Hearing Set For Rezoning

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond announced that a public hearing date of February 3rd has been set by the Town Board to consider a requested rezoning of the estate of the late Alan S. Lehman to permit development of 424 condominium units.

The 68-acre property is situated north of Jericho Turnpike and east of New York State University at Old Westbury; access to the land is via the north service road of the Long Island Expressway.

Diamond explained that the

application of Myron Nelkin seeks a rezoning from Residence "A" (2-acre) to "E-2" (6 units per acre). The developer intends to construct 200 1-bedroom units and 224 2-bedroom units if the application is approved.

In 1971, Mr. Nelkin sought a rezoning of the estate from Residence "A" to "E-1" (16 units per acre) to permit construction of 992 apartments. The Town Board denied the application on February 27, 1973, the same day that it adopted the Jericho Master Plan which retained the 2-acre zoning of the land.

Route 107 (Cedar Swamp Rd)

Task Force To Meet

The next meeting of the Route 107 Task Force Committee will take place on Wednesday, January 14, at 8:00 p.m. in the Old Brookville Village Hall in Nassau County.

The Task Force, under the chairmanship of Austin H. Emery, Regional Director of Transportation for the metropolitan area, is composed of two Oyster Bay Town Councilmen, a member of the Nassau County Planning Commission and village officials from Brookville, Old Brookville and Upper Brookville.

This panel has been studying alternatives to reconstruct and correct problems along a stretch of Route 107 from Jericho Turnpike to the Greenvale Glen Cove Arterial.

The agenda will include a review of the comments of the November 19, 1975 Public Information Meeting, a discussion of the State's choice of action at this time, and an explanation of project design criteria.

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Public Hearing On Price Marking

Nassau Consumer Affairs Commissioner James E. Picken announced today that he will hold a public hearing in Mineola on Wednesday, January 14th, at 9:30 A.M., on a proposed regulation to require that supermarkets continue marking prices "conspicuously, plainly and clearly" on consumer commodities.

"We are intent on adopting this regulation before the universal product code scanning systems come into Nassau," Picken said. "But we must give supermarkets as well as consumers a chance to be heard."

At a hearing in September, many consumers testified in favor of the regulation, which would be adopted under Nassau's Unfair Trade Practices law, but few supermarket representatives were able to appear.

Some food chains have suggested the elimination of price marking on individual items with the advent of the UPC scanning system, but Picken

believes that consumers are outraged at the idea of shopping from shelf signs only, and he wishes to forestall the problem.

"Testimony, letters, and petitions with hundreds of names have come to my office," he said. "Shoppers say if there is no marking they will not remember prices and will not be able to check for errors or compare costs. Elderly consumers complain that they cannot see the shelf signs."

Commented Picken, "consumers are sufficiently abused in the name of computerized progress. We don't want to permit another abuse."

The hearing will take place in the Board of Supervisors Hearing Room in the County Executive Building, Mineola. Anyone who prefers to submit comments in writing may send them to the Commissioner of Consumer Affairs, 160 Old Country Road, Mineola, N.Y. 11501.

State Benefits Are Going Up!

The state's taxpayers can prepare to shell out an extra \$20 million according to a new audit completed by State Comptroller Arthur Levitt. The audit shows that next year the basic cost of the state payroll will jump \$20 million despite a freeze on wages and pensions. The reason for the increase, says the audit, comes about as a result of fringe benefits paid to state workers.

The State Comptroller's figures put the state payroll at \$2,263,329,904 as of March 31, 1975. In addition, the Comptroller's audit pointed out that fringe benefits make up \$673,866,493 or 29.77 per cent of the total payroll figure.

Comptroller Levitt predicts that at the close of the current fiscal year (March 31, 1976) fringe benefits will jump by \$20 million to about \$693 million, or 32.11 per cent of the payroll. In the 1976-77 fiscal year it's projected that fringe benefits will account for 33.35 per cent of the payroll or approximately \$760 million.

These figures probably come

as a surprise to most taxpayers who assumed that because state workers received no salary increase during the current fiscal year, the state payroll would stabilize. While it is true that the state's 200,000 employees failed to win a wage hike, their fringe benefits were bolstered right on down the line. Improved social security, health and dental benefits are among the main culprits causing the enormous increase in the state payroll.

It should also be pointed out that the largest payroll expense (for the current fiscal year) was the \$463,719,054 that taxpayers doled out for public employee retirement costs.

The audit did not include the payroll costs of the Legislature, judiciary, state police and various boards, commissions and authorities.

The following is a breakdown of the state payroll as of March 31, 1975, and it shows what portion of the overall payroll goes for retirement benefits. The breakdown does not include health and dental fringe benefits.

Margiotta Will Not Seek Re-election

Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta (R-Uniondale) recently announced he will not seek re-election to a seventh term in the State Assembly in the next general election in November. He plans, instead, to devote his full time to the leadership of the Nassau Republican Party after the close of the 1976 session of the State Legislature.

The Uniondale lawmaker said he has been agonizing over the decision for the past two years. He said he finally made up his mind over the Christmas holidays after discussions with his wife, Dorothy, and two children, Michael and Carol Lynn.

"After 17 years service in Albany, if as an assemblyman, I have come to the decision not to seek re-election next November," Margiotta said. "The prime reason behind my decision is to spend more time with my family, to be able to plan a holiday with them without worrying whether we shall be in or out of session and be able to come home at night instead of living out of a motel room in Albany half the year."

Another reason is the growing length of the past few legislative sessions, according to Margiotta.

"The State Legislature, in the past few years, has turned into a year-round position, as witnessed by the 1975 session which ran for 7 months and was then topped by a 12 week special session," he said.

"I have prided myself on the fact that I have worked extremely hard and was willing to put in the extra hours to serve my constituents as an assemblyman and, at the same time, worked just as hard as the Republican County Chairman."

"I now find I can no longer do both jobs as well as I want to do them because the sessions are lasting so long. My constituents and my Party are the ones who will suffer if I attempt to continue to do both jobs in the future."

"I, therefore, have made the decision to remain as the Party Chairman and not to seek re-election as the Assemblyman from the 17th District."

"I honestly believe that this decision is the right choice for

both my constituents in the district and the members of the Republican Party," Margiotta said.

Margiotta, 48, was first elected to the Assembly in 1965. He was subsequently re-elected in 1966, 1968, 1970, 1972 and 1974. He is presently the ranking minority member of the Assembly Education Committee and serves on the Ways and Means Committee and the Committee on Local Government.

He co-sponsored and helped guide through the 1974 Legislature the bill to increase state aid to education by \$348-million, a record increase in the history of the State.

He also worked tirelessly for passage of the bill to appropriate \$4.1-million to the State Education Department to help educate handicapped children. This legislation was supported by Mrs. Helen Kaplan, Executive Director of the Nassau County Association for the Help of Retarded Children.

The Uniondale lawmaker is recognized as a "man of his word." It was his handshake which insured bi-partisan support of the hotly disputed 1972 legislative budget that guaranteed no cuts in state funds for education, welfare, mental health, narcotic-addiction control and general aid to localities.

Margiotta was named on January 4, 1968, Chairman of the Nassau County Republican Party after serving a highly successful term as Chairman of the Hempstead Town Republican Committee. He presently holds both positions. His election as County Chairman capped an organizational career that began more than two decades ago when he first served as a committeeman in the 62nd Election District in Uniondale. He is also Republican Executive Committeeman in Uniondale.

Assemblyman Margiotta has lived nearly all his life in Hempstead Town in Nassau County. He is a graduate of the Uniondale Grade School system, Hempstead High School and Hofstra University. He obtained his law degree from Brooklyn Law School.

He has served as President of the Uniondale Republican Club, Counsel to the Joint Legislative Committee on Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles and Legislative Counsel to the Nassau County Board of Supervisors.

A former trustee of Hofstra University and past president and board chairman of the University's Alumni Association, Assemblyman Margiotta was named in 1966 as "Outstanding Alumnus of the Year" by the Hofstra Alumni Association.

He is one of the founders of the Uniondale Public Library and past chairman of the Uniondale Library Board. He is a former commander of the Uniondale VFW Post, past director of the Central Island Mental Health Center and former chairman of fund drives for the Boy Scouts, Cerebral Palsy and the Cancer Fund.

He holds memberships in the County Historical Society, County Bar Association, Hempstead Elks, Uniondale Kiwanis and Uniondale Knights of Columbus.

He, his wife, Dorothy, and their two children, Michael and Carol Lynn, live at 844 Bedford Court, Uniondale. He maintains a law office at 955 Front Street, Uniondale, New York.

He said that he will continue to devote full-time service to the upcoming session of the State Legislature. "I still plan to be instrumental in helping to set the course Republicans will follow in the 1976 session."

"I can assure all the residents of the County of Nassau that I shall exit fighting to make sure our County receives its fair share of state aid (due it, especially in the area of education," Margiotta said.

"I would like to thank my constituents of the 17th Assembly District for granting me the honor and privilege of representing them. In particular, I would like to thank my friends and neighbors of Uniondale for their steadfast devotion and support during my tenure as their Assemblyman. Dorothy and I shall never forget their kindness and loyalty."

Special Hearing On LILCO "Ratchet"

The Public Service Commission will conduct a special hearing in January to determine whether and to what extent Long Island Lighting Company should reduce its existing minimum monthly charge—the "demand ratchet" rate to about 200 seasonal customers who have their service disconnected in the off-season.

Examiner Edward L. Block will conduct the special hearing at 10:30 A.M., Monday, January 12, in Room 2B-43 of the State Office Building, Veterans Memorial Highway, Hauppauge, so that the affected customers and the public can offer statements or testimony concerning the proposal. Since the affected customers would be required to pay the entire minimum charge as a condition of receiving service in 1976 summer season, the Commission will shorten its usual decision-making process.

Examiner Block also is conducting hearings to determine whether and to what extent a \$30 million revenue increase sought by LILCO is justified. Those hearings, for cross-examination of Commission Staff and intervenor witnesses, will continue at 10:30 A.M., Tuesday, January 13, in the Village Hall, 171 Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, with further hearings the rest of the week in

the Commission headquarters, 24th floor of Two World Trade Center, New York City.

LILCO customers taking service under the Large General and Building Heating classifications have been subject to a "demand ratchet" clause for many years; in the last LILCO rate case, the "ratchet" was redefined to set a minimum demand monthly charge of 85 percent of the highest demand in a summer month during the previous 11 months. The demand portion of the bill is related to the costs of the capacity the utility must have available to meet the highest demand on the system; while the total capacity is needed only part of the year its capital costs continue all year.

Last June, LILCO, filed a new tariff which was accepted by the Commission—setting the "demand ratchet" charge as the minimum monthly charge for any seasonal customer who is disconnected in the off-season. Under that tariff the customer would be required to pay for each month of disconnection 85 percent of its highest demand charge as a condition for getting service restored the following summer season.

The new LILCO proposal which will be the subject of the special hearing reduces the "demand ratchet" for 1976 to 27 percent of

the highest monthly demand charge, and provides for annual steps of 17 percent each until the ratchet again reaches 85 percent in 1980.

After the Commission accepted the original "demand ratchet" tariff, it and LILCO received many complaints from customers—particularly those in the East End of Long Island—that the provision would impose a financial hardship on them.

In filing the tariff, LILCO submitted a list of customers affected. It included several categories of businesses, but predominantly hotels, motels, beach clubs and eating places. The effect on customers who had requested service cutoffs ranged from about \$91 to about \$1,075 per account.

LILCO proposes to limit the reduction in the "demand ratchet" minimum charge to those customers who were taking service on both August 30 1974, and July 14, 1975, and who notify the company at the time service is renewed that they meet the tariff requirements.

Any of the affected customers may become a party to the case in the special hearing, even if they were not parties previously.

The Commission may approve, modify or reject any or all of the proposed tariff changes.

As well as those noted on page 3, here are a few more set for later this month: scheduled for Hempstead on Friday, Jan. 23, Assemblyman Margiotta's has set a public hearing for homeowners, school administrators and members of the business community at which time they will have the opportunity of suggesting alternative approaches other than the property tax to finance education. The public is invited to attend and testify at this hearing. Those interested in offering testimony should contact Assemblyman Margiotta's Albany office at Room 833 of the Legislative Office Building, Empire State Plaza, 12224 (phone: 518-472-3620).

Then, the Nassau County Department of Social Services will conduct a Public Hearing on the New York State Child Protective Services Act on Wednesday, January 14, in the Board of Supervisors Meeting Room, County Executive Building, West Street, Mineola.

Social Services Commissioner Joseph A. D'Elia will preside at the hearing, which will begin at 1 P.M.

The New York State Law mandates local districts to conduct a Public Hearing prior to submitting an annual local plan for child protection to the New York Department of Social Services.

The 1976 Public Hearing follows a Community Education Seminar held earlier this month for school administrators, hospital and public health personnel, describing their responsibility in reporting suspected incidents of child abuse and, or neglect.

MOST LOCAL LIBRARIES in the area have the necessary forms for one to register for national and local elections by mail. In case you are not presently registered, why not stop in and pick up this all-important form?

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Letters To The Editor

To the Editor:

There have been several letters to the editor recently discussing the sad case of a junior high school teacher who struck a student with "excessive force". The four school board members who voted to retain the teacher have placed the school district and the taxpayers into a real precarious legal position.

Teachers are highly-skilled experts who have been hired for very special skills and who are well-paid for those skills, one of which includes the ability to hold control of their emotions when dealing with those with whom they are entrusted - children. Any teacher who strikes a child in anger is unfit to teach. But more than that, every dog is entitled to only one bite, and after that there is no defense for the owner of the dog if the dog bites again. In this case the first child has been struck. The board has now been warned that the teacher is unfit to teach. If the teacher strikes another child with "excessive force", the board, the district, and the taxpayers can be held liable for damages for allowing the teacher to be in a position to repeat his previous misconduct.

Since Mr. Lari, Mr. McCormick, Mr. Nagle, and Mr. Arena have placed the liability for the teacher's future conduct upon the shoulders of the taxpayers, the teacher should be required to indemnify the district and the taxpayers from the effects of any misconduct on his part. Further, if the teacher does not or cannot indemnify the taxpayers he should be fired, and if the school board refuses to take further action the four members responsible for the teacher's retention should be turned out of office when they are up for re-

election.





Postal Service Meets Holiday Commitment

The U.S. Postal Service has announced it has again successfully delivered billions of pieces of holiday mail and cleared all post offices of such mail before Christmas Eve, according to Hicksville Postmaster Anthony M. Murello.

The massive mail operation was accomplished despite airline strikes and other transportation delays caused by severe weather conditions.

Specific volume figures were not immediately available. Last year, the Postal Service successfully delivered more than nine billion pieces of mail during the holiday period.

Public cooperation in adhering to suggested mailing dates; the recent upgrading of first-class mail to equal airmail service; and support from new bulk mail centers all contributed to moving the mail smoothly, the Postal Service said.

The daily volume of holiday mail peaked this year on December 15, three days earlier than last year.

Although early indications

show Christmas mail volume declined this year compared to last, the Postal Service said an improvement in its system for counting mail volume makes a valid comparison to last year impossible until revenue figures become available later this month.

Seniors Must File For Tax Exemptions

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Solomon Newborn reminded residents who are eligible for a senior citizen property tax exemption that they must file for the exemption every year and should submit their applications immediately after January 1st with the Nassau County Board of Assessors.

THE EXEMPTION MUST BE RENEWED EACH YEAR. "Many of our seniors meet the qualifications for property tax exemption," Newborn commented, "and I am eager to see that every older home owner who is eligible takes advantage of this special tax reduction."

Senior citizens who currently have a tax exemption should automatically receive a renewal form in the mail. New applicants can obtain their forms by writing the Nassau County Board of Assessors, 240 Old Country Road, Mineola, N.Y. 11501, or by telephoning 535-2377.

Newborn explained that New York State authorizes local municipalities such as Oyster Bay Town and school districts to grant a 50 percent reduction in real property taxes to seniors. He stated that in order to qualify for the exemption, a senior must be at least 65 years of age, have owned the property for a minimum of two years, maintain the property as their legal residence and use it exclusively for residential purposes, have no children attending public school and have a combined income of all owners of \$6,500 or less, including pensions and social security.
