Gas Fumes Fell Firemen

Leaking Sulfur-Dioxide gas from a house at 15 Field Ave. caused the hospitalization of 5 Hicksville firemen and 2 other men. Hicksville firemen responded to the alarm on Aug. 15 at 6:54 PM. Upon arrival firemen were met by a Lico serviceman. Lico informed the Vamps it was not Lico gas. But sulfur dioxide leaking for some time from a large refrigeration unit in the basement. Firemen wearing self-contained breathing apparatus managed after some time to get the unit outside. In the process the 5 Vamps and 2 others became sick from the fumes. The air masks did not help much against this gas. Firemen R. McAvoy 63, Lt. W. Schuckman Co. 8, M. Pohlmann Co. 7, R. Chiz Co. 7, J. MacMahon Jr. Coy were transported to Central General Hospital along with Mr. J. Giorgio and Mr. H. Brooks both of Hicksville. All were treated and released. In an attempt to rescue the family cat, McAvoy was bitten and received a Tetanus shot for his efforts. The Vamps were on the scene for 2 hours.

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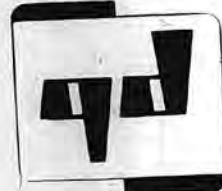
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Federal Grant Renewed For Srs.

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso has announced renewal of a \$646,708 federal grant to the Department of Senior Citizens Affairs, through the New York State Office for the Aging under Title III of the Older Americans Act of 1965.

The award, for the period from July 1, 1975 through June 30, 1976, will make possible the continuation and expansion of services to Nassau County elderly rendered by seven public and private non-profit agencies under sub-contract with the Department. It will also facilitate the addition of a home maintenance and winterization program for low-income eligible elderly.

In cooperation with the Economic Opportunity Commission, the Nassau County Office of Manpower Development and the Vocational Educational Extension Board, a Home Maintenance and Winterization Project will be launched. This program is aimed at lessening the impact of the energy crisis on seniors, providing employment and training for older workmen, and reducing the cost of living which plagues those living on fixed incomes. A twelve-man Home Handyman Corps composed of men age 60 and over, and funded under the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) will be trained to do basic repair and winterization work on the homes of eligible senior citizens. It is anticipated that over 700 homes will be winterized and repaired during the 1975-76 funding year. A community outreach program will identify the homes, and the trained Handyman Corps will be deployed in six units in three separate geographic locations which have large concentrations of low-income elderly.

At a meeting of the Department's Title III Technical Review Committee on July 10, 1975, decisions were made to renew and expand contracts with the following agencies:

1) **FAMILY SERVICE ASSOCIATION** for a crisis-intervention and counseling service called "Project AID" (Aged in Distress). This service provides periodic follow-up contacts, back-up services such as mental health and debt counseling. Home visits are made when necessary by specially trained staff to resolve immediately critical problems. Under the renewed funding, an Energy Crisis Emergency Fund will be established for the purpose of assisting senior citizens who are financially unable to make their fuel or public utility payments.

2) **NASSAU COUNTY LAW SERVICE COMMITTEE, INC.** Free or low-cost legal services (civil matters only) are provided for Nassau County residents age 60 and over who have modest incomes and are therefore not eligible for Legal Aid Services, yet cannot afford the regular fees of a private attorney. An attorney is available at scheduled times at the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs main office in Carle Place, at its branch offices in Freeport, Long Beach and Roslyn, and on its Seniormobile. For the year 1975-76 a coordinator will recruit and organize a volunteer corps of retired attorneys, themselves senior citizens, to expand the availability of free legal service to eligible older persons.

3) **STATE UNIVERSITY AT FARMINGDALE, DEPARTMENT OF NURSING** "Seniors Helping Seniors" is a unique program to train senior citizens to serve as paid Home Health Aides for elderly confined to their homes due to poor health. An eight-week twice-yearly training session at the University's Nursing Laboratory teaches techniques necessary to provide

home health care. In addition to offering an opportunity to earn income and teaching new skills to seniors, it helps keep those elderly who require the services of Home Health Aides to remain at home rather than being institutionalized.

4) **JEWISH ASSOCIATION FOR SERVICES FOR THE AGED (JASA)** A direct service program to help the elderly of Long Beach to live independently within the community for as long as possible. Homemakers, housekeepers provide, on a one-at-a-time basis, routine household tasks such as shopping, preparing meals, and cleaning for eligible elderly without cost or on a voluntary contribution basis. In situations requiring more than once-weekly visits, JASA helps to pay the cost of commercial housekeepers. During 1975-76, concerted efforts will be made toward establishing linkages with consumer groups of minority older persons. An outreach worker will be added to the staff, particularly to service minority elderly.

5) **AMERICAN RED CROSS, NASSAU CHAPTER** Portal-to-portal transportation is provided to Long Beach senior citizens who, because of monetary or medical handicaps, are unable to use available transportation facilities. Scheduling of vehicle is through the Long Beach Office of the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs. During 1975-76, the program will be expanded to provide similar services to older persons living in the Freeport-Roseville area.

6) **SOUTH NASSAU COMMUNITIES HOSPITAL** A new Geriatric Health Center has been established, offering comprehensive health maintenance to senior citizens from low-income and minority groups in the Oceanside, Freeport, Rockville Centre, Roosevelt, Baldwin, and Island Park areas. Transportation to and from the Center is provided, as well as outreach medical and mental health counseling, education and referral. During 1975, about 2000 persons participated in outreach health education, health screenings and referral programs.

7) **MENTAL HEALTH CENTER OF NORTHEAST NASSAU** An outreach program provides home health care, medical supervision and homemaker services to senior citizens in the Glen Cove, Sea Cliff, Glen Head, Bayville, Oyster Bay and Syosset areas. Also provided is mental health care through crisis intervention, continuing therapy, and preventive education. During 1975, over 1,100 seniors received health care services. To help prevent institutionalization, medical supervision is provided by the Visiting Nurse Association and Public Health Nurses. Homemaker services are provided during crisis situations to those elderly enrolled in this program. During the coming year, priority will be given to minority outreach efforts. A Consumer Advisory Board will also be established.

In announcing the grant renewal, County Executive Caso said, "We are gratified that the federal government has recognized that Nassau County is committed mind and heart to the development of programs to meet the needs of its older citizens - the fastest growing segment of our population."

As the designated Area Agency on Aging for Nassau County the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs has organized a service delivery system through eight sub-areas on aging with staff operating out of field offices in Carle Place, Freeport, Long Beach, Roslyn and a traveling information unit called "The Seniormobile."

During the coming year, the Department plans to organize and develop community Area Councils on Aging for the purpose of pooling resources, determining gaps in service and encouraging the development of coordinated proposals for additional funding. These Area Councils will be composed of representatives of community groups, senior citizen organizations and members of public and private non-profit agencies, as well as Department staff professionals.

Names of contest winners will be announced at the Lakeside Theatre (Parking Field No. 6) in Eisenhower Park, East Meadow, on Sunday, Aug. 24 (raindate, Aug. 31), beginning at 4 p.m. In addition to the exhibit of photographs, the film, "An Evening with Nikon", an interpretation of Spain and Portugal by two American photographers, will be shown at the Theatre.

Nassau residents of all ages may submit one photo in black and white and one in color, with mounted prints enlarged from original negatives. Size must range from a minimum of 5 x 7 to a maximum of 11 x 14. Slides are not acceptable.

Photos may be in any of the following areas: animals, scenery, portraits, or original creations. Entry number, name, address, and picture title must be on the back of each print. The original negatives must be presented before awards are made.

The prizes will be awarded by Ehrenreich Photo and the Optical Industries, Inc., co-sponsor of the event with the County's Department of Recreation and Parks.

Computer Aids Police

A new computerized teletype communications system has been put into use by the Nassau County Police Department and local village departments.

The system which utilizes the New York State Police Identification Network computer in Albany consists of 36 Data-40 computer terminals placed in different locations throughout the county. These high speed terminals give each location access to files contained in various computers around the country and the ability to send messages to any other criminal justice agency in the United States.

The speed at which the system operates is what makes it unique. Each terminal will send and receive messages at the rate of 1200 characters per minute. Under the old system the teletypes operated at the rate of 100 characters per minute.

Another feature which will be available in the near future is the ability of each terminal to make direct inquiries of individual state motor vehicle computers. When completed, a terminal will receive information on an out of state vehicle in approximately 12 seconds.

The new system will give the police officer in the field quick access to vital information such as wanted and missing persons, stolen vehicles, bicycles, boats

Uncover Billing Abuses

The Nassau County Medicaid Investigative Team has uncovered more than a half million dollars in billing abuses in its first year of existence.

County Executive Ralph G. Caso praised the work of the team he established last August to "assure that health care dollars are being properly spent."

The Medicaid Investigative Team includes accounting and systems staff from the Department of Social Services and administrative and medical personnel from the Health Department. Additional professional members are available to the term "on call."

The claims of all providers of Medicaid care — physicians, dentists, chiropractors, psychologists, pharmacists, nursing homes, — come under scrutiny.

The team's one-year report to Caso, cites some 53 providers — representing more than 30,000 claims submitted over the course of a year — who have been specifically investigated. Abuses uncovered — and billings reduced — amounted to more than \$524,000.

The investigative team referred six cases to the District Attorney's office for possible criminal action. To date, two have resulted in indictments and the others are under investigation.

One provider improperly billed the county for approximately \$150,000. In addition to his suspension from the Medicaid program, all payments have been withheld and the matter was

referred to the District Attorney.

Five providers have been disqualified from the Medicaid program. Nine cases have been referred to the legal office of the Department of Social Services for follow-up investigation.

Candidates for close scrutiny by the investigative team are Medicaid "storefronts" or "mills." The report estimates savings of as much as \$47,000, through percentage reduction of over-billings from these multiple-service operations.

(Specific names are withheld pending possible legal action.)

An average of 100-125,000 claims are received monthly by the Nassau County Department of Social Services medical payments section.

While results of some of the investigations of suspected billing abuses go to the District Attorney's office for possible criminal action, the majority of the recommendations from the team result in civil action: suspension of the provider; reduction in billing amount; corrections, warnings.

Emphasizing that "not all Medicaid billing offenses are clear cut," Caso stressed the preventive aspect of the team's work. "The fact that Nassau County has such a Task Force actively auditing all Medicaid bills is a formidable restraint on possible violators."

Social Services Commissioner Joseph D'Elia and Health Commissioner John Dowling urged anyone who suspects a fraudulent billing action on the part of any Medicaid provider to call 535-2835.

Beware 'Antique' Firearms

The Nassau County Police Department and the District Attorney's Office have become aware of the unlawful sale and possession of certain firearms by firearms dealers and residents of Nassau County under the belief or guise that such firearms were exempt under the antique firearms section.

In 1974, the legislature amended the definition of "firearm" in Section 265.00(3) of the Penal Law of the State of New York to exclude certain antique firearms from the licensing requirements of the law.

Section 265.00(14) Penal Law defines an antique firearm as "any unloaded muzzle-loading pistol or revolver with a matchlock, flintlock, percussion cap, or similar type of ignition system, or a pistol or revolver which uses fixed cartridges which are no longer available in the ordinary channels of commercial trade."

Either through misinformation, misinterpretation, or disregard of the law, certain firearms not complying with aforementioned section have been sold and purchased as antique and or replicas of antique firearms.

The firearms in question are black powder replica revolvers which when loaded are capable of and guns, proceeds of crimes and other data.

The new system has direct contact with NCIC (National Crime Information Center) in Washington, D.C.; DCJS (Department of Criminal Justice Service) in Albany; the National Auto Theft Bureau; the New York State Motor Vehicle Bureau, and the Law Enforcement Telecommunications System in Phoenix, Arizona.

It is also linked directly to 12 other states in the nation and eventually all 50 states will be hooked in.

To help facilitate the system's operation the County Department's Communications Bureau has inaugurated a continuous

firing six shots in rapid succession. One of the requirements of the Antique Law that is not complied with by these weapons is the "muzzle-loading" aspect which means the firearm must be loaded only through the muzzle end of the barrel where the projectile exits.

Firearm dealers failing to comply with this law and all laws relating to the sale of firearms will be forthwith arrested. Persons who have made purchases of these firearms under the belief that they were exempt as antiques will be permitted to bring the weapons to the Pistol License Section of the Records Bureau, Nassau County Police Headquarters, 1490 Franklin Avenue, Mineola, New York for inspection as to its category at any time prior to September 15, 1975.

Those firearms found to be possessed in violation of law will be invoiced to the Police Property Bureau for safekeeping with the owner having the option of:

- (a) applying for pistol permit if eligible
- (b) selling the gun to a lawful holder of pistol permit
- (c) having the gun lawfully deactivated otherwise the firearm will be destroyed in accordance with the law.

Dear Editor:

Thumbs were turned down on our June school budget vote. Why then did the subsequent vote, held in August, lump all propositions except the one for the cafeteria, under proposition No. 1? This to me seemed a poor way of letting all of us express our wishes to the garbled wants of the

school board, and hurt those of us who did not want certain items to go through. It especially caused a hardship for the elderly homeowner, to whom even \$5.00 a month means a great deal. We are being squeezed in a vise and are now being subjected to another turn of the screw by our own residents. Levying school taxes on us after age 65 is a gross inequity. My husband, a World War I veteran with overseas service, and I, though childless, have paid school taxes for 45 years in Hicksville. We helped pay for one set of schools, then in 1949 were asked to pay for still more school buildings etc. The fair way to levy school taxes, would be to levy on those whose children attend school, so much per head, but not on the property owners who already pay property taxes. Our 50 percent school exemption may have been of great help years ago, but not now anymore, what with taxes spiraling and our fixed income dollar shrinking. We are a far cry from the happy Alice in Won-

derland faces that the general populace sees on T.O.B. circulars for the elderly. As far as General taxes are concerned, the elderly get very little exemption, especially Hicksville elderly, on account of the heavy special district taxes for Hicksville residents. Most of the Sr. citizens have had to look to part time employment for a supplement, because we are on the borderline financially and cannot get supplemental social security. We have had to curtail checkups (medical and dental), prescription drugs and food. There are no LUXURY items we can do without to pay for the increase in taxes.

I believe the giant octopus to the west of us has finally, ideologically and otherwise, reached into our community, and his tentacles will eventually strangle us."

Historical Walk

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that Dorothy Horton McGee will lead a Historical Walk through Oyster Bay hamlet on Sunday, August 24, leaving at 2 p.m. from the Wightman House, 20 Summit Street, Oyster Bay.

"The historic walk conducted by Miss McGee last year proved most interesting, entertaining and informative," Burke said. "The historical detail she supplied was amazing."

Miss McGee is the Chairman of the Oyster Bay Historical Society and the Town of Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. Her theme for this year's walk will be "The American Revolution in Oyster Bay."

Leaving from the historic Wightman House, built c. 1720, which, from its original site nearby, witnessed the American Revolution, the group will proceed to the Fort Hill property, recently accepted for preservation by the Town of Oyster Bay. This property encompasses the eastern side of an original British Fort. Adjoining it is the Townsend burial ground, dating back to the 17th Century. It is here that Robert Townsend, George Washington's chief spy during the Revolution, is buried.

Another old burial ground, with its historical headstones, will be visited on the way to Raynham Hall, built c. 1740. This preserved structure was the home of Samuel Townsend, member of the New York Provincial Congress, and father of the National Register of Historic Sites. Raynham Hall was occupied by Col. Simcoe of the Queen's Rangers and was visited several times by the notorious British spy, John Andre. The group will tour the grounds, and incidents that took place in Oyster Bay hamlet during the Revolution will be recalled.

After touching other historic points in the village, the tour will conclude at Christ Church Parish Hall, 61 East Main Street, where coffee will be served to the walkers. A similar tour last year drew a group of more than a hundred people despite poor weather conditions.

District Attorney Establishes Major Offense Bureau

Denis Dillon, District Attorney of Nassau County has announced that a Major Offense Bureau (M.O.B.) established to combat an increase in violent crime; to focus resources on habitual offenders and to restrict plea bargaining in these cases, will

become operational in his office on September 1.

Dillon said "I believe that the best deterrent is swift and certain punishment, and the aim of this bureau is to move these cases from arrest to disposition in 90 days".

He noted that recent police statistics show an increase in violent crime in the County, and that a study made in his office of 395 indictments (441 defendants) returned in 1974, for serious robbery, burglary, rape, sodomy, assault and attempted murder

showed that to date only 162 of offenders received any prison time (68 cases are still open). Also, 75 per cent of these cases took longer than 90 days to move through the system to disposition. Dillon said that due to felony screening which evaluates felony

indictments, the overall number of indictments has declined since last year, but, there has been an increase in the number of indictments on these violent crimes. M.O.B. will be staffed by seven experienced attorneys.
