The Bicentennial Parade is shaping up as one of the largest and most colorful community processions in Hicksville history with over 20 bands, numerous color guards, military units, many floats and vehicles—all being organized to honor the Nation's 200th Birthday.

Senator James Buckley will lead the list of dignitaries on the reviewing stand.

Memorial Day Parade

The Memorial Day Parade and Services is scheduled this year to assemble at 8 a.m. sharp in Sear's parking lot, under the auspices of Hicksville Veteran Organizations which include the host post, the Charles Wagner American Legion Post 421, the William Gouse Jr., V.F.W. Post 3211, the Amvets and the Jewish War Veterans.

"This year the parade will start in the Sear's parking lot at 8:30 a.m. sharp," said Parade Chairman Frank Molinari, a past commander of Charles Wagner Post American Legion. "The parade will proceed south on Broadway to Old Country Rd., then west to Newbridge Rd., then south to the Hicksville High School Field where the Memorial Services will be held, if the sun is shining. However, in case of rain, these services will be held in the Hicksville High School Auditorium," Mr. Molinari continued.

"Participating in these solemn services this year are two Gold Star Mothers from Hicksville, Mrs. Mary Malinski and Mrs. Alexander Kozma, who will be joined with American Legion Auxiliary Chaplain, Mrs. Lillian Molinari, a past president of this Auxiliary," he said.

"With me on the reviewing stand, will be T.O.B. Town Clerk Anne Ocker, Judge Warren Doolittle, who will be the principal speaker, Mr. Richard Evers of the American Legion who will read the General Orders; New York State Assemblyman Lewis Yevoli; Mr. Steven Didier of the Bicentennial Committee; Mrs. Rosemary Walsh of the Hicksville School District; Mr. Frank Dorsey, Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus; Francis Testagrossa, Exalted Ruler of the B.P.O.E. 1931; and Mr. Wesley Tietjen of the American Legion, who will serve as M.C. on the Reviewing Stand," said Chairman Molinari.

Participating in this important parade will be the Hicksville Fire Dept. and Auxiliary, the Hicksville A.O.H., the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts, all the school Bands, St. Ignatius, Senior High School Band, the 4-H Clubs, the Hicksville American Soccer Club, the Hicksville P.B.C., Nautical Cadets and P.B.C. Girls, the Joseph Barry Knights of Columbus, and the Hicksville Library Bookmobile.

Parade cars will be provided through the courtesy of Eisenmann Buick and Robert Chevrolet.

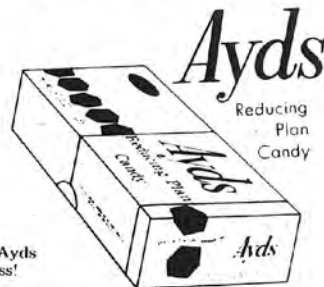

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Town Beach Schedule

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the Town's nine beaches will open on a daily basis beginning June 19 but that two beaches -- one on the south shore and one on the north shore -- will be open on weekends starting Saturday, May 29.

Burke explained that Tobay Beach and Centre Island Beach will be open on the three-day Memorial Day weekend of May 29-31, as well as the June 5-6 and June 12-13 weekends preceding the formal opening date for all beaches. "The use of Oyster Bay's beaches has been traditionally light between the Memorial Day weekend and mid-June," said Burke. "This year's schedule reflects continuation of an economy measure that was successfully initiated in 1975."

"We recognize the desire of some residents to use the beaches during weekends as soon as weather permits," he continued, "and for that reason a south shore and a north shore beach will be open for the three weekends preceding the official opening date." Burke said that seasonal parking stickers will be available at the two beaches during these weekends and at all beaches starting June 19th.

Seasonal beach parking stickers, which are honored at all Town beaches, will cost \$6.00 each this year. "This \$1.00 fee increase follows eight successive years in which the seasonal charge has remained unchanged," stated Burke, "and is attributable to greater costs the Town has incurred in maintaining and improving beach facilities."

A daily \$2.00 per car charge will be made for residents not possessing the seasonal passes.

Town residents 62 years of age or over may purchase a permanent senior citizen photo ID card for a one-time fee of \$3.00 either at the Town Clerk's office in Oyster Bay hamlet or at the Town Hall Annex in Massapequa (to obtain the card at the Annex, seniors are required to provide their own 1" x 1" photo). Beach passes will be issued without charge at any Town beach to seniors presenting the ID card and their vehicle registration.

Supervisor Burke said that the Town, largely because of the efforts of Councilman Joseph J. Saladino, now offers a permanent ID card for disabled resident drivers who require the assistance of an artificial device to walk. The card may be obtained by completing forms available through the Town Clerk's office in Oyster Bay hamlet and returning them, in person, with a remittance of \$3.00. A disabled person presenting his ID card and vehicle registration at any Town

beach will have a free seasonal beach sticker attached to his vehicle.

At certain Town beaches permitting non-resident use, the fee for non-residents will be \$3.00 per car on weekdays and \$5.00 per car on weekends and holidays. A daily charge of \$1.00 per person over the age of twelve (12) will be made for all non-resident pedestrians.

While there is no charge for residents launching boats at the new permanent ramps at Theodore Roosevelt Memorial Park and the ramps at Tappen Beach and Burns Park, the seasonal parking fee of \$6.00 for their cars or half-ton trucks will be levied. Daily car truck parking charges for non-residents are \$3.00 on weekdays and \$5.00 on weekends and holidays; non-residents will also be charged \$2.00 per day for the use of the ramps.

Supervisor Burke said that the temporary launching ramps placed at Centre Island and Stehli Beaches last year during the renovation of the Roosevelt launching ramps will be available for use again this boating season.

The Tappen Beach pool will be open between 1 PM - 7 PM on weekdays, and 10 AM - 7 PM on weekends and holidays between June 19th and September 6th. Use of the pool on weekdays between 9 AM - 1 PM will be allocated for school district programs and the Town's free swimming classes scheduled through Edward F. Brickell, Superintendent of Beaches.

Fees for residents are set at \$7.75 per day for adults and \$5.00 for those under twelve (12) years of age. Non-resident adults will pay \$1.00 per day and those under 12 will pay \$7.75. A \$25 per day fee for the use of the lockers will apply to residents and non-residents alike.

Burke also noted that this is the first boating season that the Town will provide racks suitable for storage of sunfish and sailfish at Tappen Beach. A total of 24 racks are available to Town residents only, from now through November 7th, at a charge of \$50.00; a fee of \$25.00 will be levied for those purchasing space after August 1st. Application for use of the racks can be made through the Superintendent of Beaches.

A pamphlet entitled "Your Town Beaches - Preserved to be Enjoyed" offers additional information about the Town's beach facilities and services. It can be obtained by writing to the Beach Division at Town Hall, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay 11771, or by calling the division at 922-5800, ext. 271 between 9 AM - 4:45 PM on weekdays.

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Dear Friends...

Well, downtown Hicksville is really beginning to show signs of being beautified ... no wonder with so many local organizations, citizens and merchants working together for this purpose. In the last few days we were pleased to see two large "Welcome to Hicksville" signs up on Broadway, which we understand were donated by the Hicksville Sons of Italy ... they really look great.

This week every home in the Hicksville School District received a copy of the District's Bulletin Board Brochure, which, as they state, is "intended to give voters a broad overview of the school budget." This proposed school budget, which will be voted on, on Wed., June 23, is, as stated by the Board in the May 6 issue of THE HERALD, a "no-growth in dollars" budget. In the light of certain unavoidable raises, this amount, \$27,451,140.00, will, as Supt. of Schools Dr. Fred Hill states, "require some belt tightening in every phase of operations, but, except for requiring secondary school pupils (roughly 1,100 of them) to walk to school, there will be no loss of the instructional programs and services or extra-curricular activities as offered this year ... There will be a budget hearing on Wed., June 2, starting at 8:15 p. m. in the Senior High School. We hope all concerned parents and taxpayers will study the Board's Budget Brochure, and attend this budget hearing.

An informed vote is so important, not only to your tax rate, but also to the children of our community. While at the budget hearing, if you have questions, do not hesitate to bring them up. As we said last week, "There are no stupid questions." There are many well informed people, both in the administration and on the school board, who will do their best to help you to understand this situation. So, come on down. As they say on TV, "government is NOT a spectator sport."

Running for the Board of Education School District 17, Hicksville, are Iris Wolfson, incumbent, opposed by John F. Prokotek, while incumbent Thomas Nagle is running for re-election opposed by Frank H. Willard.

In another page of THE HERALD, you will find the time, route and other details about the coming Memorial Day Parade and Service. Remembering those who have given their lives so that we can continue to enjoy our freedoms, should come before shopping. I, for one, am against stores opening on Memorial Day. I do remember ... I hope you do too.

The Parish Hall in Old St. Ignatius Loyola School rang with revelry last Friday evening as Hicksville celebrated with a Bicentennial Ball. Over 240 local patriots, many in home-crafted or rented costumes, honored the nation to the Syncopating rhythms of Joe Testa and his orchestra.

Sponsored by the Gregory Museum, the ball was a most successful gathering, including among its guests and patrons a veritable cross-section of Hicksville community groups. Guests of honor included newly appointed Nassau County District Court Judge Warren Doolittle and his lady and Dr. and Mrs. Frederick Hill, Superintendent of Hicksville Schools. The noted educator provided a most stirring "toast to the United States' Bicentennial" in one of many memorable moments in this night of pageantry. A lovely guest of honor was Elaine Tusa, the Gregory Museum's Bicentennial Grandmother Contest Queen, who was escorted by her husband, Joseph.

Among other distinguished guests of honor or participants were two whose community-minded efforts made the large school hall available to the Hicksville Bicentennial Committee: Father Frederick Harrer, Pastor, and Samuel McCafferty, President of the St. Ignatius Church Parish Council. The Reverends William Karvelis and Hugh Cannon were also present to welcome the community. Mrs. Iris Wolfson, President of the Board of

Education, Mr. Lawrence Wolfson and Mr. John Ayers of the School Board and Mrs. Ayers were also on hand to join in the fun. Chief Roy Schaaf of the Hicksville Fire Department, some of his officers, and their lovely spouses made up a handsome table.

The Oyster Bay Town Bicentennial Commission's popular Chairman, Dorothy H. McGee, author and distinguished local historian, was present, being escorted in the Grand March coincidentally, but appropriately, by a bearded young "soldier" of the Queen's Rangers, whose green-coated British unit occupied Oyster Bay village during the Revolutionary War.

Among organizations prominently present - many in costumes reflecting ingenuity and two hundred years of American history - were: the Galileo Lodge of the Sons of Italy; the Hicksville Kiwanis; Charles Wagner Post of the American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; the Knights of Columbus; Troop and Pack 172 of the Boy Scouts of America; the Catholic Daughters of America; the Hicksville Auxiliary Police; the Gregory Museum and the Presidents of three units of the Parent-Teacher-Association as well as Assistant Principal of Lee Avenue School, Mr. Lou Penque.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Noeth,
This is the time of year when I'm sure many of Hicksville taxpayers turn their attention a little more to what is going on in our schools, because, of course, this is budget voting time. I am no exception. I have not been able to make the school board meetings due to personal health reasons, but I am on the Executive Board of the East St. P.T.A. But somehow, if it was mentioned at all at our meetings, it by-passed me. I am referring, of course, to the change in the transportation police of Hicksville. I was not aware of it until I received the Hicksville Public School Bulletin Board today, May 25.
I realize it is not easy to make up a budget for a school and get the best education for your tax dollars without increasing that

budget. A "no growth in dollars" budget has been presented to us this year. Dr. Hill, our Superintendent of Schools, tells us to achieve this there must be "belt tightening in every phase of operations." The only area that has a major change is that our children from grades 7 through 12 will walk a 1/2 mile further. Otherwise the policy of transporting the students in the district remains the same. How, I ask you, in all good conscience can such a statement be made?
This policy that "remains the same" involves some 1200 additional new walkers. Many children who rode before will now have to walk and not just a 1/2 mile that was so gently put in the Bulletin, but in many cases over a mile and still others almost a mile and a half. So again, I ask, how can the Board say that the

Transportation policy we have had in the past will remain the same. When 1200 or more children now walk, who once rode, that is an increase of approximately 25 percent and that parents, is a definite change in policy. I ask you readers to please be aware of this. I'm sure that many of us are dissatisfied with this "change in policy." It may not be too late to do something about it. Otherwise, many of us will find we will have to vote NO on the budget, thereby affecting all the children. I'm sorry to say. Only in this way can there be fairness to all. Therefore, please write your Board members about your dissatisfaction of this change and let your voices be heard at the Budget meeting on June 2.

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School Boards "Outraged" at Pension Fattening

The Executive Committee of the Nassau Suffolk School Boards Association, at its monthly meeting on May 20, passed a resolution calling for "the defeat of any legislator who votes for legislation which fattens teacher pensions at a time when school districts are being forced to cut programs and personnel." The Executive Committee expressed its outrage at the terms of Assembly Bill A 11140 and its companion Senate Bill S 8675 now nearing votes which would add hundreds of thousands of dollars to the budgets of Long Island districts without adding anything at all to education.

"Politicians are constantly claiming that school boards are spendthrifts, irresponsible and unwilling to control costs," said Mrs. Eleanor Smith, President of the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association, "while at the same time their mandating us to spend money without in any way providing a source for those funds which the already beleaguered taxpayer."

In September of 1974 Mrs. Smith stated, "That it was the obligation of school board members as locally elected state officials to use all available means to insure the best possible education for the children of their constituents. This would certainly seem to include making known to the voters of their school districts the positions and

attitudes of candidates for state and federal offices relative to the education matters within the purview of the offices which they seek."

Mrs. Smith noted that almost 15 of the state aid to local education loudly proclaimed by the Governor and the Legislature never leaves Albany but is used to pay the state mandated retirement benefits and other fringe benefit costs. "The money to pay these mandates comes out of funds for education and the Legislature knows it," Mrs. Smith pointed out. "It is interesting that this legislation has reached its third reading without attracting any public attention. As local school trustees who have to deal with irate taxpayers and runaway tax rates we can understand why politicians concerned with re-election in November don't want to call attention to this raid upon tax dollars supposedly destined for the classroom but which will now line the pockets of New York State United Teachers members as a political payoff."

Assembly Bill A 11139 which would permit state retirement system credit of up to three years for military service is also opposed by the Association although it would not have as disastrous an effect as would the other bills.

Statewide contributions to the

teachers retirement fund will increase by more than \$20,500,000 this school year alone if this legislation sneaks through. Districts presently contribute 19.4 percent of their payroll to the teachers retirement fund and these new laws will increase that with almost another percentage point. Taxpayers can take 1 percent of the teacher payroll in their school districts and calculate that amount in terms of its effect on the local tax rate to get an indication of how significant these two pieces of legislation are.

While the Executive Committee of the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association said it would actively work in November for the defeat of legislators supporting this "outrageous" legislation it pointed out that November would be too late to rectify the unconscionable wrong done to the school children of New York State if this legislation is passed.

They urged all residents to contact immediately their state assemblymen and senators to urge the defeat of this legislation when it is called for a vote. "The State teachers union lobbyists are pushing all out for this one," Mrs. Smith said. "The State and County school board associations are pushing hard against it. The only lobby we have is the people. They must make themselves heard now. Next week may be too late. November will certainly be too late."

Editor's Note: Assembly Bill A-11140 and its companion Senate Bill S-8675 will adversely affect your next tax bill. If you wish to go on record opposing it, write to your elected officials in Albany and let them know how you feel. . . NOW.

Lent To Hold Forum In Hicksville

Memorial Day

Memorial Day originated after the Civil War to honor those who had given "the last full measure of devotion." It was designed by the Grand Army of the Republic to honor the dead, and, more importantly, to inspire the living.

Thus, the solemn and somber occasion is a time for recollection, to reflect upon the nature and the meaning of the sacrifice by our war dead. We can agree that they fought for their country's 200 years of freedom and the preservation of their way of life, but there is something more, which the late, famous war correspondent Ernie Pyle explained so well.

While watching the great waves of humanity pouring ashore at Normandy, he wondered what it was that sparked these men to storm impenetrable defenses in the face of an unending rain of deadly fire. He first thought they were fighting for their country, but the invasion force was made up of many nations. And then he thought they were fighting for glory, but it became obvious that there was no glory in such a devastating business.

Finally, Ernie Pyle concluded that, in the most basic sense, they were fighting for each other. In so doing, they had imparted a new dimension to the word "duty."

We cannot bring back those who have gone, but all of us can provide for them the noblest of monuments: remembering what they stood for and their accomplishments. It is up to all of us to see that these men did not serve in vain and that the memory of what they did is not eroded by time.

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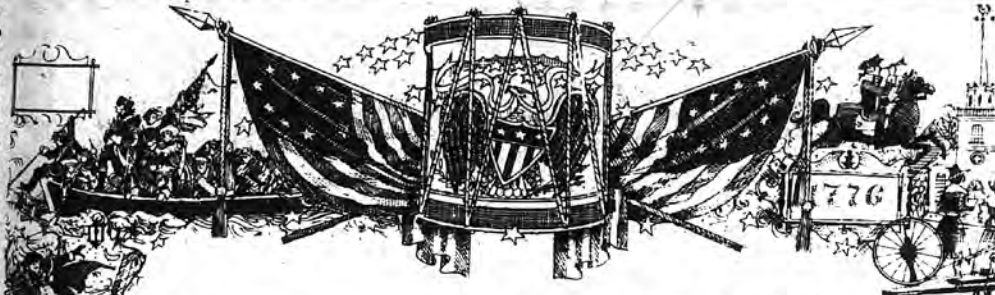
