## At The School Board Meeting

The Hicksville School Board Meeting of January 12th was opened by Dr. Hill who offered a prayer for the 1977 year and special condolences for the death of Mr. Jack Meller a long-time member of the school staff. Mr. Bruno sent notice to the Board that he would not attend and requested a hold of an item on the Agenda.

The next School Board Meeting is scheduled for January 26th at the Old Country Road Elementary School. There will be an educational presentation of the District's new Reading Center.

Under unfinished business was "Clerical Fact Finding" which was postponed until February 8th; causing many Clerical Staff Members to leave the meeting.

Mrs. Wolfson, Chairman of the School Board, spoke for all Board Members in condemning the malicious acts of vandalism at the Jr. and Senior High Schools over the three holiday weekends. Rocks were thrown through

windows, files of teachers records, were completely destroyed, and a new Computer Center was wantonly damaged. Board Member Cornelius McCormick suggested that all residents of Hicksville be sent a report of the destruction, explaining the damage costs to the District in materials, insurance, and possible additional security. High School Student Council President Denise Vitelli spoke for the student body against such vandalism, offering their assistance, and suggesting that a reward may help in apprehending those involved.

Report on Curriculum Study indicated new courses at the Jr. High School in Home Technology and Home Living. Appointment of an additional Reading Teacher was approved. Mrs. Marjorie Giannelli was appointed to the position of Director of Continuing Education. Compensation for extra-duty on athletic events and intra-mural programs was ap-

proved by the Board. School District Registrars will be paid a \$2.20 hourly wage. Request for a leave of absence by a Staff Member was granted, but life insurance coverage had to be studied further.

A "Flash Budget" for the 1977 School Year was an added item to the Agenda, indicating a no-growth budget with some transfer of funds as costs increase and school enrollment declines. Special request for a test for identifying learning disabilities in primary grades was approved, although the cost of same could not be established for the Board. Routine expenses were all approved, including a renovation of PA Systems for the High School. Under transportation on the agenda a request had been made to explain mileage measurement checks for a resident, and complete charts were opened that fully explained School District calculations.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 PM.

## Newest OTB Office In Hicksville

Nassau Downs-OTB announced this week that it has set a date for the opening of a small office in downtown Hicksville in an attempt to service the more than 3,000 persons who board daily at the Hicksville Railroad station, the busiest LIRR stop on Long Island.

"This will be our 21st office," said Easa Easa, President of Nassau Downs, "and we will schedule our hours to service the commuters who utilize this station as well as the downtown business community of Hicksville."

The OTB office will be a mini-branch of only 474 square feet located at 24

Newbridge Road, just south of the station and will open at 10 A.M. on Tuesday, January 25th and

close at 7 P.M.

Thereafter it will open from 7 A.M. to 7 P.M., Monday through Saturday.

## Some Sr. Citizens Lose Tax Exemptions

"A major problem facing the senior citizens exemption program is the loss of exemption last year by over 400 senior citizens in Nassau County due directly to Social Security cost of living increases which brought them above the \$6,500 income limitation," stated County Bd. of Assessors Chairman Abe Seldin.

"Without corrective legislation many more seniors will lose their exemption this year as a result of the July 1976 cost of living increase."

Seldin has been in contact with State Senator John Caemmerer (R) of East Williston who has submitted a series of bills aimed directly at the problem. The various bills give the Legislature a wide choice at a solution.

Most notable is a bill which increases the income limitation to a flat \$7,200 a year and another measure which provides that Social Security cost of living increases not be included in the income determination up to a maximum income ceiling of

\$7,500. The \$7,200 bill was passed last year by the Senate but failed to be acted on by the Assembly. This year bipartisan cooperation is expected in both houses of the Legislature.

"Because of the gravity of this situation, I do expect the Legislature to give the measure the highest priority," stated Caemmerer. "We'll be working hard on this one; it means a lot to our seniors."

**Applications Available**

Applications for the senior citizen property tax exemption program are now available from the Nassau County Board of Assessors.

Under guidelines established by the state legislature and adopted by Nassau County, its three towns and 62 school districts, senior citizens who have owned their home for two years or more; have an income of \$6,500 or less (including Social Security); and satisfy other basic requirements are eligible to receive a 50 per cent reduction in their county, town and school

taxes but not those levied by special districts. (For school taxes the income limitation has been set at \$6,500 by most of the local school boards. Boards have set a \$6,000 limit in the Lynbrook, East Rockaway, Seaford, Sea Cliff, Glen Head, Glen Wood Landing and Plainfield school districts and a \$5,000 limit in the Long Beach district.)

Application for the exemption must be made each year. However, the department of assessment will automatically mail renewal forms to all seniors who received the exemption last year. In the 1977 tax year, 10,829 senior citizens received the property tax exemption.

## 1976 Report From Eisenhower Park

Over the years, the vast grounds at Eisenhower Park, a facility of the Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks, have accommodated as many as 17 huge picnics at once in the various reserved areas, all of which are identified by the names of trees (e.g. Pin Oak, The Holly, South Maples, Peach, etc.) By combining areas, company, school and club outings have included as many as 3000 people at a clip, but advance registration at the Field House near Parking Field No. 2 is a "must" for groups numbering 100 or more.

Picnickers in the past have included everybody from the Long Island Mummies to the Sons of Italy, from Scout groups to the U.S. Marine Corps. Among the largest this past year were the June picnic of the Nassau County Steuben Society, with 1800 celebrants, and a king-size corporate outing for 3000.

While the areas that may be reserved can take on almost 5000

people at once, additional unreserved sections of the park can handle another 3000. It was here that a real increase in usage was noted this year, paralleling

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## Improvement In TOB Snow Control Reported

After a series of meetings with Town Board members and Department and Division heads last week, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby ordered an immediate change in the Town's Snow Control Program and no sooner had the details been worked out when it was put to the test as the largest snowfall to hit Long Island in two years began to fall.

"The change that I put into effect immediately resulted in approximately 25 additional trucks working on Town roads," Colby said. "Previously, these trucks, which are actually too small for the largest part of the Snow Control Program, were used initially in commuter parking fields and then returned to the Department of Parks and Recreation for use in its facilities."

According to Colby, the trucks are not equipped with sanders and, although equipped with plows, were too small to handle full-length plowing of roadways. "But after reexamining snow control procedures of the past, it became apparent that, after the commuter parking fields are handled, these trucks should

supplement the Highway force by handling the dead ends and cul-de-sacs where smaller equipment is actually a benefit." This, of course, will result in a delay in implementing snow control procedures in Town park facilities. No sooner had Colby ironed out the details of this change in procedure -- the Commissioners of Parks and Recreation and Public Works were still with him -- when the snow began to fall Friday afternoon.

"I remember pointing to the window and saying to them, 'Well, let's get it into motion,'" Colby recalled.

Friday evening and early into Saturday morning Colby remained at the Highway Division to get his first real taste of the Town's Snow Control Program since he became Town Supervisor just two weeks earlier.

"The men were really doing a fine job and the effort was unquestionable," Colby said. "What I never realized was how frequently plans for handling the snow have to be changed and how often weather reports are updated with immediate changes being required." Colby noted that early Friday evening some reports were indicating that the snow would accumulate to three inches before turning to rain and presenting icing conditions. "When is plowing the best course? When should we go with sand? Are the conditions different in one section from another area of the Town? All these questions were being an-

swered and reevaluated all night long," according to Colby, who remained at the Highway Division until about 2 AM Saturday. He returned again later that weekend and joined with Councilman Thomas Clark in handling phone calls about particular problems in certain sections.

"Within less than 48 hours the more than 700 miles of Town roads had been gone over at least once according to reports we received," Colby said. He noted that during that time, many of the Town Highway crews had been working more than 30 hours straight and sanitation crews had been added to the effort. "At that point, safety of operation became a serious consideration and we slowed down the operation."

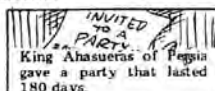
Since the weekend operation, Town trucks have continued sanding operations, giving greater priority to intersections. The constant, below freezing temperatures have been working against Town efforts.

"I have also asked for a further reevaluation of our procedures, although I believe that if residents make an effort to get their cars into their driveways, our efforts will produce even greater results," Colby said. He added that he was certain some residents will still have complaints "but more than likely, these will still be based on the problems caused by the Christmas snowfall. I think my efforts to improve on the previous system have demonstrated that a great deal has already been accomplished."

## At The Town Board

The 14 item calendar at the Town Board Meeting held Tuesday January 18th concluded at 12:30.

Gilbert Tilles, petitioner for a special use permit for office building at Woodbury (Froelich Farms) was represented by counsel, Mr. Herbert Balin.

Mr. Balin presented the petition before the board complete with artists rendering and answered all questions pertinent to the case.

Councilman Diamond requested information relative to the number of employees, types of signs and their sizes, whether there would be in-plant feeding, the height of the building and variations in the screening.

Councilman Carman had reference to the lease and every member of the board contributed to the questioning to some degree.

Mrs. Jacobs, representing the So. Woodbury Taxpayers Assoc., questioned the petitioner and the Board on the surplus parking being offered and requested that the space be utilized in the form of plant screening rather than additional parking area. She cautioned the board in reviewing more formal plans relative to the height of appurtenances such as the air conditioning towers and the elevator shaft. Mrs. Jacobs brought up the question of interior roads to eliminate any future curb cuts on Woodbury Rd. and thanked the board for their concern when they denied a curb cut on Woodbury Rd. for the bank now under construction. She requested that care be taken in

locating the curb cuts for the proposed building to be constructed on the Sunnyside Blvd. service road; the bend in the road and the close proximity to the entrance to the L.I.E. may pose a problem, she explained.

On the Hearing relative to amendments to the Code of Ordinances (Motor Vehicles and Traffic), Sara Middendorf requested information concerning additional signs on R.R. Ave and Nassau Street in Syosset.

A contingent numbering upwards of 30 representatives of Senior Citizens from the Bethpage area queried the Board on the amendment to the Housing Law. Supervisor Colby assured the group that there have been no requests brought before the board for low-cost housing or senior citizen housing up to the present time.

Councilman Mosca, who acknowledged the group and thanked them for their appearance in the inclement weather, affirmed the Supervisors' comments by stating that if in the future any such action is to be taken relative to any construction it would involve a senior citizen housing project and not a low-cost housing complex.

At the conclusion of the formal meeting Allison Berman representing the League of Women Voters presented Supervisor Colby and the Councilmen with a copy of their recent publication "Know Your Town - Oyster Bay".

Judy Jacobs spoke before the

assemblage for a second time relative to the Tilles Industrial area (Froelich Farms Ind. Park). In concluding her remarks she acknowledged Mr. Tilles' willingness to cooperate with the requests of the local community residents and proffered the comment that between shrubbery and plant screening and curb cuts, etc. there was enough for a give and take situation to permit negotiations to proceed amicably. Supervisor Colby and Councilmen Diamond, Mosca and Carman assured Mrs. Jacobs that the Board shared the community's concern over curb cuts on and along Woodbury Rd.

Mrs. Jacobs commented on the recent thorough and swift method that the town's snow removal forces acted during and after the last snow storm.

Supervisor Colby thanked Mrs. Jacobs and commented on the time and effort he and Councilman Tom Clark expended during the storm. They answered phones until the early morning hours and helped direct the snow removal operations.

Mrs. Carole Fishman addressed the Board Supervisor Colby in particular, and questioned the allocation of funds to purchase equipment in the amount of \$200,000 for the Landfill Project in Plainville. The Supervisor repeatedly informed Mrs. Fishman that the equipment was a necessary adjunct to the compacter and would have been purchased regardless of whether the Plainville site was to be filled with non-pollutant, non-cyclable material or nothing at all.

## Largest Order In Grumman History

Grumman Aerospace Corporation announced today it has signed two contracts with the U.S. Navy providing over \$200 million in new funding for an order of 86 F-14 Tomcat aircraft.

This provides funds for planned procurements announced by the Department of Defense last fall.

Under the order 36 F-14s will be delivered to the Navy during 1977, and 50 aircraft to the Imperial Iranian Air Force during 1977 and early 1978.

The contracts provide \$77.1

million in new funding for the Navy aircraft and \$123.7 million for the Iranian delivery.

Previous funding under advanced procurement contracts brings the total value of the 86-plane order to \$663 million for Grumman's work as prime contractor and systems integrator on the aircraft.

"In dollar value, this is the largest one-year aircraft order Grumman has received in its 47-year history," stated George Skurla, chairman and president

of Grumman Aerospace.

"This order is a reflection of Grumman's success in building the world's most advanced fighter aircraft. With its Phoenix weapons system, the F-14 is unmatched in technological excellence by any other fighter/interceptor," said a government spokesperson.

Skurla continued, "Performance superiority and cost control make the F-14 a strong candidate for the new Follow-On Interceptor to be selected by the U.S. Air Force Aerospace Defense Command and for the air-defense role of such free-world nations as Canada, Japan and Australia.

To date, 234 of the advanced fighters have been delivered to the Navy and 21 to Iran.

The Navy Grumman F-14 Tomcat holds the undisputed position of the world's most advanced fighter aircraft. Navy pilots have praised its flight performance as "superior thrust response coupled uncanny maneuverability."

"My days are so busy with lawyers, people stopping by, letters to write... and I'm so lonely through it all," so writes a woman who has just lost a husband.

After the death of her husband Queen Victoria said, "There is no one left to call me Victoria." Even though she was a queen, she knew what it meant to be lonely. Loneliness is no respecter of persons.

## Museum Notes-Winter Feeding Our Birds

During these cold winter days, especially with snow on the ground, the birds need our help in staying alive and in good health. During a cold winter night birds can lose up to 20 percent of their fat. If food isn't available to them first thing in the morning, some may die. Water is just as or more important to birds as food during the winter months.

We use several varieties of feeders and food to satisfy the appetites of different species of birds. Suet and peanut butter mixed with sand are important to replace fat loss of certain birds. Sunflower seeds satisfy most of the seed eaters, but Cardinals prefer corn, and American Goldfinches like thistle seed.

Some birds enjoy our covered window feeder in which we put raisins, fruit, bread crumbs, etc.,

along with sunflower seeds. A few birds use it to get warm.

Water should be kept from freezing. We use thermo controlled electric heating units in our large water tubs.

While it is admitted that the empty seed shells can mess up a lawn, this can be easily remedied by sweeping or vacuuming them up. To me this is little enough to do for the enjoyment I get out of hearing and seeing the birds that winter over in our area. Also, by assisting nature, we are helping preserve the birds, one of God's gifts to all of us.

Feeders can easily be made or purchased along with bird food and other accessories from most garden shops in our area.
