Dr. Jerome J. Niosi, Hicksville Superintendent of Schools, will be introduced to the 94th Con-vocation of the Regents of the University of the State of New York to be held on Friday, September 20. The Regents, established by the Legislature in 1784, is the oldest continuous State Education agency in America. It is the highest policy-making body for education in the state. The invitation to Dr. Niosi

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was extended by Dr. William L. Bitner, Associate Commissioner for Instructional Services of the State University. Dr. Niosi, who became Superintendent of Schools in Hicksville in October 1971, will be accompanied to the Convocation by his wife, Mrs. Celia Niosi, a teacher and librarian, and his daughter, Valerie, recently awarded the degree of Juris Doctor. by SHIRLEY SMITH Hicksville voters approved a \$25,209,238 budget after defeating two previous propositis. They also okayed a \$231,440 tran-sportation proposition which restores 1/2 mile to the bus limits at the Junior and Senior High Schools, making the total tran-sportation package the same as last year. Over 5700 people voted in last Thursday's election, while each of the other votes brought out less than 4000. The Hicksville School District has been on austerity since July 1, with many services eliminated or curtailed. With an approved budget, these With an approved budget, these services will be restored to the

students and taxpayers, but the district's administration cautions that some of these, mainly transportation and cafeteria, may take a couple of week to implement fully. The school board set the 1974-75 tax rate at \$14.585 (including \$.45 for the library). This is a \$1.46 increase over last year's rate of \$13.124. At a regular school board

\$13.124. At a regular school board meeting, prior to accepting the results of voting, board president, Robert Pirrung an-nounced that lay help assign-ments would be re-examined and something would be done to relieve some of the problems

which have occurred since the board reduced the monitor staff by half. He also directed the business manager to process checks for those working on the polls separately so they can be paid by the end of the month. Checks were not received for six weeks after the last vote. Mr. Pirrung presented a plaque to former school board trustee, Edward Bello, in ap-preciation of his three years' service to the community. He thanked Mr. Bello for a job well done.

Two Hicksville Petitions Draw Community Opposition

Residents of two areas of Hicksville, one in the vicinity of Bloomingdale Road and the other south of the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza, were at Town Hall on

Plaza, were at Town Hall on Tuesday to voice opposition to proposed changes in their communities. This was the second time in about a year that Bloomingdale Road residents came to Town Hall in the morning and evening to oppose rescission of restrictive covenants on the same parcel on

to oppose rescission of restrictive covenants on the same parcel on willis Court, a cul de sac which cuts off Bloomingdale Road into the triangular industrial area bordered by Hicksville Road and Bloomingdale Road. The petitioner, 111 Bloomingdale Realty Co., was asking for the rescission of the covenant which prevents ex-pansion of the 7500 square foot building now on the parcel, oc-cupied by a company called Metatronics.

Metatronics. According to attorney William Miles, of Bethpage, the restriction prevents any in-dustrial company from carrying on a going business on the parcel. The Town ordinance for an In-dustrial H zone would permit a building twice that size, he said. The restrictions, which have been lifted from other parcels in the triangle, were imposed upon it by a former owner in 1952. It was the Town Board's feeling that the restrictions were

was the lown Board's feeling that the restrictions were maintained on the subject parcel because its only access is onto Bloomingdale Road, residential on one side and leading to residential streets.

residential streets. A year ago, Champion Con-struction Corp, was the cond-tional contract vendee of the parcel when it asked the Town Board for rescission of all restrictive covenants end other conditions. The Town Board denied the petition after residents told hair-raising stories of trucks driving through their front windows and lunch-time litter strewn about by factory workers. Litterings



Congressmen John Wydler, Norman Lent, Lester Wolf, Angelo Roncallo, and the leadership of the Long Island Committee for Soviet Jewry will meet on Sunday September 22nd, at 11:00 a.m., at the Baldwin Jewish Center, Seaman Avenue, Baldwin. The Long Island Congressmen have been in the forefront of the struggle to obtain free emigration for Soviet Jews. Each of the Congressmen has adopted a "Jewish Prisoner of Conscience." a political prisoner who is now incarceraled in a Soviet Labor Camp. Through this program of adoption the Congressmen are writing to the Prisoners and to their families, trying to ease their situations. The purpose of this special Sunday briefing by the Congressmen, with the terms of

the Jackson Amendment about to be made public, is to make the Long Island community aware of the ramifications the Amendment presents

Mrs. Inez Weissman, President of the Long Island Committee for Soviet Jewry, will introduce Mischa Shauli, who emigrated to Israel from the Soviet Union, to Israel from the Soviet Union, to the Congressmen and the Long Island Committee leadership, Mr. Shauli, who has lived in Israel for the past two and one-half years, is a guest of the Long Island Committee, and will be visiting this area until October 25th, During his stay, he will address student groups, organizations, and synagogue and church groups on the problems of absorption of Soviet Jews in Israel. One of the reasons Mr. Shauli

came to this country is to explain the problems that are still going to face Soviet Jews, despite the passage of the Jackson Amend-ment. Mrs. Weissman explained, "Mr. Shauli speaks on behalf of Soviet Jews when he says, 'We can't take the passage of the Jackson Amendment to mean that the problems of Russian Jews are now ended.' There are many problems still to be faced harassment, arbitrary arrests, search of homes and removal of personal property, loss of jobs, and the problems of young Jews entering universities, among others. others.

others. Of special concern to Mr. Shauli is the plight of a friend who is presently imprisoned in the Soviet Union. Aleksandr Feld-man, arrested October 18th, 1973, has been sentenced to three and one-half years of hard labor. After applying to emigrate to Israel, Feldman was harassed, Irred from his job and hounded Israel, Feldman was harassed, fired from his job, and hounded by the KGB. He was accused of hooliganism and during his trial was not allowed to call defense witnesses, nor to have members of his family present. Mr. Shauli woll try to bring the case of Aleksandr Feldman to the at-tention of Long Island tention of Long Island Congressmen in order to help his friend.
