Duffy Ave To Be Improved

County Executive Ralph G. Caso has awarded a contract for the improvement of Duffy Avenue in Hicksville.

A \$68,210 contract was awarded to H.T. Schneider, Inc., Farmingdale, lowest of four bidders, to flatten the curve on the south side of Duffy Avenue near Henrietta Street in Hicksville. The present curve with a radius of 120 feet is too sharp and the accident level has been high. The new radius will be 700 feet. Also included in the contract is installation of a guide rail on the north side of Duffy Avenue to prevent vehicles from going down an incline which leads to a factory complex.

Work is expected to begin in November and be completed within three months.

Community Orchestra Concert

The Hicksville Community Orchestra will start its sixteenth season with a concert on Thursday Evening, November 18, at the Hicksville Senior High School on Division Ave. The concert which is free to the public, on a non-invitational basis, will start promptly at 8:15 P.M.

The program will include Beethoven's Prometheus Overture, Aaron Copland's Quiet City, Schumann's Concerto in a minor and Prokofiev's Fifth Symphony.

Valerian Lagueaux and Martin Lipnick will be featured during the Copland piece on the trumpet and english horn respectively.

Soloist for the Schuman Concerto will be pianist Lawrence Schubert. Mr. Schubert made his New York and London debuts during 1975 at the Town Hall and Wigmore Hall, and will perform as a recitalist and as a soloist with the Orquesta Sinfonica de Maracaibo in December. Additional performances this season will include his second recital appearances at the Town Hall Pavillion in Hempstead and Town Hall in New York City.

Only Nassau and Suffolk County high school seniors in the upper 20 percent of their class are eligible. Qualified students should get applications from their guidance counselors before November 1, 1976.

Continue Swine Flu Shots

The Nassau County Department of Health will continue this Sunday to administer swine flu vaccine-free of charge—at a site near your home. Flu immunizations will be available from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M. at Island Trees High School on Straight Lane in Levittown; at Uniondale High School on Goodrich Street; at East Meadow High School on Carman Avenue and Jericho High School.

On November 7, residents who are considered high risk—persons 65 years of age or older, or those who are chronically ill—will receive their inoculations. The remainder of the population, 18 years of age or older, will be immunized on November 14 or 21 or on December 5.

The immunization of chronically-ill children from 3 through 11 years of age requires separate handling of two doses of a special vaccine. They will receive their first shots on November 3 or 5 and their second inoculations on December 1 or 3 at the health centers operated by the Department—at Elmont, Freeport-Roosevelt, Hempstead, Nassau Community Care Center in Inwood, or Plainview—between 9 A.M. and 4 P.M., or at the Department's clinic in Long Beach Memorial Hospital on the same dates, between 9 A.M. and Noon.

Chronically-ill youngsters between 12 and 17 years of age—who also require two doses of the vaccine—will be inoculated along with the adult high-risk population at the 26 community sites on November 7, with the second shot given on December 5.

Flu shots also may be obtained from private physicians, who must not charge for the vaccine, but who may require a fee for

administration.

The chronically ill are those adults or children with chronic heart, lung or kidney diseases, or other diseases such as multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, chronic anemia or diabetes, according to Dr. John J. Dowling, Commissioner of the Nassau County Department of Health.

The Department also is arranging to supply appropriate vaccines to physicians, hospitals and to residents of nursing homes

and health-related facilities, as well as to industrial and commercial companies, upon request.

"The vaccine," Dr. Dowling noted, "is prepared in egg culture. Persons who are allergic to eggs should not be inoculated."

"Neither," he added, "should people who have had a fever or a cold at least 24 hours before being immunized."

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

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To The Editor:

Autumn's eye-filling display of multicolored foliage marks the start of preparations for the Town's leaf collection program. Special crews of the Department of Public Works will collect bagged leaves raked up by homeowners as well as remove those that have fallen on the more than 700 miles of Town roads.

The cooperation of homeowners in this annual effort will greatly assist Town forces in completing the task efficiently and expeditiously. Residents are reminded that it is illegal—as well as dangerous—to burn leaves, nor should they be raked into the roadway.

The latter practice only adds to the burden of Highway Division crews and slows down the completion of this phase of the program. Leaf-covered roads also increase the potential of auto skids when wet from rain and can result in local flooding conditions through the clogging of storm drainage systems. Piles of leaves in the roadway can also be a fatal attraction to children where they are often hidden from the view of approaching motorists.

Raked leaves should be placed in containers, preferably 24-gallon plastic bags, and placed at curbside on regularly scheduled rubbish days. Each household is limited to eight bags of leaves per collection.

If you have a greater number of bagged leaves, please contact the Highway Division at 921-1030 to arrange for a special pickup.

This year, most of the more than 100,000 cubic yards of collected leaves will be composted, using the Town's recently acquired portable shredder. This equipment not only significantly reduces the volume of leaves but also enhances and speeds up the natural decomposing process which converts the material into rich, nutrient soil. This will be put to good use by the Department of Parks and Recreation in the care

and maintenance of the more than 600 acres of Town parkland.

To The Editor:

One thing that hasn't happened, and one thing that did happen, prompted me to initiate steps to protect Nassau County's environmental and economic interests in the event that offshore oil drilling proves inevitable.

The thing that hasn't happened is Congressional enactment of a national energy policy. Back in 1973, the Arab oil embargo caused grave inconvenience to Long Island motorists and sent oil, gasoline and utility prices soaring. For some people, it caused hardship as some energy intensive industries were put out of business, at least temporarily.

But the inconvenience of 1973 would pale into insignificance compared with the impact of another oil embargo. Since last year alone, imports of Arab oil have more than DOUBLED while Congress ignored the mounting crisis and did nothing to make us any less energy dependent than we were in 1973. Another embargo now would find us twice as vulnerable as we were three years ago and would be an economic catastrophe for Long Island.

The thing that did happen was that New York State withdrew from the lawsuit seeking to block offshore oil drilling in the Atlantic. Nassau and Suffolk counties were left literally on their own in a fight that we may not be able to win. Indeed, the language in a federal appeals court's decision reversing a lower court's injunction against lease sales raised very practical and realistic questions about the probable outcome of the lawsuit.

So it may be that we will be forced to run the risks of offshore drilling. Many observers have

concluded that offshore oil drilling is inevitable.

If that conclusion proves accurate, I want to make sure that Nassau County is compensated for the risks by maximum economic benefits for its people and by real income that will ease their tax burden.

I sent telegrams to executives of Exxon, Mobil and Shell Oil—the principal bidders in the Baltimore Canyon last August—inviting them to meet with me to discuss formation of a joint committee of oil industry and government officials to study every aspect of oil drilling as it may affect Long Island. The companies have accepted the invitation. Among the topics on the committee's agenda will be fail-safe environmental safeguards, potential employment opportunities, refinery siting, the use of pipelines or tankers to transport the oil, reduced regional energy costs and possible revenues that local governments can receive as a result of offshore operations.

We are not withdrawing from the lawsuit. But we are being realistic. If the oil industry may be our neighbor, now is the time to begin planning how we can live together.

Welfare Millions

State Comptroller Arthur Levitt recently announced the distribution of \$91,588,149 for welfare to the 57 counties outside New York City.

The money represents approximately 90 percent of the Federal and State share of anticipated welfare expenditures for November. The Federal share amounts to \$64,527,166 and the State share, \$27,060,983. The remaining 10 percent is payable after verification of the actual November expenditures.

Nassau County received \$10,467,098.20.

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

Construction Resumes

Nearly one year to the day since the roar of machinery and the bustle of construction ceased at Nassau Community College, County Executive Ralph G. Caso mounted a payroll to signal the project's rebirth.

Work on five major projects at the college ground to a halt last November when the State Dormitory Authority was unable to sell the bonds necessary to continue. Under Caso's direction, financial arrangements were altered and \$35,000,000 in county funds have revived the project. The site will soon be swarming with construction workers.

"I am delighted to have been able to achieve this resumption of construction for a two-fold reason - these buildings are critically needed for the advancement of the educational system, and workers in the construction trades - where unemployment is rampant - can now go back on payrolls."

When work was halted last Fall, some 450 workers were employed on the site. Instructional Wings 1 and 1 and the library were 60 per cent completed; the administration building was 15 per cent completed, and the physical education building was at the 40 per cent mark toward completion.

A series of meetings was held this past week between Dormitory Authority and Nassau Public Works officials and the contractors involved. Contractors are now resuming work and moving supplies and equipment onto the site.

Construction crews are being mobilized and full-scale work should be underway within two weeks.

When work had to be halted last November, the partially finished buildings were secured to limit deterioration. Early this year, when it appeared the Dormitory Authority would be unable to continue financing, Caso began to negotiate a new agreement.

In the original contract for development of the campus, the Dormitory Authority had com-

mitted itself to pay the full cost of construction with the county picking up its half share at a later date.

A new agreement was reached in late summer and on Sept. 27 Caso asked for and received Board of Supervisors approval to put up the county share immediately. The board approved a \$35,000,000 bond issue to get the project started again.

The Dormitory Authority expended some \$35,000,000 on work already done at the college. Caso said. "The county is committed to completion of that work. Any decision on additional construction on the campus will be reviewed in the future."

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

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OTB Helps Reduce Nassau Tax Totals

Easa Easa, President of Nassau Downs-OTB, announced that the county's off-track betting corporation will provide \$6 million in revenue to the county for 1976, or \$1.4 million more than had been anticipated.

Easa further projected that Nassau OTB would be able to generate \$6.5 million in revenue

for 1977 despite a number of potential and actual problems that should cut into OTB handles throughout the state.

County Executive Ralph G. Caso was advised by Easa that the revised State Lottery has had a significant negative impact on off-track betting that has resulted in a drop-off of roughly 10 per

cent in business. The addition of Meadowlands in New Jersey has already been felt and a new federal tax law that will go into effect in January, 1977, will cause an estimated loss of between 5 and 10 percent.

The tax law calls for the withholding of 20 per cent from net winnings of over \$1,000. Easa said this will drive many patrons back to the bookmakers and also decrease the amount of money which winners ordinarily re-bet at OTB.

Easa warned that although Congressional leaders have stated they will amend this section of the tax law it was imperative for all public officials to be aware of its existence and to work for its removal.

Nassau OTB is now handling about \$1.5 million in bets each week and, despite the described problems, expects the opening of additional branches during 1977 to offset the anticipated reductions.

"We estimate that our handle will continue to average \$1.5 million per week, giving us a total 1977 handle of \$78,000,000."

Nassau Downs, which opened its doors in January of 1975, has now taken in more than \$86,000,000 in bets including \$37 million in 1976 and is presently operating 19 branch offices, with two more under construction in Hicksville and Wantagh expected to open in November. Easa said OTB will open at least 25 branches throughout the county.

The OTB executive said that his surveys of the other OTB corporations in the state indicate that Nassau County can also expect approximately \$6.5 million in additional revenue in 1977 through the surtax on winning bets placed on races at Roosevelt and Belmont.

"When added with the \$6.5 million from Nassau OTB you can see that the county's treasury will be enriched by about \$13 million from off-track betting sources," Easa said.

Collecting Stamps A Great Hobby

"When someone asks me what's a good age to start collecting stamps, I tell them any age," Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Anthony Murello said in connection with observing National Hobby Month.

"That's one of the great virtues of stamp collecting," Sectional Center Manager Postmaster Murello added. "There are no special requirements and no age limits. I've seen five-year-olds fascinated with starter stamp collecting kits, and, on the other hand, there are 80-year-olds just as intent on keeping their collections up-to-date."

"It's not like a game of chess or checkers, where you need an opponent" he said. "There are both children and adult stamp clubs all over the country where people meet to share their acquisitions and interests."

"Stamp collections that feature maps, flowers, birds, space, or cats, for example, are called topical collections," he said. "A woman living in a suburb of Washington, D.C. collects only stamps on which horses are

pictured, filling albums with examples from countries throughout the world. An eminent physician has amassed a fine collection of stamps dealing with the medical profession. There is practically no subject in the world that is not represented on stamps," Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Murello said.

"One of the most rewarding aspects of my job is working with school children," Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Murello said. "We show them the fun and educational values of collecting stamps. But more importantly, we take them on tours of the post office to show them how we process the mail. They learn first hand how postage stamps help to pay for the services we provide."

"While they're with us, we stress the importance of accurate, legible addresses, and the necessity for using correct zip codes. Children are very alert and quick to see the reasons for our constant reminders about proper preparation of mail," Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Murello said.
