## Road Work Continues On Route 106

Southbound 106 drivers who have been unnerved by the new entry into southbound 107, north of Jericho Turnpike, can relax. For them, the detour isn't permanent, according to State Senator Ralph J. Marino.

Responding to complaints about the so-called improvement diverting 106 traffic into a new loop that lacks its own merge lane into 107, the Oyster Bay Lawmaker announced that the connection will be used exclusively by 106 drivers who want to go westbound on Jericho Turnpike.

"Southbound travellers will continue to use the old connection into 107," said

Marino. "It will be re-opened in September, after construction of a concrete lane divider separating the merge lane from oncoming traffic."

The new loop, immediately north of the old connection, allows Jericho Turnpike bound autos more distance to weave across to the right southbound lane and enter for Route 25 in greater safety.

"Within a matter of

weeks, the routes will be marked with explicit signs directing drivers into either the old southbound ramp or new westbound loop.

"The Department of Transportation will proceed as fast as it can. Until construction is complete, I urge caution for all southbound drivers along that route, for safety's sake," said

Marino.

Ford issued his proposed budget of \$349 billion it reflected budget cuts in several important areas of Federal aid to education: a 50 percent cut in aid for handicapped children (from \$100 million to \$50 million), abolished drug education funds entirely, and this estimated Federal budget of 349 billion contains less than 2 percent for education. Mrs. Jones feels that individual letters, phone calls or even telegrams to your Congressman will be effective. We agree on this. So, if you do not wish federal aid to education to be so curtailed, why not contact your Congressman immediately and let him know just how you feel. In Hicksville he is

If that doesn't do it, we can move away and some of us will out of town, or to the local cemetery or

eat the bitter bread of welfare.

Said amendments provide for the lowering of the permitted height of buildings in "G" Business Districts to thirty-five (35) feet and of projections, except those mandated by state law, to fifteen (15) feet; and require the enclosure of elevator or stair bulkheads, mechanical equipment, water towers and similar equipment with a minimum setback of twenty (20) feet from the edge of the roof and to occupy an area not to exceed twenty percent (20 percent) of the roof area and a height not to exceed twelve (12) feet; and said amendments being as follows:

A. Amend SEC. 490. Height, of Division 3 "G" Business District (General Business) of Article VI. Commercial Districts to read as follows:

Sec. 490 Height

In a "G" Business District, no building hereafter erected or altered shall exceed thirty-five (35) feet in height.

B. Amend SEC. 1. Definitions, of Article 1 in General by substituting the following as and for the definition of the height of a building as presently defined therein:

The height of a building shall be the distance measured from the mean average grade of the ground surrounding the building to a point midway between the highest and lowest points of the

roof. However, State mandates parapet walls; and chimneys, spires and similar projections not in excess of fifteen (15) feet above the roof, shall be excluded in measuring the height of a building. Elevator or stair bulkheads, mechanical equipment, water towers and similar equipment shall be enclosed or screened and shall be setback a minimum of twenty (20) feet from the edge of the roof; and the aggregate area covered by such enclosures or screened areas shall not exceed twenty percent (20 percent) of the roof area; and the total height of such penthouse enclosures or screened areas shall not be in excess of twelve (12) feet above the roof.

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## New Disaster Control Plan In Effect For Nassau County

A disaster control plan has been formulated by the Nassau County Police Department and the county Fire Commission aimed at providing a quick and effective response to any local emergency.

The main thrust of the plan is toward the immediate assumption of control of operations by local authorities and the establishment of coordinated action by all groups concerned. Guidelines for such an

operation have been set down in a manual which was officially approved by Police Commissioner Louis J. Frank and Rudolph C. Fischer, former Chairman of the Nassau County Fire Commission.

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso termed the plan the most "comprehensive set of guidelines" established by any major municipality to cope with a possible disaster.

The manual was completed

recently following months of consultation between the Department and the Fire Commission and sets down procedures to be followed in emergency situations arising from "limited area disasters."

## Art Show

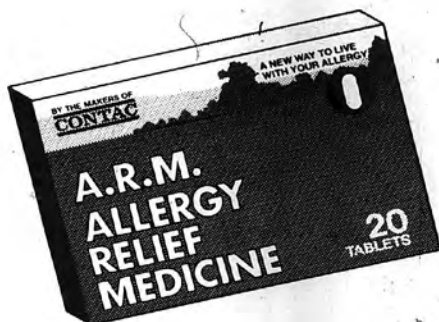
