Voters Pass Budget Defeat 5 Propositions

Voters in Hicksville turned out on Tuesday to pass the Budget, but defeated all but one of the accompanying propositions. Approximately 5,000 out of 8,000 registered voters cast their ballots.

registered voters cast their ballots. Proposition One, which was the basic budget passed 2493 to 2380. Propositions Two and Three, which dealt with transportation, were defeated. Because these were turned down, no K-8 students who live less than two miles from the school they legally attend will receive bus tran-sportation and no students in Grades 9-12 who live less that three miles from the school they attend will be transported. No handicapped student will be transported during the summer. Proposition Four, which provided for inter-scholastic and

co-curricular activities, was defeated 2515-2330. Because of the defeat, there will be no variety, musical or drama shows other miscellaneous after-school ac-tivities. There will be no athletic

tivities. There will be no athletic programs for girls or boys, no transportation for athletic teams and limited participation in the Bicentennial celebration. Also affected by the defeat of this proposition will be the parents of all school children, who will be required to purchase classroom supplies. The pur-chase of textbooks will be limited to \$10 per punil. No equiument or to \$10 per pupil. No equipment or library books will be purchased either as replacement or ad-ditions.

ations. Proposition Five, which provided for Continuing Education and Driver Education, was passed by a margin of 2486-2309.

Proposition 6, which provided for repair to buildings, was defeated 2551-2151. This means that only emergency repairs to buildings will be made. No fur-niture or equipment will be replaced. There will be no auxiliary police and no com-munity use of buildings except by advance payment of all costs involved.

Proposition 7, which provided for cafeteria services, was deteated 28911741. This means that there will be no school lunch program or free lunch program. Pupils may bring lunches from home, or private caterers or other self-supporting services could be provided. Elected to the Board of Education were William Bruno, Jr., Cornelius McCormack and John Ayres.

An Open Letter

To The Taxpayers of Nassau County

Dear Friends:

YOU ARE GOING TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY to vote on whether or not to have a 15-man Nassau County Legislature on Tuesday, June 10th, if you are registered, of course.

Inasmuch as we are unalterably opposed to such an expensive suggestion, we have in the past week or two had messages from those who are in favor of this legislature which, if it is voted in, you will have the opportunity of paying for. In favor of this proposition are the following: the executive committee of the Nassau County Democratic Committee who claim that "the cost will be less than 3 cents per family per week (ha), the League of Women Voters of Nassau County, the Mid Island Branch of the American Association of University Women, the Nassau Democratic County Committee, and Nassau County Women's Political Caucus, the Nassau Liberal Party, the National Organization for Nassau Women, the National Council of Jewish Women (Nassau), (these groups also tell us in a flyer that "you can get all of this for less than 3 cents per week per family", (ha), Next we heard from the Hon. Joseph Margiotta who is now "for this legislature", but warily did not state estimated costs, simply stating that "the cost to the taxpayer will be worth it", the Hon. Frank Purcell, who was against this concept as recently as last Fall, is now in favor of it, he tells us, although he did not tell us the reasons for his change of mind, next we heard from Mr. Herbert Schimkus of West Hempstead, who "sincerely recommends a YES vote. He too states that the "entire cost for this important change would be \$1.50 per year per taxpayer", and finally Mr. Edward Grause of East Meadow, a prominent democrat and advisor to Stanley Harwood who instituted the original court case about this change a few years ago, wrote to us stating that he is definitely for a YES vote and hopes that we will advocate it too. Oh yes, we almost forgot, a daily newspaper called NEWSDAY has been beating the drums for this proposition constantly for the past few weeks. In Tuesday's editorial section we get another strong blast which, if you don't happen to read this particular publication, states that although they feel that the suggested district lines are unacceptable and the costs included in this proposition are entirely too high they would still advocate a vote for it because "these can be changed in coming years"... More im-portantly they state that "the County's board of supervisors with its weighted voting system has already been declared unconstitutional because it conflicts with the US Supreme Court's one-man, onevote ruling (see my comments on this misleading half-truth)...However, they continue "If the voters refuse to approve the proposed legislature next Tuesday, the State Supreme Court will impose its own plan". (what's wrong with that? If it isn't fair to the taxpayer it can be appealed) ... If anyone had the time to look into just what the Court stated, when it handed down the decision that Nassau County no longer had a one-man, one-vote type of Board of Supervisors, they would find that this Court only stated that the Board of Supervisors form of government here in Nassau was unconstitutional only to the degree that the Town of Hempstead should receive more representation on the Board of Supervisors, in order to maintain a one-man, one-vote form of government. In no way did this decision state that we HAVE to have a new layer of government such as they now have in Suffolk (ask the Suffolk taxpayers what has happened to these costs in the past three years). And while you are at it why not ask them if they have better government than before, because that's not the way we hear it from our many friends who live in Suffolk.) So, to get back to the Court's decision.....we for one will willingly risk their working out a plan to make the government of Nassau County a one-man, one-vote Board of whatever you want to call them....just so long as in changing the district lines they do not increase the number of those

who we will be obligated to pay to SERVE us. We urge you to vote NO on the proposition to establish another unnecessary layer of government on the backs of our overburdened taxpayers...and suggest that you spend at least a part of this weekend talking this over with your friends and neighbors and urging them to vote NO, this Tuesday. Don't give in to apathy and don't believe that there is nothing you can do about



Summer Workers **Need A Social** Security Number

Students and other people planning to get summer jobs should apply without delay for a social security number if they don't already have one, ac-cording to Sydney Savrin, social security district manager in Mineola.

security district manager in Mineola. "Some employers won't hire you unless you have a social security number," Savrin said. "Delaying your application might preveat you from being hired or cause you to lose time and money." People can get information about applying for a social security number by calling or writing any social security office. "You should apply for your social security number at least several weeks before you need it for a job," Savrin said. "When you don't recall having had a social security number before, your application is screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure a second number to make sure a second number isn't issued to you. And screening takes time "

isn't issued to you. And screening takes time." A worker builds disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to his social security number. He gets credit if he's paid \$50 on more in a 3-menth celerdar muarter in work

he's paid \$50 or more in a 3-month calendar quarter in work covered by social security. More than nine out of 10 jobs are covered by social security. "Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life." Savrin noted. "When you get a job covered by social security, be sure your employer copies your name and number correctly from your social security card to his records." record

People applying for a social security number for the first time security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship, ac-cording to Savrin. The Mineola social security office is at 1 Station Plaza North.

It was our feeling then, as it is now, that the development of both parcels at the same time would avoid costly duplication of time and effort and would provide residents with the most cohesive plans and finest recreational facilitie

The of the first actions of the TAsk Force was to poll the residents of the Park District, whose boundaries are the same as those of the local school district.

as those of the local school district. Mr. Willard's information regarding the number of questionnares sent out and the number returned is incorrect. Also incorrect is his assertion that the return on the poll was insufficient for the determination of responsible conclusions. 
