





The Board of Education has directed that there should be no growth in the dollars expended, and therefore, for the first time in over twenty-five years, our porposed total school expenditures are not increased. To create such a budget, the Board of Education and ad-ministrative staff carefully reviewed budgetary requests, and had to cut over 1.2 million dollars from original requests of the individual schools and departments. The unavoidable increases in costs for lights, heat, power, repairs, supplies and should be no growth in the dollars increases in costs for lights, heat, power, repairs, supplies and equipment, plus the state and lederal levied increases in taxes. for retirement and social security, had to be offset by corresponding cuts in other sections of the budget. Due to declining enrollment and by decreasing staffs, it was possible to offer the same level of in structional services within the total dollar limit of this year's budget. The only reduction in budget The only reduction in service is a one-half mile in-crease in the walking distance for Junior and Senior High school pupils. These will now be 1-1-2 and 2 miles respectively. This reduction in bus service will not affect elementary school pupils.



which could then provide the most education at the least cost, A STRONG planning com-mittee is an immediate need in preparing comprehensive plans to cope with a decling enrollment to cope with a decing enrolment continued inflation, and reduced state aid. Each committee plan must offer recommendations that are the best of all available courses of action - fully studied for their effect on the children, on the education preserve and as the the education process, and on the taxpayers. The committee must have the facts, the brains, and the GUTS to make the proper choice among the various alternatives.

Mere "lip-service" to ap-pointment of a committee and its workings and of "cosmetic ac-tion" on committee recom-

mendations must not be accepted

mendations must not be accepted by taxpayers. 2. Alternative budgeting principles must be adopted. Alternatives would be provided by the planning committee. Full backup material should be furnished with each recom-mendation so that the board can fully review and can reach logical decisions. Public hearings logical decisions. Public hearings and full publicity is mandatory in order to eliminate any possibility of deceiving the taxpayers. The Citizen's Budget Advisory Committee should be eliminated; Committee should be eliminated; citizens cannot be expected to have the capability of making budgetary recommendations based upon biased facts presented by administrators.

3. There must be a reduction of costs associated with educator pay and fringe benefits coupled with an improvement in the pay

of those who earn below a specified threshold. The costs of educators can be reduced by

elimination of all excess teachers - those not required as a normal result of a declining student population and by the elimination of programs which are not cost effective in terms of the results obtained or the number of students served.

4. The addition or expansion of a program or a cause, or the purchase or lease of additional equipment must be evaluated, not only for cost effectiveness, but it must evaluated in terms of

but it must evaluated in terms of a declining enrollment, continued inflation, and the burdens of the taxpayer.⁶ 5. The school board must be removed from the hands of special interest groups and placed back into the hands of the laxpayer. Sneitlieu, andue influence by educator unions must be eliminated. Board deliberations and judgments must be based on fact and logic and the will of the people- - and not on the interests of special groups.

groups.
6. A procedure must be established to immediately suspend any teacher who uses excessive or unnecessary force against a student for any reason whatsoever. If facts leading to his suspension are sustained during a subsequent hearing, the teacher must be fired at once. Taxpayers cannot allow the trust placed by parents in teachers to be flaunted with impunity.

7. The 'law of diminishing returns' now applies to our education system. I do not sub-scribe to the twin fallacies of ignorance. More money sunk into education does not breed better education is followed. education - it fattens educator's paychecks. Most certainly, higher taxes do not improve property values.
