To Survey Hicksville Commuters

At a recent breakfast meeting of the Long Island Association, Robert K. Pattison, President and General Manager of the Long Island Railroad, called upon the business community to approach the railroad concerning better ways that the LIRR can offer the best possible service to Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

"To accomplish this," LIA President Jack Rettaliata said, "the LIRR, together with the LIA, is mounting a survey directed at the employees in the Hicksville area, asking them about their daily commutation to and from work."
The survey will also explore their impressions of present railroad service

and their current costs for traveling to and from work.

With the results of this survey, it is projected that the LIRR will be able to learn whether or not rail service is adequate for serving commuters, or whether a coordinated service utilizing trains and buses might fit the bill.

The Hicksville area, because of its high concentration of industry and its pivotal location as an intermodal junction point for rail and bus service, was selected as the sample area.

LIA spokesman William Marlin said it should be noted that both small and large industries and businesses will be included in the initial survey group.

Charities Appeal Opens

When an 86-year-old Long Island widow we'll call Mrs. P. was raising her children she went all out for the holidays. She scrubbed and shopped and baked and decorated in preparation for the big day. The house was stocked with good things to eat and Christmas lights twinkled a welcome to visiting family and friends. It was a time of warmth and gaiety and camaraderie.

Today, Mrs. P.'s home is a dark and dismal one-room apartment. A son, her only remaining relative, lives in another state and she has few friends. She rarely ventures out because her winter coat is threadbare and there's no money for another. She's depressed and lonely and isolated. Now, with the holidays approaching, Mrs. P. constantly relives those earlier, happier days and -- unless someone, somewhere cares -- those memories are all the lonely old widow will have this Christmas.

Each year at this time, Catholic Charities, Diocese of Rockville Centre, publicizes the plight of persons like Mrs. P., seeking help for them through its Christmas Family Fund appeal. And each year, the response has been heart-warming. The economy may have its ups and downs, but Long Islanders' generosity is ever increasing. In 1974, for instance, contributions to the fund totaled a record \$54,500. Last year donations came to \$60,027.85.

Those funds which enabled 5,125 children and 2,459 adults to share in the Christmas spirit, came from individuals, families, foundations, businesses and school, social and fraternal organizations.

Those who would like to aid the families in need this year are asked to send a check to Christmas Family Fund,

Catholic Charities Central Office, 50 North Park Avenue, Box X, Rockville Centre, N.Y. 11571.

All of the monies contributed goes to those in need as administrative expenses are borne by Catholic Charities. And every cent is used in either Nassau or Suffolk County. Recipients, like those in the following cases, are selected on the basis of need without regard to race, religion or national origin.

N. Family
Mrs. N.'s husband died last year, leaving her with six children. She receives a check each month from Social Security, but because of her husband's erratic employment record, the amount doesn't adequately cover living expenses. A borderline case, the family doesn't qualify for public assistance. Life has been a burden for Mrs. N. since her husband's death, but her faith has sustained her. Now, however, she doesn't know where she will get the strength to cope with the latest tragedy in her life: her oldest son has just been diagnosed as a terminal cancer patient. Perhaps the knowledge that total strangers could care enough to provide the means for a Christmas celebration for her family could make the difference.

R. Family
Mrs. R., a 38-year-old mother of five children, suffers from Parkinson's disease. She has been hospitalized four times this year and medical expenses have been tremendous. Bills are piling up as Mr. R.'s salary won't cover them. He is trying to keep his family intact but his responsibilities are an emotional drain and he is receiving counseling from Catholic Charities. He has also applied to the agency for a homemaker-home health aide for his wife. Now, with outside help, some of the R.'s problems are

Last Call For Swine Flu Shots

Sunday, December 5, will be the last time that the Nassau County Department of Health will offer inoculations with swine flu vaccine without charge in its public clinics.

"There are no plans to continue the public clinic program beyond this Sunday," Dr. John J. Dowling, County Commissioner of Health, said. "It is hoped that eligible residents will take advantage of this opportunity to receive the swine flu vaccine."

Previously, more than 86,000 residents received their inoculations at 28 community sites, he noted.

An additional 70,000 received their immunizations from private physicians, in nursing homes or hospitals, or in industrial plants with vaccine supplied by the Department.

Private physicians who administer the vaccine may not charge patients for it, but they may require an administration fee.

Chronically-ill people between the ages of 6 months and 11 years and from 18 through 24 are eligible for the bivalent vaccine by making an appointment at a Health Center operated by the Department in Elmont, Freeport-Roosevelt, Hempstead, Inwood, Long Beach or Plainview. They

also must have a second dose at least four weeks later. These shots will not be available at community sites on Sunday.

People between 12 and 17 years of age who are chronically ill may obtain their first of two doses at the community clinics on Sunday, with a second shot administered either at a Health Department Center or from a private physician.

Under new guidelines announced by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), people between 18 and 24 years of age will require two doses of vaccine -- at least four weeks apart whether or not they are chronically ill.

HEW also has authorized the immunization of chronically ill children aged six months through two years. They may obtain two doses by either making an appointment at a Health Department Center or from a private physician.

Volunteers at the 28 community sites will also continue to administer the combination of Victoria and swine flu vaccine to high-risk people who over 65 years of age or over 25 and chronically ill. The remainder of the population over the age of 18 are eligible to receive the

monovalent vaccine.

"The need for volunteers -- nurses and lay people -- for this Sunday's immunizations still exists," according to Dr. Dowling. He urged anyone interested to contact the Department at 535-3345.

For further information on the swine flu immunization program, telephone the Department at 535-3410.

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At The Town Board Meeting

The first hearing at the November 30 Town Board meeting was a petition by Ace Properties, for a change of zone from Res B-A to Res B-1 at Woodbury, E. S. of South Woods Rd. for a distance 2,347 feet N. from N. S. Jericho Turnpike It lasted for 70 minutes.

Ace Properties represents several landowners whose combined interests total 8 1/3 acres. The petitioner was represented by counsel, Mr. Niles.

Counsel contended that the property presently zoned one acre, abuts vacant land zoned 1/2 acre, and that an economic hardship would result if in an attempt to develop the property, the 1/2 acre parcels would compete in sales.

The downzoning requested, stated Mr. Niles, is contrary to the Master Plan; however he is certain that the Board recognizes the hardship the M.P. inadvertently imposes.

The parcel under consideration is 360 feet wide by 1000 feet deep. A 50 foot road dividing the width would permit the construction of a total of 15 homes including the existing one.

Under the present zoning, a total of 7 homes could be constructed.

Councilman Diamond felt that the granting of this petition could lead to further requests for downgrading by other parcels, from 1/2 acre to 15,000 sq. feet and from 15,000 sq. feet to an extension of the commercial zoning.

The Board actively participated in the discussion with Mr. Niles, who seemed well prepared and professional in his presentation and defense.

One of the pertinent factors involved discussion over the existing condition of So. Woods Rd. and how an additional entry and exit would affect the safety problems that traffic is currently facing.

Speaking in opposition to the petition, was Judy Jacobs of So. Woodbury Taxpayers Assoc. and Roberta Rosen of the Gates Civic Assoc.

Ms. Jacobs stated that she was there in opposition basically to prevent a domino reaction by others to downzone, leading eventually to a further expansion of commercial property, and, in addition to attempt to alleviate current safety hazards on So. Woods Rd.

Ms. Rosen stated that the petition, if granted, would demonstrate that there was no integrity in the purpose of the Master Plan.

A letter in opposition to the granting was received from the School Board signed by Joan Davidson, V. Pres. of the board.

Other Actions

The second hearing was to consider proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances relative to motor vehicle and traffic rules. It dealt exclusively with the installation of traffic regulations and fire zone areas in the Manetto Hill Shopping Center in Plainview. The requirement for the proposed amendments rises out of the public's ignoring the existing fire zone signs and the absence of exit and entry lanes into the shopping center area.

Item number 46, relating to the petition of Myton W. Ireland for a change of zone at Oyster Bay, was approved. The granting will permit the construction of a

\$750,000 commercial center to include a bank, medical facilities and approximately 8 stores. The complex will be on W. Main St. between Maxwell Ave. and Spring St. Mr. Ireland is a prominent citizen of Oyster Bay and was represented by Oscar Summers on Sept. 14, 1976 in his petition.

Item number 47, relating to the petition of Old Mill Farms Riding Club, Inc. was denied. Public opposition to the petition by residents and civic groups from the Brookville and Muttontown area at the hearing on Sept. 14, is an example of how concerted action and the voice of the people is served by the Town Board.

Prior to adjournment, Councilman Saladino publicly thanked the Coast Guard, Nassau County Police Marine Unit, the Capt. of the Oyster Bay Conservation Vessel, the O.B. Harbor Master and several neighbors for their efforts in attempting to locate his son, who was missing in the Great South Bay on Sunday, November 28th. The councilman's boy was rescued at 1:00 A.M. on the 29th, and brought a real happy ending to the Thanksgiving weekend.

Cable Hearing

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the Town Board will conduct a public hearing Tuesday, December 14th, on a request by Cablevision Systems to increase the fee for basic cablevision service from \$5. per month to \$7.

"The request by Cablevision Systems would increase the monthly bill to those customers currently receiving only the basic cable television service," Burke

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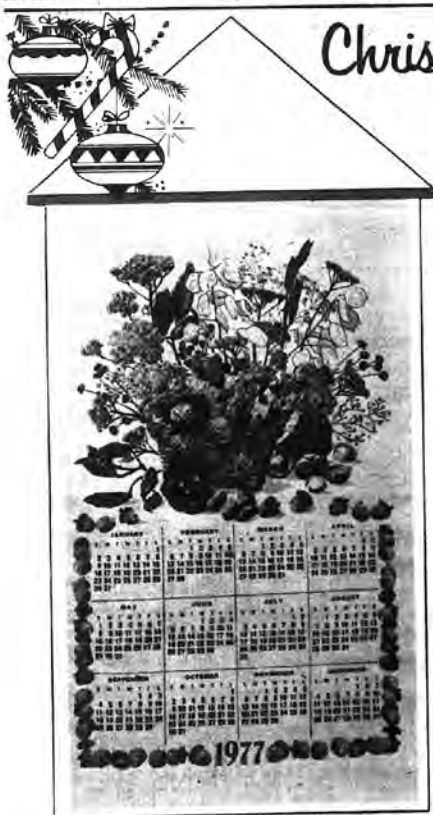

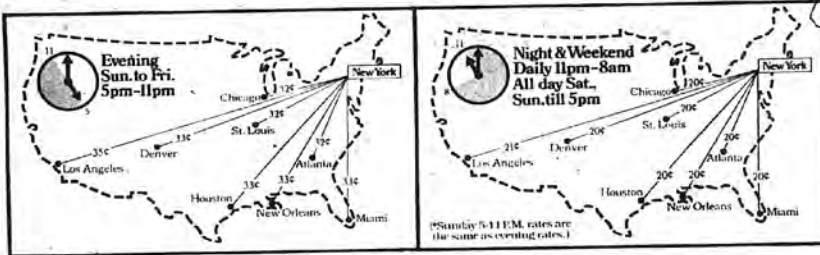
