Arson Blamed For **Five Local Fires**

The entire Hicksville Fire Department was called out early May 18, 1976 when a series of garages fires occurred, all within 2nd Asst. Chief James Huttle at this time had fire units patrol streets looking for fires as residents slept on unaware of the events taking place. While on patrol firemen found a garage fire at Jerusalem Ave & 1st St. It apparently had just been set. Damage to that structure was set at \$50.00 Lastitume firemen. several hours of each other. The fires were deliberately set by unknown person or persons. The first alarm came in 12:39 AM for a garage fire at 19 Winding Rd. When firemen arrived the fire was moving swiftly through an attached garage which contained at \$50.00. Levittown firemen were called out to battle a garage fire in their district about the same attached garage which contained a car. Vamps were confronted with a heavy smoke condition upon arrival. The fire was spotted by a passerby and a county police roving ambulance. The occupants were alerted and evacuated the dwelling. The fire caused an estimated \$9,000 damage. time as the Hicksville fires started. Hivksville units con-tinued to patrol the area till after 3:00 AM.

At 5:40AM a general alarm was sounded for another garage firethis time at No. 12 Winding Rd. Damage to this 2 car garage was put at \$1,200.00. Fire officials suspect this fire was started earlier but smoldered for several hours before spreading.

At 6:48 AM another general alarm was transmitted for a fire alarm was transmitted for a fire at Nathans Restaurant on No. Broadway. A fire there, believed to have been caused by an electric heater which spread to rubbish nearby caused an estimated \$14,000 damage mostly to food. A sprinkler did go off and confined that fire until employees snatted it and called figremen.

Meanwhile Asst. Chief Huttle
ordered units out again to patrol

the residential areas south of Old Country Rd. for more fires. In several hours \$38,850 fire loss was suffered. Chief Huttle thanked county police for their assistance. One wamp suffered an eye injury and county police of the 8th Pct. took him to the hospital for treatment. The County Fire Marshal's office sent out an investigator to check the fires for evidence.

FULL EMPLOYMENT?

The House Education and Labor Committee, last week, approved a bill called the "Full Employment and Balanced Growth Act of 1976. This is just one more example of what I see as a need for a truth in labeling law for Congress

How, you might ask, can anyone possibly be against 'full employment,' or 'balanced employment," or "balanced growth"? Nobody is against a job for every American who wants to argument about whether this bill will provide full employment work, but there is a great deal of provide full employment, y responsible Congressmen Many feel the bill will

asso feel the bil will styrne balanced growth instead of encouraging it.

The Full Employment and Balanced Growth Act – also known as the Humphrey-Hawkins Bill after its principal sponsors – has a goal of a per cent nemployment within four years Government would provide most, if not all, of those jobs. That means if you are now working in the private sector, you will pay

for them. The so-called Full Employment Bill carries a staggering price tag of \$25 billion a year. This budget busting bill has been described by President Ford as a boundoggle jecting that much additional government spending into our economy would certainly fuel the fires of inflation, just when in Hation seems to be coming under

Any freshman economics student can tell you that in creased capital in the private sector creates jobs and increased government spending takes money out of the private sector Government policy should, therefore, be directed toward creating jobs in the private sector where they will do the most good This bill, on the other hand, carries Uncle Sam another step down the road to ruin pursued by Great Britain and New York City. Rather than cutting the size of government and the amount of control it exercises over our daily lives, this bill would increase the size of government and move us closer to the day when we, like the Mother Country and New York City, can no longer afford to support the welfare state we have

In the United States, govern ment already spends one-third of what you earn. The outrageous what you earn. The outrageous growth of government spending is one of our most severe problems. It must be checked The Full Employment and Balanced Growth Act of 1976 sounds wonderful What would you think though, if we re-named it the "Rob the Taxpayers and Accelerate Inflation Bill"? Accelerate Inflation Bill*?

For my part, I will continue to

support legislation designed to create jobs in the private sector which will add to our nation's financial strength, while opposing new government programs which will cost you more than they are worth

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
