses of Medicaid payments, and claims according to Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso.

"While I am not pinpointing specific Medicaid abuses at this time, it is my feeling that certain checks ought to be made to insure that every dollar we spend for health care is a dollar properly spent," Caso said. "Both Social Services Commissioner Joseph D'Elia and Health Commissioner Dr. John Dowling concur with my belief that this joint venture will be another step in upgrading the services we provide Nassau residents."

Caso said that the three-member team will begin to check into the accounts and records of

persons and firms providing Medicaid services in Nassau. Included in this scrutiny will be the records of physicians, dentists, chiropractors, psychologists, podiatrists, nursing homes, druggists, optometrists and opticians, physical therapists, clinics, ambulance and taxi companies and many others involved in Medicaid care.

Members of the team will be a physician and a medical care administrator from the Nassau Health Department and an accountant/pharmacist team from the Department of Social Services. Caso said that the confidential nature of the study will preclude the release of the names of the team members.

The team's first task will be to run checks of high-volume

Medicaid vendors. Spot checks of the records of other vendors will follow. Regulations of the New York State Health Department provide Health Department authorization to examine upon request records substantiating claims made on Medicare.

"The County welcomes specific complaints from the public," Caso added. "I urge anyone knowing of Medicaid abuses to immediately write the Medicaid Investigation Team, Nassau Department of Social Services, County Seat Drive, Mineola, 11501."

Caso said that abuses uncovered by the team will be brought to the attention of the appropriate authorities, including the Nassau District Attorney.

County To Pay Enrollment Fee For "Medically Needy", Caso Says

Declaring that he will not unnecessarily burden "medically needy" residents with a Medicaid enrollment fee, Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today announced that the county will pay the fee.

"Asking us to burden a small group of marginal income people with an enrollment charge is asking too much," Caso stated. "These people are really feeling the inflationary pinch and I'm not about to add to their burden."

Under new federal legislation

that went into effect July 1, persons falling into the category of "medically needy" are charged a semi-annual enrollment fee for Medicaid coverage. According to the State Social Services Department, the "medically needy" are people who have income and resources above the level for public assistance, but below that necessary to meet the cost of necessary medical and remedial care and services. Persons receiving public assistance or Supplemental Security Income payments

receive full medical coverage at no cost to them.

Approximately 5,400 persons will be affected by the county's decision to pay the enrollment fee, which ranges from \$6 to \$42.20, according to the Nassau Social Services Department. Based on current caseloads, the cost is estimated at \$61,380 yearly. The state would reimburse 50 per cent, leaving the county cost at \$30,690.

Caso pointed out that had he not chosen to pick up the enrollment fee, 50 per cent of the amount collected from the "medically needy" — \$30,690 — would have gone to the federal government and 25 per cent to the state, leaving Nassau with an income of \$15,345.

The administration of the collection procedure by the county, however, would cost about \$42,000 a year.

"It amounts to a small price for us to pay to assure that medical assistance is available to the needy that cannot afford it," Caso said.

"Home Improvement" Pamphlet

Home owners who contemplate having repairs or improvements done on their houses are urged to send for a new pamphlet issued by the Nassau County Office of Consumer Affairs entitled, "How to Avoid Home Improvement Problems."

The leaflet advises people to plan the financing as well as the work, and to protect themselves when signing contracts.

"Ask your contractor if he holds a Nassau Home Improvement license," the leaflet urges. "Keep the leaflet on hand for future reference," Pickens advised.

Reports

I can report with great pride that the Town of Oyster Bay completed another highly successful blood donation drive last week. I am extremely grateful to the more than 200 Town employees who volunteered to take part in this vital program.

In addition to assuring unlimited blood replacement for himself and his immediate family, each donor has the personal satisfaction of knowing that he has contributed directly to help another person in need—even to the saving of the recipient's life.

And the need is great. Over 600,000 pints of blood are

needed by hospitals in the New York area every year, but only 300,000 units are provided by volunteer donors. Although an individual donor can give blood up to five times a year he can only give one unit or pint at a time. On the other hand, recipients often require more than one unit; for example, open-heart surgery requires a minimum of 16 units.

The supply of blood is particularly critical in the summer months because donor groups are not readily available due to vacations, school closings, etc. And whole blood is perishable. It must be transfused within 21 days after it is drawn or bedisposed of.

Giving blood is safe and it is easy. After a brief medical examination and a medical history is taken, the donor lies on a table and a trained technician or registered nurse draws approximately one pint of blood. It all takes less than half an hour. After a few minutes rest and some coffee and cookies, you can resume normal activity. The donor's body replenishes the fluid

lost through blood donation in 24 hours.

I urge all Townspeople to participate in a blood donor program, especially during these critical summer months. It is also very reassuring to have the priceless protection of an unlimited blood supply for yourself and your family.

Remember: The human body is the only manufacturer of this Liquid of Life — there are no substitutes.

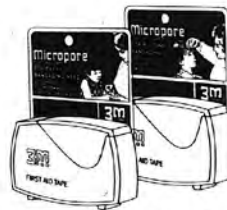

"Jews For Jesus" Leader To Speak

Moishe Rosen, spokesman for JEWES FOR JESUS, will speak at Trinity Lutheran Church, 40 W. Nicholas St., Hicksville on Sunday August 11th at 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. The JEWES FOR JESUS movement grew out of the Jesus revolution which began in the Haight-Ashbury district of San Francisco in 1966. When a number of "flower children" began turning away from dope to Christ, there were among them a substantial number of young Jews. When these Jewish hippies turned to Christ, instead of abandoning their ancestral religion, their interest in their own Jewish heritage and culture increased.

Between 1966 and 1970, Rosen was minister to the two largest Hebrew Christian congregations in the country—the Beth Sar Shalom Hebrew Christian Fellowship in Hollywood and New York City. Sponsored by that organization, he left his position in New York to begin a ministry in San Francisco to meet the spiritual needs of the young Christian Jews. In Sep-



tember, 1973, he terminated his employment with the Beth Sar Shalom Fellowship to devote his ministry to the JEWES FOR JESUS movement.

JEWES FOR JESUS was a slogan to proclaim an identity. Rosen believes that when a Jew accepts Christ, even if he is baptized and a member of a church, he does not cease to be a Jew. He says: "Being a Jew is a matter of belonging to the people

with whom God made the covenant through Abraham and Moses. No man can nullify that covenant. Most people think Judaism and Christianity are considered to be mutually exclusive categories. They forget that the first disciples of Jesus were all Jewish, that the New Testament, like the Old Testament, is written mainly by Jews. He came up with the slogan to show that it is a false dilemma to think that one must either be a Jew or be a Christian."

The Jews for Jesus observe many of the Jewish traditions and customs. Most attend synagogue as regularly as other Jews, yet they manage full participation in local churches.

Japanese Scroll Paintings At Plainview Library

Ten museum-quality hanging scroll paintings, perhaps the most handsome expression of Japanese art, will be on display at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library during August. The ten scrolls were selected from the permanent art collection of Hofstra University by Dr. Robert Myron, Chairman of the University's Department of Art History and Humanities, who organized the exhibit.

Of those in this exhibit, most belong to the Edo or Tokugawa period (1615-1867), during which the arts were encouraged and schools of painting flourished. Mounted on long strips of stunningly colored and patterned brocades that were backed with linen, the scrolls were fitted with rollers at the base so that, when not exhibited, they could be rolled up and stored away.

Also available at the library are bookmarks listing titles of books and films on Japanese art and flyers with general information on the scrolls.

In a cooperative project of Hofstra University and the Nassau Library System, the exhibit is being loaned to the Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library, among other public libraries in the County. Funds to compensate a Hofstra University student employed to transport, mount and dismantle the exhibit are donated by Takashimaya, Inc.

Concurrently the library has an exhibit an Oriental Showcase that includes traditional Japanese toys and clothes.

The library is open Monday to Friday from 9:30 AM to 9:00 PM; Saturday 9:30 AM to 5:30 PM; and Sunday 1:00 PM to 9:00 PM.

A-10 Money Freed; Roncallo; "17,000 Jobs"

Congressman Angelo D. Roncallo announced that the Department of Defense approval of the release of \$39,000,000 long lead time production of the A-10 aircraft. This money will enable Fairchild Republic of Farmingdale, to gear up for production of the close-in support aircraft.

The approval notification, signed by Deputy Secretary of Defense, William P. Clements, allows for procurement of 52 aircraft, well above the original

estimate of between 25 and 30.

In making the announcement, the Long Island Congressman said, "This project is of major importance of Long Island. Both the work at Fairchild and the sub-contracts and related jobs the contract will generate, mean about 17,000 jobs for us and we need them desperately."

The A-10 participated in a fly off with the A7D earlier this year, and was generally judged to be the winner of the competition.
