Some Sr. Citizens Lose Tax Exemptions

"A major problem facing the senior citizens exemption program is the loss of exemption last year by over 400 senior citizens in Nassau County due directly to Social Security cost of living increases which brought them above the \$6,500 income limitation," stated County Bd. of Assessors Chairman Abe Seldin.
"Without corrective legislation
many more seniors will lose their exemption this year as a result of the July 1976 cost of living in-

Seldin has been in contact with State Senator John Caemmerer (R) of East Williston who has submitted a series of bills aimed directly at the problem. The various bills give the Legislature a wide choice at a solution.

Most notable is a bill which Most notable is a bill which increases the income limitation to a flat \$7,200 a year and another measure which provides that Social Security cost of Jiving increases not be included in the income determination up to a maximum income celling of \$7,500. The \$7,200 bill was passed-last year by the Senate but failed to be acted on by the Assembly. This year bipartisan cooperation is expected in both houses of the Legislature.

"Because of the gravity of this situation. I do expect the Legislature to give the measure the highest priority," stated Caemmerer. We'll be working hard on this one; it means a lot to

Under guidelines established by the state legislature and adopted by Nassau County, its three towns and 62 school districts, senior citizens who have owned their home for two years or more; have an income of \$6,500 or less (including Social Security) and satisfy other basic requirements are eligible to receive a 50 per cent reduction in their county, town and school

Museum Notes-Winter Feeding Our Birds

By Gardiner E. Gregory During these cold winter days, especially with snow on the ground, the birds need our help in staying alive and in good health.

During a cold winter night birds can lose up to 20 percent of their fat. If food isn't available to them first thing in the morning, some may die. Water is just as or more important to birds as food during the winter months.

We use several varieties of feeders and food to satisfy the appetites of different species of birds. Suet and peanut butter mixed with sand are important to replace (at loss of certain birds Sunflower seeds satisfy most of the seed eaters, but Cardinals prefer corn, and American Goldfinches like thistle seed

Some birds enjoy our covered window feeder in which we put raisins, fruit, bread crumbs, etc.

along with sunflower seeds. A few

birds use it to get warm.

Water should be kept from freezing. We use thermo controlled electric heating units in

our large water tubs.

While it is admitted that the empty seed shells can mess up a lawn, this can be easily remedied by sweeping or vacuuming them up. To me this is little enough to do for the enjoyment I get out of hearing and seeing the birds that winter over in our area. Also, by assisting nature, we are helping preserve the birds, one of God's gifts to all of us Feeders can easily be made or

purchased along with bird food and other accessories from most garden shops in our area.
