'No Tax Increase'Budget

TOB Supervisor John W.Burkeasked the Town Board to schedule day and evening hearings on the 1976 Town budget at last week's Board meeting. Burke announced that his proposal "contains no increase in the General, Highway and Part-Town tax rates.

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"After many weeks of meetings with Department heads, we were able to trim neads, we were able to trim spending enough to assure tax-payers that they will not face an increase next year," Burke continued.

continued.

Citing both inflated prices and the negotiated costs of salaries and benefits, including a cost-of-living clause which takes effect next year, Burke said that a "no-tax-increase budget has been defently to a cost of the co difficult to achieve.

difficult to achieve.
"Our success in doing so is a result of stringent belt-tightening which will allow to minimize spending which will allow to minimize spending while still providing for necessary services," the Town Supervisor continued.

He said that increased costs would require continuation of the job freeze. He noted that because of the higher restrictions he op-

of the hiring restrictions he or-dered more than a year ago, approximately 40 full-time positions have been eliminated in the 1976 budget but layoffs will not be required since these are positions that were vacated in the

positions that were vacated in the past and were not filled during the freeze.

"Our belt-tightening measures haven't been easy to live with, but I know the absolute importance of keeping spending to abare minimum. Every department and division has responded admirably," Burke remarked, "in maintaining a high level of performance for the public by

improving their own efficiency. They have been doing the job - even though they have less than the usual complement of personnel or equipment - and will continue to do so because the economic factors that brought on

economic factors that brought on the freeze have hardly changed."

Burke noted that greater use of computers will help some Town offices to keep pace with their work despite the possible loss and non-replacement of personnel. "In some cases the greater use of computers is already helping to save us money in one area so we will be able to maintain or im-prove a service where costs may prove a service where costs may have jumped," Burke said. Last week the Town began processing its own payroll as part of its expanded computer capacities and this could mean a savings of

and this could mean a savings of up to \$10,000 a year. The continuation of strict regulation regarding overtime authorization will be on-going. Burke said, as will the many smaller efficiency improvements that many staff members have devised to help themselves to be more productive.

The 1976 Preliminary Budget which the Board voted on on Tuesday set for public hearing, reflects the same 77.5-cent tax rate per \$100 assessed valuation as this year's rate for the General Town Tax. The total General Town Budget is approximately \$16.3 million or about \$300,000 higher than the current budget. si6.3 million or about 5300,000 higher than the current budget. The Highway Budget also maintains the current tax rate of 71.2 cents per \$100 assessed valuation as does the Part-Town Building, Zoning, Planning and Development) budget maintain the current 9.6 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.



She recommended additional, semipermanent, trash cans be placed in conspicuous places in conspicuous places to relieve the poorly kept public areas.



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AMENDMENT TO THE BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, That the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, as amended and revised, and now set forth as Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby amended in the following respects:

A. Sec. 490. Height. of Division 3 "G" Business District (General Business) of Article VI. Commercial Districts is hereby amended to read as follows:


