# Voters Pass Budget Defeat 5 Propositions

Voters in Hicksville turned out on Tuesday to pass the Budget, but defeated all but one of the accompanying propositions. Approximately 5,000 out of 8,000 registered voters cast their ballots.

Proposition One, which was the basic budget passed 2493 to 2380. Propositions Two and Three, which dealt with transportation, were defeated. Because these were turned down, no K-8 students who live less than two miles from the school they legally attend will receive bus transportation and no students in Grades 9-12 who live less than three miles from the school they attend will be transported. No handicapped student will be transported during the summer.

Proposition Four, which provided for inter-scholastic and

co-curricular activities, was defeated 2515-2330. Because of the defeat, there will be no variety, musical or drama shows other miscellaneous after-school activities. There will be no athletic programs for girls or boys, no transportation for athletic teams and limited participation in the Bicentennial celebration.

Also affected by the defeat of this proposition will be the parents of all school children, who will be required to purchase classroom supplies. The purchase of textbooks will be limited to \$10 per pupil. No equipment or library books will be purchased either as replacement or additions.

Proposition Five, which provided for Continuing Education and Driver Education, was passed by a margin of 2486-2309.

Proposition 6, which provided for repair to buildings, was defeated 2551-2151. This means that only emergency repairs to buildings will be made. No furniture or equipment will be replaced. There will be no auxiliary police and no community use of buildings except by advance payment of all costs involved.

Proposition 7, which provided for cafeteria services, was defeated 2891-1741. This means that there will be no school lunch program or free lunch program. Pupils may bring lunches from home, or private caterers or other self-supporting services could be provided.

Elected to the Board of Education were William Bruno, Jr., Cornelius McCormack and John Ayres.

# A Project of Love

The idea for this project was developed by two teachers, of West Hempstead School Dist. 27, Ms. Gail Miller and Ms. Bonnie Pierno, who loved their work and wanted to share their friendship and the mutual understanding they have for each other with their students. They understood that learning is a process and must be experienced. Out of this understanding and caring came the idea for the cultural exchange program called "309."

The idea was to take 50 seniors from West Hempstead High School and match them up with 50 kindergarten kids from Bedford-Stuyvesant and let them learn from each other. The program called for four trips or four chances of exchange to take place. When Ms. Miller, the high school teacher, presented the idea to her Social Studies class, it was met with hearty enthusiasm and the Seniors were anxious to begin planning their first meeting with their little "buddies."

This year, after two tremendously successful years, the program was once again presented to the Seniors of the Class of 1975. And, once again the idea was met with the same zeal as the two years before. The first trip was to go into Bedford-Stuyvesant and have a Christmas party with the little ones. Before meeting the buddies each big "buddy" wrote an introductory letter to his friend so that there would be some basis for friendship. It seems that the letters were almost unnecessary, for the minute the Seniors arrived and met their buddies there was an instant rapport. Everyone got along so well, that, regardless of the fact that the Seniors were totally exhausted, parting brought tears to the eyes of everyone involved.

The Christmas Party was such a success that everyone was looking forward to the next part of the trip which was to be in



February. The Seniors once again went into Bedford-Stuyvesant on a dual mission. First, to see their buddies and second to be teacher aides for the day in classes kindergarten to six grades. Here, the Seniors were able to follow a regular day at school, but in a different type of culture from their own.

In May it was time for the little ones to come out to West Hempstead for a taste of our culture. Classes in ceramics and a gym period were arranged. Once again the buddies paired off and friendships grew stronger. Things that the Seniors had been taking advantage of became new and exciting to them through the eyes of the little ones. Their love for the out of doors was something that affected all. As the kids romped in the sun and grass Seniors reflected on their new knowledge. The trust that had developed between buddies was evident to anyone that watched the scene. If anything had been accomplished by the project it was in the area of human relations. Only by this exchange could anyone learn so

much about another person and culture. The children are so trusting and open that their experiences become so real. And even though they are children there is so much to be learned from them, because they are children. The fact that they live in a totally different environment only lends to the amount that is to be gotten from them.

A picnic is planned which the last leg of the project and the last time the Seniors and the kindergartners will see each other. The chance that they may get together in the future is slight, but the memory and the knowledge that had been gained overwhelming.

Thanks to two beautiful women, Ms. Miller and Ms. Pierno, the experience was made possible and for that, no one that had ever been a part of the project, this year or the two previous years, will ever forget or want to forget what happened.

# An Open Letter . . . .

## To The Taxpayers of Nassau County

Dear Friends:

YOU ARE GOING TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY to vote on whether or not to have a 15-man Nassau County Legislature on Tuesday, June 10th, if you are registered, of course.

Inasmuch as we are unalterably opposed to such an expensive suggestion, we have in the past week or two had messages from those who are in favor of this legislature which, if it is voted in, you will have the opportunity of paying for. In favor of this proposition are the following: the executive committee of the Nassau County Democratic Committee who claim that "the cost will be less than 3 cents per family per week (ha), the League of Women Voters of Nassau County, the Mid Island Branch of the American Association of University Women, the Nassau Democratic County Committee, and Nassau County Women's Political Caucus, the Nassau Liberal Party, the National Organization for Nassau Women, the National Council of Jewish Women (Nassau), (these groups also tell us in a flyer that "you can get all of this for less than 3 cents per week per family", (ha), Next we heard from the Hon. Joseph Margiotta who is now "for this legislature", but warily did not state estimated costs, simply stating that "the cost to the taxpayer will be worth it", the Hon. Frank Purcell, who was against this concept as recently as last Fall, is now in favor of it, he tells us, although he did not tell us the reasons for his change of mind, next we heard from Mr. Herbert Schimkus of West Hempstead, who "sincerely recommends a YES vote. He too states that the "entire cost for this important change would be \$1.50 per year per taxpayer", and finally Mr. Edward Grause of East Meadow, a prominent democrat and advisor to Stanley Harwood who instituted the original court case about this change a few years ago, wrote to us stating that he is definitely for a YES vote and hopes that we will advocate it too. Oh yes, we almost forgot, a daily newspaper called NEWSDAY has been beating the drums for this proposition constantly for the past few weeks. In Tuesday's editorial section we get another strong blast which, if you don't happen to read this particular publication, states that although they feel that the suggested district lines are unacceptable and the costs included in this proposition are entirely too high they would still advocate a vote for it because "these can be changed in coming years"... More importantly they state that "the County's board of supervisors with its weighted voting system has already been declared unconstitutional because it conflicts with the US Supreme Court's one-man, one-vote ruling (see my comments on this misleading half-truth)... However, they continue "If the voters refuse to approve the proposed legislature next Tuesday, the State Supreme Court will impose its own plan", (what's wrong with that? If it isn't fair to the taxpayer it can be appealed)... If anyone had the time to look into just what the Court stated, when it handed down the decision that Nassau County no longer had a one-man, one-vote type of Board of Supervisors, they would find that this Court only stated that the Board of Supervisors form of government here in Nassau was unconstitutional only to the degree that the Town of Hempstead should receive more representation on the Board of Supervisors, in order to maintain a one-man, one-vote form of government. In no way did this decision state that we HAVE to have a new layer of government such as they now have in Suffolk (ask the Suffolk taxpayers what has happened to these costs in the past three years). And while you are at it why not ask them if they have better government than before, because that's not the way we hear it from our many friends who live in Suffolk.) So, to get back to the Court's decision....we for one will willingly risk their working out a plan to make the government of Nassau County a one-man, one-vote Board of whatever you want to call them....just so long as in changing the district lines they do not increase the number of those who we will be obligated to pay to SERVE us.

We urge you to vote NO on the proposition to establish another unnecessary layer of government on the backs of our overburdened taxpayers...and suggest that you spend at least a part of this weekend talking this over with your friends and neighbors and urging them to vote NO, this Tuesday. Don't give in to apathy and don't believe that there is nothing you can do about

## Hearing On Coliseum

The Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum Advisory Committee was announced it will solicit public comment aimed at improving operations and services of the county arena in a public hearing on Saturday, June 14th, in Mineola.

The seven-man citizens advisory committee, formed by the County Board of Supervisors by resolution of March 3, 1975, has been looking into management practices and policies at the Coliseum.

Harold F. Madden, a Rockville Centre businessman who heads the committee, said its members view the public hearing as "an important part of a fact-finding process by the committee."

The hearing will begin at 10 A.M. in the Board Room on the 5th floor of the County Executive Building at 1 West Street. Ample parking will be available one block south in the field just west of Nassau County Police Headquarters.

Madden said: "The committee hopes the public will respond to

this opportunity to express their views regarding operations at the Coliseum. We will be there to listen to all those who wish to speak."

Persons planning to speak at the hearing may write to the committee at the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum, Hempstead Turnpike, Uniondale, New York, 11553; or telephone the secretary, Mrs. Caroline Leckstrom at (516) 794-9300, Ext. 276. Those who do so will receive priority at the hearing, but anyone who appears and wishes to speak will be heard by the committee. Written comments and suggestions will be accepted prior to and at the hearing.

Besides Madden, other members of the non-salaried Coliseum Committee are: Vice Chairman Daniel T. Sweeney, Sea Cliff; Frederick H. Bruenner, Sands Point; Peter J. Cimino, Baldwin; Donald A. Dertner, Rockville Centre; Franklin H. Ornstein, Lido Beach; and E. Wayne Sunderland, Massapequa Park.

## DEVOTIONS

Trinity Lutheran Church

LOVE, HONOR, AND OBEY.

### Part I - LOVE

We want to look at three basic ingredients for a good marriage. We will begin with the ingredient that is most familiar to everyone. That is, the ingredient of love. Most people marry for love, so they say. Yet when I counsel young couples and ask them what in particular they love about that person they are going to marry, most often I get sort of a blank stare and much silence. But upon pressing them a bit further, the answer that I most often receive is an answer that goes something like this, "Why I just have a feeling about that person. I'm most happy when I'm with him. It's just good to be together." That leads me to believe that romanticism is not dead. I believe in romanticism, but I also

believe that a good marriage must be based on something more than just a good feeling in the presence of another person.

The Bible most often speaks of love in terms of doing and acting and giving. It says to honor Christ by submitting to each other. Be willing to give yourself to the other person. ## Summer Workers

### Need A Social

### Security Number

Students and other people planning to get summer jobs should apply without delay for a social security number if they don't already have one, according to Sydney Savrin, social security district manager in Mineola.

"Some employers won't hire you unless you have a social security number," Savrin said. "Delaying your application might prevent you from being hired or cause you to lose time and money."

People can get information about applying for a social security number by calling or writing any social security office.

"You should apply for your social security number at least several weeks before you need it for a job," Savrin said. "When you don't recall having had a social security number before, your application is screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure a second number isn't issued to you. And screening takes time."

A worker builds disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to his social security number. He gets credit if he's paid \$50 or more in a 3-month calendar quarter in work covered by social security.

More than nine out of 10 jobs are covered by social security. "Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life," Savrin noted. "When you get a job covered by social security, be sure your employer copies your name and number correctly from your social security card to his records."

People applying for a social security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship, according to Savrin.

The Mineola social security office is at 1 Station Plaza North. The phone number is PL7-5470. The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

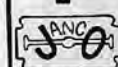

# Letters To The Editor

To the Editor:

I was somewhat bewildered by a letter from Frank Willard appearing in last week's paper in which he attempts to draw some correlation between the Hicksville School District's budget and the plans for the development of the Hicksville Community Park. Although there are financial considerations attached to both matters, they are entirely separate issues and should not be confused. I will address myself only to those remarks regarding the proposed park development.

The writer states that "trickery" has been involved in the formulation of the proposal for construction of the Community Park. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Recognizing the desire of local residents for recreational facilities, and seeing the opportunity to preserve as parkland the only large section of undeveloped land in Hicksville, the Oyster Bay Town Board held a public hearing in 1973 regarding acquisition of the Geise property (Lee Avenue) and subsequently acquired the land.

Soon thereafter, I and Supervisor Burke announced the creation of a Task Force comprised of active community leaders whose purpose was to develop plans for this parcel as well as the triangle at Old Country Road, Plainview Road and South Oyster Bay Road. It was our feeling then, as it is now, that the development of both parcels at the same time would avoid costly duplication of time and effort and would provide residents with the most cohesive plans and finest recreational facilities.

One of the first actions of the Task Force was to poll the residents of the Park District, whose boundaries are the same as those of the local school district.

Mr. Willard's information regarding the number of questionnaires sent out and the number returned is incorrect. Also incorrect is his assertion that the return on the poll was insufficient for the determination of responsible conclusions.

Official figures indicate a return that is within the percentage normally expected by professional pollsters for such returns and generally considered a valid sampling.

The Task Force has held numerous informational meetings with groups in the Hicksville community and, based on the total sum of all information available to it, has carefully examined three conceptualized alternatives and has taken a position favoring one of these alternatives. A brochure describing these proposals is now being prepared and will be given wide distribution throughout Hicksville. The group will then conduct a community-wide public meeting regarding the favored plan before any recommendation is made to the Town Board.

Each of these actions has been undertaken in the open and has been the object of great interest on the part of the local news media. "Trickery" seems hardly the word best suited to characterize the efforts of members of the community who have devoted much time and energy toward realization of a Hicksville Community Park.

From the onset the plan has been to develop the 13 acres as a community park, rather than as a park for use by the entire Town, simply because Hicksville's population is great enough to mandate a facility that can be

used exclusively by local residents. This concept has been proven viable and acceptable in the cases of the four community parks already in existence within the Town.

Mr. Willard has misquoted me in stating that any tax incurred as a result of park development will increase every year.

It should be obvious to anyone remotely involved in the continuing plans for the development of the Hicksville Community Park — or even to one who has only read about it — that Mr. Willard's statements are in-

correct and that his assumptions are faulty.

I most certainly appreciate the writer's concern regarding taxes, and can assure all residents of the Park District that this factor is being taken into careful consideration as development plans continue.

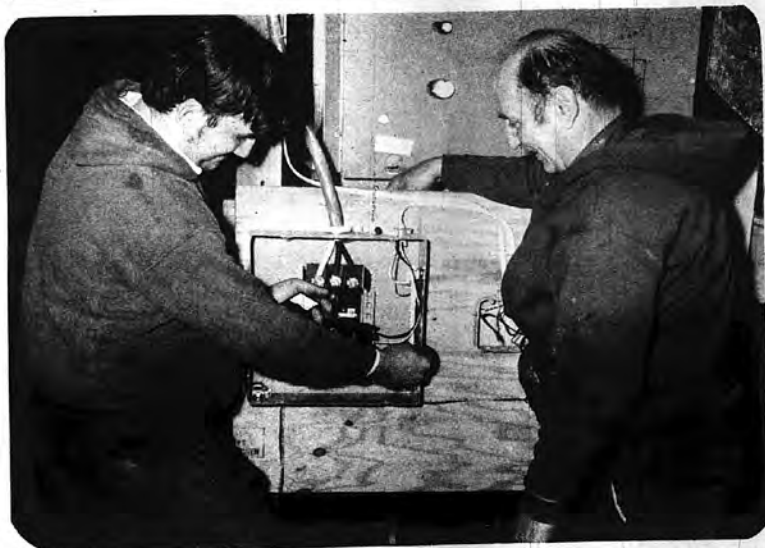
