## School Bus Accident

A school bus, owned by W.E. Transportation Co. of Hicksville, went out of control Monday, May 5. At the time of the accident, 3:10 p.m., the bus, which was being operated by Andre Poggioli of Hempstead, was carrying the Plainview Junior High School Track Team. According to the Second Precinct, Woodbury, the bus went out of control and hit a sign and then two trees on Old Country Rd. at Park Ave., Hicksville. The bus then swerved onto the roadway and collided with three cars operated by Lola Gutterman, 47 Syosset Circle, Syosset; Robert Furey, 11 Roma St., Hicksville; and Beatrice Rubinfeld of Levittown; and a N.Y. Telephone Company van, operated by John Filardo, 6 Reiter Ave., Hicksville. Andrew

Poggioli, suffered a head injury and was taken to Central General Hospital along with six passengers in the bus, including two adults and four students. Also injured and taken to Syosset Hospital were: Lola Gutterman and a passenger in her car. Robert Furey and two passengers in his car were taken to Central General Hospital. Police stated that the driver of the bus could not remember what had happened. The bus was taking 13 students, the coach and the assistant coach to a meet in Garden City.

In Central General Hospital for treatment, was Michael Rinaldo, 25, coach; Dale Thompson, 14; Vincent Garcia, 12; Catherine Clancy, 12 and Kurt Fisher, 14.

## Bill Would Aid Handicapped

Library service to the blind and special service to the physically handicapped has long been part of the program of the Hicksville Public Library. Talking books and cassettes, plus the necessary phonographs and cassette players, circulate at a brisk rate of nearly 1,000 a month to individuals and schools.

The library delivers the books or other materials to the physically handicapped or blind if requested. A special book catalog is available from which the physically handicapped may make selections if they wish. The blind may use a bi-monthly list "Talking Book Topics" or records to introduce them to the latest available titles.

Both the blind and the physically handicapped have access to all services (reserves, best sellers, music, films, etc.) that they can use.

The Talking Books are furnished by the Library of Congress and the services by the local libraries through the Nassau Library System.

There is a bill that libraries are urging support of now in the Assembly Ways and Means Committee (Burton Hecht, Chairman), and the Senate Finance Committee, Chaired by Senator John Marchi. It provides for \$2,100,000.00 in 1975-76 for

library systems to serve the blind and physically handicapped. This will enable the 136,000 residents of New York State that are unable to read conventional print to take further advantage of these services at a cost to Nassau County of only \$112,000.00.

If you wish to support this legislation actively please write to the Chairmen and your local

legislator. The bill numbers are S 653 Giuffreda and A 3102 Landes.

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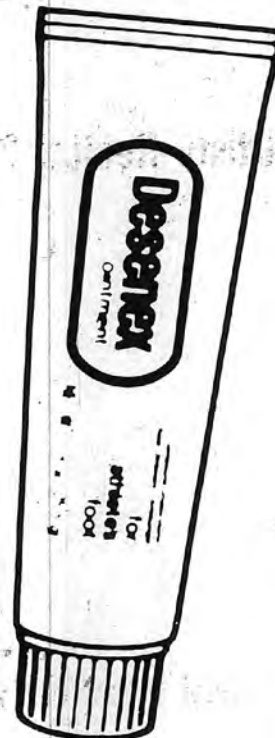
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## Bowlarama Awards Night

## At Nassau Sups.' Meeting Sunday Blues, Water Conservation Advocates Petition Board

Ms. Jean Wood, Executive Director of the Environmental Technology Seminar urged the Nassau County Board of Supervisors to develop, adopt and implement a six-point program of water conservation measures which she described as "emergency" action pending completion of recommendations from the Bi-County Waste Water Management Study. The proposals offered by Ms. Wood include water management planning to accommodate only such growth as will not tax existing water supplies, a long range educational campaign on the importance of water conservation, use of water saving devices a study of water rates to eliminate water pricing which rewards excessive water use, paving regulations to prevent over-paving which inhibits replenishment of ground water supplies through rainfall absorption and recharge programs.

In response to Ms. Wood's presentation Hempstead Supervisor Alphonse M. D'Amato cited several County projects which have been undertaken in recent times to both improve the handling of sewage effluent and to provide for the recycling of rain waters.

A Mrs. Brill, whose family, she said, operates a "supermarket" in Bethpage, told the Board that there was discrimination in the enforcement of Sunday "Blue Laws". Mrs. Brill, who said that in ten years, no one in her family

had ever been arrested for a "Blue Law" violation said that police of the 7th Precinct had told her that if she opened her store on Sunday, she would be arrested "because supermarkets cannot open on Sunday." Stores operated by large chains do open on Sunday, she said, and the police take no action. The items which she sells on Sunday are all items which, she claimed, the law permits to be sold.

County Executive Caso told Mrs. Brill that, while the "Blue Law" has State-wide application, it is enforced by the police on the basis of specific complaints. "It may very well be that your competitors are complaining," said Caso. "The thing for you to do, is to get the advice of an attorney and if he advises you that, under the law, you are not doing anything wrong, then you should fight it. You should also contact your Assemblyman and Senator and try to have these antiquated laws repealed", Caso added.

Walter Sterling, a regular attendant at the Board, repeated accusations which were made by him at earlier Board meetings that there had been thefts of parts and fuel from the Uniondale shop of the MSBA. These accusations prompted Messrs. Caso and D'Amato to tell Sterling that he was abusing the courtesy extended by the Board which remains in session at the close of the regular meeting to hear the views of taxpayers and concerned citizens. "You keep bringing up these same charges

time and time again, even though you've been told that this Board has no jurisdiction over them", said D'Amato. "If you have proof, then you should go to the District Attorney," said D'Amato. Mr. Caso told Sterling that he had asked MSBA Director Andrew Schiavone to conduct an investigation of Sterling's charges and Sterling confirmed that he had been advised of this in a letter from Mr. Schiavone.

No speaker at the May 5 meeting addressed himself to the CSEA County wage settlement of 6 percent approved last week by the Board. In an interview, CSEA President Irving Flaumenbaum said that his people were "unhappy" with the raise and that CSEA will step up efforts to amend the Taylor Law. Flaumenbaum also said that CSEA members would increase their political activity and use their funds and numbers to "help their friends and hurt their enemies".

In other action the Board confirmed the nomination of James T. Byrne, Jr. to be a member of the Board of Managers of the Nassau County Medical Center, and approved emergency resolutions of support for two bills which would expand the entitlement of Nassau police officers to disability retirement when injured in performance of their duties and provide for payment to beneficiaries of deceased retired policemen of the liquidated balances of their retirement contributions.

at the head propped on a square of tile in front of her and was advised by the instructor: "Think of it as a raw egg." Asked about the fragility of the doll when it's finished, the instructor explained that it would be like handling porcelain or china dinnerware.

Every part of the doll must be carefully polished so that it is smooth as glass to the touch, which is a long, painstaking process. Then the skin color is china-painted on and "counched" with a small sponge to remove the excess.

One student showed the cloth body of a doll she had made. The clothes, like the soft bodies, are all handmade and sewn at home.

The women chat and help each other all along the way, pooling their talents, trading bits of silk or lace, and even crochet or knit for each other. If a doll requires glass eyes, a set costs the student \$3.00; little wigs are another \$3.00 each. Other dolls have painted hair and eyes, with students mixing china paint from vials of powder themselves.

Said one lady: "My girls were

all blonde, so I'll make HER blonde." On went the yellow paint.

Other students busily painted eyes or lips, some polished limbs, a few were "pouncing" and the new student warily scraped her "raw egg."

The give-and-take and camaraderie between the students is obvious ("Could you outline my eyes for me?" asked one of another). In addition, the instructor goes from one to the other offering advice or helping when needed.

When the dolls are finally finished, students contribute one doll to the Senior Citizens Unit and get to keep the next one for themselves. Some have already won ribbons at outside ceramics shows, and they are encouraged to enter their creations at every opportunity.

For a closer look, Nassau County residents are invited to stop in and watch the action any Thursday from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the Center, which is located near parking field 8 in Eisenhower Park.

To the Editor:

Why support John Ayres, Robert Losche and Cornelius McCormack for the Hicksville School Board? Why vote for Hicksville Citizens for Better Education (HCBE) candidates? What does this organization stand for? These are some of the questions fellow Hicksville citizens may be asking as the school board elections of June 4th draws near.

HCBE is an organization of your friends and neighbors who are concerned with the quality of education in Hicksville. We have been in existence as a formal organization for three years. We have a constitution, by-laws and hold public meetings. We have held public discussions on the school budget, the impact of BOCES on the community, and the value of specialized programs such as foreign language and individualized instruction.

Our primary goal is to obtain for the children of this district the highest level of quality education available consistent with the desires of the community.

We also support candidates for the school board whom we think will make "good" board members. We exact no promises from the candidates we support. Once they are on the board, they vote their conscience.

What makes a "good" board member? We as an organization feel that a "good" board member will promote good education and fiscal soundness. A tough task in today's economy. Ideally, the candidates will be mature, intelligent people capable of making reasoned judgements. We advertise publicly for candidates to come forward.

Being an active member of Holy Family Parish, Mrs. Wolf was secretary of the Rosary-Altar Society and is presently serving on its Parish Council. She was active in the 325th Anniversary Celebration of Hicksville and is a founding member of the Hicksville Garden Club. She is a professional volunteer.

## Banks Reach Tentative Agreement

The Boards of Directors of LITCO Corporation of New York and Long Island National Bank today reached a tentative agreement for the acquisition of Long Island National Bank by LITCO.

The agreement provides for a price of approximately \$37 for each of the 509,374 shares of Long Island National Bank. The purchase price is to be paid partly in cash and partly by the issuance of 8 per cent subordinated convertible debentures payable in five equal annual installments commencing one year after consummation of the transaction.

The proposed cash payment amounts to 29 percent of the total purchase price. The debentures will be secured by the pledge of the stock of Long Island National Bank and be convertible at the option of the holders into LITCO common stock at a ratio of 4 LITCO shares for each \$100 of outstanding debentures.

It is intended that Long Island National Bank will be operated under its present name as a subsidiary of LITCO with all of Long Island National's present directors, officers and employees.

The proposal is subject to tax rulings and approval of a definitive agreement by the respective corporations and by supervisory authorities. The offering of the debentures to the shareholders of Long Island

National Bank will be made only by means of a prospectus.

## Nostalgia Marks JHS 50th Anniversary

The Fiftieth Anniversary Celebration of the Hicksville Junior High School this June 2-7th is focusing well-deserved attention upon one of the most distinctive buildings in Nassau County. For a half a century its classic columns have graced the community while from its portals have departed thousands of well educated, adjusted and patriotic students.

It consists of three main portions, the oldest wing, along Jerusalem Avenue, having been constructed as Hicksville's first Junior-Senior High School in the early 'twenties and added to in 1929. As the community population skyrocketed after World War II, a large east wing with much extended facilities was built and opened in 1956, at which time the school became exclusively a junior high school. In the early sixties, the notable experiment with the movable temporary buildings attached to the east wing was begun. In those years of the population peak, the school had the distinction of being the largest junior high one one roof in the State of New York. The efficiency and good order of this vast school operation was a

tribute to fine student cooperation and the services of a superior faculty and administration.

As interest is kindled in the emerging plans for a gala Golden Anniversary Week at the Junior High School many old grads and citizens familiar in some capacity with this center of community education fondly remember happy contacts with the school.

The spacious lawns and playing fields adjoining the Junior High School have been the sites of memorable events in Hicksville's community life. Circuses once pitched their tents, where the west front wing now stands. In the 'thirties and the 'forties, the widely known Hicksville Field Club thrilled thousands with its football prowess on the very field where today's eleven's train and play for junior high honors. Patriotic pageants marking Hicksville's Centennial of the Railroad in 1936 and a great block party on Jerusalem Avenue in 1948, to top off the week-long Tercentennial Celebration of the Robert Williams Land Purchase, have thronged the school's front lawns with townspeople.

Since World War II, the memorial stones and plaques attesting to Hicksville's valor and service in the Great Wars are located in a lovely mall near the southwest corner of the school. Memorial Day and Veterans' Day services thus have the Junior High School as a focal point each passing years.

In the weeks that follow further articles will develop in more detail the history and contributions of this cultural landmark whose Fiftieth Birthday Party on June 7th is exciting more and more people.

Handicapped children up to a maximum of 20 miles, with transportation of handicapped, and that said \$275,927, be raised by taxes on the taxable property of the district.

### Proposition No. 3 (\$455,093.)

Shall the transportation, provided in Proposition No. 1 above, be increased by \$455,093, to authorize transportation on the same basis as provided in the school year 1974-75 as follows: K-3, over 1/2 mile; 4-6, over 3/4 mile; 7-9, over 1 mile; 10-12, over 1 1/2 miles. Out-of-district private and parochial transportation up to a maximum of 15 miles. Handicapped children, up to a maximum of 20 miles, and summer transportation, and after school activity buses, and that said \$455,093, be raised by taxes on the taxable property of the district.

### Proposition No. 4 (\$490,764.)

Shall the School District Budget, as provided in Proposition No. 1 be increased \$215,739, to provide funds to maintain the co-curricular activities of the district in the amount of \$37,899, and the interscholastic activities of the district \$161,840, and to provide transportation to the participants in these events away from the district at a cost of \$16,000.

Any person interested in this application who wishes to comment thereon or become an interested party in any proceeding regarding this application must notify the undersigned in writing stating specific areas of interest on or before June 9, 1975. All such written comments will be retained by the Department and considered in the formulation of the final determination. Any such interested party will be eligible to be heard if a public hearing is ultimately held in connection with this application. 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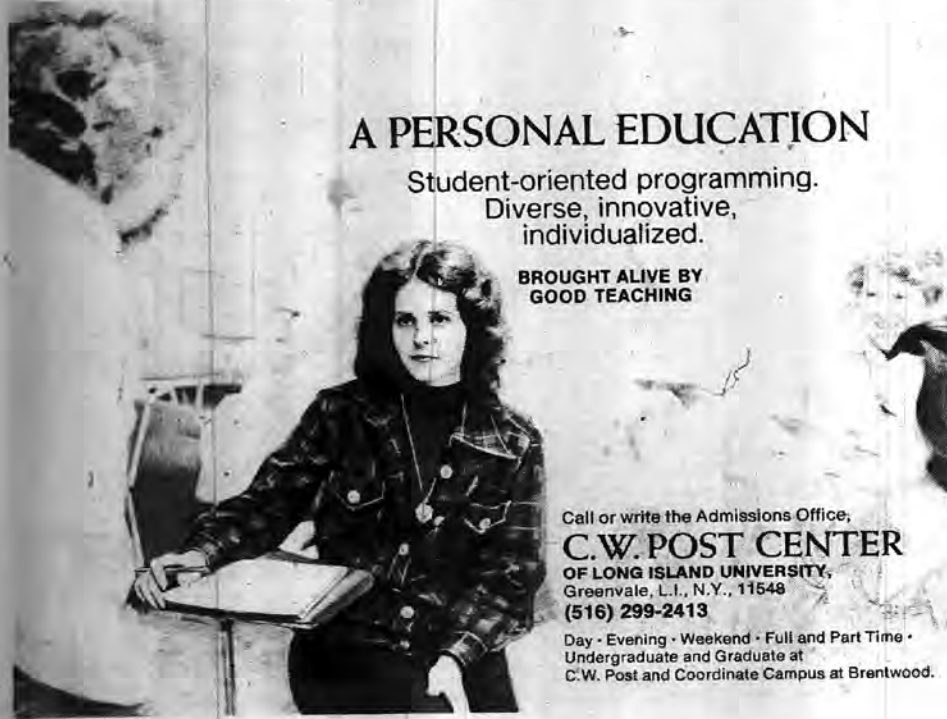
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
