Does Hicksville Have A Drug And Alcohol Abuse Problem?

As Executive Director of Help-Aid-Direction (H.A.D.), a Hicksville-based youth and family counseling, drug and alcohol abuse prevention and treatment center, I have been regularly approached by numerous concerned parents and adults seeking an honest straight answer to this important question.

Unfortunately, I must answer in the affirmative. Hicksville and its neighboring communities of Jericho, Syosset, Plainview, Bethpage, Levittown, East

Meadow, and Westbury are very typical of countless other suburban areas. They all have certain groups of youngsters and adults who abuse drugs and alcohol in order to be able to cope with everyday stress and personal, emotional conflicts.

Hicksville is an "average" community. It has many attractive aspects which enhance life for its inhabitants. However, a certain percentage of its adolescent and adult population possess personal difficulties requiring intervention from concerned counseling agencies like Help-Aid-Direction.

The H.A.D. organization has served the residents of Hicksville and its neighboring communities with viable counseling and referral services since October 1970.

H.A.D. has helped many adolescents, adults, and families get a clearer understanding of their problems and thus improve interpersonal relationships among family members.

The abusive use of drugs and alcohol is symptomatic of an inability on the part of a person to effectively resolve internal personal conflicts and feel

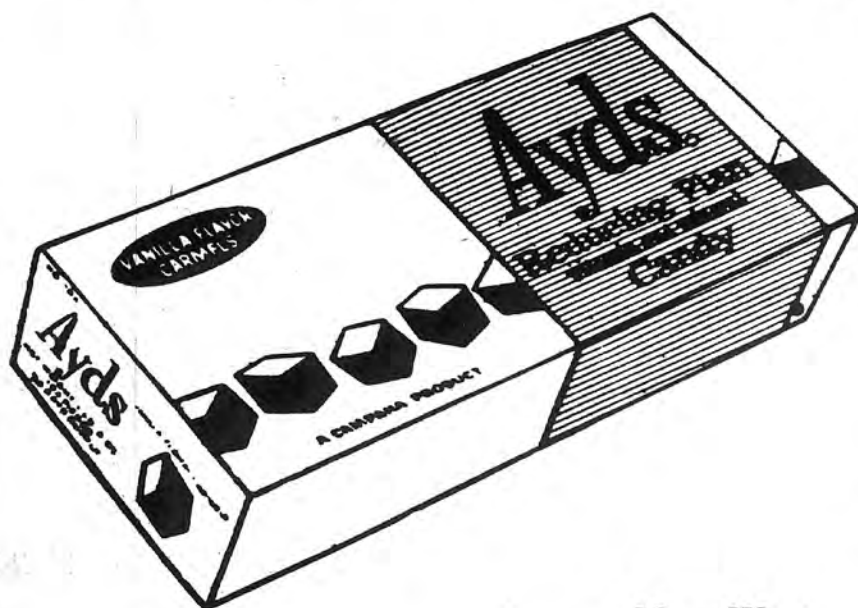

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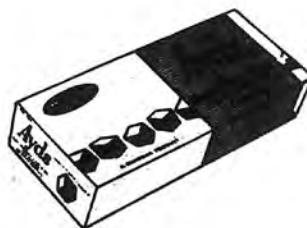
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Disposal Facility Open

Town Councilman Joseph J. Saladino has reminded homeowners in Oyster Bay that the Town's free disposal facilities are open 7 days a week for residents who have large amounts of fallen branches and trees to dispose of as a result of Hurricane Belle.

Judging from the numbers of trees down throughout our Town, Saladino said, "Our Commissioner of Public Works said it would be some time before his crews would be able to begin curbside collection of large amounts of fallen trees and branches."

According to Saladino, Chairman of the Town Board's Standing Committee on Highways and Sanitation, before the highway crews will begin curbside pickup of trees and branches they will be continuing their efforts to clear roadways of the fallen trees. The first priority must be the safety of Town residents and that means our

highway crews will be continuing the task of clearing public thoroughfares," Saladino explained. "It will only be after the roadways are cleared that the highway trucks will become available for collection of fallen trees and branches that residents will be gathering from their own property."

There were still a great number of trees blocking roadways as of this weekend, Saladino said, despite the fact that Town Highway and Park crews had worked 32 straight hours when the hurricane struck Monday. After that initial effort, the Highway Division has used every available man to work strictly on the road clearing program during regular work schedules but trees that were weakened by the hurricane continued falling during the remainder of the week, and, in many instances, the Town forces were delayed in their efforts while they awaited LULCO crews.

If homeowners do not have large amounts of fallen trees and branches, they are reminded that such items can be placed out for curbside collection by the Town Sanitation crews. The branches will be picked up by the sanitation trucks on regular rubbish days as long as the lengths of the branches do not exceed 4 feet and the homeowner ties them in bundles not exceeding 50 pounds each or a total weight of 200 pounds.

"But for the homeowner with greater needs, who wants to immediately rid himself of the branches on his property, the Town's free disposal area for non-commercial residents is a great convenience," Saladino advised. The area where Town residents can bring such rubbish is located adjacent to the Town incinerator complex at Old Bethpage just off Round Swamp Road. The disposal area is open from 8 AM to 9 PM every day including weekends.

July Construction Tops \$4 Million

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Gregory W. Garman announced that the value of construction permits issued by the Town's Building Division during the month of July exceeded \$4 million.

Among the permits let in July were: 29 for new one-family dwellings valued at \$2,179,614; 10 for commercial construction valued at \$1,149,335; and 70 for residential alterations and ad-

ditions valued at \$499,722.

In addition, 10 permits for other than residential alterations were issued valued at \$29,020; and 1 industrial construction permit valued at \$439,000.

Councilman Garman, Chairman of the Town Board's Standing Committee on Commerce and Industry, said that the total dollar value of all permits issued for the month of July was \$4,284,706.

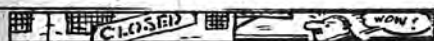

To The Editor:
The Town's Disaster Task Force wasted no time putting its emergency plan into effect last week following the Weather Bureau's announcement of Belle's impending visit. I am very proud of the job that all of these people did-from the tree crews out in the storm to the supervisors manning the phones and radio-many of whom were still at their posts 32 hours later.

That Monday morning (August 9), department and division heads met to review plans and coordinate assignments of men and equipment with their foreman and field forces. Headquarters were set up in the Highway Division Operations Center with communications and control under the supervision of

Receives Award

The Tobay Federal Credit Union has earned a National Credit Union (NCUA) Thrift Honor Award for its success in stimulating savings among small savers. Councilman Howard T. Hogan announced.

According to Hogan, the Town Unit was awarded this honor because it attained a monthly growth rate of 3 percent in accounts under \$20,000. "This rate-of-growth was well above the average for federal credit unions of similar size," Hogan reported.

On June 30, 1976 the credit union had 1,435 members with total savings of \$1,599,983. The credit union, which was chartered in October 1960, serves the employees of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York; and members of their immediate families.

Stephen McDonough, Jr. of Massapequa is President of the credit union and Joseph Zegers of Farmingdale serves as its Treasurer.

The Thrift Honor Award program, sponsored by the National Credit Union Administration, serves as an incentive for federal credit union officials to encourage members with small accounts to include regular savings.

the Commissioner of Public Works and the Deputy Superintendent of Highways.

On the north shore, a similar operations center was manned in the General Services Department at Town Hall. Weather broadcasts were continuously monitored, and it was soon evident that the south shore was going to be hit first and hardest. Fourteen trucks and crews were dispatched to operate out of the Carman Mill Road Highway Center in Massapequa, and radio-equipped vehicles patrolled the area's streets.

The Town's primary responsibility is to keep open the more than 700 miles of Town roads for emergency vehicles or evacuation. Work crews, therefore, concentrated on cutting trees blockings roads and moving them of one side. Other crews would later be assigned to cleanup and removal operations.

It has been estimated that some 4,000 trees along Town road rights of way went down, many of them destroying sidewalks and curbs in the process. Highway personnel have already commenced a survey of the extent of this damage for which we will be seeking federal and state funds to carry out repairs.

As our crews continue this massive cleanup operation, I hope you will continue to be patient and to cooperate as you have always done in the past. I want to publicly commend all of these Town employees for their outstanding performance and dedication throughout this emergency.

Oyster Bay Management, when it comes to service they are consistent. When it snows, you never see a snow plow, when the roads are a sheet of ice you never see any sand on them, when the roads are full of pot holes (new south road) you never see a highway crew making decent repairs that will hold up. Its been almost 2 weeks since Hurricane Belle left town and yep - you guessed it the trees are still laying in the street. No doubt we are expected to chop them up into 3 foot pieces and tie them up neatly at the curb.

Maybe the foremen go out at night to look for work to do, but due to the world war 1 era street light system which in most areas is so dim, they can't see the fallen trees.

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State Legislature's Failure To Act Endangers Senior Tax Exemptions

For the first time since the senior citizens property tax exemption program was adopted in Nassau County in 1967, there has been a decrease in the number of senior citizens receiving the exemption according to Abe Seldin, chairman of the Board of Assessors.

"Last April I predicted that many senior citizens would lose their exemptions due to Social Security cost of living increases unless the State Legislature acted to increase the income limitation," stated Seldin. "I journeyed to Albany to urge legislative action. The Senate passed an increase bill but it died in the Assembly and now many seniors will suffer."

Under State law a senior citizen can receive a 50 percent reduction in his county, town and school taxes (not including

special districts) if he meets certain qualifications, including a \$6,500 income limitation. Increases in Social Security cost of living benefits have brought many seniors over the limitation by \$100 or \$200. This results in them losing the exemption and having to pay as much as \$1,500 in additional property taxes.

In 1976, there were 11,105 seniors receiving the exemption on the school assessment roll. In 1977, 1,235 new exemptions were added to the roll while 1,511 were removed. Most of the 1,511 were removed due to homes being sold and to deaths. However, approximately 400 senior citizens in Nassau County lost their exemption directly as a result of Social Security cost of living increases. For 1977, there will be 10,829 senior citizens receiving

the property tax exemption on the school assessment roll or a net decrease of 276 from last year.

"I am concerned that many of these senior citizens may be in danger of losing their homes," stated Seldin. "Our department is powerless to act since we are only the local administrators of the statewide exemption law."

In July of 1976 senior citizens received another Social Security cost of living increase which could push even more seniors over the \$6,500 limit for next year.

"Legislation is urgently needed to stop this pattern where government gives with one hand and takes more away with the other," asserted Seldin. "The alternative is to have more and more seniors lose their exemption each year."

The Fiedel School's complex, in addition to its extensive day school facilities, includes tennis courts, a number of athletic fields, a large geodesic dome for gymnastics, contemporary playgrounds and studio workshops in all the arts. The school has recently been awarded grant support from the Educational Division of the National Endowment for the Arts, and The New York Foundation for the Arts. It has received scholarship aid support from the Clark Foundation.
