Little Known Facts About American Revolution

HELP FROM FRANCE
Benjamin Franklin spent much of his time in France during the American Revolution soliciting support from the French. He was a favorite at the French Court, especially with the ladies.

Before France entered the Revolution on the side of the Americans, Franklin secured the support of the playwright-financier, Caron de Beaumarchais, who said to him, "I propose to serve your country as if it were my own." The Frenchman gathered guns, powder, clothing and blankets and sent them to the Americans. In New

England a grateful patriot said in August 1777, "Drew 5 more French arms and bayonets."

Finally on February 6, 1778 the French joined with the Americans to fight Great Britain. They were no doubt not only influenced by Franklin but by the Americans' victory at Saratoga.

The alliance with France France was read on the grand parade ground at Valley Forge on May 6, 1778. Plans for the parade to celebrate the announcement were made by Baron Von Steuben, Washington's drill master.

The county has requested \$157,835 for the solar energy project to be installed on the third floor roof of the County Executive Building in Mineola, under technical direction of Polytech engineers.

County Plugs For Solar Energy

Nassau County has filed a request for \$157,835 in federal funds for a solar energy research project, County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced today.

The solar heat demonstration unit would be set up on the third floor roof of the County Executive Building at 1 West St., Mineola, under a sub-contract with Polytechnic Institute of New York.

"One purpose of this project is to gather test data on the application of solar energy in the Long Island area," Caso said. "The information and findings will be shared with other researchers, with industry and the community."

The request for the grant from the U.S. Energy Research and Development Administration has been forwarded to Washington through the Nassau General Services Department Bureau of Energy Resources. If approved, the estimate is that the solar energy system could be functioning in less than two years.

Its first phase would be supplying hot water and space heating to the fourth and fifth floors of the County Executive Building. Next it would supply supplementary heat and air conditioning for the entire building.

The proposal was prepared by the energy bureau and Dr. Richard S. Thorsen, head of the Mechanical Engineering Department of Polytechnic and energy coordinator for the institute.

Under the plan, Polytechnic would provide engineering and test services as a subcontractor in the amount of \$165,430. The rest of the federal funds, \$193,405, would be used for equipment, installation and preparation for the project.

The plan would be to install 170 solar energy collector panels on the building roof.

Nassau General Services Commissioner Francis E. O'Connor, who is the county's energy coordinator, will be designated the project director upon ERDA approval. Dr. Thorsen and his staff from Polytechnic will provide the engineering services and county heating and ventilation technicians will attend the system's functions.

Cast Call Extended

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond this week announced that auditions for an original Bicentennial play based on Raynham Hall's role in the American Revolution will be held on Thursday, December 11 and Monday, December 15, at the Syosset-Woodbury Community Park Center, 7800 Jericho Turnpike, Woodbury.

Auditions, which are open to all Town of Oyster Bay residents, will run from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M. both nights. The cast requires eight (8) men and three (3) women. People with theatrical experience (props, lights, costumes, etc.) are also needed. Rehearsals, which will begin right after the first of the year, will be held one night a week with production scheduled for the spring. Performances will run two or three nights a week for a period of six to eight weeks.

The play, **THE SPIRIT OF RAYNHAM HALL**, by David Litt, is being produced under the auspices of the Cultural and Performing Arts Division (CAPA) in cooperation with the Town's Bicentennial Commission. It will be directed by Marilyn Rosen, CAPA's drama coach and a professional actress with many off-Broadway and summer stock productions to her credit.

Town Board Meeting

At first glance, one would have expected the Town Board Meeting held Tuesday, Dec. 2nd, to be a long drawn out affair, however, despite the presence of approximately 75 people in the audience the entire meeting concluded at 12:25.

The first item on the agenda was a Hearing on the Petition of Gerald Monter for a change of Zone from Res B and Res D to E-1 Apartment House District, Glen Head, N.Y. The Petitioner was represented by Herb Ballin, who lightly touched upon the basics of the Petition since the Hearing was to be continued that evening at 8:00 P.M. Council Ballin did remark to some degree however that the 260, 2-bedroom apartment complex would contain recreational facilities that would include indoor and outdoor pool and tennis courts. The majority of the people in attendance were present to voice their objection to the petition. Among those who approached the Board were Herbert Schmidt, Pres. No. Shore Bd of Ed., Mr. L. O'Brien representing Todd Estates Civic Assoc., Thomas Bradley, Sergio Stella and several others. The hearing was not closed but adjourned until the evening session.

The 2nd consideration on the calendar was a Hearing to

consider proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances Town of Oyster Bay relative to Inflatable Structures. There was no opposition to the Hearing and it was closed and decision reserved.

Item No. 3 was a Hearing to consider proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances in T.O.B. relative to Motor Vehicle and Traffic Rules and Regulations. The villages and hamlets to be affected are East Norwich, Glenwood Landing, Locust Valley, Syosset and Woodbury. Basically the proposal pertained to the installation of Stop Signs and Prohibited Parking areas. Locally, Miller Place and Marlene Drive in Syosset were to be affected.

Speaking in protest of the installation of no parking areas in Glen Head was Mr. Tom Shore, proprietor of the Wooden Ship Inn. According to Mr. Shore, the amendment was being specifically directed at his business operation and appealed to the Board to further review the area prior to a decision. Mr. Dean Scheu and Mr. William Brill spoke in favor of the amendment.

The final Hearing of the day was to consider amendments to the Code of Ordinances relative to Motor Vehicles and Traffic Rules in Bethpage, Hicksville, Massapequa and South Far-

mingdale. Mr. Nicolas Bianca of So. Farmingdale spoke at length relative to the serious situation that exists in So. Farmingdale at the shopping center on Merritt Blvd at the intersection of Motor Ave. After his thorough presentation Supervisor Burke asked several questions and promised he would personally review the situation.

The balance of the calendar consisted of 21 Resolutions that were passed in quick succession. The formal meeting was concluded at 11:42.

In the informal meeting that followed among those who addressed the Board were Phyllis Singer and Judy Jacobs.

Mrs. Jacobs requested that the board review the feasibility of installing Stop Signs on Cypress Rd. and Hunting Hill Rd, Colgate Lane and Kristi Lane intersection, and Glen Drive all in Woodbury.

Mrs. Jacobs requested that the board in granting further new permits for construction in the industrial complex of Froelich Farms refuse to permit any additional curb cuts into Woodbury Rd. and design an internal network of roads within the park itself for access to the present exits onto Woodbury Rd.

The informal meeting concluded at 12:25.

Nassau GOP

"No Commuter Tax Increase City Homeowners Taxes Should Equal Nassau's"

There will be no increase in the tax on commuters this year due to the efforts of the 12 Nassau Republican state legislators, according to Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta spokesman for the delegation.

Nassau's Republican senators and assemblymen also beat back efforts to extend the commuter tax for five years as part of the proposed \$205-million city tax package, according to Margiotta.

"With many members of the New York City Council and many city legislators reluctant to vote for the taxes to help save the city, Governor Carey and the Democratic legislative leaders turned to the Nassau legislators for their votes to attempt to pass the \$205-million city tax package," Margiotta said.

"Despite strong pressure from the Governor, we opposed increasing the tax on commuters and extending for five years the tax, as we could not allow the commuter to be singled out once again to help New York City out of its fiscal mess."

"Governor Carey and New York City officials must be made to realize that the end of the dollar rainbow is not in suburbia. The suburban taxpayers are also struggling to meet their own tax bills. They cannot be called upon to dig deeper into their pocket-books to pay for the fiscal follies of the political leaders of New York City," he said.

"County Executive Caso and Supervisors Purcell and D'Amato, Tully and Burke were willing to take hard and un-

popular steps to help reduce spending in our town and county governments, and city administrators must do the same."

"The proposed \$205-million city tax package awaiting passage in the State Legislature is a fair and equitable package for New Yorkers, as it raises, among other things, the tax on homeowners in the city. City homeowners, unlike their suburban counterparts, can well afford an increase in their property tax, as they are now paying, in many instances, half as much in property taxes as Nassau homeowners with comparable homes. The commuter, however, can't afford an increase in the commuter tax, as it will force him to abandon the railroad in favor of the car," he said.

Appointed To Commission

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Joseph J. Saladino has announced the re-appointment of Marc Roncallo of Massapequa, and Jack Sumray of Syosset to the Town's American Revolution Bicentennial Commission.

The Commission was created in 1971 at the recommendation of Supervisor John W. Burke to encourage participation in the Nation's 200th birthday commemoration and to distinguish the particular role Oyster Bay Town played in the American Revolution. Miss Dorothy Horton McGee has served as the Commission's Chairman since its inception. Both the individuals re-appointed today will serve through October, 1978.

Other members of the Commission include: Ira Chinn and Mrs. Marjorie R. Post, both of Massapequa; Dr. Howard Imbel, Mrs. Miner Hill, William Johnston and John McGrath, all of Oyster Bay; Albert Wannon of Bethpage, Richard Evers of Hicksville, Mrs. John F. Budd, Jr. of Locust Valley, Martin Moran of Massapequa Park and Hon. Bernar McCaffrey of Plainview.

Town Public Hearings On Home Builders' Bonds

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke has announced that the Town Board will consider changes to Oyster Bay's Building Code designed to protect the initial deposit of buyers contracting for the construction of one and two-family homes. Enabling legislation permitting local municipalities to consider such provisions was adopted during the 1975 session of the State Legislature, Burke explained, and the Town Board has set a public hearing date of Tuesday, December 16th, to consider their adoption. If approved, the amendments would become effective January 1, 1976.

The provisions would require contractors to secure the deposits they receive from buyers for new residential construction either in the form of a bond filed with the chief fiscal officer of the Town (the Supervisor) or in an interest-bearing escrow account. In either case, the deposit would have to be secured within five business days after receipt of the deposit by the contractor.

Burke said the "default in connection with residential construction has been negligible in Oyster Bay Town. This happy circumstance, however, should not prevent the Town Board from considering provisions that strengthen the rights of future buyers contracting for such construction."

In the event of default, the contractor would be required to physically transfer the bond or escrow account to the buyer within fourteen business days after demand for return of the deposit was made.

The failure of the contractor to comply with any provision of the proposed Building Code amendments would permit the buyer to take legal action for the return of all monies advanced. Violation of the provisions would be also deemed a misdemeanor, thus permitting criminal recourse as well.

The December 16th hearing is part of the Town Board's regularly scheduled meeting and will begin at 10 A.M. in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East.

Dear Friends. . .

IT IS AN UNFORTUNATE SITUATION indeed, when violence erupts between a teacher and a student. Every case is undoubtedly different and difficult to judge. The present situation in Hicksville about which two parents have written LETTERS TO THE EDITOR, both with names withheld for obvious reasons, must have been a difficult one to decide, too. The Board of Education of this district voted unanimously to accept the finding of a panel, made up of a teacher, an administrator and a resident selected by the other two members. This panel found that the teacher's actions in this particular incident "exceeded the force necessary under the circumstances." The panel also found that the teacher did not use other methods of discipline open to all teachers. However the Board of Education voted 4-3 to accept the final recommendation of this three-member panel, that the teacher be fined \$1,000. A Board minority voted to suspend the teacher. All of this brings one thought to mind... is there any Board policy regarding such incidents? We believe there should be.

State Reimburses School Districts

The Nassau County Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) recently distributed \$1,939,750 in state aid reimbursements to the local school districts in Nassau County.

The payment was the third of six installments on an estimated \$16,725,000 that will be distributed to the districts during the 1975-76 school year.

The payments are reimbursements for BOCES services purchased by Nassau's school districts during the 1974-75 school year.

Under the BOCES state aid system, local school districts pay tuition and fees to send pupils to special and occupational education programs and to subscribe to data processing and other services provided by the cooperative board. The state then reimburses the district under a special formula through BOCES.

Reimbursements average about 53 per cent of the district's original cost, and are paid in the year after the costs are incurred.

BOCES aid payments are in addition to the regular state aid that local school districts receive directly from Albany.

An Open Letter To Hicksville Parents

As a parent of children in the Hicksville School system, I was appalled by the action taken at the Board meeting on Nov. 25, 1975, in reference to a tenured Jr. H.S. teacher Mr. Jerome McCarthy. An incident occurred in April 1975 in which Mr. McCarthy allegedly fractured the jaw of a 14 year old student. As a result it is alleged the student has suffered permanent damage to his jaw. A State Education Dept panel found the teacher guilty of all charges as presented and recommended a fine of only \$1,000.00. The School Bd. voted by a 4-3 margin to accept the recommendation and impose no further punishment.

Board members Mr. McCormack, Mr. Lari, Mr. Nagel and Mr. Arena have set a very

dangerous precedent in this case. In effect, they have given the teachers in this district carte blanche to treat students as their moods see fit. They might just as well have publicly stated to the faculty to put \$1,000 aside in case they have charges brought against them and are found guilty.

Mrs. Wolfson, Mr. Ayres and Mr. Bruno voted to have the teacher suspended for a period of time. They were over-ruled by the four other Board members. I believe the Board majority has shirked its responsibility to the children of this district. It seems unjust that such a teacher is still able to teach in a classroom knowing that he is very secure in his job. You can be sure that if the tables were reversed, and a student had injured a teacher, much stronger punitive action would have been taken.

"Let the Parent Beware" should become the motto of this district. The welfare and well-being of teachers not students is what is being looked after.

To The Editor:

When asked what single change Americans would like to see in their contact with government at all levels, the answer frequently heard is "tax reform." Earlier this year, Congress passed the Tax Reduction Act of 1975, providing needed individual and corporate tax cuts to spur a lagging economy and through efforts of the Democratic Caucus, removed one of the most infamous of the tax loopholes: the oil depletion allowance. Now, there is growing concern that the 94th Congress will fail to enact

any other meaningful or equitable tax reform that will benefit the average American wage-earner.

Unfortunately that concern may be borne out in the 674-page tax bill just reported from the Ways and Means Committee. In June, that Committee began hearings on comprehensive tax reform. But the feeling of some Committee Members, in supplemental views just filed, is that the Committee bill does little more than reshuffle tax loopholes and preferences. It makes permanent the 1975 tax law changes that raised the standard personal deduction to \$2,600 joint return and \$2,300 single taxpayers, and raises the minimum standard deduction to \$1,900 for joint returns and \$1,600 for single persons.

Committee proponents contend that the tax reform provisions will insure that people with highest incomes bear a reasonable share of the overall tax burden, and will increase tax equity at all levels of income. Supposedly, the bill will reduce key tax shelters and strengthen the requirement that all individuals pay at least some minimum tax on preference income. Despite this, majority views of the Committee plainly state that the bill does not represent a complete reform of tax laws. I agree — it does not. Nor does it come close, in the bill's present form. Fortunately, however, five amendments to be offered on the floor by dissenting Members of the Ways and Means Committee are aimed at strengthening the bill by eliminating artificial losses on real estate ventures, by no longer

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Busing Ban Shot Down

By Congressman Norman Lent

The House Democratic Caucus voted recently, by a nearly two to one margin, to scuttle a proposed Constitutional Amendment to ban busing of school children simply for the purpose of achieving racial balance. Because the Democrats control Congress by a 2-3 majority, this action means there is no hope for passage of an amendment to insure children of this country the right to attend neighborhood schools.

In defending the action of the Democratic Caucus — an action I believe contrary to the will of a majority of Americans of all races — Rep. Cardiss Collins (D-Illinois) said this is an issue which "cuts across traditional, party, regional, and philosophical lines." Thus far, we agree, but Rep. Collins goes on to commend the Democratic Caucus for killing the anti-busing amendment, and I condemn the Caucus for the very same action.

As many of you will remember, I led the fight against forced busing in the New York State Legislature, before going to Congress. That fight culminated

in passage of the Lent-Kunzman Act in 1969, which protected the children of New York State for 2 years, until it was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court. Since going to Washington, I have been pushing for the Constitutional Amendment which was once again turned down last month.

Rep. Collins defended busing on the floor of the House, but she chose to ignore some telling arguments against it. The single most telling argument against busing is that it doesn't work. It costs a lot of money, but has failed to improve the educational performance of culturally deprived blacks or whites. This fact was recognized last summer by Doctor James S. Coleman, who had been the foremost advocate of busing, until he re-evaluated his position in the cold, hard light of the data accumulated since forced busing was started. The first Coleman report was reportedly pointed to by federal courts to justify their busing orders. The second Coleman report, issued last summer, has been largely

ignored by the people who want busing to continue.

I believe involuntary busing, as currently applied, is just as wrong as the kind of busing which was used 20 years ago to maintain Jim Crow school systems in the South. Both use race as a criteria for school assignment, a concept entirely repugnant to most Americans. I think the millions of dollars spent on busing could be far better spent on pre-kindergarten and enriched remedial programs for students who need help in improving their reading, writing, and vocabulary skills.

I was disappointed in the action of the House Democratic Caucus, and I pledge to continue fighting for a Constitutional Amendment to ban forced busing on the basis of a student's race, color, or creed.

I think the majority of Americans of all races feel as I do, that we don't want busing, we want quality neighborhood schools to serve as the vehicle for delivering a quality education to all of our children.

While I am not happy with what the Ways and Means Committee has turned out in the name of tax reform, there will be an opportunity on the House floor this week to make significant and positive changes. And, the Senate will undoubtedly add its touch when the bill reaches the upper body.

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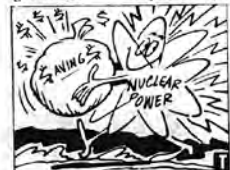

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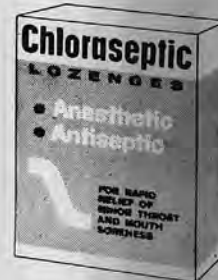
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Self Adhering Bands Available

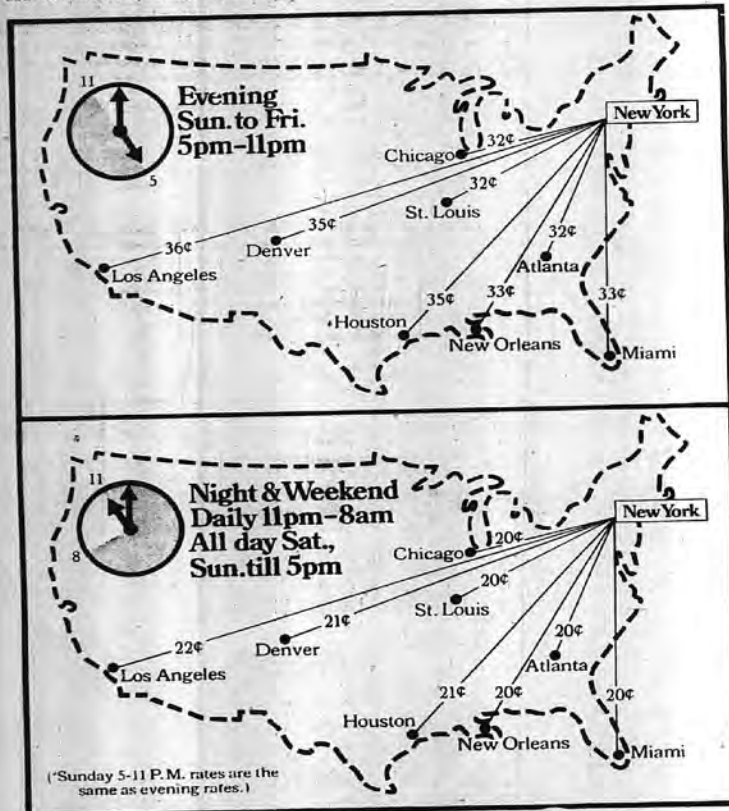
