Narrow Escape From Burning Home

Early November 6th a Hicksville family, mother, father, a 2 yr old girl and a 3 month old boy, barely escaped their burning, smoke - filled home with their lives. The fire, at 38 Violet Ave, broke out after midnight in the oil burner located in a closet on the 1st floor under the stair- way leading to the 2nd floor, where the family slept. Smoke roused the mother and all escaped, but not before they suffered smoke inhalation. The family was taken to

Central General Hospital for treatment.

If this family had a smoke detector (for the low price of \$30 - 40 dollars) this would have been a minor incident. As it was, luck was with them - they got a second chance. Thousands each year don't get a second chance. Smoke is the big killer in home fires. A smoke detector would have spotted this blaze early. Damage to the home was considerable. Hicksville vamps brought it under control in a short period of time.

The Hicksville Fire Dept. has advocated for some time - the purchase of a smoke detector, many have followed our advice, but many more have not.

We have notified residents via our house to house pamphlet, open house displays - demonstrations - articles in the HERALD to look into the purchase of one of these life savers. Don't count on a second chance. Last year over 8,000 didn't get one. Pick one up tomorrow - a gift of life for your loved ones. On sale now at many local stores.

The honored guests will include Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso and members of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay.

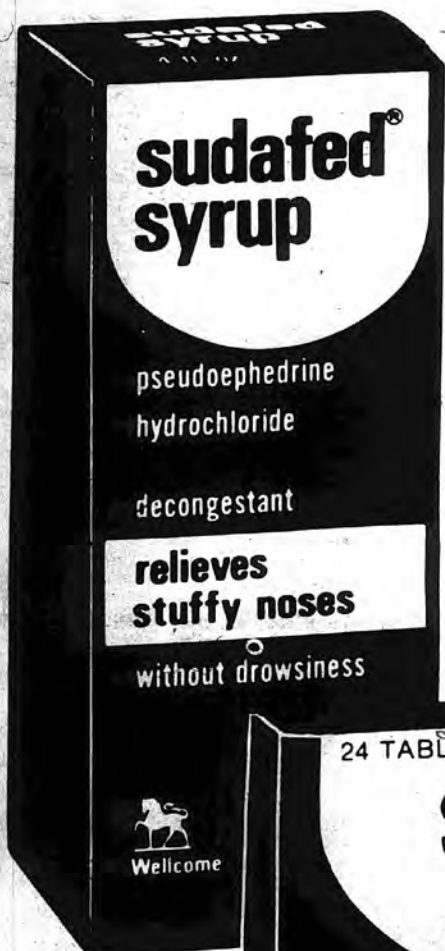

Three Hearings led the days' proceedings at the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday, November 9th.

The petition of A.M.X. Collision & Service Center, Inc. was the opener on a request for a special use permit to conduct and operate a general repair and servicing type business of non-functioning and wrecked automobiles. The location to be on the N/S Old Country Rd., 444.52' E/O Newton Rd. in Plainview.

Counsel for the petitioner was Mr. Pincus who presented his case before the board.

Mr. John Kelley, representing the Mergenthaler Co. and Mr. Steven Lowdenber, representing a local realtor, objected to the petition.

A Hearing on finance to consider a proposed construction of a baseball diamond in the Jericho Park District followed. The 90' diamond is being considered at Parklet J-7, which is on Catiague Rock Rd. in close proximity to the Jericho H.S. The estimated expense will be \$35,000.00. Speaking on behalf of the facility and emphasizing its need as an adjunct to the present sports complex in the Jericho community was Mr. Laykind, the V.P. of the Jericho Sports Organization.

The final Hearing of the morning was to consider amendments to the Code of Ordinances of the TOB re: Motor Vehicle & Traffic Rules in the Hamlet of Massapequa.

Thirty-four Resolutions followed in order. Item No. 7 was relative to a change of zone from Res. B-A to Res. B-1 District at Woodbury, which involves 0.33 acres on the E/S of South Woods Rd. north of Jericho Turnpike for a distance of 2347 feet. The request is to downzone the property from 1 acre to 1/2 acre requirements.

Item No. 20 related to approval of plans and specifications and bidding procedures for safety improvements on Juneau Blvd. in Woodbury and Catiague Rock Rd. in Hicksville. The work involved would be the installation of guard rails and street grading. The formal meeting was adjourned at 11:25.

Judy Jacobs was the sole speaker in the informal session that followed. Mrs. Jacobs requested that steps should be taken to correct the poor condition of Piquets Lane in Woodbury. She stated that she and other concerned parties would be available for a meeting Supervisor Burke could set up at his convenience. The Supervisor assured Mrs. Jacobs that he would give it his attention now that elections were over.

No Fee Increase At Ice Rinks

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke this week announced that admission fees for public skating sessions at the Town's three ice rinks Bethpage, Marjorie R. Post (Massapequa) and Syosset-Woodbury community parks - reflect no increase over last year's rates.

"I am pleased that we have been able to hold the general admission fee for both children and adults to all public sessions at 75 cents," Burke stated. "The fact that we are continuing to offer skating to our residents at this low price can be credited to the careful management and supervision of our ice rink facilities by our Department of

Parks and Recreation."

Burke also announced that discount books will again be available one the rinks are open. Consisting of 10 tickets, the books will be sold to skaters 15 years of age and under for \$5.00. The tickets are good only for the 1976-77 season.

The ice skating season will begin on Friday, November 19, 1976, and close Sunday, March 13, 1977 at all rinks. Schedules of public skating sessions are available at the rinks. Construction Tops \$3 Million

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Gregory W. Carman announced that the value of construction permits issued by the Town's Building Division during the month of October exceeded \$3 million.

Among the permits let in October were 19 for new one-family dwellings valued at \$1,054,152; 13 for commercial construction valued at \$1,235,983; and 34 residential alterations and additions valued at \$580,149.

In addition, 22 permits for other than residential alterations were issued valued at \$40,363; and four industrial permits valued at \$176,040.

Councilman Carman, Chairman of the Town Board's Standing Committee on Commerce and Industry, said that the total dollar value of all permits issued for the month of October was \$3,150,782.

Marino Cracks Down On Violent Juveniles

State Senator Ralph J. Marino has announced a four-point program of juvenile justice in response to the ongoing violence perpetrated on the elderly by known, repeated offenders. "We can no longer tolerate laws that give vicious youngsters a license to maim and kill with impunity," the Syosset Republican said.

Marino recently "blew the whistle" on Ronald Timmons who assaulted an elderly Bronx woman, was freed on \$500 bail, then jumped bail to escape prosecution. As Chairman of the Select Committee on Crime who has been tracking the careers of homicidal juveniles, Marino revealed that Timmons has a record of 67 court appearances for serious crimes including the murder of a 92 year old man. In so doing, the Senator broke the confidentiality protecting juvenile records. "I did it to make a case for changing absurd laws that make it virtually a crime to reveal a homicidal history to police and judges. As a result of literally blind justice, a dangerous killer has been turned loose, to claim more victims."

Marino's program is aimed at levying harsh penalties on anyone attacking senior citizens, and making it difficult for violent juveniles to escape detection, prosecution and punishment. The proposals will assure that:

-juveniles arrested for violent crimes must be fingerprinted at

the time of arrest so their previous criminal history can be identified by police and judges before sentencing.

-if a major crime is committed by a person over 16 who has a history of violence, his juvenile records must be open to the courts. "Under current law," said Marino, "the juvenile records are sealed and a subsequent crime is treated as a first offense calling for gentle handling by the courts. The judge in the Timmons case did not have these records before him."

-a former violent juvenile who commits a major crime after age 16 will not be afforded protections provided youthful offenders, but must be sentenced as an adult and remanded to a reformatory.

-Attackers of senior citizens aged 60 and over will be treated as "special felony offenders" subject to plea bargaining restrictions and tough sentencing, whatever the criminal's age.

Marino succeeded in passing a 1976 law mandating a two year sentence for violent juveniles. He also sponsored several proposals to change the Family Court system that treats juveniles alike, whether they are youngsters guilty of mischief or career criminals who thrive on brutality such as murder, rape, robbery and assault. The bills were sabotaged by liberal lawmakers in the Assembly.

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Petitions Denied

The Public Service Commission announced today it has denied by a 4-2 vote petitions filed by three towns seeking a rehearing of the Commission's decision to permit Long Island Lighting Company (LILCO) to build above ground a 345,000 volt electric transmission line across parts of Suffolk and Nassau Counties.

At the same time, the Commission issued orders which approve LILCO's Environmental Management and Construction Plan (EM&CP) for a 13.4 mile segment of the line and direct the company to perform an archaeological survey over other parts of the route before beginning construction.

The Commission, after hearings, issued a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need to LILCO August 9 for construction of a double-circuit overhead 345,000 volt line connecting a substation at Holbrook with one at Tuland Road via the so-called over-the-top route. The permit requires LILCO to operate the line at 138,000 volts

until the Commission makes a final decision concerning health and safety effects of 345,000 volt operation. The project also includes three links of 138,000 volt lines, including an underground connection between the Tuland Road and Bethpage substations.

Commissioners Anne F. Mead and Harold A. Jerry, Jr. dissented from the order denying rehearing to the Towns of Oyster Bay, Islip and Smithtown. Miss Mead, who joined the Commission after the original order was issued, dissented "on the ground that the line should be

built entirely underground." He cited the dense population of the area, the "possible harmful effects" of long-range exposure to extra high voltage lines, and "the visual impact in an area as flat as a pancake." Mr. Jerry dissented on the same grounds he cited in dissenting from the original order: that the line should be built underground.

While the petitions of Islip and Smithtown were rejected as being filed too late, the Commission nevertheless considered and commented on the

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Landfill Procedures Win Perfect Court Grades

The final of a series of three suits seeking to halt the Town's preparation of a sanitary landfill in Plainview was thrown out by Supreme Court Justice Paul Kelly who agreed with two of his colleagues in ruling that Oyster Bay has proceeded properly in its planning of this solid waste disposal facility.

Justice Kelly dismissed the South Huntington Water District suit citing the previous decisions of Justice David T. Gibbons and Justice William Sullivan who noted that the Town had not violated any laws, rules or regulations in proceeding with the "construction and operation of a solid waste disposal facility, a lawful governmental function." Justice Gibbons had dismissed the Town of Huntington suit and Justice Sullivan threw out the Justice Kelly suit filed by the Tuxedo Hills Civic Association and others.

Town position that in this preliminary planning stage it is premature to reach any final conclusions.

Town Supervisor John W. Burke explained that throughout the current controversy, "opponents of the site have demanded that the Town prove the environmental safety of the proposed sanitary landfill before it proceeds any further. We have repeatedly pointed out that unless we proceed further with the planning for this development, we will not be able to supply proof as to the environmental soundness of the project. But, we have assured that we will not use the facility unless the environmental safety is proven to the responsible authority."

In the case presented to Justice Kelly, one of the complaints of the water district in seeking an

injunction against the Town's proceeding with the sanitary landfill development was that the Town "failed to conduct the studies necessary to understand fully the problems to be created by the conduct of this operation."

Noting that even if the water district complaint were true, Justice Kelly states, "It does not negate the possibility of further study and investigation prior to the final construction and operation of the facility."

Burke noted that this was precisely what was taking place. "Studies are continuing so that we will be certain that all questions and uncertainties have been fully examined, understood and solutions found before landfilling is permitted."

In addition to the Town's assurance that no landfilling will take place unless the program is environmentally safe, Burke

noted that, "the agency that will decide the environmental soundness of the plans has made it quite clear that the people will have an opportunity to fully explore and question and raise objections to the plans when such plans are completed. As advocated by this Town Board, and requested by landfill opponents, the State DEC will conduct a public hearing on the final plans. "That," Burke added, "will be the time for final conclusions to be reached."

arguments of those towns in its order denying rehearing.

The Commission denied the contentions of Oyster Bay and the other towns that authorization of new overhead lines where such lines now exist is improper and that partial undergrounding is unjust and unfairly discriminatory. In its original order, the Commission said it reviewed the effect of putting new lines on existing rights-of-way and found that "the aesthetic environment will in fact be improved" along the route where steel poles will replace lattice towers. The argument that an assessment of the incremental impact of new lines on the environment is an improper criterion "was finally laid to rest by the Court of Appeals last year," the Commission said. The

Court concluded that the significance to be attached, in prescribing new routes, to the presence of existing transmission lines is primarily a matter for evaluation by the Commission.

To the claim of the Towns that the new line would adversely affect the health and safety of their residents, the Commission responded that "there is nothing in the Common Hearings (on 765,000-volt lines) or in this proceeding, or in the rehearing petitions that support such a claim."

The Commission also found no merit in the contention by Oyster Bay that underground construction would make the line more reliable. "Our monitoring of LILCO's experience does not indicate that overhead transmission lines involve the likelihood of increased service interruptions."

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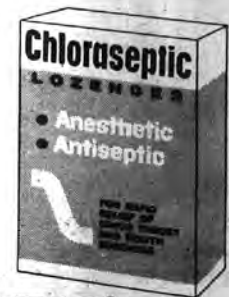
