Building Hit By 90G Blaze

A fire in a 2 story office building at 82 No. Broadway caused considerable damage. The fire was reported at 8:57 AM on August 31. Hicksville Chief Roy Schaff said the fire started in an office on the 2nd floor of the Guardian Life Insurance Building.

The first arriving engine company found a fast moving fire and a 2nd and later a 3rd alarm were transmitted. The Jericho F.D. assisted with a pumper at the scene, along with a tower ladder from Westbury. The Plainview Fire Dept stood by at fire headquarters for additional alarms.

The fire was up above the ceiling and vamps worked feverishly to expose and extinguish the fire. The skylight above the fire broke from the heat and this helped vamps move in fast at the point of origin. Fire officers praised the firemen from the responding departments for a thoroughly professional job. Workers in the fire building and adjacent buildings were evacuated

without incident. Four offices suffered damage and 10 others sustained water and smoke damage. Several firemen suffered minor injuries and were treated at the scene and released. In charge of the fire were Captains Donlon, O'Brien and Sulzinski and Kershaw. Hicksville Chief Roy Schaff was notified and responded in from Freeport. Chiefs from the Jericho, Bethpage and Westbury Dept assisted.

9 pieces of Hicksville apparatus responded with 100 men including the assisting departments.

Fire Report
During the 2 week period of Aug. 17-31st Hicksville vamps responded to 55 alarms. There were 21 rescue calls, 29 fire calls 5 malicious false alarms. The false alarms came in from: Cottage Blvd & Jordan La., Woodbury Rd & Haverford Rd., Nicholia St & Broadway, Cantigue Rd (Center) and Duffy Ave & Charlotte Ave.

In other fires, a smokey fire damaged the Ice House on E. Marie St. the Aug 2; alarm was

reported at 12:57 AM. The cause was listed as suspicious. The county marshalls office is investigating. A fire in a house at 12 Pine St on August 30 caused considerable damage to the basement. Vamps contained the smokey fire to the basement. That alarm was reported at 4:37 PM.

Parade & Drill Awards
The Hicksville Jr. firemen continued their winning ways by winning 5th place in total points in a Jr. tournament in Islip Terrace. In a Bayport tourney the Juniors took 4th place in total points and a parade prize.

In the N.Y. State Firemens Convention in Watertown, N.Y. the Ladies Aux are again State champs in the marching division. In the 9th Battalion Parade & Drill held in South Farmingdale the members of the Hicksville F.D. took 2nd place, following Westbury. The Ladies Aux. continued their winning ways with a 1st place Best Appearing unit. And the Jr. firemen also won 1st place. In the tournament which was won by Westbury, the Hicks Drill Team placed 4th in total points.

Setting up the tournament track began on Sunday August 29, the men and committee have worked all week to get ready for our big day on Monday Sept. 6th.

Hicksville will be honoring the 1976 gold medalist of the XXI Olympiad in Montreal. He is the winner in the lightweight division in boxing for the U.S. Olympic Team. His name is Howard Davis and he lives in Glen Cove. Howard will be riding in one of our cars in the parade.

This year each of the six divisions of the parade will be lead off by one of the ex-Chiefs of

the Dept. and a piece of antique fire equipment. There will be a 1858 Water Witch from Farmingdale Water Witch Co. No. 1 and a 1872 Hose Reel of Enterprise Hose Co. No. 1 of Hempstead, leading the 1st division. The 2nd division will be lead by a 1902 Horse Drawn Steamer from Roslyn Rescue Co. At The School Board Meeting

At the August 25th Board Meeting all were present except Mr. Bruno who was unable to attend. Mrs. Wolfson, School Board President was celebrating her birthday and received a lovely corsage for the occasion.

Purchase of audio-visual supplies, magazines and periodicals were approved for the school year.

Additional bicycle racks will be installed at the Jr. High School and available as school starts. With the cut-back in transportation mileage more students may have need for them.

Dr. Hill reported, that they change in starting time at the Jr. High, fifteen minutes later, requires an adjustment in bussing. Exact figures as to the number required could not be given until after school starts.

Announcement was made of

the retirement of Mary Yigdal, a secretary who served in the District for fifteen years. The Board wished her well.

Mr. Erwin was appointed as Consultant in Mathematics filling this vacancy. He has been a teacher of mathematics in the Hicksville Schools.

With the District again this year will be, Mr. Bob Ellegard, working with teen problems of drug and alcohol addition. This is a cooperative venture with Nassau County, and fund will be coming from their budget to help pay his salary for this year.

Circulating through all the elementary schools will be five "math helping teachers" wherever necessary.

Mr. Rienzo has been acting as Athletic Director for the district, as well as his regular assignments. Request for additional

payment for this work could not be voted upon, because Board members wanted to check past records for procedures.

Please accept this correction of my last report...Mr. Brad Jawarski a staff teacher now on Sabbatical leave was allowed to continue as soccer coach.

Mrs. Wolfson advised me that the important Community Relations Committee for Long-Range Planning will have Mr. Nangle and herself as co-chairpersons.

Announcement from our Treasurer was made that Scholarship Funds were to be transferred to banks offering the highest interest rates.

With no questions from the public, the meeting ended early. The next Board meeting will be Wednesday, September 8th at 8:15 PM and all are welcome.

Hicksville Administrative Changes

The Board of Education at its regular meeting of August 25 made the following administrative assignments. Mr. William Granville was appointed as Principal of East Street, Mr. Richard Jennett was reassigned as Principal of Fork Lane School, Mr. John Mateer was reassigned as Principal of Lee Avenue School and Mr. John Maher was returned as Principal of the Willet Avenue School.

These administrative changes afford the Hicksville Schools the opportunity of bringing a fresh look and different creative administrative talents and ideas to East Street, Fork Lane, Lee Avenue and the Willet Avenue Schools while preserving the many fine accomplishments that

have been going on in these schools in the past.

MR. WILLIAM GRANVILLE, the new East Street School principal, was graduated from Brockport State Teachers College in 1955 and earned his Master's Degree from Hofstra University in 1959. He has continued to take advanced graduate work at Hofstra in supervision and administration. As a novice elementary teacher, Mr. Granville came to Hicksville fresh from college in 1955 and served in a classroom capacity until 1966. For three years thereafter (1966-69), he functioned as a special mathematics teacher until his appointment as an Elementary Assistant Prin-

cipal effective September 1, 1969.

Following a fine career as an Assistant Principal, notably in Woodland Avenue School, for the 1974-75 school year, Mr. Granville was assigned to duty in the area of mathematics at the elementary school level. In 1975-76, Mr. Granville was the district mathematics consultant for grades K-8.

Mr. Granville was born in Rochester, New York in 1927, and is married to the former Joan Geiger. They have six children, ranging upward in age from 11 to 20, with the oldest a sophomore in college, one in the United States Navy, one daughter married, and the three youngest in public

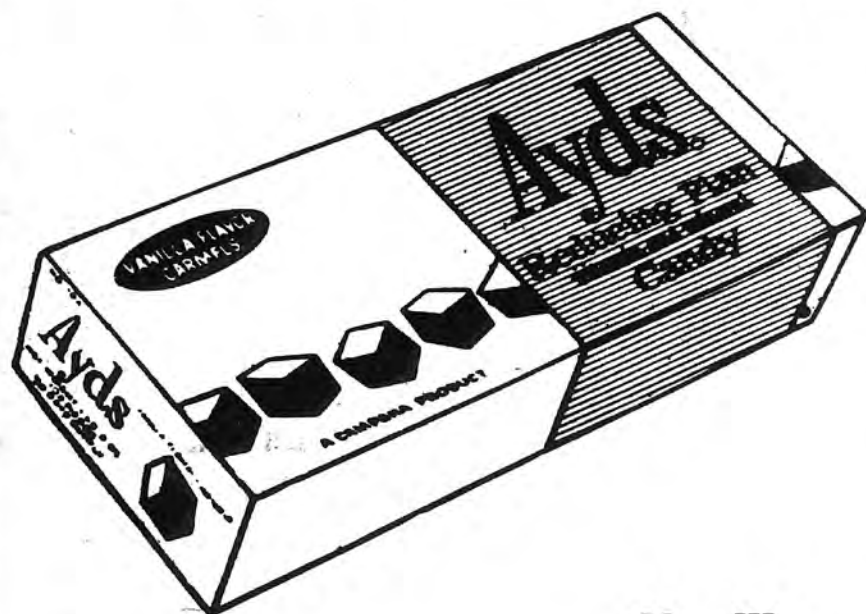

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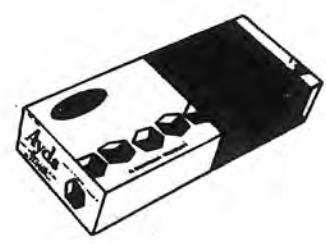
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Auditions Set For CAPA Chorale

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark urged all Town residents who enjoy singing and would like to be a member of a performing choral group to come and audition for the Town's CAPA Chorale on Tuesday, September 14.

Try-outs will be held at the Syosset-Woodbury Community Park Center, 7800 Jericho Tpke., Woodbury, from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M. All Town residents high-school age and older are eligible.

Formed in 1974 under the auspices of the Cultural and Performing Arts (CAPA) Division of the Department of Community Services, the CAPA

Chorale is dedicated to the study and performance of all types of music. The group has performed at various libraries and Bicentennial events and appeared in concert with the Massapequa Symphony. Musical selections have ranged from Honegger's oratorio "King David" to popular tunes and Broadway melodies.

Bezwersky Appointed Ronkonkoma P.M.

The appointment of William J. Bezwersky of Plainview as postmaster of Ronkonkoma, has been announced by Northeast Regional Postmaster General Frank M. Sommerkamp.

In accordance with the merit selection procedures of the Postal Reorganization Act of 1971, Mr. Bezwersky was nominated for the postmastership by the Northeast Regional Management Selection board and appointed by Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar. The appointment is not subject to Senate confirmation.

The Regional Management Selection Board is comprised of representatives from the U.S.

Civil Service Commission, American Arbitration Association, and two Postmasters selected by the Postmaster General.

Mr. Bezwersky began his postal career in 1949 as a clerk in Jamaica, N.Y., where he served for more than five years. He also served at Syosset, N.Y., for approximately six years. He has been in supervisory and managerial positions since 1970. Mr. Bezwersky joined the Ronkonkoma Post Office in 1973 as a Station and Branch Manager. He was Acting Postmaster there and, prior to his present appointment, was

Manager of Customer Services and Officer-in-Charge at Ronkonkoma.

A graduate of local schools, Mr. Bezwersky received an associate degree in business administration and management from the State University of New York at Farmingdale. He has also completed several postal supervisory and managerial programs. During 1942-47, he served with the U.S. Navy.

A recipient of several postal awards, Mr. Bezwersky resides on Prospect Ave., in Plainview, where he is active in community affairs.

B. Amend Sec. 107 of Division 1. of Article III of the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, as amended and revised, and now set forth as Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York to read as follows: Sec. 107. Tidal lands.

When the tidal lands are not shown as zoned on the zoning map, they shall be considered to lie within the use district to which it is contiguous but no structure erected therein shall be erected upon such land except upon the approval of the town board.

All persons interested shall have an opportunity to be heard upon the said proposed amendments at the time and place aforesaid.

The ordinance is on file in the office of the Town Clerk and may be examined during regular business hours by any or all interested persons.

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New Irish Pub Proves Popular

"Excuse me, where is the 'Stack O' Barley' Irish Pub located?", a well dressed man and woman in a late model automobile recently asked this reporter as he was airing his dog one Saturday evening.

After being told that it was only a few blocks away, the couple sped off.

Then we began to wonder why so many people from out-of-town have asked similar questions in recent months. We set out to investigate.

After talking to the manager of the pub, which is located in a neighborhood shopping center at the corner of Bloomingdale Road and Broadway (Route 107) in Hicksville, we found out that the enterprise was opened last December 26 by Henry F. Shekleton and James McQuade. The partners are both American born: Harry Shekleton is from the Bronx, but he spent most of his youth in County Meath, Ireland, and Jim McQuade is from Belair, Ohio.

Both men spent many years working for other Irish bars in New York City and elsewhere

before starting up their own operation.

Mr. Shekleton said that most of the pub's steady customers are Irish-Americans. But they include a handful of Jewish businessmen from local stores and plants, as well as some Germans, Poles, Italians, and many other nationalities.

"We also do a large luncheon business with the employees of Grumman Aerospace across the street."

He added that the "Stack O' Barley", which is named after an old Irish dance, holds about 150 persons, and is jammed on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights when there is music and singing.

"We plan to add an Amateur Night in September and are thinking about some other feature for Tuesday's."

In regard to the food and drink, Mr. Shekleton said, "Our Irish coffee is one of our most popular drinks—we sell almost 500 glasses a week. One reason for this, I believe, is that we use fresh, heavy cream that is mixed in our own blender, instead of the canned stuff many other places use."

The recipe for Irish coffee is

fairly simple, he noted.

"Start with a teaspoon of sugar in a 7-ounce glass. Add a jigger of Irish whiskey, then fresh black coffee, and top off with a half-inch of fresh whipped cream. It is delicious!"

On the food side of business, the dinner menu features a new "Tasty Melt" sandwich for \$2.25.

Basically this consists of a hamburger and two slices of American cheese on buttered rye bread. All of this is broiled together. Customers go home and rave about the flavor to their relatives and friends; Mr. Shekleton laughed.

The most expensive item on the dinner menu is Broiled Lobster Tails for \$9.50. But there is also Hamburger De Lux for \$2.25; Irish style sausage for \$3.50, and Steak Tid-Bits for \$4.25.

Many of these items are also on the luncheon menu, but at considerably lower prices.

Mr. Shekleton noted that he was surprised at the large number of diners who ordered wine with their meals. He believes that many of them picked up the habit while traveling in Europe.

Like many other Long Island taverns, the "Stack O' Barley" insists on proper attire for its patrons. A sign on the front door advises everyone that T-Shirts, Jeans, Tank Tops, and the like are not welcomed.

"The majority of our customers are middle aged couples out for an evening of wholesome entertainment," Mr. Shekleton said.

He added that customers come from all over Nassau, Suffolk and New York City to hear such entertainers as The Irish Blazers, Noel Kingston and Paddy Farrell, The Goodtimers, The Blackwater Boys and Ann Egan.

While listening to Noel Kingston on Saturday night, this reporter wondered aloud why it took so long for someone to fill the need for a good Irish singing pub in central Long Island.

For Hicksville has the largest Irish population of any village on Long Island, according to a study by the Knights of Columbus. And it has three large Catholic churches and a 2,000-student regional High School (Holy Trinity).

For the future, Mr. Shekleton said that he and his partner plan to make the "Stack O' Barley" the finest Irish pub in the metropolitan area. And if they are successful, they will open several others on the Island. The pub is now advertised each week in various newspapers and this draws customers from all over New York City, as well as Nassau and Suffolk.

He thinks that there is still ample room in Nassau and Suffolk for other Irish pubs because there are only a handful now, compared with the scores of them in New York City.

Finally, he said, "Our biggest crowd so far was on last St. Patrick's Day when the cars were lined up for a half-mile on both sides of Bloomingdale Road.

"We wouldn't want that many people here as a steady thing, but it makes us feel good to see such a turnout once in a while."

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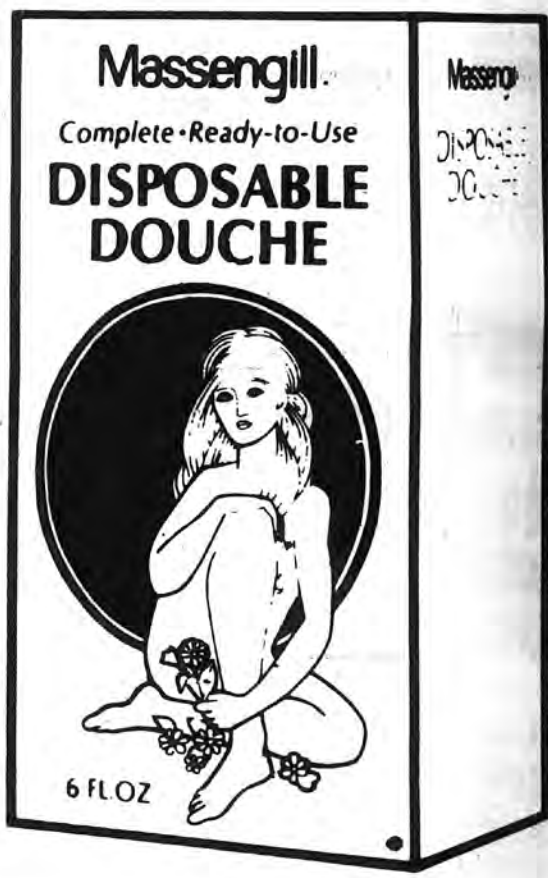
