Congressman Norman Lent has accepted an invitation to deliver the principal address at the Fourth of July celebration in Hicksville. The Far Rockaway legislator, most recently known for strong efforts to place restrictions upon Russian and Soviet bloc ships exploiting Long Island's off-shore fishing grounds, will be an important part of the patriotic program at the Hicksville High School grounds which will precede the Bicentennial Old-time Country Fair. Mr. Lent's presence was obtained through the efforts of Anthony Preverte, Bicentennial representative of the Galileo-Galilei Lodge of Sons of Italy.

Board Of Education Sets 1976-77 Budget

In an action climaxing months of study and discussions both public and private budget study sessions, the Hicksville Board of Education has established a no-growth budget not to exceed \$27,451,140 as its budget for its operations in the year 1976-77. By a 6 to 0 vote, coming close to midnight (Trustee William Bruno had left the meeting early and did not participate in the discussion or the vote), the Board of Education gave direction that there will be no dollar increase in the school budget for the coming school year. School administration was authorized and directed to rearrange the budget figures and to present detailed recommendations for the line-by-line distribution of such budget, restricted to no more than last year's dollar total, at a public budget meeting scheduled for

Wednesday, May 5th.

In commenting upon the Board's action, Superintendent Hill stated, "This is the first time in the more than 25 years for which I have seen records, that the Board of Education has not increased the budget from one year to the next. By its action, the Board of Education has recognized the economic pressures which prevail throughout the state and nation, and it has instructed staff to do everything necessary to maintain existing programs and to carry on instructional activities within the fixed dollar ceiling of last year's total budgeted expenditures.

"In essence, it also means that automatic and mandated increases in costs for such items as retirement, social security, fuel,

utilities and supplies must be absorbed by other downward adjustments in the budget wherever necessary. We believe that by carefully controlled consumption of resources, we will be able to do this. The most difficult part of the task will be in relationship to the pinch in rising costs of living upon our various employee groups.

"Nevertheless, the Board has given us a clear-cut statement of policy and purpose and it will be up to staff and Board and community to work together to insure the continued effective operation of the schools. By its action, the Board has said there will be no more dollars next year. The decision is clear and unequivocal - We will implement it, and I believe we can do it successfully."

At School Board Meeting

The April 28th School Board meeting had a full house with all Board Members present and by 9 PM there was standing room only for the public. With a full Agenda of school budget issues, end-of-year Committee reports, and possible reporting of Board Meetings in the Herald attendance had risen.

Mr. Bruno finally got to air his letters to the Board regarding HAD and the McCarthy-Weiss Case. His feelings were that the HAD Organization was not serving the community fully, and expressed dissatisfaction with the Group. No specific details were given. Mr. Bruno briefly went into the McCormick-Weiss Case; where a Hicksville teacher was accused of breaking a student's jaw. Unfortunately, several newspaper accounts of the incident were different thus Mr. Bruno wanted to open the case and get one set of facts. The Board members gave this idea merit but had to be realistic in stating that the tremendous cost in researching facts and attorney fees are involved. With this in

light the Board voted in majority to close the case finally.

Several of the Board Members had just returned from the Natl. Educational Conference in San Francisco and were enthusiastic over information obtained. Mrs. Wolfson told of the biggest problems in the schools being drug abuse and vandalism. Something like \$594 million is being spent nation-wide by our schools to control them. Mr. McCormick stressed the need of converting to the metric system as quickly as possible. Dr. Hill assured him that administration is aware of the need and students are now learning all measurements. Mr. Ayres spoke of "the changing goals and priorities in education in the years to come.

A written report from the Woodland Ave. Individualized Instruction Committee was presented to the meeting by Geri Kanuck. Printed copies were given out and can be obtained at Woodland Ave. School. Some basic suggestions of the Committee were calling for an updating of elementary school programs over a five year period, an alternate program of study to I.I. be available on option, and busing of students to schools to

facilitate these objectives. Mr. Nagel & his Committee were thanked by the Board for a job well done.

The Budget Advisory Committee, under Mr. Arena, will have an open meeting on May 10th. Their Committee member asked that Summer Recreation be reinstated as important and would cost \$16,500 to the District. At this time Town funds are no longer available to assist. Mr. McCormick made a motion to table this decision until the next Board meeting and it was carried.

A suggestion to allow the public to attend Contract Negotiations of employees was opposed by the Board as not really necessary. It was further suggested that employees should pay part of the cost of fringe benefits. This was also tabled as complete bid costs have not been established.

The Board announced their Annual Meeting on June 23rd with the public to vote on a "hold-the-line" Budget Proposition No. 1 - To approve a budget vote of \$27,451,140 which is not to exceed last years expenditure. School officials state that with rising costs and contract com-

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, adopted October 5, 1971, as amended, be and the same is amended, as follows:
That the following locations be added to SECTION 17-25 of the said Code establishing thereunder the following intersections as STOP intersections and stop signs shall be erected at appropriate places facing traffic on the stop street. All traffic on a stop street approaching a through street from either direction, unless otherwise designated, shall come to a full stop before entering the through street.

That the following locations be added to SECTION 17-152 of the said Code establishing NO STOPPING ZONES, which shall be appropriately designated by posted signs:

GLEN HEAD Terry Court - east side - beginning at a point 262 feet north of the north curb line of Darby Place, north then east following the curvature of the road, for a distance of 100 feet.

JERICHO Birchwood Park Drive - north side - from the west curb line of Robbins Lane, west for a distance of 30 feet.
Birchwood Park Drive - south side - from the west curb line of Robbins Lane, west for a distance of 50 feet.

LOCUST VALLEY Oyster Bay Road - south side - starting at the north boundary line of the Village of Matinecock northwest for a distance of 152 ft.

Letters To The Editor

To The Editor:

The contract between the Hicksville Board of Education and the Hicksville Congress of Teachers (HICT) is now available at the Hicksville Public Library for reading by any person desiring to do so. All taxpayers are URGED to read it and see one of the reasons school taxes are so high. The contract oozes glue from each page to which taxpayer dollars adhere like paint on a Dali masterpiece. To write the meaning and tax-dollar cost of all the details of the rip-off would read as Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice" with "Antonio" representing Hicksville taxpayers, and with "Bassanio" representing our children's education. Therefore, just one point will be dwelled on for the moment-EXCUSED ABSENCE.

The contract generally states that teachers are authorized fifteen (15) days excused absence per year. All unused days are to be added to accumulated leave from year to year with no maximum limit.

Do you know what that simple statement will cost the taxpayers this school year?

1. Using \$20,000 as the average pay of a teacher for this year's 182 day school year, the teacher's daily pay equates to \$110 plus \$30 for fringes or a total of \$140 per day. Therefore, the 15 day absence for each of the 594 teachers on the payroll costs the district 1.25 million dollars.

2. As you know, the district hired 10 PERMANENT SUBSTITUTE teachers for this year at an average salary of \$17,000 (including fringes). Thus the ten teachers costs the district \$170,000.

3. The teacher absentee rate will average about 10 absences per year, as it has in the past, thus 3940 substitute teachers will be required. This can be reduced to 4,220 teachers as the permanent substitutes will sub an average of 172 days each. Each substitute teacher hired costs \$35 per day (some cost more), thus the cost for the 4220 teachers will be \$147,700.

In summary, the total cost for EXCUSED TEACHER ABSENCES this year will be 1.56 MILLION DOLLARS.

Read the whole contract - if you've the stomach for it. You will see the reason a change is needed on the school board and why fiscal sanity must replace spend-thrift thinking.

I am giving serious thought to being a candidate for election to the school board and will announce my decision in the very near future. All by efforts, in any event, will be directed towards the election of candidates in opposition to the incumbents up for re-election.

A Message From Your Library

"The library budget, as proposed, will be submitted on May 11, 1976. It reflects an attempt by the Board of Trustees to propose a budget that balances careful consideration of costs with the determination to maintain the quality of services enjoyed by the community. The library will not be able to continue to provide the reading materials needed for recreation, school work, career information, etc., unless they receive community support when their budget is presented to the Public."

"The increase of \$43,210.43 over our current budget, places our new tax rate at an estimated, \$35 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation. If your home is assessed at \$4500, your total library tax bill will be \$24.08 annually. Considering the uniqueness of the library as the most versatile of community facilities providing books, films, reference help, music and cultural programs, consumer

education programs and 66 hours a week service, the Board of Trustees feel this budget is reasonable."

"Book costs have risen 30 percent since we last had an increase in our budget. We are

saving on periodicals by postponing a needed micro-film program for a year.

"This represents a general salary increase of 7 percent to the staff plus a mandated increase in hospitalization costs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES APPENDIX A

BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, that the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, as amended and revised, and now set forth as Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby amended in the following respects: AMEND the definition of height as set forth under Sec. 1, of Article I of the "Building Zone Ordinance" of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, as amended and revised, and now set forth as Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay by including the following language indicated by underline, so that said definition shall read as follows:

The height of a building shall be the distance measured from the mean average grade of the ground surrounding the building to a point midway between the highest and lowest points of the roof. However, State mandated parapet walls, and chimneys, spires and similar projections not in excess of fifteen (15) feet above the roof, shall be excluded in measuring the height of a building. Elevator or stair bulkheads, mechanical equipment, water towers and similar equipment shall be enclosed or screened and shall be setback a minimum of twenty (20) feet from all the edges of the roof, except that where the roof area cannot accommodate such a minimum setback, all around, then such equipment shall be placed on the roof so as to be as equally distant as possible from all roof edges but, in no event, closer than five (5) feet from any such roof edge; and the aggregate area covered by such enclosures or screened areas shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the roof area; and the total height of such penthouse enclosures or screened areas shall not be in excess of twelve (12) feet above the roof. For the purposes of this ordinance where separate and contiguous stores or shops share a common roof, that part of such common roof which covers each separate store or shop shall be considered for setbacks and centering purposes for that separate store or shop as to such equipment serving such store or shop. Notwithstanding the above, where separate and contiguous stores or shops share a common roof, nothing precludes the placing upon the roof covering that store or shop such equipment serving such store or shop along the center of an inner edge of the roof which separates the abutting and contiguous stores or shops; where elevator or stair bulkheads, mechanical equipment, water towers and similar equipment is not higher than the parapet enclosure, no enclosure or screening as mentioned above shall be required. AMEND "Article III. Provisions Applicable to All Districts Division 1, Generally" by adding thereto the following new section: Sec. 115. Private Roadways and Road Widths In All Residential Zones. Except where expressly provided otherwise in this Ordinance, the following restrictions shall be applicable in all residential districts: (a) All paved areas used as service areas shall be located not nearer than fifty (50) feet to the right-of-way of any State Highway and not nearer than thirty (30) feet to any public street or property line.

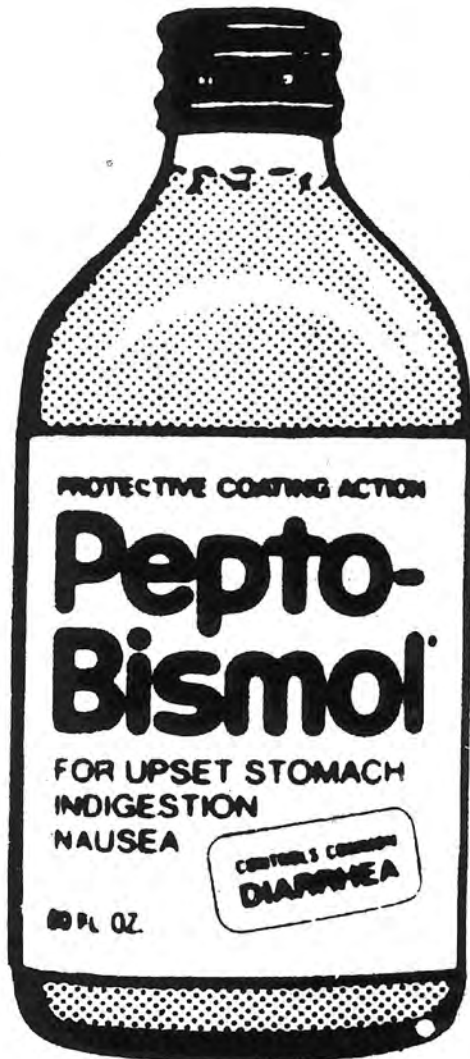

mittments they will be able to keep the budget in line due to economies and lower enrollment. Proposition No. 2 - To give the Hicksville Library power to make their decisions without coming to the School Board for approval. Exact legal jargon is in the Herald with legal notices.
