

Library Budget Vote Apr. 22

The Hicksville Public Library budget has been prepared with the intention of combining economy with efficient service. While the budget has been in-creased only \$39,761.90 (7.5%) the library intends tooffer the public substantially the same services hibrary intends tooffer the public substantially the same services and quality of program that it has offered in the past. This means an adequate supply of new book titles and replacements, a 66 hour week schedule (including Sun-days from 1-5), reference librarians on duty at all times and prompt and courteous ser-vice. Free films, concerts, home extension sessions, and discussions of important com-munity issues will be presented for the enlightment and en-joyment for citizens of all ages. A meeting room is available for organizational use. Special services and programs are ofservices and programs are of-fered to the homebound or physically handicapped. The Annual Report, which will be mailed shortly to all residents, will describe these programs in

The library must have the support of the general public to fulfill its community function. If a budget with an increase of less than 8 (cost of living 12) is rejected, serious damage to programs and services will result. Less than one half of all the budget items show any in-crease at all. The rise in utility costs is responsible for a very substantial portion of the in-crease within the operating budget budget.

Hicksville Firemen have been Hicksville Firemen have been busy this past week. A fire caused moderate damage to the roof of the Royai Diner located on Old Country Rd. near South Oyster Bay Rd. The alarm was received on March 28th at 10:50 AM. First arriving units on the scene found a deep seated fire in the cockloff, the space between the ceiling and a deep seated tire in the cocknow, the space between the ceiling and the roof, and ordered a second alarm transmitted. 8 pieces of apparatus responded with 75 men under Chief Mario Misturini. Hicksville vamps battled the fire for over an hour and confined it to one wall and a section of roof in the rear of the building. The Vamps were hampered by double walls and a double metal re-enforced roof. The Jericho Fire Dept. sent one Engine Co. to Hicksville headquarters to stand-

THIS IS OUR 25th year in the publishing of weekly newspapers....and I can truthfully say that I have never had so much immediate response to any column or editorial, as this past week on my message in DEAR FRIENDS: regarding the possibility of the New York State Assembly and Senate cancelling the Referendum set for June 10th on the proposed Nassau County

Phones started ringing about one hour after we know you receive your newspaper each week....and later your notes and letters came pouring in...first we want to thank you for letting us know how you feel on this matter. Many of you asked, what can we do? And that's what this column is all about.

We suggest that you contact your State Senator and our State Representative, as well as the Hon. Francis Purcell, of the Board of Supervisors of Nassau County in Mineola, and the Hon. Ralph Caso, Nassau County Executive, also and simply let them know that you do NOT want this important referendum cancelled. You do want to vote on how your County is governed and you do want to know how much this new layer of government will cost you in taxes, before you vote. Send copies of your letters to all the daily newspapers, radio and cable TV, and, of course, to the weeklies in your areas. You do not have to make your letters lengthy unless you want to. And whether or not you agree with me, it is still important that you let your elected representatives know that you do NOT want your right to vote taken away from you on this proposal, or for that matter, on any other proposals.

SECONDLY, you must be registered in order to vote. If you haven't voted in the last two years you may have to re-register in Mineola. Check this out....register...and then, on June 10, if we are fortunate enough to be permitted by those we have elected

to serve us, to vote....then, whatever you feel about this proposal, go down and cast your vote. Naturally we will continue to bring you as much information regarding the June 10 Referendum as possible each week.

So, to sum up... (1) Send your requests that this June 10 Referendum on the Proposed County Legislature NOT be cancelled, to as many people as possible who have a voice in this matter. Make your wishes known briefly and specifically

(2) Find out as much as you possibly can before June 10th about this matter that is going to affect your

County taxes horrendously.


(3) Check your registeration. (Your School or Library District registration does not count) You must be registered in Mineola.

YOU'VE GOT WHAT IT TAKES

Lewis Carrol, author of Alice In Wonderland, was a remarkable talent. He wrote children's stories, often in fantasy form, which not only captured the imagination of the children but also bore a message. In one of his fantasies he tells of a lock that runs here to yonder continually searching for something. Finally a curious bystander asks, "What is the matter?" "I am seeking," says the lock, "for something to unlock me."

How many of us are not faced with the same dilemma as that of Lewis Carroll's lock? Many times we go through life locked up in ourselves and in our problems. We want someone to unlock us - to release the latent powers within us. Someone to set us free from our fears and

to show us and help us develop solutions.

The cross of Christ is God's statement that you and I have worth in His eyes. Whenever we see or wear a cross, it proclaims, "God believes in me. 




