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G.O.P. Delegates To National Convention

Nassau Republicans recently nominated their delegates and alternates to the 1976 Republican National Convention to be held in August in Kansas City, Missouri.

Leading the delegation which will go uncommitted into the April state presidential primary will be Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta, Party Chairman. Margiotta was nominated by the State Republican Committee last Tuesday in Albany as one of the three at-large members of the slate.

Also named at-large were A. Holly Patterson, former Nassau County Executive and Party leader, and Leonard W. Hall, former National Party Chairman and congressman.

In a meeting at GOP headquarters in Hempstead, the county's executive committee unanimously nominated the following slate:

THIRD CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT: (Nassau-Suffolk Counties)
Delegates: Assemblyman Joseph M. Reilly of Glen Cove, Isabel R. Dodd, Nassau Republican Election Commissioner and Republican leader of Sea Cliff, and John P. Campbell of Cold Spring Harbor, Suffolk County.

Alternates: James E. Picken, Nassau Commissioner of Consumer Affairs, and Republican leader of Massapequa, Lorraine MacGowan of Huntington, and Ruth Gosman of Northport, both Suffolk.

FOURTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:
Delegates: County Executive Ralph G. Caso, State Sen. Norman J. Levy and State Sen. Ralph J. Marino, Chairman of the Oyster Bay Republican Town Committee, and Republican leader of East Norwich.

Alternates: Congressman Norman F. Lent, Mrs. Penny D'Amato, wife of Hempstead Supervisor Alfonso D'Amato, and Christian N. Braunlich of Wantagh, First Vice-President of the Nassau Young Republican Organization.

FIFTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:
Delegates: Hempstead Presiding Supervisor Francis T. Purcell, George J. Farrell, Jr., former state assemblyman and Party First Vice-Chairman and Republican leader of Floral Park-Bellerose, and Mrs. Sinita Walker of Lakeview.

Alternates: Congressman John W. Wyder, Hempstead Councilman Eugene L. Weisbein, Republican leader of Hewlett, and Peter DeSibio, Chairman of the Nassau Bridge Authority and Republican leader of Inwood.

SIXTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:
Delegates: North Hempstead Supervisor Michael J. Tully, Jr., Thomas T. Pierce, North Hempstead GOP Town Chairman, and William B. Groat of Queens Village.

Alternates: State Sen. John D. Caemmerer, Raye Garfinkle, Republican leader of Great Neck North, and Edna S. McGahan of Bayside.

Harwood To Support "Uncommitted" Delegate Slates

In a statement issued last week Nassau Democratic Chairman Stanley Harwood said that he will participate in a campaign to send uncommitted delegates from Nassau County to the Democratic Convention next July.

Emphasizing that he was not acting in his official capacity as leader of the Democratic Party, Harwood said that partial results of a poll of Nassau Party Committee members showed support for many candidates, including some not yet formally entered and "some who will probably have withdrawn by the time the Convention is held." Under such circumstances, Harwood said, many Democrats will probably not be ready to make a final choice by Primary Day, April 6th, and it is to them "that the uncommitted slates will look for support."

Denying that the uncommitted slates are "stalking horses" for any undeclared candidate or part of a movement to stop any candidate now in the field, Harwood stated that members of the slates will be required to "give us their word that they are now genuinely uncommitted and will so remain until June" when they will confer with rank and file Democrats, and with each other "and perhaps with representatives of the candidates then in the field." Thereafter, they will be free to vote their own consciences, though Harwood indicated that he hoped they would make an effort to find a common position so that "Nassau may speak with as unified a voice as possible at the Convention."

The Committee for an Independent Delegation, which will choose the candidates and assist in their campaigns, is now in the process of organizing,

Harwood said. Among those on the Committee is Don Mankiewicz, a former Vice Chairman of the County Committee; Norbert Stemcosky, a Democratic Leader of Glen Cove; Morton Hayes, Hewlett Democratic Leader; Elaine Horowitz, a Vice Chairman of the County Committee; Charles Castell, former West Hempstead Democratic Leader; and William White, former Garden City Democratic Leader.

Members of the slate have yet to be selected. Harwood said that CID would form a screening committee and interview persons interested in running as uncommitted delegates. Such people were urged to submit resumes to CID, 103 Scudders Lane, Glen Head, N.Y., or to telephone the Committee at either 676-1709 or 364-2221. The Screening Committee, still to be selected, was to meet on Sunday, January 11th, at the Salisbury Club in Eisenhower Park at 1 p.m. to conduct interviews with those people who ask to be considered. Their selections are to be announced shortly. The first day for circulating petitions is January 13th.

Harwood offered the full cooperation of County Democratic Headquarters to all slates, and went so far as to pledge that CID will not challenge the nominating petitions of any slates pledged to candidates.

New Health Agency Formed Three Agencies Dissolved

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso recently announced the names of his five appointees to the new federally-mandated Health Services Agency for Nassau-Suffolk.

They will join 25 others on the governing board of the agency, which is designed to identify health problems, set priorities and recommend means of coping with them in the Nassau-Suffolk area.

The agency is being set up under the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974. The agency's task is to improve health care on Long Island while controlling costs. It will review and pass on new health facilities and will review federal funding in health areas.

Caso's appointees are Dr. John J. Dowling, Nassau health commissioner; Mrs. Lurana Tucker Campanaro, who heads the county's Office of Women's Services; Hugh F. Mahoney, executive assistant to the county

executive; Isidore Shapiro, Nassau Mental Health commissioner, and Russell Service, deputy county executive.

The names have been submitted to Dr. Lawrence Sheer, chairman of the HSA Nominating Committee.

A ten-member task force has been working since last February to set up the agency. It has established that a governing board of 30 members would run the agency. The board is to consist of 16 health care "consumers" and 14 "providers." The providers are those involved in delivery of health care.

Dr. Dowling and Shapiro are the designated providers among Caso's appointees and Mrs. Campanaro, Mahoney and Service are the consumers.

The task force accepted five members appointed by Caso and five by Suffolk County Executive John V.N. Klein. One member will be appointed by the U.S. Veterans Administration.

Nineteen others are to be elected at large from Long Island. The nominating committee has been accepting nominees and will conduct an election by mail ballot later this month.

Voting on the nominees will be members of the boards of directors of the three agencies which now perform health planning functions: The Nassau-Suffolk Comprehensive Health Planning Council, the Long Island Health and Hospital Planning Council and the Nassau-Suffolk Regional Medical Program. **THE THREE WILL BE DISSOLVED AND THEIR FUNCTIONS ASSUMED BY THE NEW HSA WHEN IT IS FORMALLY ESTABLISHED AND FEDERALLY FUNDED SOMETIME THIS SPRING.**

The governing board members will be unsalaried. The law provides for a staff to be paid from federal funds.

CPES SAYS:

State's Economy In Jeopardy

Albany, N.Y.—"This is no time for politics as usual—New York State's economy is in jeopardy," says the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey (CPES).

"The kinds of increases in taxes being discussed by the administration would drive more industry and business and employment out of the state.

"New York State and local taxes are already 24 per cent higher than the second highest state, and 54 per cent above the United States average. They amount to \$915 for every man, woman and child in this state. Since this is the figure for 1973-

1974 it is likely over the \$1,000 mark at this time," the statewide taxpayers organization said.

"We are in an economic war with neighboring states to retain our industry. In recent years 50 per cent of our industry has moved to New Jersey, 10 per cent to Connecticut, and 9 per cent to Pennsylvania. Our total state and local tax burden is already 38.3 per cent higher than in Connecticut, 39.4 per cent higher than in New Jersey, and a whopping 54.9 per cent higher than in Pennsylvania.

"What are some of our political leaders trying to do? Hand more

of our industry over to neighboring states? A substantial increase in taxes would surely do this.

"It would also place a further load on the already overburdened hard-working taxpayers of New York State," said the taxpayers defender group.

"It is high time that strenuous efforts be made to retain industry, business and employment if New York State is to survive in the competitive area that is the northeastern United States," CPES declared.

Existing Home Sales Going Up In 1976

Price, location and utility costs, always important considerations for potential home buyers, this year will make the difference in sales for two segments of the housing industry.

The National Association of Realtors' Department of Economics and Research has predicted record sales for existing homes in 1976, but only a moderate increase in new home construction for the year.

These predictions are based upon an analysis of 1975 data, factors affecting the industry and indicated trends.

For example, the department notes that the median price of a new single-family home exceeded \$40,000 by late 1975, but the median price of an existing home was \$5,000 less. And, in some sections of the nation, there has been a good selection of existing homes at \$30,000 or under, but few new homes at the price.

Available land for new homes located close to the urban center and urban transportation is becoming difficult to find in most sections of the nation. Potential buyers often look at new homes or developments 1-1 1/2 hours or more from their city jobs, the department explains.

Due to the increasing number of moratoriums on natural gas hookups, the percentage of new homes being built which use more costly fuels for heating and cooling will continue to increase.

The department notes that

between 1971-74 the percentage of new homes built with electric heating systems increased from 31 per cent to 49 per cent.

What effect did these factors have upon housing sales in 1975? The U.S. Savings and Loan League, whose members account for a majority of all home mortgages made annually, reported the following:

A total of 1.2 million mortgages were made by its members during 1975.

About 1 million were issued on existing single-family homes,

and another 220,000 on other resale units, primarily condominiums.

The remainder, about 280,000, was made on new units.

Thus, mortgages on resale units of all kinds were issued at a rate of more than four for each new unit sold. In an average year, the ratio between existing and new home sales is between 2.5 and 3 to 1.

The Department of Economics and Research estimates that the ratio will be at least 4 to 1 in 1976.

AS WE ALL KNOW parking conditions at the main Hicksville Post office are totally inadequate. The Puppet Theatre is located near Parking Field 6A in Eisenhower Park, East Meadow, and for our Senior Citizens who have the urge to create a painting, those who are County residents, age 60 or over may take advantage of a free painting course given on Fridays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. at Christopher Morley Park on Seatingtown Road in Roslyn-North Hills. These classes start on Jan. 9. To register for the course, call the Senior Citizens Unit at 292-4247 any weekday between 9 a.m. and 4:45 p.m. . . to underscore one of the richest chapters in our County's history, plans are being made for a major air show at Mitchel Field next summer as the highlight of the local bicentennial observance. A committee has been working for four months on a three-day salute to the significant role aviation has played in our development. To the Editor:

The current state of the economy demands an abrupt departure from the decades of expansion and spending which have come to characterize government. It is time either for transition and change or for existing in continual crisis.

The choice, I suggest, is not debatable. While the Town of Oyster Bay has been firm in its priorities and fiscally cautious, we must not assume that further pursuit of those policies alone will automatically see us through.

Our budget this year properly anticipates \$1.7 million of Federal Revenue Sharing funds and \$3.6 million in various forms of State aid. What is our future if the Congress or the State, each facing its own financial struggle, shall suspend its local municipal assistance programs?

Putting aside as impolitic and unrealistic that the real property tax base remains an inexhaustible source of additional local revenue, four measures in combination seem a minimum response in today's municipal climate:

1. That we resist - in fact, turn

away - any importuning for new programs that necessitate new expenditures.

2. That those of us who serve this Government shall determine to do more, to renew our efforts, to assume greater tasks, to be more productive, more efficient and more self-sacrificing in rendering our services.

3. That we prune back those Town services which are susceptible to reduction without diminishing our responsibilities.

4. That we examine, question and reconsider every expenditure with the same critical analysis of a resident scrutinizing his household budget. The household expects no less.

These, I submit, are our guidelines for '76, mandated in circumstances shared by virtually all local governments.

Only January and you've already broken your resolutions, after swearing "and this time I really mean it"? Well, don't wait until next year to make amends. Vow now that you'll start taking better care of yourself. For just as the days and months and years can just slide by if we let them, so can good health.

A fine way to begin practicing better health habits is by making an appointment for a complete checkup either by your own doctor or at the Nassau County

Cancer Detection Center. Located at 535 Old Country Road in Plainview, the center is open to both Nassau and Suffolk residents and last year nearly 2,000 were examined there.

The checkup includes an examination of the head, neck, lymph nodes, chest, breast, skin, abdomen, male or female genitalia and rectum, also a proctosigmoidoscopic exam, a chest X-ray, blood tests, urinalysis, and for women a

cervical-Pap test. In addition, cytological sputum or mammography tests are given when indicated by the examining physician.

The \$60 fee covers only part of the actual cost of the comprehensive checkup, the rest is paid for by the American Cancer Society. The detection center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Appointments are necessary. For additional information call 420-5262.

Mr. Marice F. Kiley, District Director of the New York District of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that the period within which aliens must report their addresses is at hand.

The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report their addresses to the Government during that period.

Mr. Kiley said that forms with which to make the report are

available to all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. The alien should complete Form 1-53 and after filling it out place a postage stamp on the reverse side of the card, which has a preprinted address, and drop it in any mailbox.
