Library Budget Vote Apr. 22

The Hicksville Public Library budget has been prepared with the intention of combining economy with efficient service. While the budget has been increased only \$39,761.90 (7.5%) the library intends to offer the public substantially the same services and quality of program that it has offered in the past. This means an adequate supply of new book titles and replacements, a 66 hour week schedule (including Sundays from 1-5), reference librarians on duty at all times and prompt and courteous service. Free films, concerts, home extension sessions, and discussions of important community issues will be presented for the enlightenment and enjoyment for citizens of all ages. A meeting room is available for organizational use. Special services and programs are offered to the homebound or physically handicapped. The Annual Report, which will be mailed shortly to all residents, will describe these programs in detail.

The library must have the support of the general public to fulfill its community function. If a budget with an increase of less than 8 (cost of living 12) is rejected, serious damage to

programs and services will result. Less than one half of all the budget items show any increase at all. The rise in utility costs is responsible for a very substantial portion of the increase within the operating budget.

If you would like to join the Library Board and Friends of the Library in presenting and interpreting the budget to the community call Mrs. Clara Bennett, President of the Friends at 681-3183, or the Library at WE 1-1419.

Remember the tax increase is only 4.6c and the total budget of \$567,591.89 still costs most homeowners no more than \$20.00 a year.

Fire , Post Office And A House

Hicksville Firemen have been busy this past week. A fire caused moderate damage to the roof of the Royal Diner located on Old Country Rd. near South Oyster Bay Rd. The alarm was received on March 28th at 10:50 A.M. First arriving units on the scene found a deep seated fire in the cockloft, the space between the ceiling and the roof, and ordered a second alarm transmitted. 8 pieces of apparatus responded with 75 men under Chief Mario Misturini. Hicksville vamps battled the fire for over an hour and confined it to one wall and a section of roof in the rear of the building. The Vamps were hampered by double walls and a double metal reinforced roof. The Jericho Fire Dept. sent one Engine Co. to Hicksville headquarters to stand-by.

Post Office Hit By Smokey Fire
On April 1st Hicksville Firemen responded to a smokey fire in the basement of the post office on West John St. The alarm came in at 2:31 a.m. 7 pieces of

apparatus, 85 men under 1st Asst. Chief Roy Schaaf responded. Firemen had to don air masks to fight the fire which started in a storage room. No mail was destroyed. The fire was confined to one room loaded with empty mail bags. Vamps were on the scene for almost 2 hours. Hours before the post office fire, Vamps were called out on 3 false alarms, 2 from Fountain St. and Heitz Pl and 1 from the East St. School.

House Fire-Underhill Ave.
Fire caused considerable damage to a dwelling at 63 Underhill Ave. Hicksville Chief Mario Misturini said no one was home when the fire broke out and had gained considerable headway before it was discovered.

The fire was reported at 2:47 p.m. 7 pieces of apparatus responded with 60 men. Chief Misturini reported the fire started in the living room and burned through the floor into the basement. Probable cause was listed as electrical. Hicksville

vamps were on the scene within minutes but the delayed discovering took its toll in damage. Firemen Carl Johnson rescued the family pet which was overcome. Firemen resuscitated the pet and revived it. The dog then bit fireman Johnson. That's gratitude for you.

Fire Report - March 11 to April 1
During this period Hicksville Vamps answered 61 calls. There were 10 false malicious alarms, 20 rescue calls and 31 fire calls.

Now that Spring has arrived, we hope you will all get moving on Spring clean-up. The town will be having special clean-up pickups. Most fires start in the home and could be avoided. With good weather here now, it would be good to hold an exit drill with your family. Plan 2 ways to escape from any part of your home. Plan now. Don't wait till the smoke gets you. Speaking of smoke-why not use some of the tax-rebate money to invest in a smoke detector. It may well be your most sound investment.

Dear Friends...

THIS IS OUR 25th year in the publishing of weekly newspapers...and I can truthfully say that I have never had so much immediate response to any column or editorial, as this past week on my message in DEAR FRIENDS: regarding the possibility of the New York State Assembly and Senate cancelling the Referendum set for June 10th on the proposed Nassau County Legislature.

Phones started ringing about one hour after we know you receive your newspaper each week...and later your notes and letters came pouring in...first we want to thank you for letting us know how you feel on this matter. Many of you asked, what can we do? And that's what this column is all about.

We suggest that you contact your State Senator and your State Representative, as well as the Hon. Francis Purcell, of the Board of Supervisors of Nassau County in Mineola, and the Hon. Ralph Caso, Nassau County Executive, also and simply let them know that you do NOT want this important referendum cancelled. You do want to vote on how your County is governed and you do want to know how much this new layer of government will cost you in taxes, before you vote. Send copies of your letters to all the daily newspapers, radio and cable TV, and, of course, to the weeklies in your areas. You do not have to make your letters lengthy unless you want to. And whether or not you agree with me, it is still important that you let your elected representatives know that you do NOT want your right to vote taken away from you on this proposal, or for that matter, on any other proposals.

SECONDLY, you must be registered in order to vote. If you haven't voted in the last two years you may have to re-register in Mineola. Check this out...register...and then, on June 10, if we are fortunate enough to be permitted by those we have elected to serve us, to vote...then, whatever you feel about this proposal, go down and cast your vote.

Naturally we will continue to bring you as much information regarding the June 10 Referendum as possible each week.

So, to sum up...

(1) Send your requests that this June 10 Referendum on the Proposed County Legislature NOT be cancelled, to as many people as possible who have a voice in this matter. Make your wishes known briefly and specifically.

(2) Find out as much as you possibly can before June 10th about this matter that is going to affect your County taxes horrendously.

(3) Check your registration. (Your School or Library District registration does not count) You must be registered in Mineola.

(4) Vote...on June 10th, if this important referendum is not cancelled.

Next week, we plan to bring you excerpts from your notes and letters, as space permits. In the meantime...don't give up on this important matter...your letters and your opinions do count. SHEILA

YOU'VE GOT WHAT IT TAKES

Lewis Carroll, author of Alice In Wonderland, was a remarkable talent. He wrote children's stories, often in fantasy form, which not only captured the imagination of the children but also bore a message. In one of his fantasies he tells of a lock that runs here to yonder continually searching for something. Finally a curious bystander asks, "What is the matter?" "I am seeking," says the lock, "for something to unlock me."

How many of us are not faced with the same dilemma as that of Lewis Carroll's lock? Many times we go through life locked up in ourselves and in our problems. We want someone to unlock us - to release the latent powers within us. Someone to set us free from our fears and

to show us and help us develop solutions.

The cross of Christ is God's statement that you and I have worth in His eyes. Whenever we see or wear a cross, it proclaims, "God believes in me. And He wants me to start believing in what He believes in." Often though we see ourselves as weak and ineffective and not very competent, but that simply is not true. We are a child of God, created in His image. Therefore we have potential power. We have what it takes.

The New Testament says it this way, "Surely you know that you are God's temple, and that God's spirit lives in you." Just think of it - we are the temple of Almighty God and His spirit is in us. How can we then ever say I haven't got what it takes to meet a problem that is

facing me. We must never give up, never. For if we believe the truth that God's spirit is in us, we will never give up, for with God's help we are equal to anything the Devil or life throws our way. God, in Christ was able to overcome death itself, and He can certainly help us overcome our problems however big they might be.

Today God wants to provide a breath of fresh air for the smoke filled rooms of our lives. Some lives are cluttered with fears and problems. We need only be willing to open the window of our hearts and let Him in. To breathe in God's spirit through reading and studying His Holy Word. Through it we refurbish our body, His temple, and meet our problems head on.

The "redcoats" may not be coming nor the "patriot minutemen" standing fast on April 19th, the 200th Anniversary of the Battles of Lexington and Concord, but Hicksville will be "kicking off" its Bicentennial commemorations in stirring fashion just the same.

Sponsored by the Gregory Museum Historical Committee in conjunction with the Hicksville American Revolution Bicentennial Committee and with the cooperation of the Town of Oyster Bay Bicentennial Commission, a day-long celebration is being planned to mark the beginning of armed resistance to British tyranny.

Plans now call for a patriotic parade from the Mid Island Bowl parking lot down Bay Avenue to the Heitz Place Courthouse where ceremonies will take place between 10:15 and 11 A.M. Veterans groups, youth organizations and fraternal clubs are being invited to march behind the Hicksville Police Boys Club band and contingents of the Stonewall Brigade and the 42nd New York Volunteer Regiments. Civil War drill and musket-firing groups.

Recalling the "shot heard round the world" at the Gregory Museum in the old courthouse will mean the rattle of musketry as the colorful, uniformed men in "blue" and "gray" salute the beginnings of our nation's epic struggle for human liberty and dignity, the ceremonial raising of

Social Security

QUES: I opened my own business last year, I know I have to report my self-employment earnings and pay social security contributions on them, but when should I do this?

ANS: A report of your 1974 earnings and the social security contributions should be sent with your income tax return to the Internal Revenue Service by April.

QUES: My husband was seriously injured in an auto accident, and the doctor says it will be a long time before he can go back to work. How long should he wait before he applies for social security disability payments?

ANS: He shouldn't wait. People can miss out on some disability payments if they delay applying. Back payments can only be made for up to 12 months. Your husband can get information about applying for benefits by calling or writing any social security office. Your local social security office is at 1 Station Plaza North, Mineola, N.Y. The telephone number is P17-5470.

QUES: My doctor is going to send me to a laboratory for some diagnostic tests. Will my Medicare pay for these tests?

ANS: Medicare medical insurance can help pay for diagnostic tests provided by some independent laboratories. Your doctor may be able to tell you whether the laboratory is certified and whether the tests are covered by Medicare. You can also call or write any social security office for information. Your local social security office is at 1 Station Plaza North, Mineola, N.Y. The telephone number is P17-5470.
