Spring Concert Set

On Tuesday, April 13, at 8:15 P.M., the Hicksville High School Music Department will present the third in a series of spring concerts.

Featured will be the Sophomore Girls' Chorus under the direction of Mr. Charles Arnold who will sing selections from Hilaire Belloc's A Child's Book of Beasts, music by Jean Berger. Mr. Arnold will also direct the Madrigal Singers in music from the Renaissance and Contemporary periods.

The Sophomore Mixed Chorus will perform a group of American choral pieces tracing the more important developments in American music of the past two hundred years. William Golee, the director of the group, has

selected such pieces as the original music for the Star Spangled Banner, a spiritual, two contemporary numbers and a combined anthem for chorus and chamber orchestra.

The Chamber Players will conclude the concert with Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings, movement one, and the Toy Symphony by Leopold Mozart. Mr. Thomas Buttice, who conducts the group, has reconstructed the original orchestration of the Mozart work which calls for such instruments as the cuckoo, toy trumpet, toy drum and nightingale.

The concert will take place in the High School auditorium and the public is cordially invited to attend.

At The School Board Meeting

At the March 24th meeting all Board Members were in attendance with Mrs. Wolfson being well and presiding. Mr. Rozan, Asst. Superintendent for Personnel Services, was absent due to illness in the family. Announcement was made that public Budget Sessions will be continued.

Under unfinished business the Board was anxious to vote on summer recreation programs and classes. Several Members wanted to table this for further discussion, but decision was vital. It was pointed out that parents were calling the schools for information and they needed to be properly informed. The vote was not carried, but Mrs. Wolfson did mention that this did not exclude a possible school class tuition program.

Board Members had been requested to bring their budget books with supporting data furnished by Mr. Weigang, District Business Mgr. as this was to be the major part of the Agenda. Guests were also

provided with photostat copy of budget items showing increases and decreases over the school year.

Review of increased employee and teacher benefits revealed this was already part of contract and beyond control. It was questioned whether Hicksville could withdraw from Federal Social Security, and hereto the District was bound by contract. Mr. Bruno stated that our insurance figures for employees were three years old and needed review. Discussion was postponed until next Wednesday, when Seaman & Eiseman Insurance Co. would bring up-to-date actuary statistics prior to the actual Budget Session.

Under Capital Funds include projects dealing with grounds, repairs, carpeting and maintenance were discussed with Mr. Becker, Grounds Supervisor. Mr. Jackson made mention that if such repairs were not made it could cost the District more money in the long run.

With this, the Board voted to maintain this figure in its entirety. Bonds for school funding projects are also non-cancellable by law and remain a fixed expense. Discussion of money market fluctuations were taken

into consideration for future needs. All air-conditioning bids were declined in keeping with minimizing new expenses. Mr. Bruno postponed letters re HAD A McCarthy-Weiss Case until April 28th when more information will be available.

John Maniac, as Representative of the Hicksville Community Council will submit his budget on May 6th it was announced.

In the High School Business Dept., Nancy De Sorbo was granted tenure after three years with our school and outstanding records of attendance. Sabbatical leaves and retirements were granted per contract commitments.

A letter was received from the H.S. Ecology Club for permission to plant trees around the school as a Bi-Centennial Project, and the request was granted by the Board.

The Elementary Intramural Wrestling Program, started by Mr. Tomani, was withdrawn. No details for the decision were made.

Approval of 1976-77 School Calendar was tabled due to the lateness of the hour. The meeting ended at 1AM with the Agenda being well covered.

The program at the library will include works of; Schumann, Debussy, Prokofiev, Stanford, as well as modern works of Scriabin and Martino.

The Hicksville Library Music Series is made possible by grants from Nassau County Office of Cultural Development, Ralph P. Caso, county executive and John Maerhofer, director. All library programs are free and the public is invited.

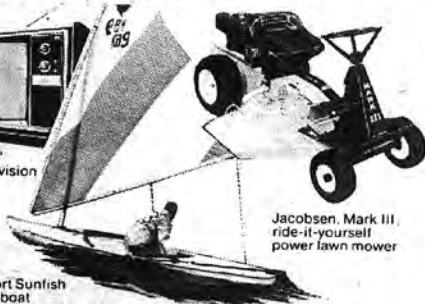

DON'T IGNORE HIM. EXPLORE HIM.

Psychologists tell us that it is very hard for a person to love unless he has first been loved. So in order for us to have the spirit of love we must first experience the spirit of love... not just love in general but specific love... the love that came down from heaven to knock on earth's door. And what happens when love knocks on the door? Why, we rush, to open it and let it in, right? Wrong, strangely enough. It's incredible how many people refuse God's offer of love, for they seem to be driven by a force that wants them to be miserable or, at the very least, never completely happy. They get nervous when all is going well.

In the person of Jesus Christ, love is knocking at earth's door. In the words of Jesus Himself, "Behold I stand at the door and knock; if anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with Me." WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide for the financing thereof; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

Letters To The Editor

To the Editor:
Last year your newspaper graciously published my letters wherein contempt was reflected for the manner in which the school board presented the fragmented 1975-76 school budget to the voters for approval. The contempt was based on:

1. The inevitability of a very carefully-hidden two million dollar budget hike in Proposition 1, designated as the contingency "austerity budget."

2. The holding as hostage the voter-desired items, mostly benefiting children, in proposition 2 through 7.

Here is one of the many examples that could be cited of the goodies included in last year's budget which is about to be repeated again this year. The agreement between the board and the Hicksville Council of Principals, Assistant Principals, Supervisors, and Department Chairmen, (hereinafter referred to as the council), was negotiated in 1974 as the second year of a two year contract ending in 1976. That agreement raised by an average of \$2300 dollars the salary of each council member during the 1975-76 school year, which by the way, contains only 182 working school days. Thus the average salary of council members was raised from \$27,600 to \$29,900 per school year. That immense average salary is much higher than the salary earned by the great majority of Hicksville's working, taxpaying, middle-class resident.

Those immense salaries are vastly higher than the incomes of the retired and of the locked-in elderly who pay property taxes to pay those salaries. The agreement by the board and council raised the cost to the district for salary and fringe benefits of each council member from \$33,785 to \$36,700 a year.

It should also be remembered that council members and their families receive medical and dental care from insurance, and

a life insurance policy equal to their yearly salary, all premiums of which are paid for by the taxpayers.

The total cost to the district for the council agreement in the present school year (1975-76) is in excess of \$90,000. That money was included in the budget increase of last year which totalled 2 million dollars. Now as you know 2 million dollars can't be plucked like leaves from a tree. Therefore it could only come from the education programs and fringes destined for the kiddies, or it had to come by delivering another sledge-hammering tax increase. Those were the choices the board gave the voters. That's why the board's fragmented budget deserved the contempt of the voters.

As taxpayers know, the voters threw a large-sized monkey wrench into the plans of the board by passing the so-called contingency austerity budget (Proposition 1) and rejecting all others but Adult Education. The board then was caught in a dilemma of their own making, a budget has passed - with nothing in it for the kids - exactly what I had predicted, and which was the driving force behind my opposition to that fragmented budget. Luckily for the board, the students circulated a petition, an action which eventually relieved the board of their "goal horns".

The council's contract is again being negotiated. Based on the board's past actions it appears reasonable to assume that the board will not reject the pay-raise demands of such highly paid people. If they do not, here are the alternatives:

1. Reduced programs or fringes for the kiddies;
2. A wage freeze or reduced wage increase for the lower-paid deserving employees such as clerks and custodians who earn so little.
3. A large tax increase;
4. Or a combination of all three

of the above.
In any case, most taxpayers will abhor use of any of the alternatives.

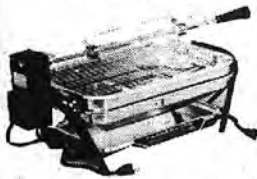

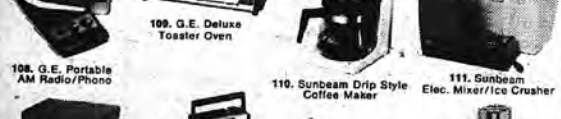
