School Board Comments On Preliminary Budget

At its meeting on February 11th, the Board of Education set Wednesday, June 4th, as the date for the annual public referendum on the proposed school budget for 1975-76, and for the election of school trutees.

school trutees.

By law, qualified voters are thus given the opportunity to approve or disapprove the proposed educational programs and services which the schools must provide during the coming

must provide during the coming school year.

It is a difficult task to develop an acceptable school budget in any, year; but the widespread inflationary cost spiral, the decline in the general economy, and the increasing number of unemployed makes the task much harder this year than in

much narder this year war in most prior years. Hicksville citizens have provided continuing support for good programs of education down through the years of burgeoning enrollments and large-scale school building programs. They have provided many diversified cultural and basic instructional courses for all the children of our courses for all the children of our community. Many special op-portunities in art, languages, dramatics, music, vocational training, business education, extra-curricular activities, adult and continuing education, and other areas of curriculum have given our pupils a very enriched educational offering. The presence of these good school programs has made Hicksville a very pleasant community in programs has made Hicksville a very pleasant community in which to live and work. They have added to the value of our homes, and have insured a high level of stability in our population. Without doubt, Hicksville has been good to its schools; and the schools have

It is against such a backdrop of prior experience, that the Board of Education must now carefully weigh all of the educational problems and economic priorities
which now confront us.
A first "go 'round' on budget
requirements for the forthcoming

new year, presented a staggering set of proposed figures and in-creased costs of \$3,828,027. It now creased costs of \$3,258,027. It now seems obvious that no great amount, of either increased federal or state aid may be expected in the new year. Therefore, unless new state aid legislation is enacted, local taxpayers will be required to pay most, if not all, of any additional approved school tax burdens. This year, also, most Nassau and Suffolk schooldistricts, including Hicksville, also face special state aid problems. The present state aid problems. The present state aid problems. The present state aid formulae could result in a loss aid formulae could result in a loss of about three-quarter million dollars in present state aid to our district, because of rising assessed valuations per child, declining enrollments, and a lowering of the county and township state tax equalization percentage rate. The special 1.25 index ratio for paying state aid for secondary pupils, and the dollar save-harmless clause, and the payment of state aid on atthe payment of state aid on at-tendance, rather than enrollment, are features which benefit suburban districts such as ours, and these may all disappear unless our local legislators are able to secure continuing

legislation.
As a result of these various factors, your Board of Education must necessarily look at every service provided by the schools. It will require many difficult decisions regarding educational

priorities and program curtailments to cut costs. Essentially, any school budget buys the services of people; the equipment and supplies necessary for instruction; and the related operational and maintenance services to had children, keep them safely and adequately housed and fed; and to protect the citizens investment in buildings and facilities. To cut costs in any meaningful degree, your Board members will be required to make hard choices between many important and valuable services to children and community. When services are curtailed, jobs must be curtailed, and people must be taken from such jobs.

To make the right choices; to establish the best priorities; and to provide the right balance of services which people will support, and services which must be cut, will take community-wide study and participation in

services which people will support, and services which must be cut, will take community-wide study and participation in budget-priority decisions. Hence, it is the desire of your Board of Education to present the facts, and the alternatives to all the people for ultimate consideration. In the long run, the only people who can decide what kind of schools we have in Hickswille, are the citizens themselves. We can have as poor schools as we will tolerate, and as as good schools as we will vote for and support. In the final analysis, the decision is really up to us. In the months ahead, we will be telling you much more about the budgetary choices which confront us. Hopefully, when June 4th comes around, we will have arrived at those decisions which will provide a 1975-76 budget acceptable to the citizens of our community.



chore of "Spring Cleaning."
Carefully preserved odds and
ends that were judged "worn but
useful" last Fall have amazingly
turned to junk over the Winter
months and will soon be lining the
curbs of Town streets awaiting curbs of Town streets awaiting pickup by the Town's Sanitary Collection Services. This is only one of the problems

faced by the men responsible for the collection of some 600 tons of garbage and trash each day from the 64,000 homes in the Town's two garbage collection districts. The job of the Samitary Collec-tions service starts where the homeowner's efforts end — at the

homeowner's efforts end - at the curb. Every homeowner can help the Town do this job efficiently and safely.

Bulky items, such as old furniture, refrigerators, washing machines, etc., require special handling and equipment. Unlike other municipalities which usually designate an annual

special cleanup day for such material, Oyster Bay provides this special service on a year-round basis by appointment. Residents in a Town garbage district can arrange to have bulky items picked up by calling

921-3850.

As an alternative, you might wish to "recycle" an item if it is in usable condition by donating it to an organization such as the Salvation Army, St. Vincent DePaul Society or Goodwill Industries, A local church or youth center might also be interested in a scarred but serviceable refrigerator or TV.

Residents are reminded to use the proper containers; con-

Residents are reminded to use the proper containers: concentional containers; by Town regulation, should be no larger than 32 gallons capacity nor weigh more than 50 pounds when filled. Heavy duty plastic bags may be used in place of containers but should not exceed the 50-pound filled weight limit. Branches, lumber and tree prunings will be collected on normal trash days. The material must be no more than four feet in

normal trash days. The material must be no more than four feet in length and securely tied in bundles not weighing more than 50 pounds. You may put out as many as 10 bundles, but the total



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Security Social

QUES: What is the name of the form I have to use to report my household employee's wages for social security, and where can I

get the form? get the form?

ANS: The form is called
"Employer's Quarterly Tax
Return for Household Employees
(for Social Security)," and you
can get it at any Internal
Revenue Service office. Your local Internal Revenue office is at 114 Old Country Rd., Mineola, N.Y. The telephone number is CH8-7100.

QUES: I am 69 and have very little income, but I own my own home. Will I have to give up my home to get supplemental security income payments?

ANS: No, you can own a home of reasonable value (Market Value of \$25,000 or less -35,000 or less in Alaska and Hawaii) and still get supplemental security income and the Federal Government doesn't put a lien on your home because you get these payments. The supplemental security income program is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

QUES: I was eligible for Medicare medical insurance last March, but decided not to take it. Now I would like to have it. Can I

Now I would like to have it. Can i still sign up for it?

ANS: Yes, People who declined Medicare medical insurance protection when they were first eligible can enroll now through March 31.
