BELIEVE ME MAN I LOVE YOU

Each of us needs to matter. Each of us needs to feel loved and be loved. And no matter how sophisticated we become, or how "with it" we are, there's a childlike part of us which cries in agony. "Do you love me?" Unanswered many times by the world, we call desperately to God. "God, do you love me?" At our best we know the answer, God saying, "You know I do. Believe Me, man. I love you." But we're seldom at our best, so we persist in questioning God. "Come on, God. You know I'm not worthy. Why would you love me, when others find it so difficult?" God answers, "Because you're my creation, made in My image. I love you when you fail. I love you even when you never tried. My love is unconditional."

Unconditional love. A beautiful idea. At least if we believe it. But do we? Belief should put an end to the questions, and yet we're haunted by another. "How do I know you love me?" we ask. In the midst of my loneliness, when one crisis follows another, when I am up to my ears in personal problems, how do I know? God is no ignoramus. His intelligence must at least equal ours. He knows the importance of a demonstration. When we ask for proof of His love, He's ready. "I'll show you," He answers. "I'll

become flesh and live with you." In an act of profound simplicity. He chooses a stable for His place of birth. Then He grows with us, suffers with us, and dies for us. How do I know God loves me? Because He showed me.

In Victor Hugo's famous novel Les Miserables, Jean Valjean is a convict who has spent nineteen years in the galleys. When he is set free he discovers that he is ostracized by society. The inn will not rent him a room, the tavern will not sell him a meal. Woezy, desperate, and lonely, he decides that no one will ever care for him again. Later when the bishop offers him food and a warm bed, Valjean cannot believe that the offer is valid. He tries to reject the offer by telling his name and prison record. The bishop responds, "You need not tell me who you are. This is not my house; it is the house of Christ. This is the home of no man, except him who needs a place of shelter. What need have I to know your name? Besides, before you told me, I knew it." "You knew my name," says Valjean. "Yes," says the bishop. "Your name is My Brother."

Through Baptism we have become sons of God. Jesus has become our brother, and we have become brothers of one another. Jesus says to us today, "Believe Me, man. I love you." Music to our ears. Comfort to our soul.

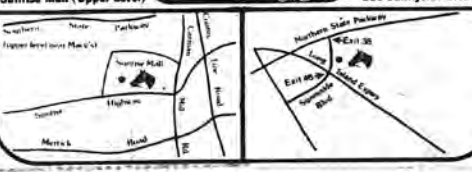

What the Community Council is offering is something for everyone. To give you an example, I will recap some of the meeting of January 8th.

The first order of business at the January meeting was the introduction of four of our young people of Hicksville - the finalists in the Hicksville VFW Voice of Democracy contest. The purpose of the contest was to promote the basic principles of democracy. We listened to Karen Bolognese from Hicksville H.S., Janice Lane from Dutch Lane, Jeanine Richards from Willet Avenue, and Anthony Neff from Burns Avenue. A Message From Supervisor Burke

Local government closeness to the people assures an ability to respond quickly to the needs of the residents it serves. To help you in your dealings with the Town, here are some of the activities and responsibilities of various governmental agencies and where they can be reached.

The following are located at Town Hall in the hamlet of Oyster Bay and can be reached by calling 922-5800:

The Town Clerk is responsible for issuing of all Town licenses and permits, maintains all Town records and is the registrar of vital statistics. Some licenses and permits also can be obtained at the Hicksville Annex, 65 Broadway (921-7630) or the Massapequa Annex at 95 Grand Avenue (795-2262).

For information on local taxes and special exemptions for Senior Citizens and Veterans, contact the Receiver of Taxes at Town Hall.

Information on construction permits, building codes, rules or ordinances relating to building and zoning, can be obtained at the Building Division of the Planning and Development Department. Variances from building and zoning ordinances are handled by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

The Department of Community Services is responsible for cultural and performing arts programs, the Youth Bureau, programs of the Drug and Alcohol Control Agency and special programs for senior citizens and the handicapped.

The Department of Public Works, with administrative offices in Syosset, is responsible for many of the services provided for our Townspeople. Residents can contact the following divisions directly:

The Highway Division at 921-1030, Sanitary Collection at 921-3850, Environmental Control at 921-7347 and the Animal Shelter at 921-5120.

The operation of senior citizens housing projects is the responsibility of the Town Housing Authority located at 355 Newbridge Road, Hicksville. For information call 433-0990.

Residents can also avail themselves of the Town's Action Line, 922-7676, for a fast response on any problem concerning the Town's services.

OK Telephone Installations

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Warren M. Doolittle has announced that the Town will enter into an agreement with the New York Telephone Company permitting the installation of public pay phones on sidewalks in the unincorporated areas of Oyster Bay.

Doolittle, a resident of Hicksville, said that the Town and Telephone Company have already selected sites for the installation of eleven phones in eight communities.

"These initial installations will serve as a pilot program," the Councilman stated, "and ad-

ditional phones may be authorized in the future." Doolittle explained that volumes of vehicular and pedestrian traffic are factors in site selection.

The specific terms of the agreement authorizing the installations will be determined by the Town and Telephone Company in the near future, and the first eleven phones should be placed by Spring, 1976.

Doolittle explained that the Town had decided to permit installation of the telephones "out of a belief that they will serve as a convenience for many Oyster

Bay residents." He said the initial installations will be made at the following local locations:

BETHPAGE - Intersection of Broadway and Benkert Street.
HICKSVILLE - Intersection of West Marie Street and Broadway; intersection of West John and Charlotte Streets.

PLAINVIEW - Intersection of Old Country and Round Swamp Roads; intersection of Sunnyside Boulevard and Manetto Hill Road.

OYSTER BAY - Intersection of West Main and South Streets.
SYOSSET - Intersection of Jackson and Whitney Avenues.

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Hicksville Wrestling

Hicksville's wrestling team is the end product of several stages of development. The stages begin at the elementary age level and progress through junior high, probably junior varsity, and finally varsity level at the senior high level. The wrestlers of the future will in all likelihood have received wrestling instruction at the elementary school level. Most fans don't know that a group of dedicated parents led by Larry Gould (father of Hicksville wrestler Jaime and former Hicksville wrestler Russ) have during the past two years organized an elementary school wrestling program. The wrestlers meet once a week at each elementary school for practice conducted by Hicksville wrestlers or ex-wrestlers and under the supervision of at least two parents. The wrestlers at the schools compete as a team against each other to develop wrestling skills and develop a "mat-sense". The program begins in late February and ends with a tournament in April in which champions are awarded trophies worthy of the wrestler's success. As the program gets underway in 1976, information will be provided.

Wrestlers developed during the elementary program are encouraged to continue with wrestling during their junior high in order to develop their wrestling skills further with professional coaching and to further sharpen their mat-sense in competition against other junior high schools. Also during those formative years the youngsters are further encouraged to develop their strength and endurance so that when they enter senior high they will press varsity team members to the utmost - to unseat varsity team members - with the overall team receiving the full benefit of the competition.

While girls are not yet wrestling they are extremely important for the teams success. Most team members will wrestle like tigers when they know their physical prowess is being witnessed by their female classmates. Also, the team's manager is a very female girl - Leslie Castro. During the matches she is Hicksville's official scorer at the scorer's table. Look for her.

The team's record is now 5 wins and 1 loss at Comet wrestling fans savored the wins over Syosset 51-6 and over Herricks 29-20. In the Syosset match, Hicksville received a gift of 24 points as Syosset forfeited the bouts to Pete Webb, Al Auffant, Andy Edell, and Frank Cerone. Augmenting the 24 points were wins by John Leo, Neal Hardin, and Bill Stepkowski. Kevin Anglin, wrestling his first varsity match in place of the ill Pat Bennett, showed great promise for the future even though eventually losing 7-8. The match at home against Herricks was a mind-boggling affair. The outcome was in doubt until pins by Andy Edell and Frank Cerone finally sealed a win for the Comets. Herricks forfeit to Pat Bennett was worth six points so the score was a lot closer than it looks. Wins by John Leo, Neal Hardin, Nelson Castro, and a tie by Brian Damm rounded out Hicksville's scoring.

association, the former chief school executive was able to reduce the staff by some seventy positions, save the district approximately \$2,000,000, and avoid "firing" personnel. The retrenchment was accomplished without incident.

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Beware Of Children's 'Sore Throat' Complaints

When a child complains of a sore throat, parents should watch for signs of streptococcal infection or "strep throat."

According to Dr. Thomas B. Delaney, Chairman of the Heart Disease in Children Committee of the American Heart Association, Nassau Chapter, a strep throat

that is not treated adequately can lead to rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease.

Rheumatic fever most frequently affects children from 5-15 years of age, and, together with rheumatic heart disease, accounts for more long-term disabling illness in children than

any other disease.

Dr. Delaney stressed that not all sore throats are strep throats, but parents should be able to recognize the signs of a strep throat. If a child complains or shows signs of hoarseness or coughing, it probably is not a streptococcal infection. But, if

the child has any of the following symptoms with a severe sore throat, you should call a doctor:

- The sore throat came on suddenly.
- The throat hurts most when the child swallows.
- It hurts when you press gently under the angle of the jaw and the

glands in the neck are swollen.

- There is a fever, usually 101 to 104 degrees.
- The child complains of nausea.

Dr. Delaney added that there is no "miracle drug" to cure rheumatic fever, but rheumatic fever can be prevented if a strep throat is treated adequately.

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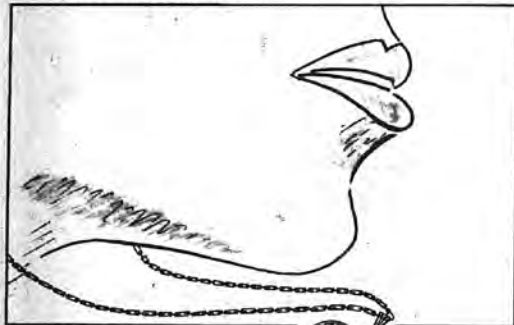
