It took 173 years, until 1962, for federal spending to hit \$100 billion a year. But by 1971, only nine years later, government spending had jumped to \$200 billion a year.



At The Town Board Meeting Property Revaluation A Real Threat

Thirty-one items filled the agenda at the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday, February 8th.

A hearing on amendments to the Town Ordinance, Hawkers, Peddlers and Solicitors led off the morning business and countered no opposition.

East resolution that followed was unchallenged and passed in quick succession.

Item No 17, a resolution relating to Change Order No 1 on a contract pertinent to the Refuse Compactor Building, met with an abstaining vote on the part of Councilman Carman.

At the conclusion of the formal meeting members of the third grade from Plainview-Kennedy Elementary School spoke before the assemblage.

A moderator read a letter requesting that the board seriously review the pollution of our deep wells and act now to

secure the health and welfare of their future. The young lady went on to explain that her classmates are taking an active interest to insure their future health and the health of their future families.

Four youngsters, followed by reading their letters to the Town Board requesting in their own way that action be taken to guarantee the health and welfare of the public as regards the waste problem and pollution.

The moderator closed and presented the board with a petition of 50 signatures representing the members of her 3rd grade class.

Supervisor Colby thanked the class and the children, in particular, who spoke before the board, for their interest and concern. He assured them that every effort will be made to protect them and safeguard their future.

Termining the threat of court-ordered revaluation of all property in Nassau County at 100 percent of full market value "very real," Chairman of the Board of Assessors Abe Seldin and New York State Assemblyman Henry Dwyer (Nassau-21) announced, at a recent news conference in Mineola the submission of a legislative package aimed at protecting homeowners from the impact of such a possible court action.

This serious problem is based on the New York State Court of Appeals Hellerstein decision of June 5, 1975 which ordered Islip Town to revalue all property at 100 percent of full market value. The decision struck down lower court rulings which allowed assessors throughout the state to assess at a percentage of full market value or by utilizing construction costs as is done in Nassau County.

To date some sixty municipalities statewide have law suits filed against them demanding 100 percent revaluation," stated Dwyer. "It is significant to note that twelve local governments have already been ordered to revalue and not one municipality has won a court case."

"Nassau County has a similar suit filed against it," stated Seldin. "although we intend to fight the suit in the courts, we must prepare for any eventuality."

Dwyer, a member of the Assembly Real Property Tax Committee, will be the key sponsor of the bill in the Assembly and State Senator John Caemmerer (Nassau-7) will be the Senate sponsor. "We must be realistic," stated Dwyer. "This issue is of such statewide importance that I will personally initiate a bi-partisan effort to pass this legislation in the Assembly."

The proposed three-part legislative package is concerned with the cost of revaluation; the impact of revaluation on the homeowner and the total picture of spiraling property taxes.

There are 4,360,000 parcels of property within New York State. It is estimated that a revaluation throughout New York State would cost a minimum of \$30 per parcel, or a total of 30,000,000. In Nassau the cost would be at least \$10,000,000. To insure accuracy and to lessen the cost impact on government, the bill provides that local municipalities be permitted up to seven years to

complete the revaluation with the State sharing in the total cost. Funds would also be requested for the maintenance of the roll since the entire revaluation would be futile unless rolls can be updated periodically to insure equality of assessment.

The impact upon the public confidence in government during the revaluation must be considered. For that reason the bill mandates a full disclosure of the methods and criteria used in arriving at the new assessment before, during and after revaluation.

The prices of homes in suburban and rural areas have increased dramatically in recent years as a direct result of the migration from the cities. At the same time, the market value of commercial properties have increased at a much slower rate. Cities have maintained low assessment values on residential properties in an attempt to keep middle-class homeowners from fleeing to the suburbs. Revaluation, therefore, at current market value would cause a greater increase in assessment on residential properties than on commercial resulting in a greater increase in property taxes on residential properties.

Unique Service For Chronically Ill

A unique project designed to enrich the lives of Nassau residents who are homebound and chronically ill is being undertaken by Jewish Community Services of Long Island. The new program, known as "Quality of Life", will bring a variety of social, recreational, cultural and craft activities directly into the homes of disabled adults between 21 and 64 years of age.
