Building Hit By 90G Blaze

A fire in a 2 story office building at 82 No. Broadway caused considerable damage. The fire was reported at 8:57 AM on August 31. Hicksville Chief Roy Schaff said the fire started in an office on the 2nd floor of the Guardian Life Insurance

Building.
The first arriving engine company found a fast moving fire company toutous arisk moving fire and a 2nd and later a 3rd alarm were transmitted. The Jericho F.D. assisted with a pumper at the scene, along with a tower ladder from Westbury. The Plainview Fire Dept stood by at fire headquarters for additional alarms. alarms.

The fire was up above the The fire was up above the ceiling and vamps worked feverishly to expose and extinguish the fire. The skylight above the fire broke from the heat and this helped vamps move in fast at the point of origin. Fire efficiers praised the firemen from the responding departments for a theorythic professional, inch. throughly professional job. Workers in the fire building and adjacent buildings were evacuated

Four offices suffered damage and 10 others sustained water and smoke damage. Several firemen suffered minor injuries and were treated at the scene and released. In charge of the fire were Cap-tains Donlon, O'Brien and tains Donion, O'Brien and Sulzinski and Kershow. Hicksville Chief Roy Schaaf was notified and responded in from Freeport. 





"Excuse me, where is the 'Stack O' Barley' Irish Pub located?", a well dressed man and woman in a late model automobile recently asked this reporter as he was airing his dog

ne Saturday evening.

After being told that it was only few blocks away, the couple

Then we began to wonder why so many people from out-of-town have asked similar questions in recent months. We set out to

After talking to the manager of the pub, which is located in a neighborhood shopping center at the corner of Bloomindale Road and Broadway (Route 107) in Hicksville, we found out that the enterprise was opened last December 26 by Henry F. Shekleton and James McQuade. The partners are both American The partners are both American born: Harry Shekleton is from the Bronx, but he spent most of his youth in County Meath, Ireland, and Jim McQuade is from Belair, Ohio.

Both men spent many years working for other Irish bars in New York City and elsewhere

before starting up their own operation.

Mr. Shekleton said that most of the pub's steady customers are Irish-Americans. But they in-clude a handful of Jewish businessmen from local stores

businessmen from local stores and plants, as well as some Germans, Poles, Italians, and many other nationalities. "We also do a large luncheon business with the employees of Grumman Aerospace across the ctreat."

He added that the "Stack O' Barley", which is named after an old Irish dance, holds about 150 persons, and is jammed on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights when there is

Sunday nights when there is music and singing.
"We plan to add an Amateur Night in September and are thinking about some other feature for Tuesday's."

In regard to the food and drink, Mr. Shekleton said, "Our Irish coffee is one of our most popular drinks—we sell almost 500 glasses a week. One reason for this, I believe, is that we use fresh, heavy cream that is mixed in our own blender, instead of the canned stuff many other places use."

The recipe for Irish coffee is

fairly simple, he noted.
"Start with a teaspoon of sugar in a 7-ounce glass. Add a jigger of Irish whiskey, then fresh black coffee, and top off with a half-inch of fresh whipped cream. It is Alliains!"

On the food side of business, the

On the food side of business, the dinner menu features a new "Tasty Melt" sandwich for \$2.25. Basically this consists of a hamburger and two slices of American cheese on buttered rye bread. All of this is broiled together. Customers go home and rave about the flavor to their relatives and friends; Mr. Shekleton laughed. Shekleton laughed.

The most expensive item on the dinner menu is Broiled Lobster Tails for \$3.50. But there is also Hamburger De Lux for \$2.25; Irish style sausage for \$3.50, and Steak Tid-Bits for \$4.25.

Many of these items are also on the luncheon menu, but at con-

the luncheon menu, but at considerably lower prices.

Mr. Shekleton noted that he was surprised at the large number of diners who ordered wine with their meals. He

wine with their meals. He believes that many of them picked up the habit while traveling in Europe. Like many other Long Island taverns, the "Slack O' Barley" insists on proper attire for its patrons. A sign on the front door advises everyone that T-Shirts, Jeans, Tank Tops, and the like are not welcomed. are not welcomed

"The majority of our customers are middle aged couples out for an evening of wholesome entertainment, "Mr.

He added that customers come from all over Nassau, Suffolk and New York City to hear such entertainers as The Irish Blazers,

entertainers as The Irish Blazers,
Noel Kingston, and Paddy
Farrell, The Goodtimers, The
Blackwater Boys and Ann Egan.
While listening to Noel
Kingston on Saturday night, this
reporter wondered aloud why it
took so long for someone to fill the
need for a good Irish singing pub
in central Long Island.

m central Long Island.
For Hicksville has the largest Irish population of any village on Long Island, according to a study by the Knights of Columbus. And it has three large County it has three large Catholic churches and a 2,000-student regional High School (Holy Trinity)

For the future, Mr. Shekleton said that he and his partner plan to make the "Stack O' Barley" the finest Irish pub in the metropolitan area. And if they are successful, they will open several others on the Island. The pub is now advertised each week in various newspapers and this draws customers from all over New York City, as well as Nassau

New York City, as well as Nassau and Suffolk.

He thinks that there is still ample room in Nassau and Suffolk for other Irish pubs because there are only a handful now, compared with the scores of them in New York City.

Finally, he said, "Our biggest crowd so far was on last St. Patrick's Day when the cars were lined up for a half-mile on both sides of Bloomingdale Road. "We wouldn't want that many

We wouldn't want that many people here as a steady thing, but it makes us feel good to see such a turnout once in a while."

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


