The Community Orchestra of Hicksville will start its 16th season with a concert on Thursday Evening, Nov. 13, at 8:15 P.M., in the Auditorium of the Hicksville Senior High School, in Hicksville, N.Y.

The concert will be under the direction of the orchestra's founder and conductor, Dr. Charles F. Gouse, and will feature Soprano Judith Clurman who will sing Mozart's "Exsultate Jubilate" and the aria "Let the Bright Seraphim" from Handel's Samson.

Ms. Clurman was raised in Hicksville and at present is a student of Hans Heinz at The Julliard School. Her performance activities include oratorio, recital, and opera workshop appearances throughout the Eastern United States; appearing with the Little Orchestra Society and The Rutgers Symphony Orchestra. She studied and performed at the Temple University Music Festival and Institute in Ambler, Pa.

Turkey Trots

Thanksgiving gobblers will be trotted home by lucky winners of two Annual Country Turkey Trots, one in Cantiague Park, W. John St., Hicksville, and the second at Eisenhower Park in East Meadow. Both races are co-sponsored by the County's Department of Recreation and Parks and local stores and are open to Nassau County residents with Leisure Passes only.

At Cantiague, Junior and Senior High School boys and girls will race a mile and a half and three miles, respectively, in separate events, on Saturday, Nov. 15 (raindate, Nov. 16), beginning at 11 a.m. Trophies will be awarded by the Recreation Department, and turkeys for the top winners will be donated by the co-sponsor of the event, the West John St. Deli.

The Eisenhower Park Turkey Trot starts at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 23, rain or shine, and will be run off on the park's cross country course, beginning near the roller rink (parking field No. 4). Boys and girls age 14-15 will compete separately over a one-mile course; boys 16-18 will race two miles; and men 19 and over, three miles. At Eisenhower Park, turkeys for the first place winners will be donated by Zorn's Poultry Farms, with trophies awarded by the Recreation Department to those who place 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each race.

Appoint Citizens Committee

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today announced that five prominent Nassau residents have agreed to serve on a citizens committee to rally support for legislation that would significantly increase the federal government's financial commitment to welfare services.

The announcement was made at a New York City Hall news conference called to show the widespread support for a bill sponsored by Rep. Bella Abzug and Sen. Jacob Javits that would raise the federal government's participation in Medicaid and aid to dependent children costs from 50 to 75 per cent.

Caso joined Mayor Beame, Rep. Abzug and other local government officials from the tri-state region to announce a concerted government-citizen effort to secure swift passage of the bill.

"One of the major causes of the fiscal problems confronting New York City and county governments throughout the state is the cost of welfare," Caso said. "If we can get the federal government to recognize its responsibility to do more in this area, then

we will have made a giant step forward in alleviating the present financial crisis."

Caso pointed out that the Abzug-Javits welfare reform bill would provide up to \$1.2 billion annually for New York State and \$750 million for New York City and \$22 million for Nassau County.

To the Editor:

Another threat to the fiscal stability of local government looms on the horizon. A letter from Congressman Norman Lent advises that reenactment of the Federal Revenue Sharing Program by Congress is in jeopardy. Representative Lent bases his warnings on opposition being expressed by a number of influential Congressmen during hearings being conducted on the reenactment by the Subcommittee on Intergovernmental Relations of the House of Governmental Operations Committee.

Subcommittee Chairman L. H. Fountain has publicly asserted that reenactment of this important bill will not occur during this calendar year. He added that municipalities should adjust their budgetary planning for 1976 and 1977 to accommodate any disruption in funding that may result.

Since 1972, Federal Revenue Sharing funds have assisted municipalities to meet the demands for both public services and prudent fiscal management. The Town of Oyster Bay, as well

as other municipalities throughout the nation, have been able to enhance services to meet the needs of the people through revenue sharing funding. Many of these programs would have to be sharply curtailed, or even eliminated, if federal funding becomes unavailable. This would more than likely also result in an increase in local taxes.

As Congressman Lent points out in his letter, the severity of the situation should not be underestimated. Unless Congress acts affirmatively on revenue sharing this year, funding will

become the subject of a yearly tug-of-war in which partisan politics will play a major role.

We have joined with other Towns on Long Island in urging our representatives in Congress to actively pursue the reenactment of the Federal Revenue Sharing Program to prevent any erosion of the fiscal integrity of local governments. I encourage residents of the unincorporated area of the Town as well as Village residents, whose local governments would also be adversely affected, to do likewise.

Invalid, 67 Rescued By Vamps

A 67 yr. old invalid man was rescued from his burning second floor apartment by 2 Hicksville Fire officers.

On Saturday Nov. 1 at 6:00 PM Hicksville Fireman responded to a reported house fire at 118 E. Marie St. Enroute the Vamps were notified by their dispatcher that an invalid was in the dwelling. Fire Lts K. Brady & R. Telender of Co No 3, first on the scene, made their way through smoke to the second floor apartment of Ozzie Arndt. Arndt was found suffering from smoke inhalation and was taken from the building. In the process Lt. Telender sustained a twisted ankle.

Firemen hailed a passing 2nd

Pet. County Police ambulance and both Arndt & Telender were transported to Central General Hospital in Plainview where they were treated & released. The second floor was heavily damaged. The fire was believed to have been caused by careless smoking.

"I am disturbed that James Schlesinger has been forced to step down from his post as Defense Secretary. We cannot afford a single, monolithic point of view in planning our national security policies. This process must involve diplomatic considerations, which are the concern of the Secretary of State, and also, security considerations which are the concern of the Secretary of Defense. It is incompatible with the aims of the National Security Council to have one man wear two hats whether he is the Secretary of State or the Secretary of Defense."

Bank Frauds

Island Federal Savings has
learned through the NYS
Banking Department that the US
Immigration and Naturalization
Service has been informed that a
confidence group of Canadian
criminals plans to enter the
United States with the object of
committing bank frauds.

The primary target of these
criminals is elderly people with
large bank accounts. Travelling
in groups of four or five people
posing at bank officials, police
officers or bank examiners, these
criminals generally obtain in-
formation concerning deposit
balances directly from the in-
tended victim. If the victim has
sufficient funds in their account,
they are asked to withdraw the
funds and take the money home
with them. Either on route to, or
at the victim's residence, the
money is taken from the victim
under the pretext of returning the
money to their account. At this
point both the money and the
people disappear.
