An Attempt To Resolve **Mutual Problems**

Through their respective attornies, the Hicksville Fire District and property owner and merchant Thomas Braun, are presently attempting to resolve problems presented by the desire of the Fire District to buy a long driveway plus a small piece of property to its right, plus easements presently existing on this property, from Mr Braun, who now owns it. This property which is a driveway onto East Marie Street next to the Fire Headquarters, is located in between the Fire Headquarters and another piece of property which the Fire District recently purchased and would obviously be needed for the District to use this property for the purposes for purchased and would obviously be needed for the District to use this property for the purposes for which it was purchased, namely, for off-street parking for fire department members answering fire calls, and for on-site fuel pumps which are presently needed.

The purchase by agreement or necessary, by condemnation ses not seem to be the question does not seem to be the question which is presently unresolved. It is more the fact that the owner, Mr. Braun, while he is willing to sell at "a going price", does require "easements, for his business, business tenants and off street parking legally required for his tenants in The Sweet Shop, Holden's Stationery and four Holden's Stationery and four tenants in second floor apart-ments. The businesses use their rear-entrances for many reasons and would need access in order to properly conduct their businesses, as they have been doing in the past. doing in the past.

The Fire District, has Its problems also. A spokesman for the Board of Fire Commissioners Town Board and (2) in planning for the future needs of the Department, they, the Commissioners, must provide for on-site storage of gasoline and diesel fuel which will be used in the near future.

fuel which will be used in the near future. The first diesel piece of equipment is already on order and expected in about a month. "The pressing needs of the Fire District must be met," he con-tinued. "The shape of the property which is needed is an L-shape, including the aforementioned driveway ad-

shape, including the aforementioned driveway adjacent to the Fire Heaquarters and a 25-foot parking area in the back of the existing firehouse. When volunteer firemen answer the fire calls they cannot be parked double nor can they park illegally on the adjacent TOB lots, which are usually occupied by commuters as early as 7 a.m. anyway," he concluded.

Mr. Braun the owner of the property in question, explained that he is most anxious to work out a reasonable resolution of these mutual problems. He explained that he received an ofter from the Fire District to buy the property in question "in fee simple", which means unencumbered, on Mar 20th 1975. On March 28th, 1975 he answered with a refusal based on the facts that the property of The Sweet Shoo at 25 Regordway already had with a retusal based on the facts that the property of The Sweet Shop at 75 Broadway already had a lease containing an easement to enter from the rear as did Holden's Stationery, and that his own Meat Market at 77 Broadway own Meat Market at 77 Broadway also needed access through this driveway for deliveries, for cesspool repairs and for garbage removal, plus the fact that his tenants in four second floor apartments needed access to their off-street parking lots through the same driveway. Mr. Braun, through his attorney has offered to "sell the District this property at the going rate if an easement will be given him for access and egress to carry out the business and the tenancies, as in the past".

Fire Commissioner Glen Muench conducted this meeting. They all expressed the hope that an amicable solution would be reached. Fire Chief Ray Schaaf explained the needs of the Fire District to all present. The Board of Fire Commissioners after hearing the pros and cons of the matter, reserved decision and decided to hold a special meeting to go over the entire transcript of the public hearing, when it became available, before making their decision on this important matter.







Hicksville's wrestling team is the end product of several stages of development. The stages begin at the elementary age level and progress through junior high, probably junior varsity, and or finally varsity level at the senior high level. The wrestlers of the future will in all likilhood have received wrestling instruction at the elementary school level. Most fans don't know that a group of dedicted parents led by Larry Gould (father of Hickswille wrestler Jaime and former Hickswille wrestler Russ) have during the past two years organized an elementary school wrestling program. The wrestlers meet once a week at each elementary school for practice conducted by Hickswille wrestlers or ex-wrestlers and under the supervision of at least two parents. The wrestlers at the schools compete as a team against each other to develop wrestling skills and develop a 'mat-sense'. The program begins in late February and ends with a tournament in April in which champions are awarded trophies worthy of the wrestler's success. As the program gets organized in 1976, information will be provided.

Wrestlers developed during the elementary program are encouraged to continue with wrestling during their junior high in order to develop their wrestling skills curther with professional coaching and to further sharpen their mat-sense in competition against other junior high schools. Also during those formative years the youngsters are further encouraged to develop their strength and endurance so that when they enter senior high they will press varsity team members to the utmost – to unseat varsity team members—with the overall team receiving the full benefit of the competition. While girls are not yet wrestling they are extremely important for the teams success. Most team members will wrestle like tigers when they know their physical prowess is being wilnessed by their female classmates. Also, the team's manager is a very female girl – Leslie




