OTB Survey Shows Patrons Typical Nassau-ites

Nassau Downs-OTB has released the conclusions of a professional in-depth survey of 1,200 Nassau County residents that add further support to the Downs-OTB has revenue-producing objectives envisioned by the Nassau County Board of Supervisors when it established off-track betting last

Mr. Easa Easa, President and Mr. Easa Easa, President and General Manager of Nassau Downs-OTB, said the results of this extensive survey are also "interesting to note because while the major objections to Nassau-OTB locations are based on an opinion that OTB will draw modesirable customers. the

on an opinion that OTB will draw undesirable customers, the survey shows that the potential patrons are typical of the Nassau County population."

The profile of the average bettor is: a male (65%), between the age of 21 to 49 (72...). He is likely to be married (65%), Catholic (61%), white (93%), educated (40% have gone on to college), and with an annual income that compares with the average income in the bettor's community.

average income in the better secommunity.

He cited some additional examples of the following characteristics of those residents described as "likely" betters.

- 76% have lived in Nassau 10 or more years with 45% residing in the county for 20 years or more.

more.

- 84% own their own home.

- 57% own two or more cars.

An overwhelming percentage (61%) of the population looked favorably upon the legislation of gambling in Nassau County. Those opposed (25%) usually objected on moral grounds or because they felt "undesirables" whuld be entering the comwould be entering the com-munity. Among those considered to be "likely" bettors, the per-centage in favor of OTB was 94 %

Even among those viewed as "unlikely" bettors the establishment of OTB was looked upon favorably by 51 g as compared to 32.% in opposition.

"Another aspect that has generated concern – the loitering potential – also has been shown to be of little substance," Easa noted. "Some 79 g of the regular bettors will have made their selections in advance and will remain at the facility less than 15 minutes, leaving without waiting simules, leaving without waiting remain at the factility less than its minutes, leaving without waiting for the results. The experience of our first month's operation in the Hempstead office is further evidence that loitering will not be a problem."

The survey noted that 50 % of those interviewed did not object.

those interviewed did not object to an OTB branch office being to an OTB branch office being located in their neighborhood, but that there was a strong minority (45%) who did voice objections. In view of this, the report noted, a majority of 54% would prefer facilities to be located in major downtown areas and shopping centers. Opposition, naturally, tends to come primarily from unlikely bettors while those who would use the offices want smaller, more convenient locations.

The survey pointed out that the "neighborhood opponents" to OTB were mostly women (58%) but they represented a cross-section of all county adults. In-terestingly, 39 % of the opponents nonetheless favor OTB in the nonetheless favor OTB in the county, and 78 % now participate in at least some form of gambling. Ironically, 29 % indicated that they would seek employment with OTB and 9 % indicated they would utilize the local facility. The survey was conducted by Oliver Quayle & Company, 180 South Broadway, White Plains, New York.



Nassau Republican state legislators announced their opposition to Governor Carey's proposal to slash \$857,000 in funds from the budget of the State Division of Veterans Affairs, according to Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta (R-Uniondale). Joseph M

The Nassau GOP lawnmakers based their opposition to the governor's proposal on the fact that these funds were scheduled to be distributed to local veterans agencies and, in most cases, had

already been included in the 1975 budget of the local government. The loss to Nassau County alone will be \$37,500 and this amount was already counted upon as income when the coun-ty's current budget was for-mulated.

"The loss of these funds, which amount to almost 25 percent of the county's veteran office's total budget of \$155,000 for 1975, would seriously curtail service to the tens of thousands of veterans in the county," Margiotta said.

The board of managers of the New York State Congress of Parents and Teachers, representing over 350,000 parents and teachers of the State, have called for a significant change in programming involving the portrayal of violence on TV.

Charging that TV violence is excessive, and is polluting the minds of our youth, the statement asserts ; that these programs also constantly violate the NAB Television Code.

This code, which sets down rules governing the depiction of violent scenes of entertainment at hours when the audience is composed significantly of children and youth be reduced, that the broad-casters begin to follow their own code, and that the positive aspects of human conflict against nature, against in-tellectual challenges and similar efforts - be presented instead.

On March 6th the Hicksville Parks Task Force gave an excellent presentation on possible uses for the two town-owned park sites in Hicksville. The former Giese (Lee Avenue) property has three alternate plans which they presented, while a plan for the triangle on Old Country Road, Plainview Road and South Oyster Bay Road, received one modest plan for those present to consider. The meeting was well attended and the presentation was followed by many questions.

THE HERALD will carry a short series on these plans in the near future, so we won't go into them now.

However, one matter stood out in our minds...although it was stated that Councilman Warren Doolittle plans to recommend a referendum to the Town Board on these proposed plans, it was also mentioned that a referendum was NOT necessary by law. We believe that, in all fairness to the residents of Hicksville who will pay for whichever plan is finally adopted, a referendum should be held. In essence we agree with Councilman Doolittle on this point. We trust that our Town Board also agrees, for, before any referendum, a public hearing is scheduled, which will give more details and publicity on this all-important matter. By the way, if your organization so desires, the Hicksville Parks Task Force will be glad to come to one of your meetings and present their suggestions and plans for your consideration and questions. They are doing a really great job which will eventually benefit Hicksville immeasurably.

SPEAKING OF IMPORTANT PUBLIC HEARINGS, keep your eyes open for those hearings that willprecede voting on a proposed Nassau County Legislature, plans for which are presently being worked on by the present County Board of Supervisor (consisting of six persons)
These propositions are expected to be ready to be
submitted to you, the voters, in May or early June. It is conceded that this new legislature will cost a lot more...a conservative estimate for each of the possible 15 legislators would be \$50,000 a year, including his \$20,000 salary. Most voters judging by estimated costs of government in the past, feel that these figures would be "only a beginning". In Suffolk County where they went to an 18-man legislature in 1970, the costs to the Suffolk taxpayer have soared from the original \$6,000 a Suffolk taxpayer have soared from the original \$6,000 a year and no other expense, to where each legislator receives \$16,800, a car, a district office, a secretary and a legislative aid. All at the expense of the taxpayers. We are absolutely against any such changes in Nassau County...we have too much government already. We'll keep you informed as to the public bearingte on this as they are set up. hearings on this as they are set up.

The project is being conducted in a manner that evidences no consideration whatsoever for the people of Plainview, Sidewalks and streets are blocked, and vehicular traffic is

Sidewalks and streets are blocked, and vehicular traffic is diverted, without any regard for the convenience of local residents or motorists. Construction materials and supplies are strewn, and heavy construction equipment is parked, in seemingly haphazard fashion throughout the surrounding area. Neither adequate fencing nor

other safety measures have been other satety measures have been taken to protect the general public. The absence of measures to keep curious neighborhood children from wandering on to the construction site is an invita-

the construction site is an invitation to tragedy.
According to a spokesman for
Ma Bell, the purpose of the work
is to liay plastic rubing and cable
eastward from the new Telephone Company facility on Old
Country Road near Stauber
Drive. (Funny thing - when attempting to justify erection of the
new facility last Spring, the Telephone Company argued that the
location was ideal because there
were existing cables aiready in
place under Old Country Road.)
The manner in which the work
is being carried forth is a dis-

grace. What's even more of a disgrace is that there seems to be no way to force New York Tele-phone to act like a good neighbor. Permits for such construction by permits for such construction by public utilities are issued by our County and our Town as a matter of routine, with no public hearings. It is indeed unfortunate that such a permit is so often regarded as a license to proceed without even a semblance of consideration for the convenience or of local residents.


